



Statement of the unexpended balance of the Health Fund for the year 1874.

Resolutions.

That the pay-rolls of this Department, when

approved by the Chairman of the Finance Committee, shall be duly certified by the President and Secretary, and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be authorized to commence the disinfection of privies and street gutters at such time as he may deem advisable.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be authorized to engage the necessary storage accommodations for disinfectants.

That the printing of the Annual Report, for the year ending April 30, 1874, be awarded to Appleton & Co., and the necessary engraving for the same to Endicott & Co.

That the Attorney be instructed to commence an action for the amount of the penalty named in the bond furnished by Messrs. Kane & Ryan upon obtaining a permit to dump manure within the city limits, until May 1, 1875, if the Sanitary Superintendent shall report any portion of such manure remaining in violation of the stipulation of said Kane & Ryan on or after the 20th day of May next.

That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be respectfully requested to transfer the unexpended balance of the Health Fund for 1874,

to the Small-pox Hospital Fund (supplies) for 1875, and that a copy of the report of the Sanitary Superintendent containing the reasons for this request be transmitted to said Board.

That the action pending against F. W. J. Hurst be discontinued without costs, but that his attention be especially directed to the provisions of sections 141 and 144 of the Sanitary Code with reference to future compliance therein.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending April 24, 1875. The total number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,156, as follows, viz. :

8 public buildings, 398 tenement houses, 137 private dwellings, 112 other dwellings, 5 manufactorys and workshops, 5 stores and warehouses, 36 stables, 51 slaughter-houses, 4 fat-rendering establishments, 2 tripe and head cleaning establishments, 1 roadway, 53 sunken and vacant lots, 46 yards, courts, and areas, 34 cellars and basements, 43 waste-pipes and drains, 98 privies and water-closets, 30 street-gutters and sidewalks, 3 dangerous stairways, 1 dangerous and smoky chimney, together with 84 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 436.

During the past week 62 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

57 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of this port.

208 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

York, and members of an organization known as the Orange County Milk Dealers' Association, respectfully state to your Honorable Body, as follows:

That your petitioners are desirous of securing a vigorous enforcement of the laws prohibiting the sale of adulterated or impure milk, believing that thereby not only will the health of the community be improved, but a direct benefit will be done to the business of your petitioners and all dealers in milk.

That, as your petitioners believe, the milk which is delivered by farmers and producers thereof in the country to dealers in this city, is frequently adulterated by the producers before leaving their hands.

That the circumstances attendant upon its delivery to the wholesale dealers in this city are such that it is almost impossible for them in the very brief period during which it remains in their hands to make thorough examinations or to apply satisfactory test as to its purity. The said milk arrives at the railroad depots in this city at night, is delivered in haste to the wholesale dealers, remains but a moment in their hands, and is instantly delivered by them to the retailers in a hasty and confused manner, the darkness, haste, and confusion preventing the wholesale dealers from doing more than to ascertain the quantity delivered.

That recently, in accordance with the laws on that subject, persons in the employ of the officers of said Department have caused the arrest and imprisonment of several retail milk dealers on a charge of selling impure or adulterated milk. That, as your petitioners believe, the fault does not lie as much with the retail dealers as with the farmers and producers. That should the milk arriving in this city at the railroad depots be examined immediately on its arrival, such impure milk would no doubt be discovered; its seizure and destruction would inflict pecuniary loss upon those who have adulterated it (and, who being personally beyond the jurisdiction of your Board, cannot be punished in any other manner), and thus make it to their interest in the future to send to this city none but pure milk, such as conforms to the required standard. Your petitioners further represent, that the test now in use for the purpose of ascertaining the purity of milk is not adequate or proper. That the impure milk bears the test of a lactometer more readily than that which is good and pure, but that should a chemical test be applied much milk that now readily conforms to the standard would be found unfit for use.

Wherefore your petitioners ask that your Board will cause proper persons, clothed with the authority of law, to attend at the several depots in this city, and, upon the arrival of the usual milk trains, to examine, inspect, and test the milk which arrives, or so much thereof as may be practicable, and to seize or destroy such as may be impure or unfit for public sale. Should the expense thereof be not properly, in the opinion of your Board, a public charge, your petitioners are willing to defray the same, if required.

And your petitioners will ever pray.
