

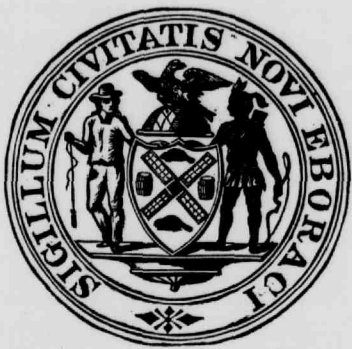

### Report for the Quarter ending June 30, 1879.

#### THE SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases.

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 21,419, as follows:

The number of complaints received from citizens during the three months ending June 30, 1879, was 2,291, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period granted, under instructions and authority of the Board, 1,235 permits to discharge cargoes upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 2,188 permits to scavengers to empty privies, their work being inspected by officers of this Board detailed for the purpose; 63 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; 28 permits to transport manure; and 32 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

During the three months ending June 30, 1879, six thousand five hundred and seventy-seven (6,577) permits were granted for burials. During the same period two hundred and sixty-eight (268) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; five hundred and nineteen (519) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; seven hundred and thirty-five (735) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; four hundred and forty-five (445) searches of the records of births, marriages and deaths were made; and three hundred and thirty-eight (338) transcripts of the records of deaths, sixty-two (62) of marriages, and fifty-eight (58) of births from said records were issued. There were four thousand three hundred and forty (4,340) persons registered as married during the quarter, and five thousand six hundred and seventy-seven (5,677) children were born during the same period.

## OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY—NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of the premises complained of. During the three months ending June 30, 1879, the number of notices issued by the Board was 3,542; these notices call attention of owners, lessees, and agents to a violation of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleansing, and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquent under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.
