THE SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases.

The number of complaints received from citizens during the three months ending June 30, 1879, was 2,291, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period granted, under instructions and authority of the Board, 1,235 permits to discharge cargoes upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 2,188 permits to scavengers to empty privies, their work being inspected by officers of this Board detailed for the purpose; 63 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; 28 permits to transport manure; and 32 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

During the three months ending June 30, 1879, six thousand five hundred and seventy-seven (6,577) permits were granted for burials. During the same period two hundred and sixty-eight (268) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; five hundred and inteteen (519) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; seven hundred and thirty-five (735) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; four hundred and forty-five (445) searches of the records of births, marriages and deaths were made; and three hundred and thirty-eight (338) trans-cripts of the records of deaths, sixty two (62) of marriages, and fifty-eight (58) of births from said records were issued. There were four thousand three hundred and forty (4.340) persons registered as married during the quarter, and five thousand six hundred and seventy-seven (5,677) children were born during the same period.
