Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 14, 1876: The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,709, as follows, viz.: I public building, 955 tenement-houses, 62 private dwellings, 14 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 13 stores and warehouses, 44 stables, I market place, 70 slaughter-houses, I public sewer, 30 fat-rendering establishments, 6 manure dumps, I pier and dock, 15 sunken and vacant lots, I glycerine works, 58 yards, courts, and areas, 73 cellars and basements, 128 waste-pipes and drains, 144 privies and water-closets, 51 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 4 dangerous chimneys, I violation of Code, 17 other nuisances, together with 3 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 400.

During the past week 58 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 19 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and funigated 19 houses, 19 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. 2 cases of small-pox were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps

SIR—There were 436 deaths reported for the week ending Saturday, October 14, being a decrease of 14 as compared with the previous week and 51 less than the number reported during the corresponding week of 1875. The actual mortality for the week ending October 7, was 460, which is 13 below the average number of deaths reported for the corresponding weeks of the past five years and represents an annual death-rate of 22.88 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1 of 7.76
