Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their Office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, June 6, 1894, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present-Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Cannon. The Construction or Executive Committee recommended the adoption of the following resolution

Resolved, That the action of the Chief Engineer in employing James McCartney as a Mason, at four dollars per day, and John L. McCartney as a Laborer, at two dollars per day, on June 4, 1894, be and hereby is approved. On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the same was adopted.

The Committee also reported the resignation of W. H. Armstrong, Laborer, and recom-mended that it be accepted, to take effect as of May 23, 1894.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the recommendation was approved. The Committee also presented the following communication, received from the Chief Engineer :

NEW YORK, June 6, 1894.

To the Honorable the Committee on Construction : GENTLEMEN-This is to recommend that the Aqueduct Commissioners advertise the sale at auction of all the hay on the site of the Titicus Reservoir.

I am, respectfully, A. FTELEY, Chief Engineer.

NEW YORK, June 6, 1894.

To the Honorable the Committee on Construction: GENTLEMEN—On May 23 you authorized me to procure from Mr. John Fox the pipes neces-sary for conveying the water around the contractor's work at the New Croton Dam where the Old Aqueduct at that point is interrupted for the purposes of the work.

These pipes, you may recollect, were found already manufactured in the foundry, and are now on their way and probably at Sing Sing. I stated to you that the special castings necessary for that work had to be manufactured, and prices were asked from the same foundry and also from Messrs. Coldwell-Wilcox Company for the same. Both parties offered to do the work for the same sum, i. e., \$52.50 per ton. Mr. Fox, however, asked four weeks to do the work, while Messrs. Coldwell-Wilcox Company promised to do it in two weeks.

The price is reasonable, and, in view of the importance, well known to you, of pushing that work, I ordered the special castings from Messrs. Coldwell-Wilcox Company; the weight is to be about nine (9) tons. Your approval of my action is respectfully requested.

I am, respectfully, A. FTELEY, Chief Engineer.


