AN ORDINANCE to amend section 183, chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, relating to the discharging of fire-arms.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Section 183, chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof the words "the grounds of Mrs. M. W. Dittmar, in Baychester."

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 17, 1895. Approved by the Mayor, September 23, 1895.

Resolved, That, for the purpose of defraying any minor or incidental expenses contingent to the Law Department, Office of Counsel to the Corporation, the Counsel to the Corporation may, by a requisition, draw upon the Comptroller for a sum not exceeding two hundred dollars; the Counsel to the Corporation may, in like manner, renew the draft as often as may by him be deemed necessary, to the extent of the appropriation set apart for the contingencies of the Law Department, Office of Counsel to the Corporation; but no such renewal shall be made until the money paid upon the preceding draft shall be accounted for to the Comptroller by the transmittal of a voucher or vouchers, certified by the Counsel to the Corporation, covering the expenditure of money paid thereon.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 17, 1895. Approved by the Mayor, September 23, 1895.

AN ORDINANCE for the better security of life and property in the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. That hereafter the owner or general contractor engaged in the construction or erection of any building over three stories in height, shall build or cause to be built, a temporary roof structure over the sidewalk in front of said building, and said contractor or owner, prior to the erection of such bridge or roof, must secure permission for such construction from the Commissioner of Public Works, and shall pay therefor such compensation as may be deemed equivalent by said Commissioner for the privilege so conferred.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 17, 1895. Approved by the Mayor, September 23, 1895.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Thomas Mullen to place and keep an ornamental lamp-post and lamp over the front of his premises, No. 230 Columbus avenue, provided the lamp be kept lighted during the same hours as the public lamps, that the post shall not exceed the dimensions prescribed by law (eighteen inches square at the base), the lamp not to exceed two feet in diameter, and not to be used for advertising purposes, the work to be done and gas supplied at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 17, 1895. Approved by the Mayor, September 25, 1895.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Young Men's Christian Association, of No. 52 East Twenty-third street, to place transparencies on the following lamp-posts: The southwest corner of Twenty-third street and Fourth avenue, the southeast corner of Twenty-third street and Sixth avenue, the southeast corner of Fourteenth street and Third avenue, the northeast corner of Eighteenth street and Sixth avenue, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue for two weeks from September 17, 1895.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 17, 1895. Approved by the Mayor, September 25, 1895.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Evening School No. 43 to place and keep transparencies on the following lamp-posts: Southeast corner of One Hundred and
