The Local Board of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, held its meeting in the temporary Borough Hall, corner of Jackson avenue and Fifth street, Long Island City, on August 11, 1899.

Present—Councilman David L. Van Nostrand and the President of the borough.

Minutes approved.

Public hearing was afforded on each of the following petitions:

To legally open Newtown avenue, from Flushing avenue to Grand avenue.

To sewer, grade, pave with asphalt, etc., Newtown avenue, from Flushing avenue to Grand avenue.

To sewer Pomeroy street, from Jamaica avenue to Broadway.

Whereupon favorable action was had thereon by the adoption of the following:

Whereas, At a meeting of this the Local Board of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, held this 11th day of August, 1899, the President of the borough aforementioned did submit to this Board for public hearing thereon, and for the consideration and action of this Board, as per notice duly published in the CITY RECORD, a petition for the legal opening of Newtown avenue, from Flushing avenue to Grand avenue, in the First Ward, borough and city aforesaid; and

Whereas, At such public hearing afforded, no opposition was made against this Board approving of said petition, and it appearing to this Board that compliance with the desires of the petitioners would be to the best interests of this city; therefore

Resolved, That the foregoing matter be and hereby is recommended to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, for its favorable action therein.

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, did submit to this the Local Board of aforementioned borough, at a meeting thereof held this 11th day of August, 1899, a petition for the sewer, grading, paving with asphalt, curbing and flagging of Newtown avenue, from Flushing avenue to Grand avenue, in First Ward, borough and city aforesaid; and,

Whereas, This Board did afford public hearing thereon in accordance with notice thereof, as appeared in CITY RECORD; and

Whereas, There was no person at said public hearing who advanced any argument against the wishes of the petitioners being approved of by this Board; and

Whereas, The conclusion arrived at by this Board is, that to improve said avenue, as desired by the owners of lands fronting thereon, would be to the best interests of the city; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it extend to the subject matter of the petition referred to its prompt and favorable consideration and action; also,

Whereas, Pursuant to public notice which appeared in CITY RECORD, the petition for the construction of public sewer in Pomeroy street, or Eighth avenue, from Jamaica avenue to Broadway, in the First Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, was submitted on the 11th day of August, 1899, to this the Local Board of aforementioned borough by the President thereof; and

Whereas, The requirements of the City Charter to afford public hearing thereon to all whom it may concern was duly complied with without developing any adverse opinion to this Board acquiescing in the wishes of the petitioners; and

Whereas, It is the conviction of this Board that it would be to the best interests of the city to cause aforesaid improvements to be made, do accordingly and it is hereby

Resolved, That recommendation of the subject matter aforesaid to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, as worthy of its prompt and favorable action in the advancement of same be and the same is hereby made.

On motion, the following was adopted:

Whereas, The Deputy Commissioner of Sewers, in and for the Borough of Queens, City of New York, did transmit to this the Local Board of borough aforementioned, communication from the Germania Real Estate and Improvement Company, with offices in the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, and bearing date of the 11th instant, wherein the desire is expressed for permit to be issued in conformity with section 560, chapter 378, Laws 1897, for the construction of sewers by them, at their own expense, in Fair View and in Grand View avenues and intersecting streets as therein named, and appear upon "cross section and grade chart for sewer system at Germania Heights," as submitted with said application; and

Whereas, No reasonable objection can be interposed against private property-owners investing their own means to improve their lands for any purpose, and is so recognized, encouraged and enabled by the section of the Charter of the Greater New York as above enumerated; wherefore it is accordingly

Resolved, That, as to the granting of permit as per copy of communication hereto annexed, recommendation be and same is hereby made to the Commissioner of Sewers and the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York.

Whereas, Petition of property-owners in Wickes street, in Richmond Hill, in the Fourth Ward, Borough of Queens, to grant permit to the Jamaica Water Supply Company to extend its water-main therein for a distance of about eight hundred feet to where said street is intersected by Newtown road was submitted by the President of the borough aforementioned to this the Local Board of said borough at its meeting held August 11, 1899; and

Whereas, The application thus made appears to us to be not only reasonable on the part of the petitioners, but that the same would be to the interest of all concerned; it is therefore

Resolved, That the matter be and hereby is recommended to the favorable consideration and action of the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York; also

Resolved, That the desires of the Department of Education to have Schools 15, 17 and 19, located in Corona, Borough of Queens, furnished with water, as set forth in communication addressed to the President of this Board, under date of August 10, 1899, be and the same is hereby indorsed in approval thereof; and that recommendation be and the same is hereby made to the Board of Public Improvements that it give the aforesaid subject its prompt action, to the end that such water connections may be made before the commencement of the new school term in September next.

On motion, the President of this Board was requested to communicate to the Dock Department the fact that the Commissioner of Sewers is about having the sewer extending on pier at foot of Broadway, First Ward, rebuilt and improved; for it is the opinion of this Board that for said Department to convert said sewer pier into a public dock would be to the best interests of that section of this borough.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX.

IN BOARD OF EXAMINERS, SEPTEMBER 5, 1899.

The Board of Examiners met this day at 3.15 P. M.

Present—Thomas J. Brady, Commissioner of Buildings for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx (in the chair), and Messrs. Dobbs, Moore, Coker, Fryer, Conover, McMillan and O'Reilly.

The minutes of August 29, 1899, were read and, on motion, approved.

Plan 689, New Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow the J. W. Rapp system of fireproof floor construction to be used for the first floor of building in place of brick arches, the underside of I beams to be covered with wire lath, as stated in petition; Nos. 725 and 727 East Fifth street. Petitioners, Horenburger and Straub. Approved, on condition that the centres have a rise of 1 1/4 inches to the foot, according to law.

Plan 900, New Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow the first-story hall partitions in large building to be constructed of 4-inch tee and angle irons, properly braced, and set not more than 30 inches apart, filled in solid between with fire-clay blocks 4 inches thick, and plastered on both sides; ceiling overhead to be constructed of 2-inch tee and angle irons, properly braced, and filled in between solid with burnt-clay blocks and plastered; also, to allow the first-story hall partitions and all stair hall partitions on each story of small building to be constructed of 4-inch tee and angle irons, properly braced and set not over 30 inches apart, filled in solid with fire-clay blocks 4 inches thick and plastered on both sides; all the stair hall and first-story hall ceilings to be constructed of 2-inch tee and angle irons, set not more than 2 inches apart, properly braced and filled in solid with burnt-clay blocks and plastered, all as stated in petition; Nos. 442 to 446 East Tenth street. Plan 1245, New buildings, 1899—Petition to allow height of buildings to be extended to 38 feet 2 inches from curb level to highest point of roof beams, as stated in petition; west side of Union avenue, 50 feet south of One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street. Petitioner, Robert Green. Approved.

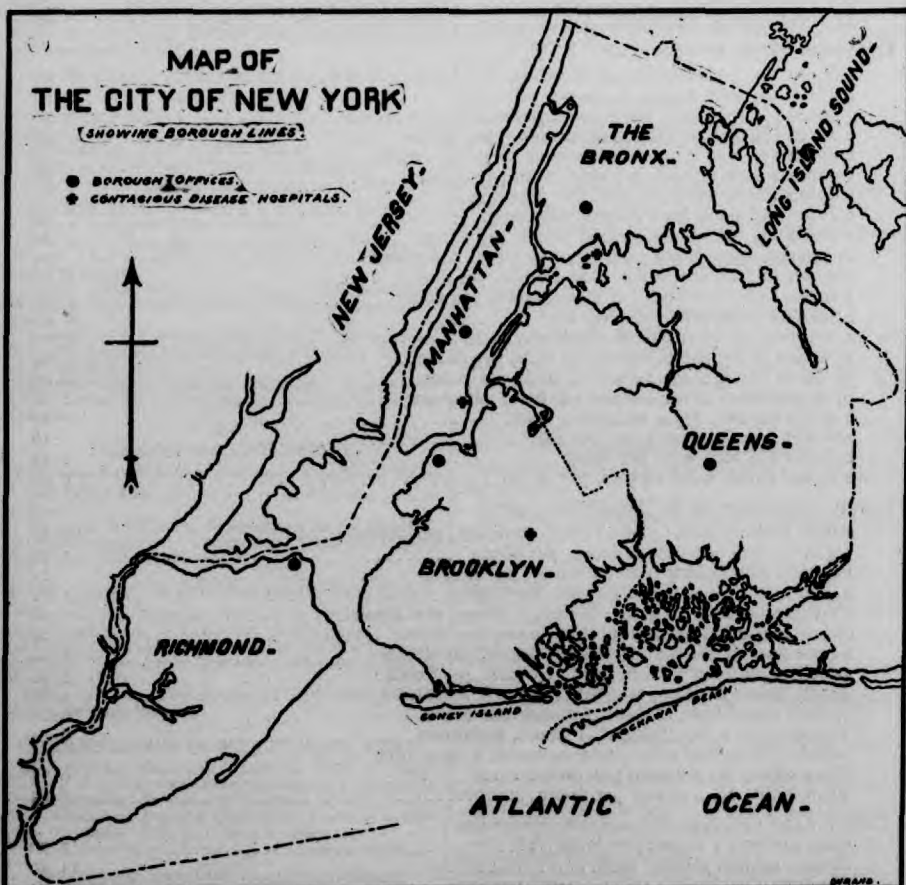
