From the Deputy Commissioner, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens-

1. Concerning the inquiry from the Vice-President of the Niagara Fire Insurance Company as to the efficiency of the fire-alarm system of the Village of Flushing, and reporting in reference thereto. Copy of report forwarded said company.

2. Recommending that the Municipal Civil Service Commission be requested to certify an eligible list for member of the Uniformed Force the name of Francis H. Dodd, Borough of

Brooklyn. Recommendation approved.

From the Fire Marshal, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens—Report of transactions of Bureau for week ending the 1st instant.

From the Chief of Department-

I. Recommending that application be made to the Postmaster of The City of New York to have the letter box on lamp-post northwest corner of John and William streets, Borough of Manhattan, removed to lamp-post on opposite corner, as the Department desires to alter said lamp-post on northwest corner to a combination fire-alarm signal post. Recommendation

2. Reporting respecting the complaint of M. Kirstein that their goods in warehouse and factory, at the fire on the 25th instant, were exposed unnecessarily, and reporting that it is not the duty of this Department, but of the Police and Insurance Patrol, to protect buildings and merchandise in such emergency. Notify complainant.

3. Recommending that a contract be awarded the Gamewell Fire-alarm Telegraph Company for overhauling old fire-alarm box keyless doors, they being the lowest bidders. Recommendation approved.

4. Recommending that permission be granted Oelrichs & Co., agents of the North German Lloyd Steamship Company, to present to the Captain of the fire-boat "New Yorker" (Engine 57), and to the Captain of fire-boat "Robert A. Van Wyck" (Engine 66), a gold chronometer, in appreciation of their valuable services rendered on the occasion of a fire at the docks of said company in Hoboken, June 30, 1900. Recommendation approved.

5. The increase asked for the ensuing year is explained as follows:

The increase asked for present force tor 1901 and for advancement in grade of Firemen is mandatory. This accounts for \$73,715 of the increase asked.

The new house at One Hundred and Fifty-second street and Prospect avenue will shortly be completed and it will be necessary to equip the same with an adequate working force.

The two Hook and Ladder Companies and the Engine Company which it is desired to change to double companies are located in sections of the City which need increased protection.

The reason for asking for 8 Pump Engineers for the Fireboats is that the engine-room and the pump-room are located in different parts of the boat, and when the Engineer is in the latter room attending to the working of the pumps, and it is necessary to move the boat in answer to a signal from the commanding officer, delay and danger arise; it is to obviate this trouble in the future that this allowance is asked.

The Department has recently acquired a searchlight engine which has proven of great advantage at fires, and an allowance of \$1,600 is asked to provide for the appointment of a regular Engineer to run the same.
