BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.

The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York met at the office of the Board, No. 21 Park row, on Wednesday, August 21, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M., pursuant to notice.

The roll was called and the following members were present and answered to their names: The Comptroller (Deputy Comptroller Levey), the Commissioner of Water Supply, the Commissioner of Highways, the Commissioner of Sewers (Deputy Commissioner Donahue), the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies (Deputy Commissioner Dowling), the Commissioner of Bridges and the President of the Borough of Richmond.
 The President, Hon. Maurice F. Holahan, presided.
 The minutes of the meeting of August 14, 1901, were approved as printed.

CHANGE OF GRADE OF EIGHTY-THIRD AND EIGHTY-FOURTH STREETS, BROOKLYN.

In the matter of the proposed change of grades of Eighty-third and Eighty-fourth streets, between Second and Third avenues, Borough of Brooklyn, the report of the President was read, showing that the matter had been duly advertised for a hearing as required by law.

After hearing Mr. E. A. Hackett and Mr. Brown, property-owners who applied for a postponement, and Mr. R. Kelly, in favor of the proposed change of grade, on motion of the Commissioner of Bridges, the hearing was adjourned to September 4.

CLOSING FORTY-FOURTH, FORTY-SEVENTH, FORTY-EIGHTH, FORTY-NINTH AND FIFTIETH STREETS, BROOKLYN.

In the matter of the proposed closing and discontinuing of Forty-fourth, Forty-seventh, Forty-eighth, Forty-ninth and Fiftieth streets, between First avenue and New York Bay, Borough of Brooklyn, the report of the President was read, showing that the matter had been duly advertised for a hearing as required by law.

Notably appearing in opposition to the proposed closing, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 31st day of July, 1901, resolutions were adopted, proposing to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by the closing and discontinuing of Forty-fourth, Forty-seventh, Forty-eighth, Forty-ninth and Fiftieth streets, from First avenue to the high-water line, New York Bay, in the Eighth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and for a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 21st day of August, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M., at which meeting such proposed closing and discontinuing would be considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed closing and discontinuing would be considered, to be published in the City Record and the corporation newspapers for at least ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 21st day of August, 1901; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record and of the publishers of the corporation newspapers that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the City Record and the corporation newspapers for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 21st day of August, 1901; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed closing and discontinuing, who have appeared, and such proposed closing and discontinuing was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by the closing and discontinuing of Forty-fourth, Forty-seventh, Forty-eighth, Forty-ninth and Fiftieth streets, from First avenue to the high-water line, New York Bay, in the Eighth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same so as to close and discontinue the aforesaid streets, as follows:

"A"—Forty-fourth Street.

Beginning at the intersection of the northern side-line of Forty-fourth street with the western side-line of First avenue:

1. Thence westerly along the northern side-line of Forty-fourth street for 496 feet to the high-water line;
2. Thence southerly along the high-water line to the southern side-line of Forty-fourth street; said southern side-line is 60 feet from and parallel to the northern side-line of Forty-fourth street;
3. Thence easterly along the southern side-line of Forty-fourth street for 502 feet to the western side-line of First avenue;
4. Thence northerly along the western side-line of First avenue for 60 feet to the point of beginning.

"B"—Forty-seventh Street.

Beginning at the intersection of the northern side-line of Forty-seventh street with the western side-line of First avenue:

1. Thence westerly along the northern side-line of Forty-seventh street for 473.83 feet to the high-water line;
2. Thence southerly along the high-water line to the southern side-line of Forty-seventh street; said southern side-line is 60 feet from and parallel to the northern side-line of Forty-seventh street;
3. Thence easterly along the southern side-line of Forty-seventh street for 510 feet to the western side-line of First avenue;
4. Thence northerly along the western side-line of First avenue for 60 feet to the point of beginning.

"C"—Forty-eighth Street.

Beginning at the intersection of the northern side-line of Forty-eighth street with the western side-line of First avenue:

1. Thence westerly along the northern side-line of Forty-eighth street for 582 feet to the high-water line;
2. Thence southerly along the high-water line to the southern side-line of Forty-eighth street; said southern side-line is 60 feet from and parallel to the northern side-line of Forty-eighth street;
3. Thence easterly along the southern side-line of Forty-eighth street for 752.75 feet to the western side-line of First avenue;
4. Thence northerly along the western side-line of First avenue for 60 feet to the point of beginning.

"D"—Forty-ninth Street.

Beginning at the intersection of the northern side-line of Forty-ninth street with the western side-line of First avenue:

1. Thence westerly along the northern side-line of Forty-ninth street for 737.75 feet to the high-water line;
2. Thence southerly along the high-water line to the southern side-line of Forty-ninth street; said southern side-line is 60 feet from and parallel to the northern side-line of Forty-ninth street;
3. Thence easterly along the southern side-line of Forty-ninth street for 733 feet to the western side-line of First avenue;
4. Thence northerly along the western side-line of First avenue for 60 feet to the point of beginning.

"E"—Fiftieth Street.

Beginning at the intersection of the northern side-line of Fiftieth street with the western side-line of First avenue:

1. Thence westerly along the northern side-line of Fiftieth street for 511.33 feet to the high-water line;
2. Thence southerly along the high-water line to the southern side-line of Fiftieth street; said southern side-line is 60 feet from and parallel to the northern side-line of Fiftieth street;
3. Thence easterly along the southern side-line of Fiftieth street for 511.33 feet to the western side-line of First avenue;
4. Thence northerly along the western side-line of First avenue for 60 feet to the point of beginning.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution, approving of the above-named proposed change in the map or plan of The City of New York by closing and discontinuing the above-named streets, adopted by this Board, together with a statement of its reasons therefor, be transmitted to the Municipal Assembly for its action thereon.

IN MUNICIPAL ASSEMBLY.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

That, in pursuance of section 436 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 21st day of August, 1901, be and the same hereby is approved, viz:

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by the closing and discontinuing of Forty-fourth, Forty-seventh, Forty-eighth, Forty-ninth and Fiftieth streets, from First avenue to the high-water line, New York Bay, in the Eighth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same so as to close and discontinue the aforesaid streets, as follows:

"A"—Forty-fourth Street.

Beginning at the intersection of the northern side-line of Forty-fourth street with the western side-line of First avenue:

1. Thence westerly along the northern side-line of Forty-fourth street for 496 feet to the high-water line;
2. Thence southerly along the high-water line to the southern side-line of Forty-fourth street; said southern side-line is 60 feet from and parallel to the northern side-line of Forty-fourth street;
3. Thence easterly along the southern side-line of Forty-fourth street for 502 feet to the western side-line of First avenue;
4. Thence northerly along the western side-line of First avenue for 60 feet to the point of beginning.

"B"—Forty-seventh Street.

Beginning at the intersection of the northern side-line of Forty-seventh street with the western side-line of First avenue:

1. Thence westerly along the northern side-line of Forty-seventh street for 473.83 feet to the high-water line;
2. Thence southerly along the high-water line to the southern side-line of Forty-seventh street; said southern side-line is 60 feet from and parallel to the northern side-line of Forty-seventh street;
3. Thence easterly along the southern side-line of Forty-seventh street for 510 feet to the western side-line of First avenue;
4. Thence northerly along the western side-line of First avenue for 60 feet to the point of beginning.

"C"—Forty-eighth Street.

Beginning at the intersection of the northern side-line of Forty-eighth street with the western side-line of First avenue:

1. Thence westerly along the northern side-line of Forty-eighth street for 582 feet to the high-water line;
2. Thence southerly along the high-water line to the southern side-line of Forty-eighth street; said southern side-line is 60 feet from and parallel to the northern side-line of Forty-eighth street;
3. Thence easterly along the southern side-line of Forty-eighth street for 752.75 feet to the western side-line of First avenue;
4. Thence northerly along the western side-line of First avenue for 60 feet to the point of beginning.

"D"—Forty-ninth Street.

Beginning at the intersection of the northern side-line of Forty-ninth street with the western side-line of First avenue:

1. Thence westerly along the northern side-line of Forty-ninth street for 737.75 feet to the high-water line;
2. Thence southerly along the high-water line to the southern side-line of Forty-ninth street; said southern side-line is 60 feet from and parallel to the northern side-line of Forty-ninth street;
3. Thence easterly along the southern side-line of Forty-ninth street for 733 feet to the western side-line of First avenue;
4. Thence northerly along the western side-line of First avenue for 60 feet to the point of beginning.

"E"—Fiftieth Street.

Beginning at the intersection of the northern side-line of Fiftieth street with the western side-line of First avenue:

1. Thence westerly along the northern side-line of Fiftieth street for 511.33 feet to the high-water line;
2. Thence southerly along the high-water line to the southern side-line of Fiftieth street; said southern side-line is 60 feet from and parallel to the northern side-line of Fiftieth street;
3. Thence easterly along the southern side-line of Fiftieth street for 511.33 feet to the western side-line of First avenue;
4. Thence northerly along the western side-line of First avenue for 60 feet to the point of beginning.

LAYING OUT PUBLIC PLACE AT HIGHLAND BOULEVARD, BROOKLYN.

The following report from the Chief Topographical Engineer was read:

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU, August 19, 1901.

MR. JOHN H. MURPHY, Secretary, Board of Public Improvements:

SIR:—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn recommending that proceedings be initiated to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out as a public place the plot bounded by Highland Boulevard, Bushwick avenue and Fanchon place, Borough of Brooklyn, I transmit herewith, for a public hearing and adoption, a map entitled "Map of plan showing the laying out of public places at the junction of Highland Boulevard and Bushwick avenue, in the Twenty-sixth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York."

The Local Board of the Ninth District recommended the laying out of a public place, the plot bounded by Highland Boulevard, Bushwick avenue and Fanchon place, which in reality embraces two plots of land, one from Gillen place to Fanchon place and one small triangular plot south of Gillen place; the title of the map therefore mentions the laying out of public places.

The main reason given by the petitioners for the laying out of this place is that the grades between Highland Boulevard and Bushwick avenue are very steep and that the public place would afford more easy access from the two important avenues, namely Bushwick avenue and Highland Boulevard, which assertion is correct.

The assessed valuation of the triangular plot south of Gillen place is \$10, and the owner is the Brooklyn City Railroad Company. The assessed valuation of the public place bounded by Gillen place, Fanchon place, Highland Boulevard and Bushwick avenue is \$5,150.

There are a number of frame buildings thereon owned by different parties.

Papers in the matter returned and technical description for the public hearing attached.

LAYING OUT CAMBERLING AVENUE, BRONX.

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU, August 19, 1901.

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, Secretary, Board of Public Improvements:

Sir—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx recommending that the final maps of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, now Borough of The Bronx, be amended by showing thereon Camberling Avenue, from Grove Street to East One Hundred and Eighty-first Street, and between Belmont Avenue and Clinton Avenue, in accordance with an appended sketch, I herewith file herewith for adoption and a public hearing a map entitled "Map or plan showing the laying out of the extension of Camberling Avenue, from Grove Street to East One Hundred and Eighty-first Street, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York."

The block between Belmont Avenue and Clinton Avenue through which this extension is contemplated is of an irregular shape and the proposed extension will subdivide the block to advantage.

The final maps did not lay out any street in this block because it was deemed expedient to leave this matter for the future.

I transmit herewith technical description and return papers in the matter.

This easterly line of the proposed Camberling Avenue is to be extended northerly to Grove Street, cutting off a strip about 24 feet in width from the block between One Hundred and Eighty-second Street and Grove Street.

Resolved, That the President of this Board cause to be prepared, for submission to this Board, three similar maps or plans, for certification and filing in the manner required by law, showing as nearly as possible the nature and extent of the proposed laying out of the above-named Avenue and the location of the immediate adjacent or intersecting open or established public streets, avenues, roads, squares or places sufficient for the identification and location thereof.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed laying out of the above-named Avenue at a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 18th day of September, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board cause these resolutions, and a notice to all persons affected thereby, that the proposed laying out of the above-named Avenue will be considered at a meeting of this Board to be held at the aforesaid time and place, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 18th day of September, 1901.

LAYING OUT HEALY AVENUE, QUEENS.

The following report from the Chief Topographical Engineer was read and the matter was referred to the President of the Borough of Queens:

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, Secretary, Board of Public Improvements:

Sir—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Queens recommending the laying out of Healy Avenue, from Bayswater Avenue to Kew-Forest Avenue (at Rockaway), in the Fifth Ward, Borough of Queens, I have to state as follows:

Healy Avenue was laid out by the Board of Public Improvements from Ugan Avenue to Carnegie Avenue, and its extension in Bayswater Avenue was requested in the resolution of the Local Board, Borough of Queens, of July 5, 1901.

Healy Avenue, from Carnegie Avenue to Bayswater Avenue, is laid out on the ground and shown on the last map of Queens County. It is a straight extension northerly of that part of Healy Avenue, from Ugan Avenue to Carnegie Avenue, and about 200 feet southerly of Bayswater Avenue it curves toward the east and intersects Bayswater Avenue.

Almost opposite this intersection the place comes from the north into Bayswater Avenue, and it seems that it would be preferable if Healy Avenue were laid out entirely straight and would intersect Bayswater Avenue directly opposite Park Place.

From the resolution of the Local Board it is not possible to understand which line the petitioners favor, and I recommend therefore that the matter be returned to the Local Board, with the request to furnish an accurate map.

This latter resolution is made under the rule established by the Board of Public Improvements on March 24, 1893: "That all petitions shall be accompanied by maps."

QUEENING WEST THIRD STREET, BROOKLYN.

The following report from the Chief Topographical Engineer was read:

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU, August 19, 1901.

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, Secretary, Board of Public Improvements:

Sir—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn recommending that proceedings be initiated to acquire title to Union Street, from Washington Avenue to New York Avenue, and from the former city line to East New York Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, I have to state that there is no legal obstacle against approving the recommendation.

Union Street is laid down on the Commissioner's Map of the City of Brooklyn, and on the Kings County Town Survey Map, filed in the office of the Register, Kings County. It has a width of 70 feet from Washington Avenue to New York Avenue, and from New York Avenue to the former city line the width is reduced to 35 feet by chapter 631 of the Laws of 1868; from the former city line to East New York Avenue, I understand that it is 35 feet wide also.

There are buildings on the land to be acquired.

I wish, however, to make the following statement in relation to opening Union Street: The tracks of the Brighton Beach Railroad cross Union Street at a depth of about 30 feet below the projected lines of Union Street, and it will be necessary, therefore, under section 61 of the Laws of 1897, to notify the railroad company that the City intends to open Union Street, and to apply to the Railroad Commissioners to approve the matter of crossing the railroad.

REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON WATT'S STREET, MANHATTAN.

The following petition was placed on file:

In the Matter

of

The Application of The Mayor, etc., relative to acquiring title to Watt's Street, from Sullivan Street to West Broadway at Broome Street.

The petition of Ellen W. Duryea and others, whose names are appended to this petition, respectfully shew:

I.—That, by resolution of the Board of Street Openings and Improvement of the former City of New York, passed June 18, 1897, there was duly laid out as provided by law the extension of Watt's Street, from Sullivan Street to West Broadway at Broome Street, and that by resolution passed the same day the said Board directed the Corporation Counsel to take the necessary proceedings to acquire title for public use to the lands required for said extension of said Watt's Street, from Sullivan Street to West Broadway, and did thereupon determine that the entire cost and expense of such proceedings should be assessed upon property deemed to be benefited thereby.

II.—That the usual proceedings were thereafter had according to law, and that the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment appointed to said proceedings did, on the 21st day of July, 1901, file their preliminary estimate and assessment in and by which said estimate the Commissioners awarded the owners of real property taken for said extension of Watt's Street, the sum of three hundred and fourteen thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight (\$314,868) dollars, and did thereupon assess the total sum of three hundred and fourteen thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight (\$314,868) dollars upon property within an area of assessment fixed by the said Commissioners, and including the property of your petitioners.

III.—That the opening and extension of Watt's Street, from Sullivan Street to West Broadway at Broome Street, was not intended to and does not encroach upon private property; that the section of the city through which the said extension is projected has been for many years past adequately laid out into streets and avenues and amply provided with all necessary and convenient means and methods of access, development and transportation, and that the said section of the city is, and has been for many years past, fully supplied with streets and street improvements; that the said opening and extension of Watt's Street is an absolutely unnecessary improvement of a general and public character, although conferring no local benefit upon property in the vicinity; that it brings for the first time into direct communication the railroad ferries and steamship docks at the foot of Watt's and West Broadway streets with West Broadway and thence in a direct line by means of Broome Street with Broadway and Elm Street, and West Broadway, Broadway and Elm Street being of course the principal avenues of communication from north to south. That by reason of such facts the said extension of Watt's Street forms the connecting link between the said principal avenues of communication and the various steamship docks and ferries.

Your petitioners therefore pray that at least three-fourths of the expense of acquiring title in the said extension of Watt's Street be placed upon The City of New York in large.

DEAR SIR—At a meeting of the Board of Public Improvements held on April 18, 1900, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn presented a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Fifth District, Borough of Brooklyn, recommending that a sewer be constructed in Nineteenth Street, between high-water mark and the bulkhead line, in the said Borough.

The matter was laid over and no further action was taken for the reason that the street was not open for public use. Commissioners were appointed on the opening of Nineteenth Street, between the points above mentioned in March, 1901.

The neighborhood is very much in need of this sewer, and I would be pleased to have you adopt a resolution declaring the street open, at your meeting held this date.

DEAR SIR—Under dates of May 31 and July 6, 1901, the President of the Borough of Queens addressed communications to me embodying resolutions of the Local Board of Public Improvements for that borough, calling for the laying of water-mains in North Henry street, between Flushing and Newtown avenues, and in Academy street, between Jamaica avenue and Broadway, both in the First Ward of that borough.

From report made to me by the Chief Engineer of this Department I find that the water-mains are necessary, and in order to carry out the purposes of the President's communications, and the resolutions of the Local Board it is necessary to lay mains in Newtown road, between Jackson avenue and Broadway; in Broadway, between Newtown road and Lyster street; in Academy street, between Broadway and Jamaica avenue, and in North Henry street, between Newtown and Flushing avenues. The total distance is 4,000 feet, on which there are 47 lateral requiring water supply and fire protection. The estimated cost is \$6,000, to be paid from the appropriation for "Laying Water-mains, Borough of Queens, for 1901."

I therefore recommend the adoption by your Board of the aforesaid resolutions, authorizing the laying of these mains, and that a corresponding resolution or ordinance be transmitted to the Municipal Assembly for adoption.

DEAR SIR—Referring to a letter dated April 12, from the Secretary of the Board, with a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Eighth District, Borough of Brooklyn, directing that Lots Nos. 1 to 5, inclusive, and 57 to 59, inclusive, Block 120, Twenty-fifth Ward Map, situated on the south side of Sumner street, between Hopkinson and Rockaway avenues, on north side of McDougall street, between Hopkinson and Rockaway avenues, and on the west side of Rockaway avenue, between Sumner and McDougall streets, be enclosed with a close board fence, six feet high, I beg to report that it is necessary to fence these lots and I recommend that the work be authorized.

The estimated cost of the work provided for in the resolution of the Local Board is \$150, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$17,750.

"Resolved, That the Local Board of the Eighth District, Borough of Brooklyn, directing it for the public interest so to do, hereby directs that the lots lying on the south side of Sumner street, between Hopkinson and Rockaway avenues; on the north side of McDougall street, between Hopkinson and Rockaway avenues, and on the west side of Rockaway avenue, between Sumner and McDougall streets, known as Lots Nos. 1 to 5, inclusive, and 57 to 59, inclusive, Block 120, Twenty-fifth Ward Map, be enclosed with a close board fence, six feet high, at the expense of the owner or owners of the said lots." These lots being assessed to this Board on estimate of value of the cost of said work in improvement, and a statement of the assessed value, according to the law preceding tax, of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment. The estimated cost of said work is one hundred and fifty dollars. The said assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is seventeen thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars; and it is further

Resolved, by this Board, That, in pursuance of section 402 of the Greater New York Charter, this Board does hereby determine that no portion of the cost and expense of said local improvement shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but that the whole of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby.

DEAR SIR—I beg to acknowledge receipt of a letter dated August 2, from the Secretary of the Board, with a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Eighth District, Borough of Brooklyn, recommending that proceedings be initiated to repave, grade and pave East Nineteenth street with asphalt pavement, from Avenue D northward to a point 20 feet south of the easterly line of Tenise court, and to cut or meet with or lay street where not already done.

Upon investigation I find that the proposed improvement is necessary, and that the estimated cost, including concrete foundation for the pavement and five years' maintenance, is \$17,000. The assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$107,000.

I recommend that the work be authorized.

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, Secretary, Board of Public Improvements:

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Queens recommending the construction of a public sewer and appurtenances in Ely avenue, in the First Ward, Borough of Queens, from Jamaica avenue to Grand avenue, I have to state as follows:

The grade, monument and sewer book of Long Island City, filed in the County Clerk's office, Jamaica, December 31, 1875, shows a plan for certain sewers in Ely avenue which must be changed in order to carry out the request of the Local Board, and because the actually constructed sewers in that neighborhood differ materially from the filed sewer book of 1875.

A map was therefore prepared entitled "Modified plan of drainage, showing the location, size and grades in Sewerage District No. 1, Ely avenue, between Jamaica avenue and Grand avenue, in the First Ward (former Long Island City), Borough of Queens, City of New York," and is herewith submitted for adoption.

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU,

New York, August 19, 1901.

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, Secretary, Board of Public Improvements:

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Queens, recommending that Delaware avenue, between Jackson avenue and Newtown avenue, First Ward, Borough of Queens, be graded, cut and flagged, I have to state as follows:

Delaware avenue is laid out in the Commissioners' Map of Long Island City filed April 25, 1873, and grades, monuments and sewers for the same were filed December 31, 1875.

The avenue is not legally opened, but proceedings for acquiring title were initiated by the City March 1, 1899, and since accessible improvements can only be made in legally opened or dedicated streets, no action can be taken in this matter.

In connection with this report, I beg to state that the existing surface grades of DeBevoise avenue differ from the filed grades in a number of cases, and that it would be advisable to modify the grades between Jackson and Newtown avenues.

A map was prepared for this purpose, showing the change of grades in DeBevoise avenue, from Jackson avenue to Newtown avenue, and is submitted herewith with a recommendation that it be referred to the Local Board, Borough of Queens, for a public hearing.

In case the property-owners should not favor any change of grades I would recommend that the Local Board pass a resolution requesting the Board of Public Improvements to fix a day of vesting title to DeBevoise avenue.

After vesting of title, the grading, etc., can be proceeded with.
