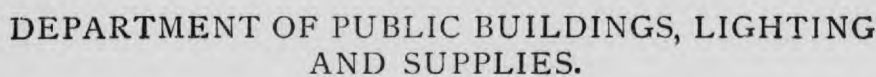

Certificates were issued for the installation of 104,360 incandescent and 619 arc lights, 47 generators of a total of 1,651½ kilowatts capacity and 1,442 motors of a total of 3,728½ horse-power capacity; 3,559 certificates were issued for interior wiring.

10,558 miles of overhead wires were removed from the streets, and 15,824 inspections were made by the Inspectors during the quarter.

OFFICE OF ASSISTANT ENGINEER.

By the introduction of Welsbach lights and gas governors in the principal public buildings which are wholly lighted by gas, there has been a saving during the quarter of 1,600,000 cubic feet of gas over the average of preceding years.

DOCUMENT "C."

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS, LIGHTING AND SUPPLIES,
BUREAU OF REPAIRS AND SUPPLIES, NOS. 13 TO 21 PARK ROW,
NEW YORK, JULY 2, 1901.

Hon. HENRY S. KEARNY, Commissioner, Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies:

SIR—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of this Bureau for the quarter ending June 30, 1901.

CRIMINAL COURT BUILDING.

The usual orders for cleaning glass in doors and windows were renewed. Plumber's supplies, carpenter's supplies, janitor's supplies, engineer's supplies, consisting of oil, waste, etc., were furnished. Five carboys of electrolyte, 1,400°, also furnished. One flagpole on the northwest corner of the above building was removed and replaced with one new pole of clear white pine, free from sap or other imperfections. Size of pole 75 feet long, 11½ inches in diameter at butt, 12½ inches at ten feet from butt, tapering to 5½ inches at top. The pole was painted three coats of paint made of Atlantic white lead and linseed oil of best quality. The eagle figure on top of old pole was removed and replaced on new pole. Also the halyards on old pole replaced on new pole.

The wood and glass partitions in the rooms recently occupied by the District Attorney on the third floor of the above building were removed, repaired, reconstructed and set up in offices on the first floor of the above building for the Coroners' Office.

The platform, railings, Coroner's bench, jury-box, etc., were removed from old quarters on the third floor of the above building, repaired, reconstructed and set up in the room on the corner of Elm and White streets, on first floor of the building.

New iron necessary to make repairs to the roof recently damaged by fire was furnished.

Iron trusses, bridge beams, rafters, purlins, etc., necessary to repair the iron structure on the roof of the above building, recently damaged by fire, was constructed and put in place.

An order for a supply of electric current was furnished during the month of June, 1901.

The copper and tile roof of building damaged by fire was repaired as follows: All that part of roof which was covered with tile, covered with Spanish tile, same style and quality as that at present on roof, laid with best quality of oil cement. The copper gutter-braces were set to the iron purlins. The old copper on premises was used for flashings, roof-deck flanges and valley linings.

All that part which was covered with copper was all covered with new 16-ounce copper. All the material was the best of their several kinds.

Water-tight coverings were furnished and used temporarily on roof damaged by fire until permanent repairs were made to same.

Fifty-five awning frames were removed from building, repaired and reconstructed where necessary, and covered with best quality of Neapolitan covering, style 94, and same placed on the windows, with all necessary cords, pulleys, etc., complete.

Two hot-water meters repaired.

About 800 incandescent lamps repaired and renewed.

The Elevators—No. 1. Pistons and valves repacked. No. 3. Cut-off valves adjusted. No. 4. cut-off rope repaired. No. 6. Piston and valves repacked. Main rope was shortened. Piston main valve, pilot valve and cut-off valve repacked; valves also repacked and cut-off adjusted. A new governor rope, new cut-off shaft furnished and put in place and keys fitted and all ropes oiled, car, sheaves, etc., cleaned.

Matron's Room—One toilet cabinet, with a set of clean towels weekly, was furnished.

Court of Special Sessions—Three toilet cabinets, with a supply of clean towels weekly, were furnished.

Court of General Sessions—Two Trow's Directories for 1901; the following law books: Birdseye's Abbott's Clerks and Conveyances Assistant, New York Criminal Reports, volume 15 and following volumes; New York Miscellaneous Reports, vols. 1 to 19 inclusive, 5 copies Cook's Annotated Code for 1901, 2 copies Silvernail's Annotated Code for 1901, and copy of Parker's Annotated Code for 1901; 2 screens, 1 plated tray for water pitcher, and 3 large Lundell electric fans were furnished and installed. About 165 yards of Brussels carpet was furnished and laid with the best paper lining. The platform in the above court was extended, the location of jury-box and railing was changed, also new railing put up and other alterations made as directed to make room conform as nearly as possible with Part I. of the above court. About 45 linear feet of iron railing, with gate, spring hinges, secret lock, oak handrailing, etc., all finished in gold bronze made and erected in the above court-room.

Judges' Chamber—Five toilet cabinets, with a supply of clean towels weekly, were furnished.

Clerk's Office—One toilet cabinet with a supply of clean towels weekly was furnished.

Coroner's Office—A supply of 24 towels weekly, 1 Trow's Business Directory, 1 Medical Register, 1 Code Criminal Procedure and Penal Code 1901, 1 Code of Civil Procedure, 1 Greater New York Charter (Revised Edition), 1 Map of Greater New York, 2 dozen cane-seat bent-wood chairs, 2 revolving desk chairs, 1 oak 8-foot table and 4 small tables as selected were furnished. The service of laborers was furnished to remove the desk, benches, platform, jury-boxes, etc., from the third floor to present court-room of Coroners on first floor of Criminal Court Building. About 259 yards of plain "A" linoleum were furnished and laid in the above office. A quartered oak and glass partition was made and erected in toilet-rooms connected with the above office. Also toilet compartments inclosed, base, door trim, etc., were repaired and the necessary hardware furnished for same. Partitions, railings, benches, etc., recently removed from third floor were cleaned off, bleached where necessary, touched up and varnished and same set up in offices on the ground floor. About 230 yards of Brussels carpet was furnished, laid and lined with best paper lining. One 5-ton safe removed from office lately occupied by the Coroners to their new offices on the first floor of Criminal Court Building. A system of electric call bells from private offices of the Coroners was installed.

District Attorney's Office—6 oak bent-wood cane-seat chairs without arms; 6 oak bent-wood cane-seat chairs with arms. 2 antique oak bookcases, about 70 by 60 inches, with glass doors; 8 rugs 30 inches by 60 inches, 1 rug 9 by 12 feet, 2 Kinsman desk electric lights, 6 general Directories of Manhattan and The Bronx. 2 Trow's Copartnership and Corporation Directories; 2 Greater New York Business Directories and 6 Lain & Healy's Brooklyn Directories furnished. One 5-ton safe removed from old offices to new offices of Indictment Bureau, also 1 safe from Library to District Attorney's Office; about 35 yards of Brussels carpet, using best quality of paper lining, was furnished and laid. Shelving and base removed, fire openings, with bricks, jams, trim, etc., prepared; 5 quartered oak doors, with hardware to match, furnished and hung. Also repairs made to base mouldings and floor as directed.

An iron railing with gates, locks, spring hinges, handholes, glass shelves, etc., was made and erected for the above Commission.

COUNTY COURT-HOUSE.

The usual orders for a supply of steam, cleaning glass in windows and doors were renewed, cleaning and Engineer's supplies were furnished. All worn-out and defective parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts. 1 dozen Winn's Ball Bearing adjustable door-holders were also furnished. 24 shades made of nonpareil shade cloth made and put up, and 14 new tin rollers were furnished and repairs were made to the balance of the shades throughout the building.

County Clerk's Office—1 enameled washstand complete, with pitcher, bowl, etc., and 1 6-gallon iron porcelain-lined water-cooler were furnished. About 70 yards of body brussels carpet was furnished and laid. 7 dozen Winn's Ball Bearing adjustable door-holders were furnished and properly attached to doors.

Surrogates' Office—1 leather covered lounge as selected, three N. B. stapling machines with 6 boxes of staples, and 1 Remington typewriter No. 6 were furnished.

Supreme Court—1 volume of Law Journals for January and March, 1901, bound, 20 copies of Trow's City Directory for 1901 and 300 copies of marriage certificates were furnished.

Judges' Chamber—2 toilet cabinets, with a supply of clean towels weekly, were furnished.

CITY HALL.

The usual order for cleaning glass in windows and doors and furnishing a supply of steam to above building were renewed. 1 barrel of soap polish was furnished. 3 iron water tanks under the roof of the above building were repaired, cleaned, scraped and painted.

Aldermanic Chamber—4 toilet cabinets, with a supply of clean towels weekly, were furnished. Councilmanic Chamber—1 toilet cabinet, with a supply of clean towels weekly, was furnished.

Reporters' Room—2 large electric fans were furnished and installed.

President of the Council—1 annotated copy of the "Greater New York Charter" furnished. City Record—1 toilet cabinet, with a supply of clean towels weekly, was furnished. A bookbinder was fitted up for the use of the above office.

Mayor's Office—2 toilet cabinets, with a supply of clean towels weekly, were furnished.

All worn-out and defective parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts. Volumes 163, 164 and 165, Court of Appeals Reports, were furnished for the above office.

President, Borough of Manhattan—1 toilet cabinet, with a supply of clean towels weekly, was furnished.

City Clerk's Office—1 toilet cabinet, with a supply of clean towels weekly, was furnished.

BROWNSTONE BUILDING.

An order was given for cleaning the glass in windows and doors of above building. The inside cleaning supplies were furnished and 1 oak flat top desk, 42 by 31, was furnished. The 24 iron window-frames on the top floor of above building were removed, repaired and reconstructed and covered with Venetian style No. 1121 awning stripe. 1 piston rod stuffing-box was renewed, pistons repacked, also main valves and pilot valves of both machines and one 10-inch idler for hand rope renewed.

City Court—2 toilet cabinets, with a supply of clean towels weekly, were furnished. Law books consisting of the following: New York Supplement, Volumes 63 to 68, inclusive; New York Reports, Volumes 162 to 165, inclusive; Hun's Appellate Division, Volumes 4 to 57, inclusive; Miscellaneous Reports, Volumes 30 to 33, inclusive; Hydecker's Lien Laws, Cook on Corporation, 3 volumes; Amendments to the Code of 1900; 7 copies of Chases' Code of 1901, and 1 copy of Parsons' 1901 Code, were furnished. 1 extension set of telephone instruments connected with telephone in above office was furnished.

Judges' Chamber—6 toilet cabinets, with a supply of clean towels weekly, were furnished.

Clerks' Office—1 toilet cabinet, with a supply of clean towels weekly, was furnished.

HALL OF RECORDS.

An order was given for cleaning the glass in the windows and doors of above building. The usual cleaning supplies, 1 revolving book rack about 4 feet high; 1 oak roll-top desk, 5 feet, No. 1 standard, and one 3-gallon wood-jacketed porcelain-lined iron well water-cooler and stand was furnished. 35 awning frames were removed from the above building, same repaired and reconstructed where necessary and covered with Oporto awning covering, same quality and pattern as those now on City Hall building. All worn and defective parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts. 1 toilet cabinet, with a supply of clean towels weekly, was furnished.

HARLEM COURT-HOUSE.

The usual cleaning and engineer's supplies were furnished. An order was issued for cleaning glass in the windows and doors of the above court-house. All worn and defective parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts.

WEST FIFTY-FOURTH STREET COURT-HOUSE.

An order was issued for cleaning the glass in the windows and doors of the above court-house. The usual cleaning supplies were furnished. 7 awnings made of Champion Duplex, style V awning stripe, with fixtures, etc., complete, made and erected on above court-house. Pistons, operating valve and relief valve were repacked, also valve-head and following bolts of elevators were renewed. The ceilings, walls and woodwork of the rooms occupied by the Tenth District Municipal Court were washed off, prepared, bleached and varnished, rubbed down in oil and pumice stone to an egg finish. The colors on side walls and ceilings were as directed. The decorations on side walls and ceilings done in accordance with drawings in office of Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies.

SEVENTH DISTRICT COURT-HOUSE.

The usual cleaning supplies were furnished. An order was given for cleaning all the glass in windows and doors of above building. All worn-out and defective parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts. 17 awning frames were removed, repaired and reconstructed and covered with style 94 Neapolitan awning stripe and replaced on windows of the above building.

THIRD DISTRICT COURT-HOUSE.

An order was issued for cleaning the glass in the windows and doors of the above court. 1 barrel of disinfectant and one 100-light gas governor furnished.

MARKETS.

Fulton Market—All worn and defective parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts. 1 barrel of disinfectant was furnished. The defective tin was removed from the roof, gutters and leaders of tower, corner of Front and Beekman streets, and replaced with tin of best quality. Slate roof of market was repaired; also flashings around chimneys, and same painted two coats of paint. 2 old galvanized-iron skylights over tar roof were removed, the skylight frame was repaired and reconstructed and two new galvanized-iron skylights about 5 feet 6 inches by 2 feet 6 inches high, with louvers all around and hip skylights on top, glazed with ¼-inch ribbed glass, furnished and put in. The main sewer in the above market was repaired and same extended to the main in South street; all necessary connections, etc., were made.

Centre Market—All worn out and defective parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts.

Tompkins Market—All worn out and defective parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts.

Washington Market—1 barrel of disinfectant was furnished. Defective tin on roof and skylight of lantern on shed over the sidewalk on Washington street side above market cut out and replaced with tin of best quality and the same painted, also one new galvanized-iron gutter about 200 feet long, with all necessary leaders furnished. 1 skylight over Stand No. 305 in the above market was removed, the curb and portion of roof connected with skylight repaired and reconstructed and 1 new galvanized-iron skylight about 6 feet 8 inches by 6 feet 8 inches by 2 feet 6 inches high, with louvers all around and hip skylight on top glazed with ¼-inch ribbed glass, was furnished and placed.

West Washington Market—1 barrel of disinfectant was furnished. The steel rolling shutters at the following stands were repaired, scraped and painted: Nos. 39, 44, 48, 52, 54, 56 and 58 Thompson avenue; Nos. 25, 26 and 27 Thirteenth avenue; Nos. 9, 10 and 11 West street; Nos. 33, 34, 35, 38, 50, 52, 54, 56, 58 and 63 Grace avenue; Nos. 7, 9, 11, 13, 26, 28, 30 and 31, 33, 35 and 50 Lawton avenue; Nos. 3, 5, 7, 9, 11, 13 and 15 Hewitt avenue, and No. 33 Gansevoort street.

Clinton Market—All worn-out and defective parts of Welsbach lamps were replaced with new parts.

Jefferson Market—All worn-out and defective parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts.

Catherine Market—Twenty-five feet of 2½-inch best fire-hose, with couplings complete, were furnished.

ARMORIES.

Coal and wood for heating, etc., were furnished to the various armories. Among the many items of repairs made to the different armories and headquarters not hereinafter mentioned were plumbing, steam-fitting, carpentering, plastering, masonwork, painting, glazing, electrical work and repairs to tin work.

Headquarters of National Guard—1 chain mat, 1 three-gallon porcelain-lined water-cooler, 1 revolving desk chair, cane seat, without arms; 15-foot roll-top desk, chair for same, and 1 wardrobe was furnished; 3 window awnings with fixtures complete were furnished and put up.

Fifth Brigade Headquarters—The lockers were removed from position in locker room and placed as directed; also 14 quartered oak lockers and 1 saddle case made and erected.

Seventh Regiment—All worn-out and defective parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts. Sixty feet of 3/4-inch three-ply rubber hose, with couplings complete, was furnished. Necessary repairs were made to the electric lighting circuits in the above armory.

Eighth Regiment—All worn-out and defective parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts. 60 nickel-plated pistol rack hooks, 2 bundles of scrub cloths, 23 upholstered seat opera chairs and 2 barrels of cleaning compound were furnished. The wooden tank was removed from the roof of the above building and 1 iron tank, capacity 1,500 gallons, with all necessary connections furnished and put in place in the hospital room in tower of the above building. The shower bath-room on the first floor and the band-room on top floor of above building were cleaned and repaired and painted. Also the new woodwork on fifty lockers in field music-room, top floor, and twelve lockers in hospital corps room on the first floor of above armory were filled, stained and varnished. The brickwork on the northerly side of the above armory was pointed up as directed.

Ninth Regiment—All worn-out and defective parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts. One barrel of Vegetable Boiler Compound was furnished, also one set of telephone desk instruments connected with exchange furnished and placed in Colonel's quarters.

Twelfth Regiment—All worn and defective parts of Welsbach lights to be replaced with new parts. 1 gross quick-kill; one gross packages flowered toilet soap; 1 dozen canisters (for soap); 18 gallons brilliant metal polish; 2 dozen corn brooms, No. 8, Grade "B," 2 dozen whisk brooms, No. 3; 150 yards of huck toweling, No. 25; 1 dozen hair floor brooms, No. 118; 1 dozen window brushes, No. 223; 6 dozen scrub brushes, No. 65; 1/2 dozen coal hods, No. 378; 500 pounds buffalo moth exterminator; 300 pair scrub cloths; 1 dozen locket towel rollers; 1 Wrigley auger; 1 gross boxes wax tapers (3 dozen to a box); 3 gross toilet soap, Colgate's (Medium No. 181); 2 gross tumblers; 10 gross parlor matches (60 S. & C.); 1/2 gross balls assorted twine; 1/2 gross sapolio; 1 gross shoe blacking (Bixby No. 5); 6 dozen twine mops (18 pounds); 1 dozen gas lighters, 3 foot 5 to 10 inches; 1 dozen galvanized iron mop wringers, 3 dozen ostrich feather dusters No. 20; 1/2 dozen squillees, 24-inch; 1 dozen boxes Babbitt's soap; 2 dozen mop handles; 3 dozen fibre pails, 13-inch deep; 8 dozen rifle brushes, bristles 45 calibre; 50 pounds castile soap; 400 pounds ground rock salt; 100 yards of cheese cloth; 3 rolls wrapping, 30-inch by 24 and 18-inch; 1 ream sandpaper; 2 boxes lye (4 dozen pounds to a box); 2 barrels of C. C. C. cleaning compound; 1 revolving desk chair, Bank of England style; 2 dozen bent-wood armchairs; 2 chain coir mats 5 feet by 5 feet; 2,000 pounds of pig lead; 200 pounds of block tin; 2 barrels of cold water paint; 20 gallons of W. B. sperm oil; 2 10 gallon jacket cans and 1 barrel (53 gallons) Rt. C. Sk. oil furnished. Also the following locks were delivered for the locker rooms in the above armory, Company D and non-commissioned staff room; 104 Yale locker locks, all different, for 1 1/2-inch doors, with 2 master keys and 2 Yale locker locks to pass the master keys, set to Nos. 215, 314, for non-commissioned staff room. Companies H and G, 104 Yale locker locks, all different, with 2 master keys. Company F, about 104 Yale locker locks, all different, for 1 1/2-inch doors, with 2 master keys. The doors of locker rooms were repaired and 410 locks were put on in officers' room, non-commissioned staff band-rooms and Companies E and B rooms. Also locks removed, doors repaired and 410 locker locks put on in rooms of Companies D, F, G and H. A lock was repaired in room of Company H and 9 master keys (1 for each company) furnished. About 84 yards of cork carpet was furnished and laid in rooms of Company K. 1 ash counter about 30 feet long, 6 feet deep and 3 feet high was made and erected; the doors of same hung on bronze butts, with cylinder locks, ends and back paneled. 1 wash-basin and 3 gas brackets were made and put in Surgeon's room on top floor of the above armory.

Twenty-second Regiment—All worn-out and defective parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts. 1 barrel of disinfectant was furnished. About 170 yards of plain "A" linoleum furnished and laid in Armorer's room and Quartermaster's room. 14 linear feet of iron railing, about 8 feet high, with gate; spring hinges and Yale lock, hand holes, etc., all finished in gold bronze, made and erected in headquarters room of the above armory.

Sixty-ninth Regiment—All worn-out and defective parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts; 2 roll-top 5 feet desks, 2 office chairs to match, 4 barrels of disinfectants, 3 dozen corn brooms No. 8 grade B, 1 dozen whisk brooms No. 3, 40 yards of huck toweling No. 25, 1 dozen ostrich feather dusters No. 20, 1 box toilet paper (1,000 sheets to a package), 3 gross Colgate's glycerine soap No. 181, 1 nail puller, 1 dozen cans "Brilliant" polish (1 1/2 gallon cans), and 2 dozen boxes wax tapers (3 dozen to a box), were furnished. The chairs, lounges, benches, lockers, etc., in rooms of Companies A, B, C, D, E, F, I, K, G and Library were repaired, upholstered and renovated; screw eyes, necessary for the window-cleaning apparatus, were furnished and put in place, also repairs made to sash, sash ends, etc., throughout building.

Seventy-first Regiment—All worn and defective parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts; 4 dozen scrub brushes, No. 65; 4 dozen dust-pans, No. 191; 6 cases of toilet paper (roll), 1,000 sheets to roll, 100 rolls to a case; 10 gross parlor matches, 60s S. & C.; 200 yards of cheese cloth, 24 pounds wax tapers, 4 boxes Babbitt's soap (100 cakes to a box), 2 boxes sapolio (10 dozen to a box), 12 dozen cotton mops (15 pounds), 1 gross Colgate's glycerine soap, No. 181; 25 pounds gum camphor (first quality), and 3 boxes potash (48 pound cans each), were furnished. About 126 window shades, made of nonpareil shade cloth, hung on old rollers where practicable, and new ones where necessary, were furnished and put up. 1 saddle case and closets for Quartermaster room, about 20 feet wide, 10 feet high, made of white pine, with necessary shelving, bronze hardware, etc., made and erected. One ash storeroom, about 19 feet wide, 4 feet deep and 13 feet high, with shelving, bronze hardware, etc., made and erected on drill-room floor of the above building. Repairs were made to the plastering in the toilet and wash-room leading to same, also in the two upper halls, regimental kitchen, pantry, line officers' room and Armorer's quarters in the above armory. The following painting was done in the two upper halls, regimental kitchen, pantry, line officers' room and Armorer's quarters in the above armory. All walls of the two upper floors and stairways were prepared and received four coats of oil paint. All ceilings of two upper halls and stairways, ceilings and side walls of regimental kitchen, pantry, line officers' toilet room and Armorer's quarters were cleaned off, prepared, varnished and same received two coats of calcimine of cold water paint. All woodwork in halls and rooms was touched up, bleached where necessary and varnished. Also the walls and ceilings in the wash-room, toilet-room and Quartermaster's room and hall leading to wash-room were cleaned off, prepared, varnished and painted. The pine woodwork in four rooms and hallway at Armorer's quarters, regimental kitchen and toilet, line officers and main hallway and woodwork on top floor were painted; also the chandeliers on two floors painted black japan. The stone and brick work on porch over main entrance was repaired and new concrete roof laid on same; also hearth removed from regimental kitchen and same replaced with new Portland cement; also brick work in room underneath above-mentioned kitchen and Colonel's toilet-room repaired. Defective tin on roof, lanterns, leaders, etc., were cut out and replaced with tin of best quality and same painted. 90 chairs were repaired and 14 chairs upholstered.

Squadron "A"—All worn-out and defective parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts. 2 dozen dust brushes, 10 gallons Wolf's acme blacking, 20 gallons "brilliant" metal polish, 40 gallons Miller's harness dressing, 12 cans Prophet's saddle paste, 2 barrels of C. C. C. soap, 2 barrels of disinfectant, 500 pounds Buffalo moth exterminator, 560 pasteboard target covers, 4 feet 6 inches long, 2 feet 3 inches wide; 6 handhole gaskets, 5 x 3 1/2; 6 manhole gaskets, 15 x 11 1/2; 20 dozen Turkish bath towels, 40 gallons turpentine, 40 gallons neat's foot oil, 1 barrel kerosene oil and 10 gallons grain alcohol were furnished. One 6-inch Rider-Ericson pump with the necessary platform connections, etc., was furnished and placed in above armory.

First Signal Corps—The flooring in room of above corps was laid, N. C. pine and yellow pine with the necessary leveling strips, etc.

First Battery—20 gallons "brilliant" metal polish, 20 gallons Miller's harness dressing, 10 gallons Miller's harness oil, 2 boxes of Babbitt's soap, 4 gross parlor matches, 1/2 gross sapolio, 2 boxes of toilet paper, 1 dozen Dietz tubular lanterns, 1 dozen ostrich feather dusters, No. 20; 1/2 dozen gas torches, 3 dozen box tapers, 2 dozen chamois skins, 17 x 23; 3 dozen cotton mops, 1/2 dozen mop handles, 5 feet; 1/2 dozen mop wringers, galvanized iron; 1 dozen 8-inch fibre cuspidors, 3 dozen toilet soap, Colgate's glycerine, No. 181; 5 gallons ammonia, 200 pounds wrapping paper, 10 pounds vaseline, 300 pounds sal soda, 10 pounds sheep's wool sponges, 50 pounds castile soap, large red bars, and 1 extension ladder, 20 feet, were furnished.

Second Battery—All worn-out and defective parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts; 5 pounds copper rivets and burrs, 1/2-inch; 5 pounds copper rivets and burrs, 3/4-inch; 5 pounds copper rivets and burrs, 1-inch; 1 hand truck, No. 2; 1 platform truck, 5 feet by 3 feet; 2 dozen ostrich-feather dusters, No. 20 extra quality; 1 dozen fibre pails, 14 quarts; 1/2 dozen carpet sweepers, Grand; 1/2 dozen lanterns with reflectors, 19 by 13 inches; 1 dozen curry combs, 2 gross Colgate's glycerine soap (Med. No. 181), 2 boxes Babbitt's soap, 100 cakes to a box; 1 gross sapolio, 2 boxes toilet paper, 1,000 sheets to a package; 12 pounds electro silicon, 100 pounds wrapping paper, 30-inch; 3 dozen china cuspidors, 100 pounds 1/2-inch Manila rope, and 1 Remington typewriter, No. 6, were furnished. Also one Fairbanks scale with measuring rod was furnished. One large iron safe was removed from the Brownstone Building, the same repaired and painted and delivered for the use of above armory.

First Naval Battalion—The following articles were furnished: 4 boxes of Babbitt's soap, 375 pounds washing soda, 50 pounds chloride of lime, 1 dozen ostrich feather dusters, No. 20; 250 pounds cotton waste, 3 cases "brilliant" metal polish, 3 dozen 1/2-pints to a case; 3 office revolving chairs, 1 No. 8 Remington typewriter, 10 gallons cylinder oil, 10 gallons machinery oil, 1 barrel kerosene oil and 2 cords 4-cut pine wood were furnished. Also, the following manila rope was furnished: 100 fathoms, 1 1/4 inch, 4 strands; 100 fathoms, 1 1/2 inch, 4 strands; 200 fathoms, 1 inch, 3 strands; 150 fathoms, 3 inch, 3 strands, and 100 fathoms, 4 inch, 4 strands. The exterior of the United States Ship "New Hampshire" was painted as follows: All dirt and paint was thoroughly cleaned off, loose paint well scraped, and the entire outside of

ship received one coat of paint from water-line up, except that portion which is at present painted white, which received two coats of white paint. The hull was painted with marine black, and the upper work with navy spar color, as at present. The house on forecabin and the cabin on poop deck received one heavy coat of paint, color as directed. The roof of superstructure also received one heavy coat of paint. Flagstaff, spars and all ironwork painted one coat. The forecabin and poop deck received two coats of paint, color as directed. The poop deck, ceiling of officers' quarters, and siding on hull of ship was repaired; also, pigeon house removed from forward deck. An electric lighting outfit, consisting of an engine and generator direct connected with bed plate, switchboard, volt meter, ammeter, rheostat, main dynamo switch and feeder switch, were furnished and placed on ship. The forward and poop decks were covered with No. 4 cotton duck. Canvas awning and curtains for cutter connected with above headquarters were made and put in place. In the drill-room of above battalion, at the foot of East Twenty-fourth street, the panels, doors, sashes, etc., were removed from the upper floor and placed in storage on the lower floor, and the upper floor was inclosed. The necessary tugs, etc., were furnished to tow the ship "New Hampshire" from the foot of East Twenty-eighth street to summer quarters off Whitestone Landing, Long Island.

Fourth District—1 toilet cabinet, with a supply of clean towels weekly, was furnished. Orders for cleaning glass in the windows and doors of the above court were issued. 1 barrel of disinfectant, and the following law books were furnished: Abbott's Digest, Annuals 1899, 1900; New York Reports from and including Volumes 158 to and including Volume 164; Appellate Division Reports, from and including Volumes 34 to 56; Miscellaneous Reports, from and including Volumes 25 to 32; Brightley's Digest, Volume 5; McAdams' Landlord and Tenant, Third Edition and New York Supplement Reports from and including Volumes 54 to Volume 64. 2 toilet cabinets with a supply of clean towels weekly, were furnished. All worn-out and defective parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts. Orders for cleaning the glass in windows and doors in the above court were issued. 1 barrel of disinfectant and 1 barrel of cold water paint were furnished.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS, LIGHTING AND SUPPLIES.

A supply of rubber stamps, 6 Smyrna rugs, 30 inches by 60 inches; 1 Konish rug, 3 by 2; 2 Daghestan rugs, one 4.1 by 3.1 and one 4.5 by 2.9, and one 4-gallon water-cooler, polished hardwood case and porcelain-lined well, with stand, furnished. 4 toilet cabinets, with a supply of clean towels, were furnished.

General Office—2 toilet cabinets, with a supply of clean towels weekly, were furnished. 1 index book, No. 1380; 1 journal, No. 23658; 1 index to journal, No. 409; 500 sheets of letter paper; 500 envelopes to match; 250 contract memorandums; index book, No. 13804; 1 record book and 1 day book were furnished.

Bureau of Lamps and Gas—1 toilet cabinet, with a supply of clean towels weekly, was furnished.

Bureau of Assistant Engineer—2 toilet cabinets, with a supply of clean towels weekly, were furnished. 1 bicycle, 24-inch frame, with cyclometer, bell, pedals, lanterns, brake and pump as selected, 1 new pedal for Columbian bicycle, furnished. Repairs were made to bicycle, and maps made of the boroughs of Manhattan and Queens.

Electrical Bureau—4 toilet cabinets, with a supply of clean towels weekly, were furnished; 10,000 application blanks for inspection of interior wiring and 6 combination knives were furnished. Remington typewriter No. 37-967 was repaired and type changed.

Bureau of Repairs and Supplies—700 pay-roll blanks, 400 printed notices, 1 dozen patent gas lighters, 1 gross glass tumblers, 5,000 record of repairs and time sheets, 5,000 carpenter shop time sheets, 1 stock ledger and 1 record of requisitions were furnished. Fire extinguishers were placed in various buildings and court-houses. The order for use of horse and wagon for Superintendent was renewed. Coal and wood for heating, etc., ice, brooms, pails, soap, waste-paper baskets, sapolio, sponges, mops and mop handles, scrubbing brushes, cuspidors, ash cans, etc., for use of different public buildings, courts and offices in care of this department were furnished. Among the many items of repairs made to the different public buildings, courts and offices not hereinbefore mentioned are plumbing, steam-fitting, carpentering, plastering, mason work, painting, electrical work, glazing, repairing furniture, etc., and for use of mechanics in the employ of the Department a supply of lumber, hardware, paints, varnish, etc., were furnished.

FREE FLOATING BATHS.

The baths (15 in number) were towed from their winter quarters to their respective berths on the East and North rivers after extensive alterations to the pontoons, fenders, painting work, roofing, etc., were made. About 45 pontoons were moved from Baths Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15; necessary repairs were made to same and replaced in former position, properly blocked and braced. 2 new pontoons, 4 new gangway bridges were built, oak fenders were repaired and other repairs were made to baths where necessary. The above pontoons were placed on Bath No. 8; the dimensions of same were, one 16 feet long, 6 feet wide and 6 feet deep, and one 18 feet long, 6 feet wide and 6 feet deep, constructed as follows:

The framework, sides, bottom and back were built of well-seasoned yellow pine; the deck frame on top and facing made of well-seasoned spruce, 10 inches by 10 inches, rabbeted; sills 3 inches and uprights 4 inches; 2 hackmatack knees in each corner, or 16 in all, 5 inches thick, bolted to the sills top and bottom, 5-inch by 6-inch uprights, 5-inch by 7-inch top and bottom timbers, dovetailed into sills and held with keys.

The sills and corner uprights were 10 inches by 10 inches, framed together and secured at each angle by two vertical-driven bolts 3/4-inch in diameter and 18 inches long.

The top and bottom sills were secured at each angle by a diagonal bolt 3/8-inch in diameter. The upper and lower streaks on sides and on deck and bottom were edge-bolted to the sills. The facing of pontoons were 3-inch spruce planking fastened to frame with 10 by 1/2-inch galvanized wrought-iron spikes. The pontoons were caulked all over top, bottom, sides and ends made perfectly watertight; each and every seam and joint has one thread of cotton and three threads of best navy oakum paved with pitch.

Each pontoon has 2-inch holes, and tapered plug worked from the manhole in top, having combing and cover; the hatch was placed the same as in old pontoon, and the cover fitted and secured with galvanized-iron chain and staples. All knees fitted snugly to sills and corners uprights, bolts were drawn tight and set in flush, scupper holes were cut in bottom timbers as directed.

All the spikes and bolts in the planking had a yard of oakum around the heads before being driven.

All the timber was dressed on both sides.

The outside and inside was entirely covered with coal-tar oil, which was thoroughly wiped and put on before the pontoons were launched. Old pontoons were removed from their present positions and new ones substituted for same.

Gangway Bridges—The pier gangway bridges were constructed similar to those now in use on the free floating baths. Material was of clean spruce, dressed on all sides, dimensions 3 feet 8 inches wide and 14 feet long, with necessary wrought-iron tie rods, shafts, wheels, journals and lugs. Size of stringers, 3 feet 7 inches by 14 feet.

Wearing Pieces—5 inches by 7 inches by 6 feet, dressed three sides, with champed edges, fastened with galvanized wrought-iron spikes, joints scarfed. This work was done on Bath No. 14.

The fourth, fifth and sixth courses of old planking, below wearing pieces on front, back and sides of Bath No. 13 were removed, and the same replanked with 3 inches by 10 inches spruce, dressed 2 sides and fastened with 7-inch galvanized wrought-iron spikes.

Tie rods with bolts, turn buckles, etc., were put on Baths Nos. 8, 9 and 11; hangers were put on Bath No. 15 and 20 bridle irons were furnished for various baths.

Thirty-one galvanized iron pumps were removed from free floating baths, same repaired and put in complete working order and replaced to where taken from.

Repairs were made on the roofs of the baths as follows:

All damaged tin was removed, and the same replaced with best quality 1 X tin.

All seams were properly examined, soldered and made perfectly tight. All new tin had 1 coat of paint on under side before applying, and 2 coats on top. All old tin on roofs received 1 coat of Elko graphite paint.

The interior of the baths were painted as follows:

All the woodwork, ironwork, etc., which is at present painted on the interior of baths, from the ceiling of roof to the deck line, also the interior of the house on top of baths, were washed off.

All loose and scaled paint thoroughly scraped. All cracks and nail holes puttied up, receiving 1 heavy coat of paint composed of Atlantic white lead and linseed oil, color as directed.

All new woodwork receiving 3 coats of paint, same as described above.

The interior of swimming walls and stairways leading to same receiving 2 coats of metallic paint, ground in linseed oil, to extend 1 foot below the water-line.

The lettering or numbering repainted as directed; coal and wood for heating, with a supply of small supplies, etc.; 2 dozen scrub brushes; 3 dozen corn brooms; 1 dozen wooden chairs; 3 dozen galvanized-iron pails; 2 dozen cotton mops, 15 pounds; 2 dozen mop handles, 5 feet; 3 dozen squilgees with handles, 16-inch; 1 dozen agate wash-basins, 12 inches in diameter; 1 dozen reflectors, 8-inch; 1 dozen stable lanterns, 1 dozen hose, 4 feet long; 1 dozen claw hammers, 1 dozen gas lighters, 30 inches; 2 dozen boxes wax tapers, 3 dozen to a box; 2 dozen fine nets, with handles and nets complete; 2 dozen boxes of small carpet tacks, 12 dozen wooden screws, 1/4-inch by 3 inches; 38 dozen boxes safety matches, large boxes; 1 1/2 dozen screw drivers, 12-inch; 1/2 dozen axes with long handles, 1/2 dozen bells, 6-inch; 1 box coach candles, 50 pounds; 1 box sapolio, 6 dozen to a box; 2 coal scoops, No. 6; 1 bale of oakum spun, 15 pounds marline, 450 rubber treads, 3/4 inch by 6 inches by 18 inches; 16 pounds of manila rope, 1,140 pounds 3-inch bolt rope, 1,740 pounds 6-inch bolt rope, and caps and badges for use of Attendants were furnished.

Three anchors and chains at the Battery, Fifty first street and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street baths were raised and moored securely to the baths.

The free floating baths were opened to the public on June 21, 1901, and in the nine (9) days of this quarter 391,866 persons have bathed therein.

Rivington Street Bath—This building was opened to the public March 27, 1901, and is opened daily from 6 A. M. to 9 P. M. except Sunday, when the bath is closed at 12 noon. There is a male and female section, thus affording accommodations for males and females at the same time. In the male section there are 45 showers and 5 bathtubs, and in the female section there are 22 showers and 5 bathtubs. Each applicant for admission is furnished with a piece of soap large enough for one bath. During the week following the opening day there were about 14,000 persons accommodated, and the numbers have since gradually increased, and for the week ending June 29 there were 23,800 males, 8,800 females, making a total of 32,600 persons; and I have been informed that there were on an average of 500 persons who applied for admission each day, but could not be accommodated during the above-mentioned week. Supplies for plumber, also a supply of coal, ice, wood, soap, cleaning supplies, etc., including cuspidors, hose, sponges, chamois skins, etc., also hard ware supplies, 3 galvanized-iron pans, 5 dozen galvanized-iron strainers, 5 inches in diameter; 4 wardrobes about 40 inches wide, with double doors as selected; 1 barrel cylinder oil, 1 barrel machinery oil, 1 rung ladder, 10-foot; 1 rung ladder, 11-foot; 3 rung ladders, 12-foot, and 1 barrel of disinfectant were furnished. 5 closets were erected in cellar of the above building, also 3 sills for oil barrels and 1 vise-bench made and erected. Necessary repairs were made to carpenter work where necessary. Repairs were made to electric fans and new fuses furnished same. The doors and toilet-rooms in the above building were numbered and lettered. Wire guards were placed on the basement windows of building, also guards were placed on 2 windows on platform of stairs, west side, and 1 engineer's fire-hoe furnished. Orders were issued to clean the glass in the windows and doors of the above building. That the above bath is well patronized the following table amply shows, in the number of persons availing themselves of its beneficent properties. Hereinafter follows the number of bathers during the quarter:

One toilet cabinet, with a supply of clean towels weekly, was furnished. 1 Trow's City Directory for 1901. 1 set of Laws of New York, 1901, 124th Session, and 1 copy of Greater New York Charter with Appendixes (Ash's), were furnished.

Hon. HENRY S. KEARNY, Commissioner:

SIR—I herein submit a report of the transactions of the Bureau of Lamps and Gas for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx for the quarter ending June 30, 1901.

In Exhibit "A" will be found a statement showing the amounts expended on vouchers for a supply of illuminating gas, etc., to the various public markets, court-rooms, offices, armories, etc., and for fitting up, lighting and maintaining the public lamps.

Exhibit "B" is a summary of the appropriation for "Lamps and Lighting, 1901," and this shows an expenditure during the quarter of three hundred and twenty-four thousand one hundred and fifty-eight dollars and sixty-two cents (\$324,158.62), and for the six months of six hundred and fifty-one thousand three hundred and forty-six dollars and ninety-five cents (\$651,346.95), with outstanding liabilities amounting to two hundred dollars.

The total number of public lamps lighted June 30, 1901, was 23,464 gas, 1,510 ordinary naphtha, 749 Welsbach naphtha and 4,815 electric lamps, making a total of 30,568 lamps.

SIR—In accordance with your instructions I submit herewith a report of the transactions of this office for the quarter ending June 30, 1901.

Men have been employed in the draughting-room and laboratory, and on the general annual inspection of street lamps.

It has been found necessary to compile new maps of the boroughs of The Bronx and Queens, showing more definitely the progress of improvements as noted by our Inspectors and to prepare a new tracing of the Manhattan map.

An improved type of portable photometer has been adapted to the use of the photometric staff of this office for a general comparison of the oil, gas and Welsbach lamps in the streets and parks of the city and is now being constructed, the comparison lights being well-seasoned incandescent lamps, standardized to give the required candle-power at a given voltage.

Maps of the several boroughs have been corrected to June 30, 1901, and show the street-lighting system of the city, as given in Table "A," with a grand total of 60,603 lamps.

In the laboratory, tests of Portland cement for the New Hall of Records have been in progress. Six carloads of cement have been accepted as conforming to the specifications and two rejected. Further tests have been made of each lot of cement as delivered on the work. The average results of tests of cement which was accepted are given in Tables "B," "C" and "D."

Table "E" shows a saving during the quarter over the average of preceding years of over 1,600,000 cubic feet of gas, due to the use of Welsbach lights and gas governors in the principal public buildings which are lighted only by gas.

BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.

The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York met at the office of the Board, No. 21 Park row, on Wednesday, October 2, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M., pursuant to notice.

The roll was called and the following members were present and answered to their names: The Commissioner of Water Supply, the Commissioner of Highways (Deputy Commissioner Morrison), the Commissioner of Sewers (Deputy Commissioner Brennan), the Commissioner of Bridges, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of Queens, and the President of the Borough of Richmond.

The President, Hon. Maurice F. Holahan, presided.

The minutes of the meeting of September 25, 1901, were approved as printed.

OPENING AND EXTENDING KNICKERBOCKER AVENUE.

The hearing on above matter was adjourned, and on motion of the Commissioner of Bridges, the matter was referred back to the Local Board.

CHANGE OF GRADE, EIGHTY-THIRD AND EIGHTY-FOURTH STREETS, BROOKLYN.

The following communication was received from the Chief Topographical Engineer:

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU, September 24, 1901.

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, Secretary, Board of Public Improvements:

SIR—A plan and profile showing the change of grade in Eighty-third and Eighty-fourth streets, from Second to Third avenues, Borough of Brooklyn, was submitted for adoption to the Board of Public Improvements upon recommendation of the Local Board of the Borough of Brooklyn, and a controversy relative to its merit arose at a public hearing which was given by the Board of Public Improvements.

It seems that the property-owners on the south side of Eighty-second street, between Second and Third avenues, oppose the change of grade in Eighty-third street because it leaves the lots directly in the rear of them and fronting on Eighty-third street higher than their own property.

Eighty-third street is graded for about 400 feet westerly of Third avenue, and handsome residences are erected. This part of Eighty-third street is from 8 to 10 feet higher than the rear of the lots which front on the south side of Eighty-second street, and the owners of the lots fronting on the north side of Eighty-third street were compelled to erect retaining-walls in the rear of their lots towards Eighty-second street.

The established grade of Eighty-third street coincides nearly with the rear of the lots fronting on the south side of Eighty-second street, and if carried out would either leave the buildings on Eighty-third street high above grade or would necessitate the lowering of the buildings and the removing of the retaining-walls.

After a personal examination of the locality I have come to the conclusion that it would be a great hardship to the people on Eighty-third street and Eighty-fourth street if the filed grade would not be altered, and I recommend, therefore, again that the map submitted to the Board of Public Improvements on July 29, 1901, be adopted.

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place, a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed change of grade who have appeared, and such proposed change of grade was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grade of Eighty-third street and Eighty-fourth street, between Second avenue and Third avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to change the grade in the aforesaid streets as follows:

"A"—Eighty-third Street.

Beginning at the intersection of Eighty-third street and Second avenue, the elevation to be 53.85 feet above mean high-water datum;
 1. Thence easterly to a point distant 270 feet from the eastern side-line of Second avenue, the elevation to be 74.0 feet above mean high-water datum;
 2. Thence easterly to a point distant 230 feet from the previous point, the elevation to be 82.2 feet above mean high-water datum;

 3. Thence easterly to the intersection of Third avenue, the elevation to be 80.0 feet above mean high-water datum.
 All elevations refer to mean high-water datum as established by the Department of Highways, Borough of Brooklyn.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution, approving of the above-named proposed change in the map or plan of The City of New York, by changing the grade of Eighty-third and Eighty-

fourth streets, adopted by this Board, together with a statement of its reasons therefor, be transmitted to the Municipal Assembly for its action thereon.

CHANGE OF GRADE, EAST ONE HUNDRED AND SEVENTY-FIFTH STREET, BRONX.

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication of James E. Dougherty and others, protesting against the filed grades of East One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street, between Prospect avenue and a point 200 feet east of Marmion avenue, which will cause the destruction of a number of large shade trees, I beg to state that the same matter has been before the Local Board of the Borough of The Bronx in 1899 and was favorably recommended.

A recent examination has demonstrated that the grade can be changed and the trees saved by adhering closely to existing surface. A map was therefore prepared and is herewith submitted for adoption, entitled "Map or plan showing the change of grades in East One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street, from Prospect avenue to the angle point east of Marmion avenue, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of The Bronx."

I also transmit a technical description and return the papers in the matter.

SIR—In reply to the communication of the President of the Borough of Queens, calling attention to the necessity for laying out a public highway from the factories in Laurel Hill, abutting the Long Island Railroad tracks, easterly of the Old Calvary Cemetery, Second Ward, Borough of Queens, I beg to state that the tentative plan showing the street system in the westerly part of Newtown, which was adopted by the Board of Public Improvements, lays out streets in that neighborhood.

This tentative plan being on a small scale, I have prepared a map with some additional features, and recommend that the same be transmitted to the Local Board for consideration.

The map is entitled, "Map or plan showing additional streets in that part of the Second Ward, Borough of Queens, bounded by Laurel Hill Boulevard, Laurel Hill avenue, Montgomery avenue, Clinton place, Clifton avenue and Newtown creek."

There was on this contract an excess of about 300 cubic yards of rock above the preliminary estimate, due to the fact that on each side of the sewer trench has been laid gas and water mains and also a private drain.

In excavating for the sewer these old trench excavations naturally also came out, making the sewer trench in some places 30 feet wide. For this excess of rock, I would recommend an allowance of 20 days, which is at the rate of 15 cubic yards per day. DEAR SIR—Under date of September 25, 1901, Hon. John L. Shea, Commissioner of Bridges, called my attention to a resolution adopted by the Board of Public Improvements September 11, 1901, for repaving Borden avenue, from the west line of Front street to the east line of Vernon avenue, Borough of Queens.

Commissioner Shea desires to have the limits changed to the westerly side of Vernon avenue instead of the easterly, because said avenue is to be widened at that point, and the building of the Vernon Avenue Bridge would interfere with any paving which might be on Vernon avenue between Newtown creek and Fourth street.

Upon investigation I find that it would be advantageous to the City to comply with the request of Commissioner Shea, and I recommend that the resolution adopted by the Board of Public Improvements on the 11th instant be amended so as to provide for "the repaving with asphalt, on the present pavement, including ten years' maintenance by the contractor, of the carriageway of Borden avenue, from the west line of Front street to the west line of Vernon avenue, Borough of Queens."

AN ORDINANCE to regulate, etc., Morgan avenue, Borough of Brooklyn.
Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:
That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 5th day of June, 1901, be and the same is hereby approved, and the public work or improvement therein provided for is hereby authorized, and it is hereby determined that the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid as therein provided; namely,
Resolved, by the Board of Public Improvements, That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the regulating and grading of Morgan avenue, between

Driggs avenue and a point one hundred and five feet northerly, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and the paving with trap-block pavement of the carriageway of said street, setting or resetting of the curb, and the flagging or reflagging of the sidewalks where not already done, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways, be and the same hereby is authorized and approved, there having been presented to said Board an estimate in writing, in such detail as the said Board has directed, of the cost of the proposed work or improvement, and a statement of the assessed value, according to the last preceding tax-roll, of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment, the estimated cost of said work being one thousand two hundred dollars. The said assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is three thousand five hundred dollars.

And the said Board does hereby determine that no portion of the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but the whole of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby.
