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## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

Transactions of the Department of Docks and Ferries for week ending Saturday, January 31, 1903.

The following communications were received and ordered on file, action being taken thereon as stated, to wit:

From the Mayor:

First—Suggesting that all communications relative to legislation which may affect the Department be transmitted to Assistant Corporation Counsel Charles S. Whitman.

Second—Transmitting communication from Percy L. Klock in reference to lease of portion of Pier foot of West Thirtieth street. Notify him that the lease has already been granted and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Third—Transmitting communication from James J. Gallagher, Recreation Pier Attendant, requesting assignment to duty. Notify him that the matter has been referred to the Corporation Counsel.

From the Corporation Counsel:

First—Advising that on January 20, 1903, judgment was entered in favor of the City in the action brought against the Metropolitan Ferry Company to recover possession of the halves of Piers foot of Seventh and Eighth streets, East river, and title to the halves of said piers was decreed to be in the City; that possession may now be taken, and requesting information relative to the condition of the piers for the past ten years, and a statement of rentals received from Piers in the neighborhood. Secretary directed to furnish.

Second—Advising that the property at Rossville, Staten Island, on which it is requested that the Department erect a public dock, is not owned by the City. Notify Alderman C. A. Shea.

Third—Requesting information as to the appointment of William O. Walker as Superintendent of Docks. Notified that the Commissioner has no information in regard to the matter.

Fourth—Submitting bills of costs for the acquisition of east half of Pier, old 12, East river, and expenses in connection with condemnation proceedings of premises between Little West Twelfth and West Thirteenth streets, and between West Eighteenth and West Twenty-third streets. Auditor directed to draw requisition.

Fifth—Transmitting copy of letter from George S. Schmidt complaining of the building of a dock and boathouse by a Mr. Manning on lands owned by the City between East Twenty-first and East Twenty-second streets, Sheepshead Bay. Referred to Corporation Counsel for advice as to ownership of property, and Mr. Schmidt notified that if the structure constitutes a nuisance, he should apply to the Police Department.

From the Comptroller—Transmitting application of Benjamin May for permission to maintain slaughter house at the southerly end of Wallabout Basin. Notify him that there is no objection to the maintenance of a slaughter house thereat.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission:

First—Requesting list of employees classified in Schedule "G." Secretary directed to furnish.

Second—In relation to the transfer of Henry L. Connell and Edward Herrman as Chairman and Rodman from the Rapid Transit Railroad Commission. The Rapid Transit Railroad Commission requested to consent to the transfer.

Third—Stating that there is no objection to the increase of salary of Isaac J. Stander, Draughtsman, as far as the Civil Service rules are concerned.

From the Department of Public Charities, requesting the construction of platform in the place of float at Randall's Island. Bureau Order No. 965 for the extension of float was canceled, and a new order issued for the construction of platform, the cost not to exceed \$750.

From the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, requesting dredging at the dumping boards foot of Stanton street, East river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to order same.

From the Commissioner of Bridges, requesting cancellation of lease of Pier, new 32, East river, so far as the premises lie within the boundary lines of property to be used for bridge purposes. Notified that the lease cannot be modified without mutual consent except so far as the area covered by the bridge caisson is concerned.

From the Board of Education, stating that the use of the upper deck of the East Third Street Recreation Pier for school purposes will commence March 1, 1903.

From the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requesting to be advised of the amount of Corporate Stock which the Department desires issued for its use during the year 1903. Secretary directed to furnish the information.

From the Department of Parks, requesting the extension of bulkheads at the foot of East One Hundred and Eleventh street and East One Hundred and Fourteenth street. Notified that it is not practicable at the present time to do the work in question.

From the War Department, stating that the application for the establishment of harbor lines on Eastchester creek was referred to the New York Harbor Line Board.

From the Bush Company (Ltd.), requesting a lease of pier on the lower water front of Manhattan. Notified that the only available Pier at the present time is Pier at West Forty-eighth street.

From Bowring & Co., agents for the Red Star Line, requesting lease of a dock in New York for the accommodation of their steamers. Notified that the only available Pier at the present time is the Pier at West Forty-eighth street.

From Birt, Potter & Hughes, complaining of difficulty in getting into berth at Pier, old 12, East river. Transmit copy of report of Dockmaster in relation thereto.

From Agents of owners of bulkhead between Piers 12 and 13, East river, requesting that any revenue collected from said bulkhead by the Dockmaster be turned over to them. Notified that this Department is not collecting any wharfage at said bulkhead.

From the City Club of New York, stating that the Legislative Committee of the City Club will meet every Tuesday evening during the session of the Legislature to consider bills relating to The City of New York, and requesting to be furnished with information relative to bills affecting the Department of Docks and Ferries. Notified that the Commissioner will be very glad to confer with them at any time in relation thereto.

From M. C. Dexter, requesting permission to berth baths on the south side of West Thirty-fifth Street Pier, and on the north side of East Thirty-second Street Pier during the season of 1903. Filed.

From Owen J. Foley, requesting assignment to duty as Watchman. Municipal Civil Service Commission requested to certify Foley's name on future payrolls as Watchman, he having been properly appointed to that position.

From M. Geoghegan, requesting that the rental of space between Piers 5 and 6, East river, be canceled during the time that he is not in possession thereof. Notify him that the rental will commence December 4, 1902.

From N. W. Harris, transmitting corrected statement showing decrease of number of passengers carried over the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad.

From John Honner, requesting a lease of bulkhead between One Hundred and Seventh street and One Hundred and Eighth street, Harlem river, or between One Hundred and Ninth street and One Hundred and Tenth street, Harlem river. Notify that bulkhead between One Hundred and Seventh and One Hundred and Eighth streets, Harlem river, is occupied by a floating dump under lease, and that the bulkhead between One Hundred and Eighth and One Hundred and Tenth streets, Harlem river, is required for open wharfage and it is not considered advisable to lease at present.

From H. Victor Keane, submitting list of concerns competent to do lithographic work.

From the Interurban Street Railway Company, requesting permission to change arrangement of terminal at the foot of Desbrosses street, North river. Permission granted, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, provided said Company shall file in this Department a written agreement as follows: 1st. The Company to take up the existing tracks and switches where inconsistent with the new plan and to relay said tracks and switches in accordance with the new plan submitted. 2d. The Company to agree to send an order to the asphalt company which originally laid the pavement to relay all pavement taken up, at the expense of the Company, and to send a duplicate copy of the order to the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department; also to pay the cost of such relaying; also the cost of inspecting the work by this Department. 3d. The Company shall at all times during the continuance of this permit maintain the pavement in good order between a line 2 feet northerly of the northernmost rail and a line 2 feet southerly of the southernmost rail of all tracks and switches that may be laid under this permit. 4th. That grooved rails shall be used for all of said tracks and switches. 5th. That said Company shall pay for the privilege of maintaining said tracks and switches compensation at the rate of \$200 per annum, payable quarterly in advance at the office of this Department. 6th. Said Company shall agree to remove said tracks and switches whenever so directed by the Commissioner of Docks and to restore the pavement to the condition in which it was prior to the taking up or relaying of any tracks or switches by said Company.

From Henry G. Leist, requesting a lease of ground between Academy and Dike-man streets, Sherman's creek, Harlem river. Application denied.

From Timothy Madigan, requesting that salary be paid him while unemployed through illness incurred while engaged in the service of the Department. Notify him that he can only be paid for the time he was actually employed.

From the North Side Board of Trade, accepting the offer of the use of Department tug "Manhattan" for inspection of the Bronx water front.

From the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, requesting blue print of Pier 3 and adjoining bulkheads, Wallabout Basin. Engineer-in-Chief directed to furnish.

From the Hoboken Ferry Company, withdrawing former proposition and requesting franchise for ferry between West Twenty-second street to Fourteenth street and Newark street, and offering for lease of franchise and wharf property \$26,000 per annum for the first ten years and \$30,000 per annum for the second ten years.

From the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, offering \$25,000 per annum for lease of Pier, new 20, East river, for the first ten years. Filed.

From the Ocean Steamship Company of Savannah, requesting the Department to reconsider the order for the construction of recreation roof on the bulkhead shed adjoining Pier, new 35, North river. Request their representative to call.

From W. J. Pollock, stating that the property in which he is interested is located at Nos. 504, 506 and 508 West Fourteenth street. Request him to furnish information relative to his ownership.

From John B. Pearson, giving notice of application for a grant of land under water at Linoleumville, Staten Island, and requesting the waiving of the usual conditions. Application denied.

From the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, requesting to be advised as to whether the Corporation Counsel has approved the insertion of shed clause in renewal lease of Pier at West Thirty-seventh street. Notified that there is no objection to the insertion of such a clause.

From J. Russell Smith, requesting information as to the length and width of piers and slips. Secretary directed to furnish.

From Sperry & Popham Coal Company, requesting that the work of filling in at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, Harlem river, be done more rapidly. Notified that the premises have been made a public dump, and that the evil will doubtless be remedied before long.

From Townsend & Downey Shipbuilding Company, accepting proposed franchise for operation of ferry between Shooter's Island and Mariner's Harbor, Borough of Richmond.

From American Malting Company (two), stating that the ice bridge now on bulkhead between Sixty-third street and Sixty-fourth street, East river, is not used for ice-bridge purposes, and that the Company is ready to pay rental for the premises. Bill ordered to be presented.



From attorney for Rumsey estate, requesting a survey of premises between Two Hundred and Eighth street and Two Hundred and Eleventh street, westerly side of Harlem river, with a view to making application for a grant of land under water. Notified that the Department would not consider a sale of the land under water referred to, but would entertain a proposition for a lease of same.

From Frederick Wesson, complaining of the Wall Street Ferry service. Secretary directed to reply.

From the Auditor, submitting report as to the financial standing of members of the Independent Wholesale Fish Dealers' Association.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

William J. McGirr, to dredge in front of dumping board between Forty-third and Forty-fourth streets, North river.

New York Dock Company, to replace the old crib at the outer end of Pier 8, East river, Borough of Brooklyn, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Milliken Brothers, to construct a dock 160 feet long at Howland's Hook, Mariner's Harbor, Staten Island, in accordance with plans submitted.

The following permits were granted, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks:

New York and Jersey Railroad Company, to place transit instrument on the roof of Pier, new 40, North river.

Owen McKane, to transfer watchman's house from the foot of West Twentieth to the foot of West Twenty-sixth street; compensation to be paid at the rate of \$2 per month, the privilege to continue not longer than May 1, 1903.

The following permit was granted on the usual terms:

Central Hudson Steamboat Company, to repair leak in water pipe at Pier, new 24, North river.

The following permits were revoked:

Robert Thedford, to occupy berth at the Pier foot of West Fifty-fourth street.

Valvoline Oil Company, to berth oil boat at the Pier foot of West Thirty-ninth street.

The sureties on Contracts Nos. 735, 748, 761 and 765 were approved by the Comptroller.

Bids were opened for preparing for and building a new pier, with appurtenances, on the westerly side of Blackwell's Island in the vicinity of Metropolitan Hospital, under Contract No. 765, a representative of the Comptroller being present, as follows:

Contract No. 765 was awarded to G. B. Spearin, the lowest bidder, subject to the approval by the Comptroller of his surety, namely, The American Bonding Company of Baltimore, No. 253 Broadway, New York.

Contract No. 735, for furnishing about 2,000 tons of anthracite coal, was ordered to be readvertised.

Specifications and form of contract for furnishing manila rope and for construction of riprap embankment on the easterly side of Riker's Island were approved, subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel as to form, and the Secretary was directed to have a sufficient number of blank proposals printed and the proper advertisement inviting estimates inserted in the newspapers designated by law.

The claim against the owner of tug "Anna J. Kipp" for damage to Department property at the foot of One Hundred and Thirteenth street, Harlem river, was ordered to be collected.

The following orders were issued:

Lawyers' Co-operative Publishing Company, Abbott's Cyclopedic Digest, complete, \$100.

Empire City Woodworking Company, two doors, \$15.

Thomas J. Quinn, three double trucks for a period of about five days, \$24 per day.

Robert Turley, Timothy Gleason and John Long, 60 days' use of horse, cart and driver, \$3.50 per day.

A leave of absence was granted Thomas S. Callendar, Jr., until March 31st, 1903.

The name of James B. Collins, Laborer, deceased, was ordered to be taken from the list of employees.

The wages of Francis J. Clark, Dock Builder, were fixed at the rate of 50 cents per hour while employed.

The following orders were issued to the Engineer-in-Chief:

To repair Pier 33, East river, and shed thereon, cost not to exceed \$500.

To order dredging at the half slip adjoining the northerly side of Pier foot of East Twenty-eighth street, not to exceed 14,800 cubic yards.

To order dredging at the bulkhead north of the East Ninety-first Street Pier, not to exceed 2,200 cubic yards.

To repair Pier at West Ninety-seventh street and report cost thereof for collection from Murray & Reid, owners of tugboat "Annie L."

To order dredging at bulkhead between One Hundred and First and One Hundred and Fourth streets, Harlem river.

The rental to be charged the Interurban Street Railway Company for the privilege of maintaining tracks and starter's house on Marginal street, in front of Chambers Street Ferry, was increased from \$150 to \$200 per annum, to take effect February 1, 1903.

The Delaware and Hudson Coal Company were notified to remove coal boat "D. and H. 2123" and cargo, sunk at the foot of West Eightieth street.

The Engineer-in-Chief reported that the following work had been completed by the force of this Department: Preparing blue prints of the standard maps of the North, East and Harlem rivers in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, to be indexed for the use of the Commissioner on tug "Manhattan."

The Engineer-in-Chief submitted a description of premises proposed to be leased at the Pier foot of West Fifty-fifth street for dumping board purposes. Secretary directed to advertise for bids for the lease of said premises for a term of five years, with the privilege of maintaining a dumping board thereon.

The amendment to section 26 of the Sanitary Code presented at the last meeting was taken from the table and, on motion, it was

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Board of Health of the Department of Health of The City of New York, section 26 of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 26. For all lodging houses in The City of New York containing rooms in which there are three or more beds for the use of lodgers, a permit from the Board of Health shall be required, and no person shall have, lease, let or keep any such lodging house or the lodgings therein, or assist in keeping, hire, or assist in the hiring, or conduct the business of any such lodging house, or the lodgings therein except pursuant to the terms and conditions of such permit. The beds in all lodging houses and in every room in which beds are let for lodgers shall be separated



by a passageway of not less than two feet, horizontally, and all the beds shall be so arranged that under each of them the air shall freely circulate and there be adequate ventilation. Four hundred cubic feet of air space shall be provided and allowed for each bed and lodger.

### Quarterly Report for the Three Months Ending September 30, 1902.

Upon the completion of Seaside Park on July 1, 1902, the date of my last report, this Department undertook a broader and more comprehensive plan for the improvement of other neglected park property, not only in the Borough of Brooklyn, but in the outlying sections of Queens. By resolution dated July 25, the Board of Estimate placed at my disposal \$165,000 to be spent in the development of the park lands owned by the city and the improvements of parkways and drives. The Department at once undertook to make available for public use those lands which for years had lain dormant. The most important of these are Sunset Park, in the centre of the vast, fast-growing South Brooklyn section, and Highland Park, adjoining Ridgewood Reservoir, the only park available for the use of the half million residents of East New York. The main force of workmen was concentrated upon these parks, owing to the magnitude of the work, but simultaneously the systematic improvement of the small parks in Flushing, College Point and Corona, of Linton Park and New Lots Playground in the Brownsville section of Brooklyn, was begun, and is now well under way, as is also the reclamation of Canarsie Beach Park.

The force which did such effective work at Coney Island was set to work upon Sunset Park. A scheme for laying out Sunset Park has been worked out by Samuel Parsons, the landscape architect, which establishes a retaining wall of split boulders laid up in what is termed "random work," five feet high and battered back to meet the slope of the bank in the rear, from which most of the boulders will be taken for the wall. The present line of this construction extends along the entire western side of Sunset Park, and is to be completed along the Forty-first street side as far as Seventh avenue and in a modified form along the Seventh avenue side to Forty-third street, the present southerly line of park property. This park, situated on a high bluff, overlooking the bay and ocean, was almost in a state of nature. The cutting through of Forty-first street and Fifth avenue left almost perpendicular banks. Every rainstorm washed large quantities of sand and gravel down into the streets, making them almost impassable and carrying away considerable portions of the park land. The first improvement necessary accordingly was the construction of this retaining wall, which is being built upon the old foundation put down by a former administration. There is already before the Board of Estimate a proposition to purchase two additional blocks of property between Forty-third and Forty-fourth streets, Fifth and Seventh avenues to be joined on to the southerly side of the present park lands, but our force has been put at work developing what the City already owns, namely, the blocks bounded by Forty-first and Forty-third streets, Fifth and Seventh avenues. At the present south-westerly corner at Forty-third street and Fifth avenue has been constructed a temporary flight of rustic stairs, in order to reach the system of walks that is intended to surround the formal terrace above. This flight of steps was put up to give the people access to the park during its construction and pending the securing of the additional land between Forty-third street and Forty-fourth street. The design adopted by the landscape architect contemplates a natural or informal arrangement of walks with winding lines and easy grades, making them inconspicuous to the eye and conformable to the peculiar contours of the territory. The park employees have already done a large amount of grading on the banks and surface of the park lands, so that it begins to assume a businesslike appearance, but there is still a great amount of work to be done. Contracts are about to be advertised for the completion of the rubble masonry retaining walls, which will be completed before winter sets in.

#### Highland Park.

At Highland Park the scheme of improvement is practically the same as originally agreed upon, and includes the building of a macadam road winding through the natural woodland from the entrance at Highland Boulevard and the reservoir, over the new boulder bridge through and around the rear side of the park, emerging at the Queens County side to connect with the road leading to Flushing. The bridge referred to, contract for the building of which was let last December by my predecessor, was completed in September, and has been greatly improved by finishing the rim of the arch with heavy oblong masses of cut dark stone. The new road has been graded as far as the bridge, and workmen are now engaged in shaping up the approaches, and the deep ravine over which the bridge has been thrown is now being leveled off on both sides of the archway. The scheme of improvement includes some beautiful sylvan walks around the deep glen far below the level of the roadway, and the work of grading these walks is well under way, so that it is expected that the heavy work will be well completed before winter sets in.

#### Flushing Park.

Of the other new work undertaken by the Department perhaps the most important is the improvement of the historic old triangle in the centre of Flushing village and known as Flushing Park. This park is undergoing a thorough overhauling. Nearly all the old curbing, which was sadly dilapidated, has been taken up and recut and reset and replaced with new where needed. The defective drainage, which created a mudhole of the park after heavy rainfalls, has been thoroughly rebuilt and improved by the substitution of new catch basins. Within a week the entire park will be covered with topsoil and resodded, new walks have been laid out, the trees trimmed and the old-fashioned iron fountain is undergoing thorough repairs.

#### Linden Park.

Linden Park, in Corona, is one of the naturally beautiful spots of the entire system. It occupies two blocks square, and lies directly opposite a school and church. In the center of the square is a good-sized natural lake, which with a green lawn sloping gently toward it and some fine old trees overhanging its border forms a very beautiful and picturesque feature. The outlines of this park have never been defined, and nothing was ever done in the way of beautifying its surface. This department has had the park surveyed and its boundaries defined, and has called attention of the Department of Public Works to the necessity of beautifying the roads adjacent thereto. A new curb has been set on one side, and some of the low spots about the border of the lake have been graded up and about one thousand yards of rich topsoil has been secured to give nourishment to a new bed of grass. A fence, consisting of ornamental chestnut posts and wrought iron piping, has been built about the park, and an overflow pipe draining the lake has been put in.

#### College Point Park.

The repairs to College Point Park, which have been practically completed in the last three months, include the recurbings of the square, the planting of trees and shrubs to form a much-needed shade and fencing park.

#### Linton Park.

A design for the construction of this long-neglected park in the East New York section has been prepared, and workmen are about to begin operations. This park was purchased in 1894 by former Park Commissioner Frank Squier. An iron picket fence was put up defining the property, but it has since been utterly ignored, and has served as a pasture for cattle and goats. This Department, in an effort to reclaim the land and make it attractive and available for the people, has decided to rebuild the walks and plant with trees and shrubs.

New Lots Playground, which has had a precisely similar history to that of Linton Park, is now undergoing a thorough reconstruction.

#### Institute Park (East Side Lands).

While the main part of the working force has been subdivided upon the smaller parks, the work of development of the east side lands has been carried on with the utmost vigor. The depression between the extreme west end of the park and the reservoir of the City Water Works is now being filled in free of charge by several contractors. A large part of the east end of the park has been treated in the same manner, so as to secure a large area of gently sloping plain, which will be readily visible from the high-ground levels of the west end. All of this territory has been carefully graded and shaped with plows and scoops, in order to obtain as level a surface as possible. The low hills to the north of this plain have been treated in a similar manner, in order to soften the contours and make them more graceful and parklike in appearance. On two of these hills holes eight feet in diameter have been marked out, dug and filled with rich mould, in preparation for planting. The Department has already advertised for 12,000 cubic yards of top soil, which will be spread upon the mounds and slopes to nourish the trees and shrubs, the planting of which has already begun. During the past two weeks our arboriculturists have scoured the country in New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania in search of trees

suitable for this important planting. Plans have been perfected for a complete system of drainage and irrigation, which include a lake about three acres in extent on the slope. This lake will empty into the pond in the deer paddock across Flatbush avenue, in Prospect Park, by means of a small streamlet and waterfall. The propagating houses, which for years have stood on the East Side lands, have been moved and reset on a new foundation adjoining the greenhouses in Prospect Park. Stones have been collected to the extent of 5,000 cubic yards, and arrangements made for crushing them, the material to be used in constructing walks. The Department has received 1,500 cubic yards of top soil from contractors, free of charge, for the privilege of filling in on the East Side lands with subsoil, thus furnishing them with a dump.

#### Paving Ocean Parkway.

Another work of considerable importance has been the paving of Ocean Parkway from the Speedway to the Ocean, a distance of over two miles. This stretch of heavy, sandy road, attached to the excellent Speedway, has been sadly out of harmony with the rest of the magnificent Parkway, and very disappointing to drivers. The repaving consists in a foundation of coarse bank gravel four to eight inches in depth, with three and a half inches of trap rock screening as a top dressing, and the whole thoroughly rolled. The improvement has been completed as far as Neck road, and is being rapidly pushed forward.

#### Seaside Park.

Since the completion of construction work on Seaside Park, the contractor has finished fencing it with wrought iron pickets. The Concourse in front of the Park has been drained, curbed and resurfaced with asphalt, and the shelter house is now about completed. All that is left of the park lands on the easterly side of the Ocean Parkway has been covered with eighteen inches of top soil and seeded, so that it forms a small, but very attractive, triangle of green where once were barren sands. The contractor is now building the granite boundary wall on the south side of the Concourse, and it is expected the job will be completed within sixty days. The contract has been let for paving with asphalt tiles the walk on the southerly side of the Concourse, adjoining the wall, but this work cannot be started until the wall is finished.

#### Prospect Park.

The replacing of the dilapidated wooden fence surrounding Prospect Park with an artistic iron picket fence is now going on. The work has been finished from the Ocean avenue entrance on Fort Hamilton avenue so far as the Park Circle, and the iron work is on the ground for completing the fence from Ocean avenue to the main entrance at the Plaza. Granite posts have been built at the end of the boundary walls. The greenhouses have been thoroughly overhauled and enlarged, and a new heating plant installed. The Park in the vicinity of the deer paddock and duck pond has been greatly improved, and several new walks have been added to the Park.

#### Bay Ridge Parkway.

The development of Bay Ridge Parkway has been carried on vigorously. The slopes have been graded, sodded and planted, and winding walks have been constructed from the low land to Second and Third avenues. A list of trees for fall planting has been secured, which are well suited for the further development of the picturesque features of the Parkway. Asphalt tiled walks and a granite stairway have been completed.

New contracts have been let for fencing with iron pickets Shore road for its entire length, and new contracts are now being advertised for building a bulkhead at the foot of the Ocean Parkway, for re-surfacing the walks in Prospect and Fort Greene parks, and for repairing bridges in Forest and Dyker Beach parks.

#### Fort Green Park.

In connection with the repaving of De Kalb avenue by the Department of Public Works, this Department undertook the construction of the walk along De Kalb avenue on the southerly side of the park. A broad path of bluestone flagging was laid, and as a border of this walk there is now being laid a three-foot strip of sod next the curb. In addition to the regular maintenance of the park, new basins and drain pipe have been laid, tree holes dug and filled with rich top soil to provide for extensive replanting.

#### Improvement of Roads.

Fort Hamilton avenue, which was sadly in need of repairs, has been resurfaced for a considerable distance from Gravesend avenue south. The roadbed consists of six to eight inches of trap rock, with a top dressing of Roa Hook gravel.

On Bay Parkway, north of King's Highway, the Department has built a sewer and sewer basins to drain certain lands which have been flooded owing to the construction of that boulevard.

Two sewer basins and cesspools have been constructed on Ocean Parkway at Avenue H to provide for the proper drainage of that part of the road.

On the Eastern Parkway new paths have been laid out between Buffalo avenue and Ralph avenue, and the sod borders along the entire line of the street have been carefully retimmed.

Bushwick avenue has been reconstructed by removing certain ragged sections of the brick pavement and replacing it with new brick work.

The roads in Prospect Park have been renewed extensively by adding gravel and screenings.

#### Remodeling Golf Links.

The regular force in Forest Park has devoted considerable time to remodeling and reconstructing the golf links, with the result that the golf players now consider the nine-hole course there the equal of any in the country. One of the old houses which was purchased with the land has been remodeled and a rustic addition made to it to accommodate over two hundred players. Patrons of the links had the old house fixed up on the interior with lockers for themselves at their own expense.

#### Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences.

The contractor to whom was awarded the work of building the centre pavilion of the Institute is working energetically on the new building, the soil excavated being used for filling low places on the east side lands.

#### Department of Arboriculture.

The law passed by the Legislature in 1902, placing all of the trees in the City under the care of the Park Department, has added a great amount of work and responsibility to this Department. Since the date of my last report I have attempted to organize this particular department of the work. An experienced arboriculturist has been placed in charge of the work; under his jurisdiction have been placed not only the trees of the parks, but also the City trees. During the greater part of the last quarter he has had about fifty men at his disposal. But this force has been unable to do much more than attend to the care of the park trees. We have, however, made personal investigation of about fifty cases in which our attention was called to trees in the way of improvements in the street, particularly where they were in the way of improvement in the Highway Department. On Fifty-fourth street this Department compromised with the Highway Department, and succeeded in saving an entire row of thirty-two trees. This was accomplished by getting the consent of the Highway Engineers to narrow the street by about fourteen inches, so that the curb could be placed outside of the line of the trees. In other cases we were able to save individual specimens of fine old shade trees by insisting upon the curb being cut to escape the base of the tree. This Bureau has not undertaken to remove any of the dead trees nor trim them, but has insisted that none of this would be done without permits from this Department, and the telephone and telegraph companies have been very carefully watched to prevent them from the wholesale slaughter among the boughs. In the war on Tussock moth the entire force of tree-men was engaged in extensive spraying operations. Spraying ceased about July 8, as the worms had about finished their destructive work. The trees in Prospect and Fort Greene parks and on Eastern Parkway and Ocean Parkway were thoroughly treated with insect poison, as those trees seem to have been the subjects of an unusually bad attack.

On July 12 the first adult moths were seen depositing their eggs, and from that time the efforts of the tree gang were directed toward the destruction of the cocoon and eggs. Steel brushes were used for this purpose, and millions of nests were destroyed in this way.

Extensive pruning has been going on for the past month. The trees on Ocean Parkway for a distance of three miles have undergone a thorough overhauling, and the trees on Eastern Parkway have been pruned throughout its entire length. The



decayed limbs have been removed from trees on Bay Parkway, Fort Hamilton avenue and Bay Ridge Parkway.

In addition to the personal inspection of trees in the City streets a great many letters have been written to residents giving them information as to the care of the trees, particularly with regard to destroying the worm.

#### Maintenance.

Notwithstanding the large amount of improvements being carried on, the regular work of maintaining and caring for the entire system of parks in these boroughs has been carefully carried on. Walks and shelters have been kept clean and in good order, lawns mown and borders trimmed, flower beds attended to, trees and shrubs brushed and sprayed to kill insects, etc., and trimmed where necessary, and sewer basins cleaned.

2. A member of the force to whom a medal is awarded must have performed an act of exceptional valor at the peril of his own life, and showing a high order of intelligence, the medal to become the personal property of the recipient and to be worn by him on all occasions of ceremony and parade.

3. The ceremony of presentation shall be held annually upon a date to be designated by the Commissioner of Police, at the annual parade of the police force or a portion thereof, the Mayor of The City of New York to make the presentation. If there be no annual parade the Commissioner shall designate the place of presentation. In the absence or inability of the Mayor, then the Commissioner of Police to act in his stead.

4. The members of the uniformed force to whom the medals shall be awarded shall be selected by a committee composed of the Commissioner of Police, the First Deputy Commissioner of Police, the Second Deputy Commissioner of Police and the Chief Clerk of the Police Department. Should this committee be divided as to the selection, then the Mayor of the City shall have the deciding vote.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Comptroller in regard to the proposed applications and the compensation to be paid for such franchises:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—I submit herewith forms of resolutions granting to the New York City Interborough Railway Company and the Union Railway Company franchises to operate street surface railroads. These forms have been redrawn and have the approval of the Corporation Counsel, and, as he states in a communication to me, are in such legal form as may be properly passed by the Board.

For the information of the Board I would state that in the case of the Interborough Railway Company there is a minimum charge provided of \$15,000 per annum for the first five years and \$30,000 per annum for the remaining term of twenty years of the grant, and also a charge for each of the four bridges, to wit: Commencing at \$4,000 per annum each and rising to \$6,000 per annum each during the first twenty-five years of the franchise.

The terms for a renewal for the second twenty-five years are to be fixed by arbitrators, but in no case to be less than the minimum provided for in the first twenty-five years of the grant.

Other special provisions are, that at the end of fifty years the plant and property of the grantee in the streets, avenues and highways, etc., shall become the property of The City of New York without cost to the City.

No assignment of the said grant can take place without the consent of The City of New York.

That a portion of the route lying within the Borough of Manhattan shall be operated as soon as practicable by underground electrical power, and the remainder of the route may, upon one year's notice in writing by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, be required likewise to be operated by the underground electrical power.

Rate of fare, not exceeding 5 cents; rate for carrying property, subject to control of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Cars to be run both day and night at intervals of not more than thirty (30) minutes.

The grantee to keep the streets between the tracks and two feet on either side free from snow and ice, and keep in permanent repair the same street surface.

The grantee to water streets three times in every 24 hours, when the thermometer is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit.

The City reserves the right to grant the same franchise over the same bridges and viaduct to other companies upon any terms which it may see fit to exact.

The grantee to complete the construction of at least 24 miles of double-track road on or before July 1, 1905, otherwise the grant to be forfeited.

Penalty provisions for non-fulfillment of terms of franchise, and a deposit of \$50,000 in cash or securities required.

The terms for the Union Railway Company provide for the payment, for the use of the Macomb's Dam Bridge and the viaduct in West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, of \$125,000 for the first term of 25 years, starting at \$4,000 per annum and rising to \$6,000 per annum. This is five times the amount required by the former Board of Estimate and Apportionment when application for an exclusive franchise was first made to it in the year 1901, and as these franchises are not exclusive, these terms aggregate ten times the sums fixed for this bridge by the former Board. The other provisions are similar to those in the grant to the New York City Interborough Railway Company, with the exception that the cars are to be run once in twenty (20) minutes, the minimum time provided by law for the elevated railway, with which this line makes connection, and a deposit of cash or securities of \$10,000 is required for the faithful performance of the terms of the franchise.

Alderman Peck suggested that the matter be postponed.

Alderman Harnischfeger addressed the Board and requested immediate action on its part. Mr. Everett P. Wheeler, on behalf of the New York City Interborough Railway Company, also made a similar request.

Mr. Fielding L. Marshall, of the New York West Side Association, requested an adjournment.

The Mayor inquired if there was any one present representing the Union Railway Company; there being no response the Comptroller moved that the Board proceed to consider the terms of the proposed ordinance.

The Mayor announced that the Board would proceed to consider the proposed franchise of the New York City Interborough Railway Company.

Mr. Everett P. Wheeler, on behalf of the New York City Interborough Railway Company, presented the following amendment to section 2 of the proposed ordinance:

"II." of the resolution on page 2, and for "Section 2—Third," on pages 14 and 15 of the ordinance.

II.—Upon the termination of the said franchise, right or privilege hereby granted, whether original or renewal, there shall be a fair valuation of the plant and property of the grantee used for traction purposes, including power house, equipment, tracks and appurtenances, which plant and property shall be and become the property of The City of New York on the termination of this grant and the payment to the grantee of such valuation. Such payment shall be at a fair valuation of the said plant as property, excluding any value derived from the franchise, and such value shall be determined by a committee of the Mayor, Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, or the persons occupying corresponding functions in the government of The City of New York, when this franchise or renewal thereof expires.

The Comptroller moved that the word "used" after the word "grantee" and preceding the words "for traction purposes" be stricken out and the word "necessary" substituted therefor, and that following the words "for traction purposes" and preceding the words "including power house, equipment, tracks and appurtenances" the following words be inserted: "upon the streets, avenues, roads, highways, public places, bridges and viaduct;" also that the words in said proposed amendment as follows: "a committee of the Mayor, Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, or the persons occupying corresponding functions in the government of The City of New York, when this franchise or renewal thereof expires," be stricken out and that there be inserted in place thereof the words, "the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successor in authority," which amendments were agreed to.

The Comptroller moved as a further amendment that the word "shall" following the words "which plant and property" and preceding the words "be and become the property of The City of New York" be stricken out and there be substituted in place thereof the words "may at the option of The City of New York," which amendment was lost by the following vote, it being necessary, in accordance with the provisions of the Charter, that twelve votes be cast in the affirmative to pass an original resolution.

Affirmative—Comptroller and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn—7.

Negative—The Mayor, President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—9.

Alderman Peck suggested that the word "overhead" wherever it appeared in said proposed ordinance be stricken out and the word "underground" substituted therefor.

The Comptroller presented the following, to be inserted in section 2, following

the seventeenth paragraph of said proposed ordinance, and to be known as the eighteenth paragraph:

Eighteenth—If any of the streets, avenues, highways, public places or bridges above referred to, or described, shall not now be open or in use as public highways, no right or franchise shall vest in the grantee by virtue of this ordinance until after such streets, avenues, highways, public places or bridges shall be legally opened as a public highway. Nothing in this ordinance contained shall be construed as an obligation on The City of New York, in respect to the opening of such streets, avenues, highways, public places and bridges.

Which was unanimously agreed to.

The Comptroller moved that in section 6, after the words "double track," the word "roadway" be stricken out and the word "railroad" be substituted therefor. Which was unanimously agreed to.

On motion, the amendments suggested were ordered printed and the matter was laid over until Friday, January 30, 1903.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Commissioner of Street Cleaning requesting the transfer of \$14,600 for "Removal of Snow and Ice," boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

SIR—I have to request that the sum of fourteen thousand six hundred dollars (\$14,600) be transferred from the account of "Sweeping and Carting" appropriation of the Department of Street Cleaning, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, for the year 1902, to the appropriation account of "Snow and Ice," Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, for 1902, for the reason that the balance remaining in the last-named account is not sufficient to meet the emergency of the last fall of snow.

I also have to request that, in accordance with the provisions of section 546 of the Greater New York Charter, the Comptroller be authorized and directed to issue Bonds of The City of New York to the amount of fourteen thousand six hundred dollars (\$14,600), the proceeds thereof to be used for the restoration to the account of "Sweeping and Carting" of the amount temporarily transferred therefrom as requested above.

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby assents to and approves of the acquiring, by purchase, by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, for and in behalf and in the name of The City of New York, of the property, franchises and business now or formerly of the New York and Westchester Water Company, or of the receiver or receivers of said company, lying, located or conducted within the boundaries of The City of New York as at present constituted, and of all rights, titles and interests in and to the same, by whomsoever the same may be held, enjoyed or claimed upon the terms and conditions hereinafter mentioned, and hereby authorizes said Commissioner, in behalf of and in the name of The City of New York, to enter into a contract for such purchase with the owner or owners thereof in a form approved by the Corporation Counsel; and hereby requests the Corporation Counsel to prepare the necessary agreement for the purchase of said property, franchises and business, rights, titles and interests, at a price not exceeding the sum of six hundred and sixty thousand five hundred and one dollars and seventy-four cents (\$660,501.74), less the amount due and owing to The City of New York for taxes and interest to date of actual transfer, and less the sum of twenty-five thousand three hundred and twenty-seven dollars and one cent (\$25,327.01), balance due and owing to The City of New York for water supplied to said company or its successors in interest by said City, over and above the amount due to said New York and Westchester Water Company or its successors in interest for hydrant rentals, water rates, etc., from The City of New York, as adjusted upon the account stated and a rebate to the City for collections made from consumers by the company or its successors for a period extending beyond said date, which said agreement is to be presented to the Comptroller for his consent, under the provisions of section 149 of the Greater New York Charter, and to the Mayor and Comptroller for their separate written consent and approval, under section 471 of the Charter; and

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of sections 169 and 178 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to the amount of six hundred and sixty thousand five hundred and one dollars and seventy-four cents (\$660,501.74), the proceeds thereof to be applied to the payment of said taxes and interest to The City of New York, to the balance due and owing to the said City on the account stated and adjusted as aforesaid, and the remainder to the payment of such party or parties, corporation or corporations as the Corporation Counsel may certify as entitled thereto upon the execution and delivery of the instruments necessary to vest the title to said property, franchises and business, rights, titles and interests in The City of New York."

The Secretary presented the following report from the Chief Examiner of Accounts of Institutions of the Department of Finance, relative to the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys:

January 22, 1903.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—This Disciplinary Institute for Boys is situated at Eighteenth avenue, Fifty-sixth and Fifty-eighth streets, one of the most inaccessible and inconvenient places south of the old City of Brooklyn. Whatever of freight or supplies is needed must be hauled over long distances. The land is low and rather wet, and after a rainstorm the grounds are sometimes unusable because of the water.

The buildings are a jumble of old-fashioned structures, partly the villa, jail and convent styles of architecture intermingled. Originally some were private residences, but additions and enlargements were made for a Brothers' School. Later they were taken for their present purpose. They were partly burned in 1890, and about thirty thousand dollars was expended in repairs. The institution has a frayed-out, gloomy appearance, and although I saw it on a brilliant winter day, it looked like a place to be avoided. There are long, high fences around parts of it, and the approaches are through a long yard, with unkempt walks and straggly greens. A general air of dilapidation is not wanting.

There were in the institution two hundred and twenty pupils. There should be two hundred and twenty-five, but five had run away, and nobody should blame them. The impression that I got from every room, including the hall, in the house, was, it is a good place to leave.

The kitchen and dining-rooms are in the basement of the main building. The odors of the kitchen suggested the proximity of the sewer, and the dining-room, a disorderly place, had a combined atmosphere, although the windows were open and cold air was trying to get in, of many smells and gloom.

The dormitory is in the top of the main building, and has an unusual number of windows, but it is crowded. There is no Board of Health permit displayed, as the law requires, stating the number permitted to sleep therein. There are about eighty more boys sleeping in that apartment than the law allows.

During the year 1901, when repairs and improvements were going forward, the inmates were boarded at the Catholic Protectorate at the usual rate of two dollars per week, or one hundred and ten dollars per annum. The per capita cost in this institution for 1901 was at the rate of two hundred and forty-seven dollars and seven cents per annum, or double that in the private institutions, and \$37.10 besides. The rate was reduced to two hundred and five dollars and eighty-two cents per annum; or, the cost here, after all reductions, is more than ninety-five dollars per capita per annum for each boy in the institution in excess of what the same, if not better work, is done for in the private institutions.

The entire appropriation for the institution from the public funds for 1902 was forty-eight thousand dollars. The salary list consumed about one-half of it, or \$23,894. It is fair to say that this same payroll, with the addition, perhaps, of a few subordinates, could take care of an institution having three or four times the population.

In the Brooklyn Eagle of July 2, 1902, there was disclosed to the public a very grave scandal affecting the institution. This matter has since drifted into the courts through the Corporation Counsel's office.

Thus it is seen that this Training School for Boys cannot be favorably measured by any of the private institutions as a standard. It will not compare from any point of view. No one of the private institutions receiving money from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would be allowed to continue under the same sanitary and sleeping conditions for a single day; and on the side of cost to the City, the private institutions are better, about two to one.

The City, therefore, would save much money by transferring these pupils to some of the private institutions. The boys would live under very much better conditions in every way, and the City would be relieved of the necessity of maintaining an institution of this kind in an inconvenient and unsuitable place.

The State Board of Charities would not allow any of the private institutions to continue that work in that place without immediate and expensive changes. No one



of the private institutions is maintained under conditions such as exist there. The difference between the private institutions in surroundings, in sanitation, in dormitories, in kitchen and dining-rooms, in play grounds, in class-rooms, in short in all those things which go to make up the desirable features from the standpoint of the student and philanthropist, can only be appreciated by actual observation. Nothing can be done in this institution to reduce the per capita cost, except by an addition of buildings so as to increase the population. Nothing whatever may be done to make the place salubrious and desirable from the health point of view, for the reason that the land lies too low for the uses of a crowded community.

I omit the detailed financial report of Messrs. Murray and Mury. Since we finished our examination, however, the State Board of Charities has completed an investigation, through its Inspector and Financial Expert, which fully corroborates the conclusions reached by the Examiners of this Department. Their report calls special attention to the fact that the institution is managed by a Board of thirteen members, having an office at Nos. 4 and 5 Court square, Borough of Brooklyn, and holding a general meeting on the second Tuesday of each month. An analysis of the attendance of the meetings of the Board of Managers shows an average attendance of six per meeting, and while it appears that some of the members are faithful in their attendance, others seldom come, or not at all.

The Visitors' Registry, kept in the general offices of the institution, gives a record of the Managers' visits to the institution proper during the past year, and from this record it appears that, with the exception of the President and Secretary, the chief interest of the managers in the institution is confined to irregular visits to the city office, where Board meetings are held, and that the institution at Fifty-eighth street receives little of their attention.

Of the administrative corps, the State Board of Charities' Expert says: "The character and efficiency of the staff does not yet come up to the desired standard necessary for successful administration. The officers in immediate charge of the boys, upon whom much of the duty and training devolves, are not at all conversant with modern reformatory methods, and not fitted by education, training or temperament to direct boys of this class." The report further says: "The refectory staff needs more intelligent direction. The condition of this room (the dining-room) was very untidy, over-crowded, ill-ventilated, and the serving of the food slovenly and slipshod. No effort appears to be made to teach proper deportment and ordinary table manners."

The same report further says: "In the engine-room and fire-room, where a full complement of Engineers and Assistants are employed and well paid, we found three boys who had been pressed into the service as stokers and firemen; one, a mere child, between seven and eight years of age, was found in the act of feeding and cleaning the fire of a large high-pressure boiler, and attempting to wield a heavy iron firing tool. \* \* \* The laundry work is carelessly done; the machinery is not properly manipulated. The result is a general wastefulness of effort and material. \* \* \* It is unfortunate that to the general defect of lack of proper plant and facility, there should be added the burden of an untrained staff, entirely unacquainted with modern reformatory methods and lacking proper appreciation of economics. \* \* \* The Industrial Departments are deficient in so far as many necessary features are lacking to make the education practical and beneficial."

From all the foregoing, it will be seen that this institution, as to cost, management and efficiency, is not creditable either to its managers or The City of New York.

To conclude: From this survey, the conclusion is irresistible that there are but two courses open: One is to immediately enlarge the institution to at least three times its present capacity, though for such increase in facilities the City, most fortunately, has no need; or to transfer the children to other and better institutions, of which there are plenty, and so close this Training School, save about one-half of its cost annually, and release the property for other purposes. This latter course is the one that commends itself, because of the many reasons above set forth, and is the one recommended.

It may be added that the report of the State Board of Charities, herewith attached, on this last point says:

"A careful study of the situation inclines one to the belief that the best interests of the municipality, and of these children would be better served if they were permanently transferred according to religious division, to the New York Catholic Protectory and the New York Juvenile Asylum."

Hon. J. W. STEVENSON, Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIR—I am directed by the Committee on Supplies of the Board of Education to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize said Committee to reject the bid of Wynkoop-Hallenbeck-Crawford Company, the lowest bidders, for printing and for furnishing and delivering printed stationery and printed supplies for the Board of Education during the year 1903, in accordance with the provision of section 419 of the Revised Charter, on the ground that it is for the public interest that a bid other than the lowest should be accepted.

The contract for printing, etc., for the Department of Education for the year 1902 was awarded to Wynkoop-Hallenbeck-Crawford Company, but they failed to perform the contract in a satisfactory manner, and so unnecessarily and unreasonably delayed work required to be done under said contract that on December 4, 1902, the Committee on Supplies, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph R of said contract, canceled said contract with Wynkoop-Hallenbeck-Crawford Company and notified them to discontinue all work under said contract except such work as was then in progress. The action of the Committee on Supplies in canceling the above-mentioned contract was approved by the Board of Education at its meeting held on December 23, 1902.

The Board of Education is prepared to furnish detailed statements showing that the provisions of the above-mentioned contract with the Wynkoop-Hallenbeck-Crawford Company were not complied with from the time of the execution of said contract, especially in the matter of printing and delivering proofs and printed minutes of the Board of Education, minutes of the Committee on Buildings and specifications for new buildings, repair work, etc.

I would further call your attention to the fact that Wynkoop-Hallenbeck-Crawford Company held the contract for printing for the Board of Education for the year 1901, and that on December 5, 1901, the Committee on Supplies canceled said contract for the reason that the contractors "have not furnished proofs of specifications within the time provided for by said contract, and have not furnished proofs of the Journal of the Board meetings and of the minutes of the Committee on Buildings within the time provided for by said contract, and have unreasonably delayed the delivery of all printed matter." The action of the Committee on Supplies was approved by the Board of Education on December 11, 1901 (see Journal, pages 1623 and 1624).

When proposals for printing for 1902 were received, the Wynkoop-Hallenbeck-Crawford Company were the lowest bidders; thereupon the Board of Public Improvements was requested to authorize the rejection of their bid in accordance with section 419 of the Charter of 1897. The Board of Public Improvements had not

acted upon the request when it was disestablished, on December 31, 1901, and the matter came over to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, which, on January 6, 1902, adopted the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment is in receipt of a request from the Board of Education that it approve the letting of the contract to other than the lowest bidder for printing and stationery for the year 1902; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment is of the opinion that it is not for the public interest that such contract be let, but believes that the Board of Education should advertise for new bids; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the aforesaid request of the Board of Education be disapproved.

In accordance with the advice of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Board of Education advertised for new bids; the Wynkoop-Hallenbeck-Crawford Company were again the lowest bidders, and upon their promise that they would carry out the provisions of the contract and give the Board of Education satisfactory service in all respects the Board decided to give them an opportunity to redeem themselves and awarded them the contract.

Owing to their failure to comply with the provisions of the contract, however, said contract was canceled on December 4, 1902, as above stated.

GENTLEMEN—It having come to our notice that the Board of Education has filed with your Honorable Body a request for permission to award their contract for printing for the year 1903 to the next lowest bidder, we being the lowest bidders therefor, we desire to submit for your consideration our protest against such action being taken by your Board.

During the early part of the year 1902 we performed our contract with the Board of Education to their entire satisfaction, and we would have continued to do so had we not been subjected to various strikes, which began during the summer and extended over a period of some months. While these strikes gradually extended to almost the entire printing fraternity of The City of New York, each of them had its inception in this establishment, and we were the principal sufferers therefrom. For a period of three months our business was stopped, and during a portion of this time not a wheel was turned in our place. We took every means in our power to fill our contracts, sending the work to other printing houses in the City, and in some cases paying double the amount we received under our contracts. We were unable, however, to secure sufficient assistance from other houses to do our work, many of them being themselves under the strike and the balance so overcrowded with work that they could not be of any assistance to us.

Even after a settlement of this difficulty had been reached our resources were so terribly crippled that it was some weeks before we were able to catch up with current work. During this whole time we had done everything in our power to expedite the work of the Board of Education, and whatever delays they were subjected to were absolutely unavoidable on our part.

We submit for your consideration certain additional facts, namely: that we are one of the largest printing houses in the world; that our facilities for doing the Board of Education work are not equalled by any other concern in this City, and that for twenty-five years we have been contractors for the United States Government.

GENTLEMEN—It has recently come to the attention of the Printers' Board of Trade that the estimate of Messrs. Wynkoop, Hallenbeck & Crawford Company for the printing contract of the Board of Education has been rejected by the Board of Education, and that the same is about to come before your Board for final action.

In justice to Messrs. Wynkoop, Hallenbeck & Crawford Company permit me to state that they are a large and reputable corporation, with extensive business interests in and outside of New York City; that the officers and directors of this corporation are men of ability, whose business integrity is unquestioned; that they are members in good standing of this Board of Trade, and that their ability to fulfill their contracts is equal to that of any printing establishment in New York City.

During the past six months the printing trade of this City has greatly suffered from a succession of strikes which for a time tied up nearly the entire printing community of New York, and which altogether lasted for over three months. This strike originated in the establishment which I refer to, and more than any other concern involved its resources were crippled and great difficulty was experienced in filling its orders, although every effort was made to carry out its contracts. This strike, however, has been settled and agreement signed for a term of years.

Inasmuch as this action of the Board of Education would tend to injure the reputation and business of Messrs. Wynkoop, Hallenbeck & Crawford Company, and in consideration of the standing of this corporation in this Board of Trade, as well as in the printing fraternity at large, it becomes my duty upon behalf of the Printers' Board of Trade of New York to institute a protest against this action and request that the same be disapproved by your Honorable Body.

The Board of Education asks the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the rejection of the lowest bid for the reason that the Wynkoop-Hallenbeck-Crawford Company held the contract for printing for the years 1901 and 1902, and in each year their work was so dilatory and the business of the Department was so greatly embarrassed and delayed that it became necessary to cancel the contract, which was done on December 5, 1901, and December 4, 1902. The reasons for the award of the contract for 1902 to this concern after the experience of the previous year were set forth in the communication from the Secretary of the Board of Education to the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated January 13, 1903.

Since the cancellation of the contract on December 4, 1902, the printing of the Board of Education has been done by the next lowest bidders, the J. W. Pratt Company, the difference in the cost being charged to the Wynkoop-Hallenbeck-Crawford Company, as provided by their contract.

#### MEMORANDUM SHOWING DELAYS OF WYNKOOP-HALLENBECK-CRAWFORD COMPANY IN FURNISHING PROOFS AND PRINTED MATTER UNDER THEIR CONTRACT WITH THE BOARD OF EDUCATION FOR THE YEAR 1902.

The contract of the Wynkoop-Hallenbeck-Crawford Company was approved by the Comptroller on April 11, 1902, and canceled by the Committee on Supplies of the Board of Education on December 4, 1902, the action of said Committee being approved by the Board of Education on December 23, 1902.

Said contract provides on page 1 as follows:

"Galley proof of all Specifications and Journal of Board Meetings must be submitted two days after receipt of copy. Galley proof of the Minutes of the different Committee Meetings must be submitted the day following the receipt of copy." And on page 15 as follows:

"Proceedings Board of Education. \* \* \* Proof to be submitted within two days of receipt of copy."

"Minutes of Committee on Buildings. \* \* \* Proof to be submitted within 28 hours of receipt of manuscript. Completed copies to be delivered 40 hours after return of proofs."

#### Delay on Minutes of the Board of Education.

The contract provides (p. 1 and p. 15) that galley proofs shall be furnished within two days after receipt of copy.

Between April 11 and December 4, 1902, seventeen meetings of the Board of Education and the Executive Committee were held. The proofs were delivered within the time prescribed by the contract twice, namely (1) meetings of April 9 and April 12, covering 12 pages; (2) meeting of April 16, covering 34 pages. The proofs of fifteen meetings were delayed beyond the two days' limit, the delays varying from one day to twelve days, e. g.:

- Meeting of August 20, delay in delivery of proofs, 12 days.
- Meeting of October 22, delay in delivery of proofs, 7 days.
- Meeting of July 30, delay in delivery of proofs, 5 days.
- Meeting of May 28, delay in delivery of proofs, 3 3/4 days.
- Meeting of April 23, delay in delivery of proofs, 3 3/4 days.
- Meeting of July 7, delay in delivery of proofs, 3 days.
- Meeting of October 15, delay in delivery of proofs, 3 days.
- Meeting of November 19, delay in delivery of proofs, 3 days.
- Meeting of November 20, delay in delivery of proofs, 3 days.
- Etc., etc.

Attention is called to the attached copy of a communication from the contractors, dated November 20, 1902, in which they express their intention to comply with the provision of the contract requiring proof to be submitted two days after the receipt of copy. (Exhibit A.) The proof referred to in said communication was that of the meeting of the Executive Committee held on November 19. This proof was received on November 28, four days after the required time.

#### Delay on Minutes of the Committee on Buildings.

The contract provides (p. 15) that proofs shall be delivered twenty-eight hours after the receipt of copy.

Between April 11 and December 4, 1902, thirty-two meetings of the Committee on Buildings were held. The proofs of three meetings were received within the time prescribed; the proofs of twenty-four meetings were delayed; the records are incomplete as to five meetings. The delays varied from two and three-fourths hours to sixty-three and one-half hours, e. g.:

- Meeting of April 23, delay in delivery of proofs, 63 1/2 hours.
- Meeting of June 30, delay in delivery of proofs, 46 3/4 hours.
- Meeting of October 13, delay in delivery of proofs, 40 hours.
- Meeting of September 23, delay in delivery of proofs, 39 1/2 hours.
- Meeting of November 17, delay in delivery of proofs, 37 1-3 hours.
- Etc., etc.

Printed edition required by the contract (p. 15) to be delivered forty hours after the return of galley proofs.

The printed editions of six meetings were received within the time prescribed by the contract; the editions of seventeen meetings were delayed; the records are incomplete as to the delivery in nine cases. The delays varied from one day to nine days, e. g.:

- Meeting of July 21, delay in delivery of printed edition, 9 days.
- Meeting of September 29, delay in delivery of printed edition, 8 days.
- Meeting of April 14, delay in delivery of printed edition, 4 days.
- Meeting of November 10, delay in delivery of printed edition, 4 days.
- Meeting of November 17, delay in delivery of printed edition, 4 days.
- Meeting of December 1, delay in delivery of printed edition, 4 days.
- Etc., etc.

#### Delay on Specifications for New Buildings, Repairs, Etc.

The contract (p. 1) provides that proofs shall be delivered two days after the receipt of copy.

Between April 11 and December 4, 1902, one hundred and thirty-five specifications, contracts, etc., for buildings, repairs, etc., were sent to Wynkoop-Hallenbeck-Crawford Company to be printed. In every case the proofs were delayed beyond the time prescribed by the contract. The delays varied from one to fifteen days, making a total delay of one thousand days. Unreasonable delays also occurred in the delivery of the printed editions after the return of proofs, the time required for printing varying from three to twenty-six days, and in sixty-nine cases exceeding seven working days.

Note—In all instances of delay allowance has been made for Sundays and holidays.

Very great delays occurred also in the printing of the Directory of the Board of Education, the Annual Report of the Board of Education and the Directory of Teachers in Public Schools. Regarding the latter, attention is called to the attached copy of a communication from the Wynkoop-Hallenbeck-Crawford Company, dated September 16, 1902, in which they express great regret on account of the delay (Exhibit B).

As to the strike to which the Wynkoop-Hallenbeck-Crawford Company attribute some of the delays, the Board of Education received no information regarding it except in incidental references in communications dated September 11 and October 13. The Board was not informed when the strike began nor when it was declared off. The delays in the delivery of proofs and printed matter were continuous from the time of the approval of the contract to the date of its cancellation.

Messrs. Gantz, Neier & McKennell, attorneys, were heard on behalf of Charles H. Thornton et al.

Mr. Vreeland, of the Board of Assessors, was heard in explanation of the action of said Board.

On motion the further consideration of the matter was postponed for one week, and Mr. Vreeland was requested to communicate with the Borough President and ask that one of his Engineers make a survey showing the established grade of the street, etc., affected.

The following assessment lists, with objections, which were referred to the President of the Borough of The Bronx at the last meeting, after hearing, for examination and in order that the Commissioner of Highways or Engineers might be prepared to produce evidence before the Board of Revision of Assessments at its next meeting as to the necessity for redressing and resetting the curbstones which appeared as a portion of the cost of the works, etc., on motion were taken up for action, viz.:

Paving Crotona avenue from Boston road to Crotona Park south with asphalt pavement.

Paving Dawson street from Westchester avenue to Leggett's Lane with asphalt pavement and resetting, etc., curbstones.

Paving Freeman street, from East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street to Southern Boulevard, with asphalt pavement.

Mr. R. H. Gillespie, Engineer, representing the Bureau of Highways, of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, was sworn and examined by the Corporation Counsel as to the necessity for the redressing, resetting and rejoining the curbstones in the said streets and avenue.

Messrs. T. H. Baldwin, A. C. Hottenroth and John C. Shaw, attorneys, were heard in opposition to the assessments.

Mr. Vreeland, of the Board of Assessors, was also heard on behalf of the said Board.

On motion of the Corporation Counsel, the said assessment lists were referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to reduce the assessment in each case five per cent. of the ratable cost thereof, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for constructing sewers and appurtenances in East One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street, from Southern Boulevard to Lorillard place, and in Crotona avenue, from Grote street to East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street, and in Belmont avenue, from East One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street to St. John's College, and in Arthur avenue, from East One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street to the summit south, and in Hoffman street, from Pelham avenue to the summit south of East One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street, with objections, referred to the President of the Borough of The Bronx, at the last meeting, with request that the Commissioner of Sewers certify to this Board at its next meeting how much of the park property on the line drains into the sewer on the grounds of St. John's College, was presented to the Board, having been returned by the President of the said Borough.

Mr. Josiah H. Fitch, Principal Assistant Engineer of the Bureau of Sewers, representing the President of the Borough, appeared before the Board and presented a certificate showing that approximately 443,000 square feet of the Bronx Park property drain through the grounds of the St. John's College, and also discussed the matter fully with the Board.

Mr. Berry, attorney, representing St. John's College, appeared.

On motion, the said assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to add to the area of the assessment the portion of the Park shown in the list, charging it with its pro rata share of the assessment, and by deducting such amount pro rata from the sums charged to the lots assessed for general benefit, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for constructing sewers and appurtenances in Crescent avenue, between East One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street and Arthur avenue, and in Arthur avenue, between Crescent avenue and East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, and in Adams place, between Crescent avenue and East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, and in Hughes avenue, between Crescent avenue and East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, and in Belmont avenue, between Crescent avenue and East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, and in Cambreling avenue, between Crescent avenue and Grote street, and in Beaumont avenue, between East One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street and East One Hundred and Eighty-third street, with objections, in which hearing was given at meeting of December 6, 1902, and the assessment list laid over, on motion, was taken up.

Objections of Richard Siegman, filed by Edw. S. Kaufman, attorney, on December 15, 1902, were presented.

Mr. Gerald Crawford Connor was again heard in opposition to the assessment.

### BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

Regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals held on Thursday afternoon, January 15, in the library of Bellevue Hospital.

Present—Doctor Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Sachs, Tack and Paulding, Trustees, and the Commissioner of Public Charities.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Dr. William Mabon, the Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, reported as follows:

1. The necessity of a new form for diplomas of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. Referred to the President with power.

2. Examination of milk by the Board of Health. The Superintendent was directed to confer with Dr. Park of the Board of Health, and also the Milk Commission of the County Medical Society in regard to this matter.

3. Announcing that official notice had been sent to the State Board of Charities of the temporary closing of Bellevue Dispensary, with reasons therefor.

4. Complaint of Comptroller concerning use of telephone for private messages. On motion, duly seconded, it was resolved that the Superintendent devise measures to correct this abuse.

5. Statement of supplies, meat, milk, condensed milk, cream, etc.

6. Wages of Enginemen and Firemen. On motion, duly seconded, it was resolved that the hours of Enginemen and Stokers be restricted to eight hours a day; that Enginemen shall receive \$3 a day, except John Conway, who has added duties and shall receive \$3.30 a day. The wages of Stokers to be fixed at \$2 a day without maintenance, and \$1.50 a day with maintenance. These regulations to date from January 1, 1903.

7. New lock for the prison ward. Superintendent reported that proposals had been asked for.

8. Statement of coal purchased thus far this year. On motion, duly seconded, it was resolved that the Board of Aldermen be petitioned to allow the purchase of coal in the open market to the amount of ten thousand dollars, in consideration of the failure to obtain bids in answer to advertisements, and owing to the difficult conditions prevalent since the expiration of last year's contract.

9. Statement concerning the condition of the roof of the amphitheatre at Bellevue. On motion, the Superintendent was directed to get proposals on this work.

10. Bill of Gas Consumers' Association for installing governors at Gouverneur, Harlem and Fordham Hospitals. On motion, duly seconded, it was resolved to authorize payment for the above at the rate of \$18 per month. The matter of the contract for the current year was referred to the Superintendent with a request to ascertain if this bill cannot be paid by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

11. Necessary repairs at Gouverneur Hospital. Authority was given to the Superintendent to have the necessary repairs made to the mangle at Gouverneur Hospital, and to obtain estimates on the work.

12. Fire alarm station at Harlem Hospital.

13. Water hydrant at Fordham Hospital; calling attention to the need of a new fire box. On motion, duly seconded, it was resolved that letters be sent to the Fire and Water Supply Departments calling attention to the necessity of a hydrant nearer to the hospital.

In connection with the Superintendent's report, the matter of the behavior of Ambulance Surgeons while in the discharge of their duties on the ambulance, was brought up by Mr. Tack and referred to the Superintendent for such action as he may deem fit.

#### Communications.

A communication from the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital submitting the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on January 2 was received, and consideration postponed until next week.

A communication from Dr. Edward Waitzfelder, Secretary of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital, inclosing minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board held on January 2, 1903, was received, approved and ordered placed on file.

On motion, duly seconded, it was resolved that the suspension of Dr. B. L. Schaeffer, Senior Surgeon at Gouverneur Hospital, for insubordination, be referred to the Superintendent, with power to act. On motion, duly seconded, it was further resolved that the nomination of Dr. S. R. Milliken to be Sub-junior Physician at Gouverneur Hospital in place of Dr. A. Sloan, resigned, be confirmed and approved by this Board.

A communication from Dr. John J. McGrath, Secretary of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital, submitting minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of



Harlem Hospital, held on December 30, 1902, was received, approved and ordered placed on file.

On motion, duly seconded, it was resolved that the Harlem Medical Board be requested to appoint a Committee of Inspection for a period of one year.

In the matter of nominations it was resolved that the Harlem Medical Board be instructed to submit credentials to the Board of Trustees with all nominations of Physicians and Surgeons to places in the hospital service.

A communication was received from the Sinking Fund Commission inclosing amended resolution authorizing lease of the property at No. 521 East One Hundred and Twentieth street as an annex to Harlem Hospital.

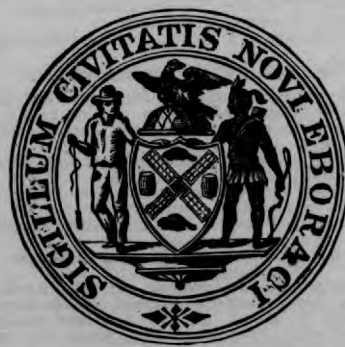

### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contracts must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
