## COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

*Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 12 o'clock M., on Friday, September 24, 1909.*

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Herman A. Metz, Comptroller; James J. Martin, Chamberlain, and Patrick F. McGowan, President, Board of Aldermen.

The Comptroller presented the following report, relative to a lease of premises at One Hundred and Sixty-second street and St. Nicholas avenue, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, to take the place of premises now occupied at Nos 1907 to 1911 Amsterdam avenue:

September 1, 1909.

*To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

GENTLEMEN—The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a meeting held on the 23d day of June, referred to me the matter of the proposed lease of premises at One Hundred and Sixty-second street and St. Nicholas avenue, which proposed lease was to take the place of premises now occupied (but not authorized so to be) by the Bureau of Street Opening, of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, at Nos. 1907 to 1911 Amsterdam avenue, Manhattan.

This matter has heretofore been reported upon in detail by the Finance Department to the Sinking Fund Commissioners, and it is not necessary for me at this time to report at length upon the subject matter, other than to state that on September 26, 1901, a lease was authorized by the Sinking Fund for a period of three years, at a rental of \$2,500 per annum, the second floor of the two-story building Nos. 1907 to 1911 Amsterdam avenue, Manhattan; that as soon as President Cantor came into office, or on or about January 22, 1902, the occupation of this room under the lease was discontinued, the room was returned to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to obtain as much rent therefrom as possible, as it was no longer required by his Department; that as fast as the Collector of City Revenue would place signs in the building “for rent” the signs were torn down, and the City, so Mr. Webster states, has been in possession (unauthorized) of this property from the expiration of the lease in September, 1904, to the present time.

On September 29, 1908, Mr. Webster, the Chief Engineer of Street Openings of the Borough President, asked that the lease be renewed at \$2,000 per annum, which was reported upon in full at the time to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. When Mr. Ahearn's attention was called to the matter, this unauthorized occupation, he requested Mr. Webster to find other quarters and remove the City's property from this room.

On December 14, 1908, the Chief Engineer of the Bureau of Street Openings, Manhattan, submits a report in reply to matters affecting this property, which had been referred to him, selects a location of property owned by Mr. Woolworth at One Hundred and Sixty-second street and St. Nicholas avenue, and a report was made at that time by this Department; the report was dated December 17, 1908, and transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, which recommends that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a lease of the north half of the building on the corner of West One Hundred and Sixty-second street and St. Nicholas avenue, being 22 feet by 64 feet 6 inches, for a period of three years from the date of occupation, at an annual rental of \$1,200, payable quarterly, the owner to furnish heat and janitor service, the City to furnish light, the owner to arrange the partition dividing the hall from the north half of the building, the inner face of said partition to be 22 feet from the inner face of the north wall of the building, lessor F. W. Woolworth, No. 280 Broadway.

The reference back by the Sinking Fund to me, for report upon this leasing proposition, was also for the purpose of arranging a settlement of the rent with the owner of the Amsterdam avenue property, the unauthorized occupation of which by the Street Opening Bureau has been the cause of the controversy. This office cannot at the present time arrange a settlement with the owner for this rent for the following reasons: First, the rent as originally authorized for three years was \$2,500 per annum. The rent in 1908, which the Bureau of Street Openings states the owner will take is \$2,000. Now, with all the improvements and increased values of real estate which have been going on in this vicinity from 1904 to the present time, if \$2,000 is a proper rental for 1908, then \$2,500 was excessive for the years 1901 to 1904; but that having been passed upon by the Sinking Fund and approved, I cannot go into those three years, but I can refuse to pay any rent for the subsequent years at the old rate if the owner claims a holdover tenancy, leaving the matter for judicial adjudication. No proposition has been submitted by the owners looking to this settlement and adjudication of this matter; therefore, I am not at this moment in a position to do anything.

The reason I am reporting to this Board on this matter is that the original lease which was made for three years, expired on September 26, 1904, and I assume that the owners will make a claim for a holdover tenancy on the part of the City for the years not authorized by the Sinking Fund. Now I do not think the City should remain in that building after September 25, 1909; I therefore recommend that the Sinking Fund Commissioners adopt a resolution in accordance with my recommendation in the communication of December 17, 1908, authorizing a lease of rooms in the building West One Hundred and Sixty-second street and St. Nicholas avenue, for a period of three years, as heretofore stated, leaving the matter of the adjudication of the amount of what the City owes to be determined later.

The Select Committee of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to whom this matter was referred at meeting held September 22, 1909, presented the following report:

THE CITY OF NEW YORK,

New York, September 24, 1909.

*To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City Hall, New York:*

GENTLEMEN—Your Committee, to whom was referred the proposed lease of the building at the corner of One Hundred and Sixty-second street and St. Nicholas avenue, for the use of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, to take the place of the premises at Nos. 1907 to 1911 Amsterdam avenue, now occupied by him, respectfully reports:

That after an interview with the owner of the property, who states that at no time did he promise to any City official, with authority to act, that he would renew the lease at Nos. 1907 to 1911 Amsterdam avenue for any less sum than the rental named in the contract, and who refuses to settle on any other terms than those named therein; and after consultation with the Corporation Counsel, who submitted the following opinion:

“September 23, 1909.

“Hon. PATRICK F. MCGOWAN, Acting Mayor, City of New York:

“SIR—I have been verbally requested by you as a member of the Committee of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to advise you in the situation, which I understand to be as follows, my information being derived from the calendar for September 23, 1909, of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and from statements made by you and others.

“It appears that in the year 1901 the City leased premises Nos. 1907 to 1911 Amsterdam avenue for the use of the President of the Borough of Manhattan. The original lease was duly authorized and was for the period of three years, which expired on September 26, 1904. The City has, however, occupied the premises ever since.



"The question thus arises whether the City is liable for the rent, as fixed in the original lease. A similar question has arisen a number of times, and it has been held that the City is liable as a hold-over tenant from year to year at the rent specified in the original lease.

"It seems, therefore, to have been settled that the City is liable under the terms of the original lease, unless they have been changed subsequently, and I am informed that such is not the case. I am also informed that the yearly tenancy will expire on the 26th of September, so that if it is not desired to continue the liability for another year, it will be necessary to vacate the premises before that time, and to notify the landlord accordingly. In that way any further liability for rent can be avoided.

—your Committee recommends that the rental be settled at the figure named in the contract, and that the premises at Nos. 1907 to 1911 Amsterdam avenue be vacated; and that the building at the corner of One Hundred and Sixty-second street and St. Nicholas avenue be leased in accordance with the report of the Comptroller on September 22, 1909

Discussion followed. The time being short in which the Borough President had to remove from the Amsterdam avenue premises, making it almost impossible to get out in time to avoid being held as a hold-over tenant for another year, the President of the Board of Aldermen stated that the owner of the property assured him that he would give ample opportunity for the City to move and would not hold the City for another year, provided the back rent was paid to him within a reasonable time.

The following resolutions were then offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City from F. W. Woolworth, of the north half of the building on the corner of One Hundred and Sixty-second street and St. Nicholas avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, being 22 feet by 64 feet 6 inches, for use of the President of the Borough of Manhattan (Bureau of Street Openings), for a period of three years from the date of occupation, at an annual rental of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200), payable quarterly; the owner to furnish heat and janitor service; the City to furnish light; the owner to arrange a partition dividing the hall from the north half of the building, the inner face of said partition to be 22 feet from the inner face of the north wall of the building; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same, when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to pay the rental of the premises at Nos. 1907 to 1911 Amsterdam avenue, Manhattan, occupied by the President of the Borough of Manhattan (Bureau of Street Openings), for a period from the date of the expiration of the original lease, September 26, 1904, to September 26, 1909, at the same rental as contained in the original lease, twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500) per annum, the Corporation Counsel having advised the Select Committee of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to whom this matter was referred, that the City is liable, as a holdover tenant, for the said rent.

The report was accepted and the resolutions severally unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a transfer of \$8,000,000 from the Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt to the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt No. 1:

September 27, 1909.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—Pursuant to section 209 of the Greater New York Charter, on the certification of the Chief Accountant and Bookkeeper of the Department of Finance as to the surplus revenues of the Sinking Fund for the Payment of the Interest on the City Debt, I request the adoption of the inclosed resolution transferring eight million dollars (\$8,000,000) from the Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt to the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt No. 1, in order that the latter fund may be able to invest in General Fund Bonds, pursuant to a resolution adopted by your Honorable Board, passed on May 26, 1909.

Resolved, That a warrant payable from the Sinking Fund for the Payment of the Interest on the City Debt be drawn in favor of the Chamberlain for the sum of eight million dollars (\$8,000,000), to be deposited to the credit of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt No. 1, thereby transferring this amount of surplus revenues of the Sinking Fund for the Payment of the Interest on the City Debt to the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt No. 1, pursuant to section 209 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolutions relative to the redemption of \$642,000 of bonds and stock held by the public, the cancellation of stock and bonds amounting to \$1,988,815.15; the redemption of \$732,039.50 of Corporate Stock, the cancellation of \$23,000 of Corporate Stock and the redemption of \$100,000 of Corporate Stock, all of which mature November 1, 1909:

September 27, 1909.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—On November 1, 1909, bonds and stock issued by The City of New York, as constituted prior to January 1, 1898, amounting to two million six hundred and thirty thousand eight hundred and fifteen dollars and fifteen cents (\$2,630,815.15) will become due. These bonds and stock are payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt No. 1. One million nine hundred and eighty-eight thousand eight hundred and fifteen dollars and fifteen cents (\$1,988,815.15) of said bonds and stock are held by said Sinking Fund, and six hundred and forty-two thousand dollars (\$642,000) thereof are held by the public.

On the same date, Corporate Stock issued by The City of New York, as constituted by the Greater New York Charter, amounting to seven hundred and fifty-five thousand and thirty-nine dollars and fifty cents (\$755,039.50) will become due. This stock is payable from the Sinking Fund of The City of New York. Twenty-three thousand dollars (\$23,000) of said Corporate Stock are held by said Sinking Fund, and seven hundred and thirty-two thousand and thirty-nine dollars and fifty cents (\$732,039.50) thereof are held by the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt No. 1.

On the same date Corporate Stock issued by The City of New York, as constituted by the Greater New York Charter, amounting to one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), will also become due. This stock is payable by the Water Sinking Fund of The City of New York, and is held by the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt No. 2.

I herewith present for your adoption, resolutions authorizing the cancellation of such of said bonds and stock as are held by the Sinking Funds from which they are payable, and for the redemption of such of said bonds and stock as are held by the public and other sinking funds.

May 28, 1909.

H. H. LOUIS E. HAFKEN, President, Borough of The Bronx:

Sir: Among the Local Board resolutions now awaiting the consideration of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is one adopted on February 28, 1907, providing for grading Jerome avenue, from East One Hundred and Ninetieth street to the city line, at an estimated cost of \$146,500.

The amount to be expended for this improvement is greater than the limit fixed by the Board of Estimate at its meeting of April 16 last, and it also appears that it could not be completed until the bridge has been built to carry this street over the Moshulu parkway.

Under these conditions I beg to ask if, in your judgment, it would not be desirable to make the improvement the subject of three resolutions, one to include the section south of Van Cortlandt avenue, another the section north of Gun Hill road, and a third to comprise the intervening section. This should result in bringing the cost of each within the prescribed limits and would clear the way for authorizing the north-erly and southerly sections at once, while the middle section could properly be ap-proved as soon as arrangements are made for the construction of the bridge.

If you so desire the resolution reported in the form originally submitted kindly let me know and an effort will be made to include it in an early calendar.

The Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx, under date of June 5, 1909, re-ported as follows:

"I think this improvement can properly be subdivided, but I would change these sections so as to make the first run from One Hundred and Ninetieth street to the grade point about 600 feet north of Van Cortlandt avenue, and the second one from Moshulu parkway north to the north line of the City. The intervening space it is pro-posed to be available for in connection with the construction of the bridge carrying Jerome avenue over the driveway of Moshulu parkway, for which an appropriation has been made, and a contract will be let shortly, providing the Commissioner of Water Sup-ply will settle the question of the necessary changes in the water mains in the terri-tory affected.

"I will forward the estimate of sections 1 and 2 of this resolution, as soon as possible."

Reports as to Estimated Cost.

For regulating and grading, etc., Jerome avenue, from One Hundred and Nine-tieth street to a grade point about 600 feet north of Van Cortlandt avenue, \$84,800; assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is \$139,200.

On motion, seconded, the following was adopted:

Resolved, That proceedings be and the same hereby are initiated for regulating and grading, setting curbs, toes, flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying on sidewalks, building approaches, erecting fences, where necessary, and all work inci-dental thereto, Jerome avenue, from One Hundred and Ninetieth street to a grade point about 600 feet north of Van Cortlandt avenue, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York.

Unanimously adopted.

On motion, seconded, the following was also unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That proceedings be and the same hereby are initiated for regulating and grading, setting curbs, toes, flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying on sidewalks, building approaches and erecting fences, where necessary, Jerome avenue, from Moshulu parkway to the northerly line of the City, and all work incidental thereto.

Estimated cost, \$68,500. Assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is \$107,050.

On motion of Alderman Hochdorffer the following was adopted.

Resolved, That the Local Board of Chester, Twenty-third District, hereby recom-mends to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the laying out on the map of The City of New York a change of grade in Edenwald avenue, from Two Hundred and Thirty-third street to the northerly line of The City of New York, in accordance with map or plan showing the change of grades in the area bounded by Digney avenue, Bussing avenue, Grace avenue, Strang avenue and East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street, and in the area bounded by De Reimer avenue, Bussing avenue, Moshulu avenue, and Strang avenue, and Bussing avenue, Seton avenue and Strang avenue, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, dated September 14, 1909.

Unanimously adopted.

No. 261. Laying out on the map of The City of New York Merrill street, from the City line to Rosedale avenue, at a width of 50 feet.

Petition signed by Michael J. Carey and many others. The report of the Chief Engineer was as follows:

Merrill street, between Beach avenue and Rosedale avenue, was laid out on the map of the Maps estate 50 feet wide, and on the map of the district June 4, 1907. It was widened to 60 feet.

There are thirteen lots fronting on Merrill street. Eight houses situated on five lots are affected by the improvement of this street and of these eight houses three are totally destroyed by St. Lawrence avenue. Three are small houses placed on rear of lots.

Merrill street is now being legally acquired on a proceeding consisting of seven streets. The area of property to be assessed has been fixed. Of the thirty-seven petitioners, Michael J. Carey and seventeen others are not within the area of assess-ment.

Should Merrill street be reduced in width it will probably make but little dif-ference in the assessment, since Merrill street is but a small portion of the proceeding. In addition, two houses have been built to conform to the street as widened and it would be an injustice to these owners to reduce the width of the street, which has been on the City map as a sixty-foot street since May 29, 1903. Further, all of the petitioners except one will receive an award for the opening of other streets, for which owners of property fronting on Merrill street will have to pay an assessment.

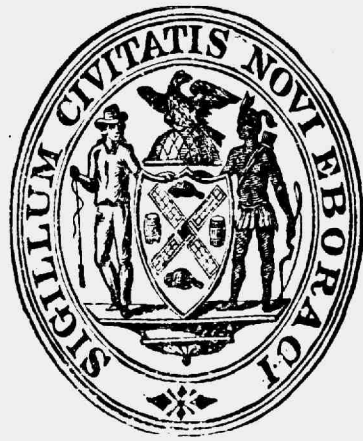

Successful bidders will be required to pay the purchase money and deposit the required security within twenty-four hours of the receipt of notification of the acceptance of their bids.

The Comptroller reserves the right to reject any and all bids and to waive any defects or informalities in any bid, should it be deemed in the interest of The City of New York to do so.

All bids must state clearly (1) the number or description of the building or buildings bid for, (2) the amount of the bid, (3) the full name and address of the bidder.

All bids must be enclosed in properly sealed envelopes, marked "Proposals to be opened October 15, 1909," and must be delivered, or mailed in time for their delivery, prior to 11 a. m. of that date to the "Collector of City Revenue, Room 141, No. 280 Broadway, New York City," from whom any further particulars regarding the buildings to be disposed of may be obtained.

The buildings will be sold for immediate removal only, subject to the following terms and conditions:

The buildings and appurtenances thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or a certified check drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances, between the time or the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curbs in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises.

None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb oppo-

site that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers, Borough of The Bronx, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act or omission, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the costs and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-ends, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs of adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

## GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
