COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock A. M., on Thursday, November 15, 1917.

Present at roll call—Frank L. Dowling, President, Board of Aldermen; Albert E. Hadlock, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; Milo R. Maltbie, Chamberlain; Francis P. Kenney, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen. His honor the Mayor arrived later. See note.

In the Matter of the Investment by the City in Liberty Loan Bonds of the United States Government.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller offered the following resolution: Whereas, At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held on October 25, 1917, it was determined to authorize the investment, for account of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York, through the Mayor's Committee on Liberty Loan, of the sum of one million (\$1,000,000) dollars in four (4) per cent. Liberty Loan bonds of the United States of America under the terms of payment of what is known as "Government Plan No. 2," viz., two (2) per cent. of the one million (\$1,000,000) dollars of bonds applied for to be paid with the application therefor on October 26, 1917; eighteen (18) per cent. to be paid on November 15, 1917; forty (40) per cent. to be paid on December 15, 1917, and forty (40) per cent. to be paid on January 15, 1918, plus accrued interest payable to the latter date on the total amount; and Whereas, In accordance with said resolution, Sinking Fund Warrant No. 41, dated

October 26, 1917, was drawn in the sum of twenty thousand (\$20,000) dollars, payable to the Comptroller as Chairman, representing the initial payment of two (2) per cent. on the one million (\$1,000,000) dollars applied for; and

Whereas, Under date of November 9, 1917, the Mayor's Liberty Loan Committee was duly advised that, in accordance with Treasury Department Circular No. 90, dated October 1, 1917, and in accordance with the basis of allotment of the Second Liberty Loan, the application of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for one million (\$1,000,000) dollars of such bonds has been allotted at six hundred thousand (\$600,000) dollars; therefore be it

Resolved, That a warrant be drawn in the sum of one hundred thousand (\$100,000) dollars in payment of the second installment of the Liberty bonds allotted, which said one hundred thousand (\$100,000) dollars, together with the twenty thousand (\$20,000) dollars paid on October 26, 1917, will make a sum total equalling twenty (20) per cent. of the six hundred thousand (\$600,000) dollars of four (4) per cent. Liberty Loan bonds which have been allotted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York.

Which resolution was adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Note—At this point his Honor the Mayor arrived.

Seventh District Municipal Court—Lease for, of Premises at the Southwest Corner of 125th st. and St. Nicholas ave., Manhattan.

Justice John R. Davies, Chairman of the Committee on Court Houses and Sites, who was heard in regard to this matter at the last meeting, was again heard in favor of the proposed lease.

After a discussion the Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

October 17, 1917.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—I am in receipt of a communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund from Hon. John R. Davies, Chairman of the Committee on Court Houses and Sites, Board of Justices of the Municipal Court, in which he requests that a lease be made of the entire second floor in the loft building situated on the southwesterly corner of 125th Street and St. Nicholas Avenue, for use of the Seventh District Municipal Court of the Borough of Manhattan, now located at 70 Manhattan Street, the lease of which expires on December 31, 1917. This request is joined in by the three Justices of that Court, namely, Justice Sinnott, Justice Weil and Justice Davies.

The communication states that by reason of the additional trial work due to the tremendous growth of the district, as well as the new Court Practice Act, the present premises are greatly inadequate, particularly inasmuch as a third part of the court will be required and greater space allotted for clerical purposes; that the location of the present court is not only too small, but is situated on a very noisy corner, and that the condition of the building, by reason of its cheap construction, has been the cause of constant complaint and criticism by the public.

The premises now occupied by this court contain an area of 6,097 square feet, which, at the rental paid, \$6,600, is at the rate of \$1.08 per square foot per annum. The premises proposed to be leased contain an area of 11,800 square feet, and the rental therefor, \$8,500 per annum, is at the rate of 72 cents per square foot. The owner will pay taxes and water rates, make inside and outside repairs, furnish heat, light and janitor service, make alterations and install electric light fixtures.

I therefore respectfully recommend, the rent being reasonable and just, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize a lease of 11,800 square feet of floor space on the second floor in the building located on the southwesterly corner of 125th Street and St. Nicholas Avenue, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Seventh District Municipal Court, Borough of Manhattan, for a term of five years from January 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$8,500, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, make inside and outside repairs, furnish heat, light and janitor service, make necessary alterations, and install electric light fixtures—and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interest of the city that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel as provided by Sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

ALBERT E. HADLOCK, Deputy and Acting Comptroller.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City from Gustavus L. Lawrence, of 11,800 square feet of floor space on the second floor in the building located on the southwesterly corner of 125th street and St. Nicholas avenue, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Seventh District Municipal Court, for a term of five years from January 1, 1918, at an annual rental of eight thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,500), payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, make inside and outside repairs, furnish heat, light and janitor service, make necessary alterations, and install electric light fixtures—and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interest of the city that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel as provided by Sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, Deputy and Acting Comptroller and Chamberlain—3.

Nays—The President of the Board of Aldermen—1.

The Chairman of the Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, was excused from voting.

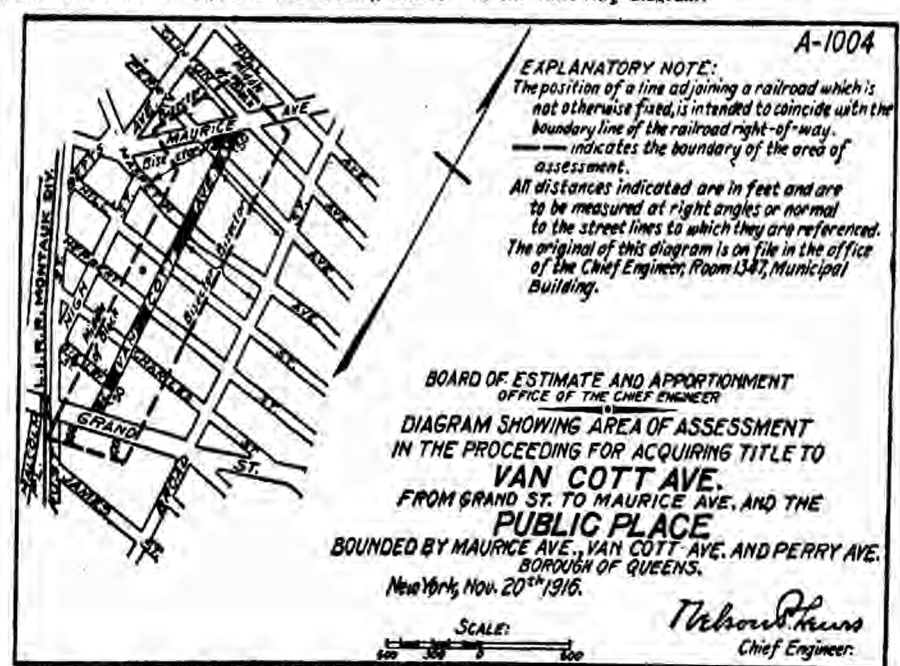

The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances, between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in the street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture

of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portions thereof, as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by the purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the date of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials or labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furnishings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions shall in any case be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids, and be it further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS ON WORK TO BE DONE FOR, OR SUPPLIES TO BE FURNISHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids in addition to inserting the same in figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done or the supplies are to be furnished. Plans and drawings of construction work may be seen there.
