BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDED DECEMBER 31, 1917.

The Department as a Whole.

The Paris office of the American Red Cross Association has requested Mr. Paulding, the Secretary of the Board, to come to France for work in connection with the United States Army Division. He therefore presented his resignation as Secretary, which the Board accepted, granting him an indefinite leave of absence as Trustee, his committee work being distributed among the other members of the Board. Arden M. Robbins was appointed Secretary, which duties he filled until Dec. 29, 1917, when

Henry C. Wright was appointed Trustee by Mayor Mitchel. On the same day Dr. Brannan was reappointed.

In view of the fact that under the budget for 1917 transfers were made from time to time of unused but accrued salaries and wages it has become necessary for the Trustees to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to return to the salary codes of the department the sum of \$13,400. The supply appropriations for 1917 were also inadequate and it was necessary to request the Board of Aldermen to authorize an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$24,389. The need for additional funds was due primarily to the increased cost of articles chargeable to the supply codes.

The budget for 1918, as adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, was reduced by \$20,000 from Salaries, Temporary Employees, which, however, represented the estimated accruals of Salaries, Regular Employees. As the budget now stands the accruals are to be transferred to the City Fund, and as these may be lost to the department should they be needed and other uses found for them elsewhere the Trustees have requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to modify the terms and conditions of the 1918 budget, in order that these accruals may be available for transfer to our codes. The Board of Estimate informed the Trustees that this was not feasible, and suggested that they make application for the funds they estimate will be required for the year 1918 at the beginning of the new year.

As no provision was made in the Budget for 1918 for the after-care of poliomyelitis cases the Trustees have requested an issue of special revenue bonds for three masseurs at Bellevue and two at Fordham, these funds to be taken from the special revenue bond appropriation authorized for this purpose September 12, 1916.

The Trustees were informed that as a result of the decision in the case of Hillyer versus Prendergast the Civil Service Commission was without power to certify payrolls for any employee of the City who is not a citizen of the United States, whereupon the services of non-citizens were to be terminated. As many nurses and employees, particularly women, in the department were not citizens, it was impossible to comply with this regulation without closing part of the hospital. The Trustees requested the Board of Aldermen to amend the ordinance so as to permit the employment of the required number of nurses and employees to man the hospitals properly, although they are not citizens, which has since been done by that Board.

The General Medical Superintendent has been instructed during the past quarter to follow the plan outlined by the City authorities to continue on the payrolls the municipal employees in military, naval or marine service.

As Bellevue and Gouverneur Hospitals are close to the water-front they were included within the barred zones for enemy aliens by the President's proclamation of November 16, 1917. The United States Marshal informally advised the General Medical Superintendent that he will not interfere with people admitted to the hospital. As part of the Bellevue enclosure is within the zone and as we have employees in the kitchens who live in the dormitory (both of which are outside of the zone) and who are enemy aliens the Trustees presented the subject formally to the United States Marshal.

Inquiries having been made by the executive officers of the War Board of the Port of New York regarding the use of the piers at the foot of E. 28th and 29th sts., the Trustees informed them that they wish to co-operate in every way possible, but that they did not believe the use of the piers would be feasible in a commercial way, they being in need of repairs and within the Bellevue enclosure.

The Trustees have granted the American Association for Labor Legislation permission to consult the general medical records of all admissions to the hospitals, for the purpose of permitting their investigators to visit the families of discharged patients and learn the economic effects of sickness.

The Trustees were able during the last three months of the year to obtain and store enough coal for the hospitals of the department, for the normal requirements of the winter.

The Christmas festivities in all the hospitals of the department passed very pleasantly, trees being provided for the children's wards, with generous remembrances to practically all the patients in the hospitals.

The department has experienced great difficulty in retaining a sufficient number of qualified employees. This difficulty is due in all probability to the prevailing economic conditions, the scarcity of labor, the high wages paid in private corporations and the inadequate salaries provided in the budget of the department.

Bellevue Hospital.

As the Polyclinic Hospital has given up its ambulance district it was assigned to Bellevue by the Ambulance Board.

The Trustees have requested the Medical Board of Bellevue and also the allied hospitals that in cases of sudden death under anaesthesia they should make every proper effort to obtain consent for autopsies.

The Trustees have authorized the appointment of an administrative secretary to the Third Division, in connection with the instruction of students on the gynaecological service, which position is primarily of an administrative character and has nothing to do with the examination or care of patients.

As it has been impossible, on account of war conditions, to obtain all the equipment required for the X-Ray Department, the Trustees have asked the Board of Estimate for permission to purchase other articles in the place of those originally authorized.

The medical care of the poliomyelitis cases in one of the wards was assigned to the children's medical service.

Several changes in the personnel of the medical administration have taken place during the past three months. One of the Admitting Physicians, Dr. Rutledge, has tendered his resignation, to take effect at the end of the year; Dr. Geraldine Watson, formerly Instructor in Anaesthesia, was appointed to the place.

As a number of problems were presented to the Trustees on account of the changes caused in the department, due to military service, a number of the rules governing the medical and surgical, as well as the general administration, had to be amended. Many men on the house staff have been called to military duty before completing their term of service and the Medical Board of Bellevue wished to know what action would be taken in granting diplomas. Owing to the impracticability of formulating a policy on this subject it was decided to consider each case on its merit.

At Bellevue Dr. Stewart, Dr. Hartwell and Dr. Brown, at the request of the Surgeon General, have conducted courses to instruct a number of officers of the Medical Reserve Corps in military medicine and surgery; also in the treatment of fractures.

The medical officers of the Bellevue Hospital Unit left for Fort Oglethorpe, Ga., for training on November 7th.

A number of soldiers, averaging about 60, who were suffering from acute medical and surgical conditions, were brought to Bellevue during the past three months from the camps around the city.

The X-Ray Department has also given courses of instruction in Roentgology to the officers of the Medical Reserve Corps.

BUILDING MATTERS

Bids were received on Sept. 25 for the rebuilding of the north tunnel wall at Bellevue, but as the lowest estimate was in excess of the amount allowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for this purpose and as no other funds were available in the budget for 1917, the bids were rejected and the subject laid over until 1918.

The installation of the automatic telephone system was completed during the quarter and the work accepted on the recommendation of the architects. There was some delay in completing the work within contract time on account of the difficulty in obtaining proper locations for a number of telephones, due to the fact that certain alterations in the old buildings were not completed until recently.

The John H. Parker Company, the contractors for pavilions I and K, having replaced some broken glass in those pavilions, on which \$300 was retained from their contract, the Trustees authorized its payment upon receipt of a report from the architect and the Building Committee that the work had now been finished.

In December the Board of Estimate authorized an appropriation of \$1,800 for alterations in the basement of pavilions I and K to provide a dining room for the employees. Plans for the work are now in course of preparation.

The Department of Docks and Ferries has undertaken the repairs to the dock at the foot of E. 29th st., for which provision was made in the budget for 1917.

During the quarter the hospitals of the department have suffered considerably on account of the extreme cold, the temperature in the wards ranging from 40 to 70 degrees. There has been great difficulty and at times it has been impossible to maintain proper temperature in the wards and at the same time operate the elevators and the laundry. As this difficulty was due to a combination of causes, which involve the changes in the power plant installation, together with the grade of coal burned, the Trustees instructed the General Medical Superintendent to make every effort to obtain a better grade of coal, and, if necessary, to have the specifications changed, and the Building Committee was instructed to make a full and comprehensive study of the problem and present such recommendations as it may see fit to relieve the present conditions.

Gouverneur Hospital.

The new building for the Out Patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital was opened December 27th, the painting of the building and the installation of the additional plumbing fixtures having been completed during this quarter.

Bids were received Nov. 13 for connecting the heating system of Gouverneur Hospital with the new building for the Out Patient Department. On the recommendation of the architect and the Building Committee, the contract was awarded to the lowest bidder, the Chute, Thornton, Bayley Corporation, in the sum of \$3,910.

Plans were prepared for a bridge across Gouverneur Slip, to connect the hospital with the new building for the Out Patient Department, which plans were presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in order that the department may obtain a franchise to erect and maintain such a bridge. The franchise was granted by the Board of Estimate on Dec. 6, 1917. The Art Commission also approved the design of the bridge.

As the boat "Huddleston" was removed to Bellevue during the repairs to the seawall at Corlears Hook Park, the Tuberculosis Clinic was temporarily conducted in the new building for the Out Patient Department, which, although opened on December 27th, was used by the Tuberculosis Clinic since Oct. 26.

While the boat "Huddleston" was at Bellevue, repairs were made to it, and the name "John H. Huddleston" was changed to "Camp Huddleston." In the meantime a committee has conferred with representatives of the Department of Docks and Ferries and the Department of Parks, with a view to obtaining the early completion of a part of the dock at Corlears Hook Park, formerly used by the boat, or another place in that immediate vicinity.

It has been necessary to assign several additional men to the regular house staff to take the place of men called into military service, and, in view of the changed conditions, brought about by the war, the Trustees have permitted a one year service.

Harlem Hospital.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 20, after a great many changes had been made, approved the plans and specifications for the following alterations at Harlem: Enlarging the ambulance platform, converting stable into a garage, enclosing north and south balcony ends, reconstruction of entrance to nurses' home, moving vacuum tanks, installing sump pump, installing ash hoist and new area.

It has been necessary, on account of the freight embargo, to grant additional time to the contractors for the layout of the grounds at this hospital.

After considerable difficulty and comprehensive inquiries, the Building Committee presented a report on the overtime on the contract of the W. H. Jamouneau Company for the installation of screens and awnings at Harlem Hospital. The Board adopted certificates of completion, acceptance and determination in accordance with the various clauses of the contract, which involved liquidated damages in the sum of \$1,830. This closed a subject which has given considerable trouble to the department for over two years.

The Medical Board requested the Trustees to appoint Dr. Irving Haynes, Director of the Gynaecological Service, as Director of the Surgical Service during the absence of Drs. Luckett and Connors on military service.

Dr. Stewart, Roentgenologist, has also been granted permission to instruct United States Army officers in Roentgenology.

The Pathologist was granted permission to have students from Fordham University attend his autopsies at the morgue at Harlem Hospital.

Two additional positions of Provisional Assistant Visiting Surgeons and two of Provisional Adjunct Assistant Visiting Surgeons were created for the duration of the war.

A change in the length of service of internes to one year was authorized, as well as the adjustment necessary to put it into operation.

Harlem Hospital is well represented by Hospital Unit "F," which was ordered to Buffalo on Nov. 12, and the department has received reports regarding the service from time to time.

The attention of the Trustees has been called to the need of providing a social service worker in the cardiac clinic at this hospital. As a request was made for the position in the budget for 1918, but denied, a further inquiry was made, and the General Medical Superintendent instructed to care for the more urgent cases that come to the cardiac clinic, so far as possible with our present staff of nurses.

Fordham Hospital.

Several conferences were held with the architects regarding the construction of the new roof ward at Fordham Hospital and several suggestions have been considered. The Medical Board has suggested the construction of a portable ward for medical cases and the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to make inquiry into the probable cost of such a ward and if funds are available for this purpose.

Dr. Nicoll, absent on military duty, has done excellent work in reorganizing and conducting the Fordham Hospital unit and the selection of a splendid personnel for this service.

As Dr. Taylor, one of the surgeons at the hospital, was assigned by the Surgeon General to give instruction to the members of the Medical Corps of the United States Army in Neuro-surgery, the Trustees have requested the Medical Board to arrange the surgical service so that it will be cared for properly during the absence of both Dr. Taylor and Dr. Nicoll. This was subsequently done by Dr. Nicoll.



TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
