The Comptroller submitted the following opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation on the preamble and resolution adopted at the last meeting, in relation to the question of the authority of law, for affixing the common seal of the city, by the Clerk of the Common Council, to leases of ferries and other city property, authorized and directed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as provided by law :

LAW DEPARTMENT,

W. H. DIKEMAN, Esq., Secretary Commissioners of the Sinking Fund :

SIR—I am in receipt of your favor of July 28, 1884, enclosing a resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, requesting me to furnish my opinion upon the question of the authority of law, for affixing the common seal of the city, by the Clerk of the Common Council, to leases of ferries and other city property authorized and directed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as provided by law.

Section 76 of the Consolidation Act provides that the Clerk of the Common Council "shall keep the seal of the city, and his signature shall be necessary to all leases by the city of its property and to all grants and other documents as under existing laws."

By sections 170 and 180 of the same act, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are given power "to sell or lease for the highest marketable price or rental at public auction, or by sealed bids, after public advertisement and appraisal, any city property except wharves or piers."

A person or corporation who at such sale or letting, becomes entitled by reason of his bid, to the lease then offered, is (in the absence of any other provisions of law) entitled to require that the officer entrusted with that duty, shall complete the evidence of the title acquired on the purchase, by affixing the seal of the city and his signature to the lease or grant of the same.

By an ordinance passed in 1844, which will be found in the compilation of 1845, chapter 19, title 4, section 10, the power to lease city property was conferred on the Sinking Fund Commissioners and "upon the production of a certificate signed by a majority of said Commissioners, of whom the Comptroller shall be one, it shall be the duty of the said Mayor and Clerk of the Common Council to execute such leases under their hands and seal of the city; said leases to be submitted to the Common Council for their sanction before being executed." By chapter 225 of the Laws of 1845, section 5, said "ordinance and any ordinance that may hereafter be passed by the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, in conformity with the provisions of this law, and relative to the said Sinking Fund, shall not be amended without the consent of the Legislature first had and obtained, etc., etc."

In the compilation of 1859, the same ordinance appears as section 28, of chapter 9, article 4. It is my opinion, however, that the provisions of the Charter of 1873 and of the Consolidation Act, as above quoted, have operated to repeal or modify this ordinance. The Sinking Fund Commissioners now derive their authority to sell or lease directly from the Legislature and not from the ordinances above quoted.

This fact is recognized in the general compilation of the ordinances of 1880, at page 39 [Authorized Edition]. Section 78 is there printed in the same terms as was Section 28 of the compilation of 1859, but it is stated in a foot-note, in the official copy printed by authority of the Common Council, to have been modified by subsequent legislation. [See also Report of the Committee on Law Department of the Board of Aldermen, printed as preface to the Revised Ordinances of 1880, in Vol. 48, Proceedings Board of Aldermen, pages 401 to 404.]

In my opinion, therefore, the Clerk of the Common Council should sign leases made by lawful authority, and as a corporation lease should be made under seal, and as he is the official custodian of the city seal, he should affix it to all such leases.

It is not necessary for him to swear that the seal was affixed by authority or order of the Common Council, but he should swear that it is affixed "by authority of law."

I understand that my predecessor had this same question under consideration in connection with a lease to the Old Dominion Steamship Company in the fall of 1881, and that the conclusion reached by him was the same as that here stated. In the particular case, the seal, as I am informed, was affixed to the lease and the verification made by the Clerk, was in the form above suggested, viz.: that the seal was affixed by authority of law.

Resolved, That the Clerk of the Common Council be requested to affix the common seal of the city to leases of ferries and other city property, which have been authorized and directed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to be made and executed, as provided by law, in accordance with the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, dated August 9, 1884, furnished by him to this Board under a resolution adopted July 28, 1884, as follows, to wit :

"In my opinion, therefore, the Clerk of the Common Council should sign leases made by lawful authority, and as a corporation lease should be made under seal, and as he is the official custodian of the city seal, he should affix it to all such leases.

"It is not necessary for him to swear that the seal was affixed by authority or order of the Common Council, but he should swear that it is affixed 'by authority of law.'"

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to send to the Clerk of the Common Council, a copy of the foregoing resolution, together with a copy of the said opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation.

After a brief discussion of the subject, on motion, the resolutions were adopted, the Mayor, Comptroller and Chamberlain voting in the affirmative and the Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen, in the negative.

The Comptroller submitted the following statement and accompanying resolution :

I hereby certify that the cash balance in the City Treasury to the credit of the Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt on the morning of August 13, 1884, was \$1,079,526.66, and that the liabilities of the fund up to and including interest payable November 1, 1884, will not exceed \$68,000.

Resolved, That a warrant for one million dollars (\$1,000,000), payable from the "Sinking Fund for the Payment of the Interest on the City Debt" be drawn in favor of the Chamberlain for deposit to credit of the "Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt," transferring the said amount from the interest to the Redemption Fund, as provided by section 172, New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

On motion, the resolution was adopted.

ARMORY BOARD, CITY HALL,
August 21, 1884.

To the Sinking Fund Commission:

GENTLEMEN—Referring to the subject of furnishing suitable armories for the organizations composing the 1st Division N. G. S. N. Y., it was the pleasure of your Honorable Board at a meeting held July 28, 1884, adopting resolutions concurring in the recommendations of the Armory Board, "that immediate steps be taken to provide suitable armories for certain organizations and directing the Comptroller to issue Armory Bonds for that purpose to prescribe that no part of the said sum of \$2,000,000 shall be paid or applied for the purposes mentioned in said resolution, until an estimate of the probable cost of the several armories proposed shall be presented to this Board."

In obedience to the condition thus imposed, I am instructed by said Armory Board to report to the Sinking Fund Commission the following estimate of the probable cost of the several armories which it is at present intended to construct.

The price of a number of plots of ground offered to the Armory Board, which are deemed most suitable and desirable for armory sites, average about \$250,000 each.

Basing their judgment upon the cost of similar structures erected within a few years past in this city and Brooklyn, the Armory Board are of the opinion that a similar amount expended in the erection of each armory building will furnish suitable accommodations for the various organizations. It is, therefore, concluded and the Armory Board desire respectfully to represent to the Sinking Fund Commission, that the "probable cost of the several armories proposed," including the purchase of the land, will be an average of \$500,000 each.
