COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at the Meeting held August 25th, 1884.

Present—Franklin Edson, Mayor; S. Hastings Grant, Comptroller; Henry B. Laidlaw, Chamberlain, and Hugh J. Grant, Chairman Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller, to whom was referred the application of the Board of Police, for lease, from Joseph H. Godwin, of the land and premises now occupied by the Thirty-fifth Precinct, for the use of the Police Department as a station-house, prison, stables, etc., for the use of the said precinct, submitted the following report:

CITY OF NEW YORK-FINANCE DEPARTMENT, COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE. August 11, 1884.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

The Comptroller, to whom was referred at the last meeting a resolution of the Board of Police requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize a lease of premises for a station-house, prison, etc., for the Thirty-fifth Precinct Police, respectfully

REPORTS :

That the said premises are occupied by the Police Force of the Thirty-fifth Precinct as a stationhouse, prison, stables, etc., and that the annual rent therefor is considered fair and reasonable. resolution is submitted to authorize the leasing of the same upon the terms and conditions contained in the resolution of the Board of Police.

That a lease was made and entered into by and between the Corporation of Trinity Church and the Fire Department, dated June 16, 1880, of the premises No. 253 Spring street, for the use of said Department as an Engine-house (No. 30), for the term of eight months from May 1, 1880, with the option and privilege of five successive yearly renewals, at a rental of \$540 per annum.

As this lease was made and executed after the passage of chapter 461, Laws of 1880, requiring all applications to lease real estate for city purposes to be presented to and passed upon by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, I submit a resolution to approve of said lease, to give it validity.

Sir.—I am in receipt of your favor of July 28, 1884, enclosing a resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, requesting me to furnish my opinion upon the question of the authority of law, for affixing the common seal of the city, by the Clerk of the Common Council, to leases of ferries and other city property authorized and directed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as provided by law.

Section 76 of the Consolidation Act provides that the Clerk of the Common Council "shall "keep the seal of the city, and his signature shall be necessary to all leases by the city of its proper "erty and to all grants and other documents as under existing laws."

By sections 170 and 180 of the same act, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are given power "to sell or lease for the highest marketable price or rental at public aution, or by sealed bids, "after public advertisement and appraisal, any city property except wharves or piers."

A person or corporation who at such sale or letting, becomes entitled by reason of his bid, to the lease then offered, is (in the absence of any other provisions of law) entitled to require that the officer entrusted with that duty, shall complete the evidence of the title acquired on the purchase, by affixing the seal of the city and his signature to the lease or grant of the same.

By an ordinance passed in 1844, which will be found in the compliation of 1845, chapter 19, title 4, section 10, the power to lease city property was conferred on the Sinking Fund Commissioners, of whom "Council to execute usel leases under their hands and seal of the city; and commissioners, of whom "Council to execute usel leases under their hands and seal of the city; and leases to be submitted to the Comptroller shall be one, it shall be the duty of the said Mayor and Clerk of the Common Council for their sanction before being executed." "In my opinion, therefore, the Clerk of the Common Council should sign leases made by ority, and as a corporation lease should be made under seal, and as he is the official "custodian of the city seal, he should affix it to all such leases.

"It is not necessary for him to swear that the seal was affixed by authority or order of the "Common Council, but he should swear that it is affixed 'by authority of law."

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to send to the Clerk of the Common Council, a copy of the foregoing resolution, together with a copy of the said opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation.

ARMORY BOARD, CITY HALL, 1 August 21, 1884.

To the Sinking Fund Commission :

Gentlemen—Referring to the subject of furnishing suitable armories for the organizations composing the 1st Division N. G. S. N. Y., it was the pleasure of your Honorable Board at a meeting held July 28, 1884, adopting resolutions concurring in the recommendations of the Amory Board, "that immediate steps be taken to provide suitable armories for certain organizations and directing the Comptroller to issue Armory Board, or prescribe that 'no part of the said sum of \$2,000,000 shall be paid or applied for the purposes mentioned in said resolution, until an estimate of the probable cost of the several armories proposed shall be presented to this Board.'"

Basing their judgment upon the cost of similar structures erected within a few years past in this city and Brooklyn, the Armory Board are of the opinion that a similar amount expended in the erection of each armory building will furnish suitable accommodations for the various organizations. It is, therefore, concluded and the Armory Board desire respectfully to represent to the Sinking Fund Commission, that the "probable cost of the several armories proposed," including the purchase of the land, will be an average of \$500,000 each.
