

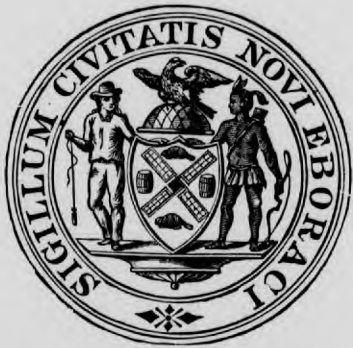

A copy of the Final Estimate of the Health Department was received and ordered on file.

The Secretary was directed to request the Civil Service Board to furnish this Department with an eligible list from which to appoint one Clerk, one Sanitary Inspector, one Meat Inspector, and one Fish Inspector.

Resolved, That Rule 55 of the Rules and Regulations be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

In the office of the Secretary, the Counsel, the Sanitary Superintendent and the Chief of the Seventh Division, there shall be kept a register, in which the clerks in the respective offices shall each day record their names, the hour of their arrival, the hour of leaving the office during the day for a period of more than fifteen minutes, and the reason therefor and the hour of returning, and the hour of leaving the office at the close of the day.

The above-named officers shall make a weekly report to the Board of the absence of any clerk during office hours for a period of over fifteen minutes (other than the time allowed for lunch) the reason therefor, and whether with or without leave; also the failure of any clerk to properly register in conformity to the above regulations. These reports will also show the amount of time spent, if any, over the prescribed office hours, by any clerk or other office employee. The report of the Secretary will embrace the clerks of the Sixth Division.

The Sanitary Superintendent will also make a weekly report to the Board of the absence from duty, either with or without leave, and the period of such absence of any Chief of Division.

Each Chief of Division will also make a weekly report to the Board of the absence from duty, either with or without leave, and the period of such absence of any Inspector or other employee not a Clerk.

Resolved, That Rule No. 105 of the Rules and Regulations be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

In the Fourth Division drugs shall be expended only upon written prescription by a physician in the employ of the Department. Such prescriptions shall be placed on file in the Division, and the number issued shall be reported by the Chief Inspector in his weekly report to the Sanitary Superintendent.

Resolved, That the resignation of Sanitary Inspector Adams, to take effect February 1, be and is hereby accepted.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 8, 1887:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 7,851.
 The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 311.
 During the past week 187 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.
 There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 33 permits.
 There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 7 permits.
 There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 6 miscellaneous permits.
 There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 13 permits.
 At premises where contagious diseases were reported, 1340 visits were made, and 120 disinfections and 13 fumigations were performed.
 The number of cases of contagious diseases removed to Riverside Hospital was 6.
 The number of vaccinations performed was 421, of which 40 were primary, and 381 revaccinations.
 There were seized and condemned, 10,155 pounds of meat.
 The number of specimens of milk examined was 48, the number of analyses of same made was 4, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 40, the number of arrests made was 1, and the amount of fines imposed was \$1.

The certificates of 818 births, 73 still births, 277 marriages, and 809 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, January 8, 1887. This shows an increase of 182 births, 11 still-births, 33 marriages, and 42 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886, there was a decrease of 22 births, an increase of 12 still-births 99 deaths, and the same number of marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 4; erysipelas, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 3; rheumatism and gout, 2; cancer, 2; bronchitis, 3; pneumonia, 17; heart diseases, 21; convulsions, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; suicide, 4; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 9; diphtheria, 12; croup, 6; whooping-cough, 7; malarial fevers, 1; puerperal diseases, 5; inanition, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 12; aneurism, 2; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 6; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 9; apoplexy, 3; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 8; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 6; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 3; premature and preterm births, 6; surgical operations, 1. The number of deaths from typhoid fever, cerebro-spinal fever and alcoholism was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 108 were in institutions, 503 in tenement-houses, 178 in houses containing three families or less, 9 in hotels and boarding-houses, 10 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 3 were on the basement floor, 168 on the first, 221 on the second, 174 on the third, 90 on the fourth, 32 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 787 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 22 non-residents; 87 were stated to be single, 206 married, 90 widowed, and the condition of 426 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week were as follows, viz.: City deaths, 800; still-births, 73; bodies in transitu, 14; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 97 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 818 births, 277 marriages, 73 still-births, 809 deaths; 14 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 126 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 11 transcript of the birth record, 9 of marriage, and 86 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending January 8, 1887, was 19.6 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 30.155; the mean humidity was 72, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,575, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.75 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The actual mortality for the week ending January 1, 1887, was 749; this is 67 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1886, and 88.4 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.66 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,460,644.
