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LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

IN COMMON COUNCIL, JUNE 2, 1886.

Whereas, It is with profound sorrow that this Common Council has learned that John Kelly died at his residence in this city yesterday, Tuesday, the 1st instant; and

Whereas, The death of an ordinary friend or acquaintance occasions gloom and sorrow, but when death strikes down one of the most prominent and influential men of his day and generation—a man universally known, beloved and admired—one whose name is associated with all that is manly, brave and honorable, whose word was his bond—sadness and gloom give place to the deepest grief, the most profound sorrow. John Kelly has been prominently before the people of this city for more than one-third of a century: He was an Alderman of his ward; twice a member of Congress from his district; twice Sheriff of this county; Comptroller of this city and an Assessment Commissioner, and he performed the duties incident to these various positions and others of minor importance with singular intelligence and fidelity, deservedly earning the commendation and praise of grateful constituencies. Through all this time and amid all these changes he retained the name bestowed upon him, when but ten years old, by his first employer, James Gordon Bennett the elder, that of "Honest John Kelly." He was a self-made man in the highest and broadest acceptance of that honored term. He began his career when but ten years of age as an office boy, and by patient application to business by day, and to study by night, combined with industry, energy and perseverance, he attained, step by step, the exalted position he held at the time of his death—the leader of the oldest political organization in the country—an organization co-eval with the organization of our government—and became also recognized as a counsellor and guide to the great Democratic party as well of this State as of this Republic; and

Whereas, When such a man dies it is incumbent upon this Common Council to take such measures as will best testify the sorrow of the people and government of this, his native city, for his death, to manifest respect for his memory and to sympathize with his stricken family and sorrowing friends; be it therefore

Resolved, That the members of this Common Council, for themselves and the people they represent, do most sincerely lament the death of John Kelly, and we hereby tender to his bereaved family—his stricken wife and her fatherless children—our heartfelt sympathy in their affliction, and we feel assured that the sympathy of the people of this city also goes forth to them, and that it is the universal prayer that He who "tempers the winds to the shorn lamb" will take them into His holy keeping; and be it further

Resolved, That out of respect for the memory of John Kelly the public offices of the Corporation be closed and no public business be transacted on the day appointed for solemnizing the funeral rites, Saturday, June 5, 1886 (except in the offices specially required by law to be kept open), that the flags on the City Hall and the other public buildings be displayed at half-staff from sunrise until sunset on said day, and the owners or occupants of private buildings and the owners or masters of vessels in our harbor are hereby requested to display their flags at half-mast on that day, and that a committee of five, of whom the President shall be one, be appointed by the Chair to take such other action and make such other and further arrangements as to them may appear more impressively to manifest sorrow for the death and respect for the memory of the illustrious deceased; and be it further

Resolved, That, as an additional mark of respect for the memory of John Kelly, this Board do now adjourn.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending May 22, 1886:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 4,850.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 385.

During the past week 307 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 84 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 4 permits.

There were issued under the Sanitary Code, 14 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 109 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 120 visits were made, and 47 disinfections and 20 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 6.

The number of vaccinations performed was 1,281, of which 884 were primary, and 397 re vaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 5,520 pounds of meat, and 600 pounds of fish.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 35; the number of analyses of same made was 1.

The certificates of 489 births, 69 still-births, 242 marriages and 626 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, May 22, 1886. This shows an increase of 59 births, 6 still-births and 3 deaths, and a decrease of 3 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885, there was a decrease of 48 births and 28 deaths, and an increase of 10 still-births and 29 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; erysipelas, 5; malarial fevers, 2; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 8; bronchitis, 2; heart diseases, 3; convulsions, 2; apoplexy, 5; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 8; Bright's disease and nephritis, 6; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and preterm births, 6; surgical operations, 1; while the deaths from measles increased 1; scarlatina, 4; diphtheria, 2; croup, 7; whooping-cough, 2; typhoid fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 5; inanition, 7; alcoholism, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 1; pneumonia, 13; aneurism, 2; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 7; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; suicide, 1; and drowning, 2. The number of deaths from cerebro-spinal fever and all diseases of the brain and nervous system was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 116 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 157 under two years, 213 under five years, and 49 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 11 more than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 34.03 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 149 were in institutions, 315 in tenement-houses, 133 in houses containing three families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 20 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 105 on the first, 143 on the second, 126 on the third, 48 on the fourth, 24 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 611 were stated to be residents of New York City and 15 non-residents; 100 were stated to be single, 171 married, 92 widowed, and the condition of 263 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 626; still-births, 69; bodies in transitu, 14; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 72 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 489 births, 242 marriages, 69 still-births, 626 deaths; 14 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 138 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 6 transcripts of the birth record, 8 of marriage and 96 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending May 22, 1886, was 61.7 degrees Fahrenheit, the mean reading of the barometer was 29.981; the mean humidity was 75, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,153, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.80 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 584 deaths and still-births, or 84.03 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 16; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 225; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 108; Greenwood (undenominational), 30; Lutheran (undenominational), 89; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 13; Evergreen (undenominational), 39; Woodlawn (undenominational), 29; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 9; Union (Methodist Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 5; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 4; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 4; Washington (undenominational), 9.

The actual mortality for the week ending May 15, 1886, was 599; this is 68 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1885, and 114.4 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.72 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,433,692.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, May 26, 1886, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, Baldwin, Barnes, Ridgeway and Fish. Also, Chief Engineer Church, and Chief Engineer Birdsall and Consulting Engineer Adams of the Department of Public Works.

The minutes of the stated meeting of May 19, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examinations and audit of bills included in Vouchers Nos. 1734 to 1745.

On motion of Commissioner Dowd, said vouchers were approved by the Commissioners, and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee on Construction made report, dated May 24, with recommendations, as follows: 1st. Upon a proposal of Heman Clark, contractor, to sink an incline shaft on Section B of the New Aqueduct, for use in lowering building materials for the aqueduct.

The Committee recommended that authority be given to sink and use said incline shaft on the dumping-grounds belonging to the City at or near Station 1267, on Section B, on condition that the whole of the work, including the refilling of said shaft in a satisfactory manner, be done by the contractor at his own expense, and without cost to the City, and that an agreement be made with him to that effect.

These recommendations were approved, and the making of such an agreement authorized by the unanimous vote of the Commissioners.

2d. Upon a request from the Division Engineer of Division No. 2 for authority to employ an able-bodied laborer for rough work upon his division, which request had the approval of the Chief Engineer and the Committee, the compensation of such laborer not to exceed \$2 per day.

The Committee recommended that the Chief Engineer be authorized to employ said laborer and to report the appointment to the Commissioners for approval, and it was so ordered.

3d. Upon a request of the Chief Engineer for authority to build a small auxiliary office for the use of the Engineers at the Pocantico cut and blow-off, to replace one lately destroyed by fire at that place, and to cost not over \$250.

This request was approved by the Committee and the required authority was given to the Chief Engineer by the Commissioners, and the sum of \$250 appropriated for that purpose.

4th. Upon a request of Smith & Brown, contractors upon Section 1 of the New Aqueduct, that an inspector be sent to Maine to inspect stone for the new gate-house at Croton Dam, the Committee recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the aforesaid request be granted, upon condition that all the expenses of such inspector be borne by said contractors, the same to be accounted to this Commission by said inspector, and to be deducted from the monthly estimates of the work done by said contractors; such inspection, however, not to be conclusive, or to preclude a subsequent and final inspection of the stone before it is laid upon the work; and upon such terms the Chief Engineer shall send an inspector from the Engineer Corps.

On motion of Commissioner Barnes, the resolution was adopted unanimously.

The Comptroller, under date May 22, gave notice of the issue of a warrant for a voucher not certified by the Aqueduct Commissioners, and appertaining to the work of the Commissioners of Appraisal for New York County, amounting to \$200; which notice was ordered placed upon file, and entered upon the books of this Commission.

Notices, dated May 21, 1886, were received from Heman Clark, and O'Brien & Clark, that they should hold the Aqueduct Commissioners responsible for the delay in payment of the monthly estimates for work done in April last; and also a similar notice, dated May 22, from Brown, Howard & Co.; all of which were ordered placed upon file.

Mr. Joseph P. Disbrow gave notice, dated May 26, 1886, of his revocation of any license heretofore given by him for the occupation by the Commissioners of Parcel No. 72, of his lands, and demanding that said premises be vacated immediately. This matter being now in litigation, the above notice was referred to the Counsel to the Corporation.

A communication was received from Mr. William Russell, concerning certain bills of his, of which payment has been withheld, and was referred to the Committee of Finance and Audit for consideration.

Commissioner Dowd offered, and Commissioner Barnes seconded, the following resolution, and it was adopted unanimously, viz.:

Whereas, There have been some unfavorable public criticisms and statements made with regard to cements now being used in constructing the New Aqueduct; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer is hereby directed to report to this Board all of the brands of cement offered and examined for use upon the work, which of the same have been accepted, and which rejected, and the reasons therefor, and especially whether any cement so rejected at any time has subsequently been accepted and used, and the reasons therefor.

Commissioner Barnes offered, and Commissioner Baldwin seconded, the following resolution, which was also unanimously adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the President is hereby requested to report to the Aqueduct Commissioners at an early day, a review of the work of the Commission to the first day of June, 1886, that shall include the plans and work of construction to that date, and the progress therein, and the plans and projects relating to said aqueduct and the dams and reservoirs now under consideration before the Commission that have not been adopted and approved; and the Secretary and the Chief Engineer are hereby directed to report to the President such information as he shall require for the said review, from their respective offices.

Commissioner Ridgeway then offered this resolution, which was also seconded and unanimously adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to furnish each of the Commissioners with an abstract of the cost and amount of work done, from its beginning up to the present time, the number of persons now employed under direction of the Commission, the capacity in which each is serving, and the respective salaries paid therefor.

Commissioner Fish offered the following resolution, which was seconded, and unanimously adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to report to the Aqueduct Commissioners within ten days,

First. The names of all employees who, while disabled from sickness or other cause, or while absent from duty, have drawn salaries.

Second. The time for which such salaries were paid to each of such employees during such disability or absence.

Third. The amount of salaries paid to each of such employees.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

Liscomb, Dock Superintendent, to whom was referred the application of Joseph May for permission to maintain a small float at Thirty-fifth street, North river, reported thereon, and recommended that the same be granted, provided he pay for the use thereof fifty cents per day, commencing May 1st instant; and be and remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board.

On motion the report was received, recommendation adopted, the communications ordered to be placed on file, and the President authorized to advise Mr. May and Dock Master Joseph B. Erwin, of the action of the Board.

Joseph L. Liscomb, Dock Superintendent, to whom was referred the application of Eldridge & Mould, to maintain ice-bridge, tally-house, and scales on the westerly side of Pier 53, East river, reported thereon, and recommended that the same be granted.

On motion, the report was received, recommendation adopted, and the communications ordered to be placed on file.

A report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 5327, stating that C. H. De Lamater & Co., had abandoned idea of placing mooring-pile, twenty-five feet back of the bulkhead foot of Thirteenth street, North river, was received and, together with the application, ordered to be placed on file.

The Engineer-in-Chief, to whom was referred the application of John H. Starin, for permission to drive spring-piles, cut gangways, place water-tanks, and erect awning at Pier foot of Thirty-second street, East river, reported on Secretary's Order No. 5352, that he saw no objection to permit being granted.

On motion, the report was received, the communications ordered to be placed on file, and the President authorized to advise Mr. Starin that his application has been granted, the water-tank and awning to be and remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board; and provided that he file an agreement in writing to restore the pier to its original condition when notified so to do by the Board, all of the work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department. The President was also authorized to request Mr. Starin to call on the Board respecting the compensation to be charged for the use of said pier.

A communication, dated August 14, 1885, was received from C. H. Loomis, attorney Union Dredging Company, showing that the contract dated May 9, 1881, had been modified in respect to

the price per cubic yard, to read and provide as follows, viz.: 20 cents per cubic yard for dredging mud; \$1, per yard for dredging crib-work, which was accepted and adopted, and the President authorized to advise the Engineer-in-Chief of the action of the Board.
