



PUBLIC NOTICE.

A resolution, of which the following is a copy, was adopted by the Common Council, May 26, 1886, and was approved by the Mayor, May 28, 1886, viz.:

"Resolved, That in consideration of the fact that little, if any, business is transacted in the public offices of the Corporation after 12 o'clock, M., on Saturdays during the summer season, the various offices of the City, except those specially required by law to be kept open, be closed at noon every Saturday during the months of June, July, August and September, and the heads of the several departments of the City government be and are hereby requested to give their employees a half-holiday on Saturdays during the months above named."

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, June 9, 1886, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, Commissioner of Public Works, Commissioners Baldwin, Barnes, Ridgeway, and Fish.

Also, Chief Engineer Church, and Chief Engineer Birdsall and Consulting Engineer Adams of the Department of Public Works.

The meeting was opened for public hearing pursuant to public notice, said notice having been duly published in the CITY RECORD and "Tribune" of this city. The notice was read to those present, and in response to an announcement by the President that the Commissioners were ready to hear any person interested, George W. Lyon, Esq., of counsel, appeared for Mr. William H. Deforest, owner of certain lands affected by the proposed modification, and briefly stated that his client would neither object, or consent to the proposed modification in the plans of the Commissioners with respect to the nature of the estate to be acquired by the City, in the lands on the line of the proposed Convent avenue, between One Hundred and Fortieth and One Hundred and Forty-fifth streets, leaving that matter entirely to the decision of the Commissioners and reserving all his rights as to compensation, and otherwise.

No one else appearing, the hearing was suspended for the time being, and the regular order of business taken up.

The minutes of the stated meeting of June 2, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of bills included in Vouchers Nos. 1752 to 1767, and on motion of Commissioner Dowd, said vouchers were approved, and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee then made report upon several requests for copies of the plans, contracts, etc., for the New Aqueduct, and recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Secretary be authorized to furnish to Walter Wood, Esq., a complete set of the drawings, plans, contract forms, etc., of the New Aqueduct, at the same cost that bidders and others have been supplied; and that he be authorized to furnish a set of the same to the University of the City of New York, and to complete the set of the Engineers of the Washington Aqueduct, free of charge.

On motion of Commissioner Barnes, the resolution was adopted.

The Committee on Construction made report, dated June 7, in relation to taking the fee, in lieu of an easement in perpetuity, in the right of way lands of the New Aqueduct in Westchester County; and recommended that the Chief Engineer be directed to prepare and submit for the consideration of the Commissioners, maps showing all the parcels of lands of which, in his opinion, the fee is essential, and of those in which an easement is sufficient, and to report his estimate of the probable cost of the fee parcels.

This recommendation was adopted, and on motion of Commissioner Spencer, it was

Resolved, That the Committee on Construction is hereby requested to consult the Counsel to the Corporation upon the proper course of action to be taken by this Commission to obtain the title of lands, for the New Aqueduct, from the line between Westchester County and New York County, north to Croton Lake, in fee, or a qualified or conditional fee, instead of, or additional to, the easement below the surface already taken.

The Committee next made report, of this date, adversely to a change of the line of the Aqueduct at Shaft Site No. 8.

The matter was discussed, and then laid over for the report upon the subject heretofore called for from the Chief Engineer.

Commissioner Ridgway offered the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Committee on Construction is hereby requested to consult the Counsel to the Corporation with regard to the power of the Commissioners to order the contractors, (except upon Sections A. and B.) to construct, under their respective contracts and at the prices named therein, such additional shafts upon the line of the New Aqueduct as the Commissioners may deem necessary.

The resolution was adopted.

Commissioner Ridgway next offered this resolution, viz.:

Whereas, It has been stated to the Committee on Construction that the bricks delivered on Sections 4 and 5 are of a quality unsuitable for the arch work of the tunnel; therefore be it

"Resolved, That the Chief Engineer is hereby directed to examine the same and report whether such is the fact, and if so to require the contractors, Brown, Howard & Co., to remove from the line of the aqueduct all the bricks now delivered on said sections; and to furnish bricks strictly conforming to the specifications of their contracts.

The resolution was adopted.

The following resolution was offered by Commissioner Barnes and adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer is hereby directed to investigate and report to this Commission whether the requirements of Section 29 of the contracts respecting light and ventilation of the tunnels are complied with by all the contractors, and hereafter to require said contractors to strictly comply with said requirements, and to keep the tunnels sufficiently free from smoke and obnoxious gases for the proper progress of the work.

Commissioner Barnes next offered the following resolution, which was adopted, viz.:

Whereas, At an inspection made by the Aqueduct Commissioners on June 8, 1886, it appeared that the brick work in that portion of the tunnel north and south of the open cut on Section No. 4 was of a character not in conformity to the contract specifications; be it

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer be and he is hereby requested to report what, in his judgment, is necessary to be done in order to correct the defects in the said work.

The Commissioner of Public Works presented a communication of this date, in relation to a reduction of the Engineer Corps of this Commission, and the saving of expense in that department, and also in the office of the Secretary.

The communication was read and the matter discussed, and on motion of Commissioner Ridgway, seconded by Commissioner Barnes, that part of the communication relating to the Engineer Corps was referred to the Committee on Construction; and that part relating to the office of the Secretary, to the Committee of Finance and Audit, for consideration and report.

Commissioner Dowd presented the following memorandum and resolutions, viz.:

MEMORANDUM.

The Jerome Park Reservoir was begun in April, 1885; and at that time it was represented that the necessary surveys and soundings could be completed within a few months. I believe that the work could and should have been long since completed, and that that Engineer Corps should be at once disbanded.

I further believe, that with the information furnished by the Department of Public Works, and that since obtained by the Engineer Corps of this Commission, we now have all that is necessary with regard to the Quaker Bridge Dam and Reservoir, and therefore that the Engineer Corps on that survey can and should be dispensed with; therefore, I offer the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Engineer Corps engaged upon the surveys and soundings of the proposed Jerome Park Reservoir, be disbanded on the 15th instant.

Resolved, That the Engineer Corps engaged upon the surveys of the proposed Quaker Bridge Dam be disbanded on the 15th instant.

The matter was discussed and the resolutions modified, and then adopted, as follows:

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer is hereby requested to report upon the surveys and soundings of the proposed Jerome Park Reservoir, and also upon the proposed Quaker Bridge Reservoir, and whether or not one or both of the Engineer Corps engaged on these surveys cannot be disbanded forthwith, without detriment to the work of the Commission.

Commissioner Baldwin called attention to the fact that the public hearings extending for over two years past in relation to the construction of the proposed Quaker Bridge Dam and the Muscoot Dam were finally closed on the 27th of January last, and time given until the 1st of May for presenting written communications upon the subject, and believing that those questions should be determined without further delay, he moved that Wednesday, June 23, be now fixed for deciding said questions.

After discussion, it was agreed that on the above date the Commissioners would resume the consideration of those questions, and continue the same at each consecutive meeting until a decision is reached.

The Secretary submitted an application from Arthur B. Sinclair, for the position of Clerk, vice Buckley, resigned, and commended the applicant to the favorable consideration of the Board.

On motion of Commissioner Dowd, the Secretary was authorized to employ Master Sinclair, as office boy, at a compensation of \$5 per week.

The public hearing was resumed, and the notice again read to those who had come in since the first reading.

Mr. William S. Whiteman, owner of the parcel of land upon the Tenth avenue, opposite Shaft No. 27, appeared and stated that he would neither consent nor object to the taking of the property, having no purpose to interfere with or obstruct the work of the Commissioners, but meaning to retain all his rights in the premises.

On motion of Commissioner Baldwin, the hearing was then finally closed.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a special meeting of the Board of Docks, held June 10, 1886.

Present—Commissioners Stark and Koch.

The minutes of the meeting held June 9, 1886, were read and approved.

The Board went into Executive Session.

A communication from R. P. H. Abell, President Columbia Yacht Club, requesting the Board to fill in with stone a certain portion of the grounds occupied by them at the foot of Eighty-sixth street, North river, was referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report as to the filling required thereat.

The following communications were received, read, and

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit: From Department of Street Cleaning—Reporting that the owners of the private dump on Tompkins street, between Irvington and Stanton streets, East river, are in the habit of throwing water-soaked lumber into the slip, interfering with the work of said Department. Referred to the Dockmaster to examine and report.

From J. H. McConnell—Requesting permission to replace piles and place gangways at float located on the Ogden estate, High Bridge, Harlem river. Permission granted (provided the consent of the owners is filed in this Department), the work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

From William Murray—Requesting an appointment as Clerk.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. In reference to the model of New York Harbor, constructed by Captain F. J. Palmer, late of the United States Coast Survey.

On motion, the President was authorized to forward a communication to Captain Palmer, embodying the report of the Engineer-in-Chief as the views of this Board respecting the same.

2d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5362, repairs required to Pier at foot of Thirteenth street, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to repair, as recommended in his report, at a cost of about \$220.

The communication from T. F. White, assignee of P. White's Sons, complaining of the condition of Pier foot of Thirty-eighth street, North river, was,

On motion, taken from the table, and, with the report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 5427 in relation thereto, ordered to be placed on file, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to fence off the said pier, as recommended in his report.

The communication from the Old Colony Steamboat Company, requesting permission to place a platform from the corner of one now in use by them to Pier, old 28, North river, and cover the same with a shed at the height of present shed, was,

On motion, taken from the table, and, with the report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 5057 in respect thereto, ordered to be placed on file and permission granted, the work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

On motion, the subject matter respecting the compensation to be charged for the use of land under water to be covered by said platform was referred to Commissioner Koch with power.

Commissioner Koch, to whom was referred the application of the Department of Public Charities and Correction for a landing place on the Harlem river, south of One Hundred and Fifteenth street, reported thereon and recommended that the same be denied.

On motion, The report was received, recommendation adopted, and the President authorized to notify said Department of the action of the Board.

Commissioner Koch, to whom was referred, with power, the application of the Newburgh Steamboat Company, for permission to erect a sign on Pier, old 42, North river, reported that he had granted the desired permission.

On motion, his action was approved.

On motion of Commissioner Koch, Commissioner Matthews was elected Treasurer of the Board for the year ending April 30, 1887, by acclamation.

The President appointed Commissioners Koch and Matthews as the Auditing Committee.

On motion, the renewal of insurance on office furniture, Pier A, North river, was referred to Commissioner Koch, with power.

On motion, the suspension of Watchmen Lawrence F. Osborn and Michael Rafferty was reconsidered, and said Watchmen were restored to duty, and the President authorized to notify the Engineer-in-Chief of the action of the Board.

On motion, the President was authorized to notify the various parties who purchased leases of wharf property at public sale held April 15, 1886, to call at this office with their sureties and execute the same.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

The President stated that he had approved the suspension of Inspector Gecks, whereupon the action of the President was approved, and was authorized to appoint an inspector vice Peter Gecks.

2d. Recommending the appointment of a Draughtsman and an assistant, for clerical work, in order to facilitate the preparation of the assessment lists. Filed.

From Jacob Wrey Mould, Architectural Draughtsman, applying for leave of absence for ten days on account of sickness. Granted.

From E. R. Campbell, asking to be restored to duty as a Foreman in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards. Referred to the Executive Committee.

From the Engineer of Construction in charge of streets and sewers in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, reporting in relation to the driving of piles for a foundation for the Webster avenue sewer, which the contractor desires to proceed with, in the trench opened north of One Hundred and Seventy-third street, and stating that, in his judgment, piling is not necessary at that point. Approved.

From the Superintendent of Parks:

1st. Reporting the suspension of John Vitchel, Terrence Masterson and John Rush, Laborers, for intoxication.

Commissioner Crimmins, to whom was referred, on the 19th ultimo, the matter of the sanitary condition of Mill brook, presented a report submitting plans and specifications for the improvement of the condition of the brook, by the construction of the Mill Brook drains between One Hundred and Forty-fourth street and Westchester avenue, and moved that the same be approved and printed, and when so printed and approved as to form by the Counsel to the Corporation, that the Secretary be directed to insert an advertisement in the CITY RECORD inviting proposals for doing the work. Adopted.

On motion, the Treasurer was authorized to purchase a suitable ambulance wagon, and when obtained the President was directed to see that the same is suitably equipped and attendants provided to fit the same for use for the relief of persons injured or taken ill in the Parks.

In accordance with Regulation 35 of the Civil Service Regulations, the following named persons are hereby reappointed to the positions set opposite their names, respectively, subject to the further pleasure of this Board:

George S. Welsh, Assistant Engineer.

On motion, the salary of John C. Hume, Computer, was fixed at \$1,200 per annum, to date from 1st instant.

The pay of Adolph Heyer, Skilled Laborer, was fixed at \$3 per day, to date from the commencement of the next pay-roll.

The pay of Adam Herlich, Laborer, in Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, was fixed at \$2 per day.

The following preamble and resolution were unanimously adopted:
