

Minutes of Adjourned Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at the office of the Aqueduct Commissioners, on Friday, November 12, 1886, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, the Commissioner of Public Works, Commissioners Baldwin, Barnes, Ridgway, and Fish.

Also, Chief Engineer Church, and Chief Engineer Birdsall of the Department of Public Works. The meeting was opened for public hearing pursuant to public notice.

Mr. Lovett appeared before the Commissioners in behalf of Mrs. Susan Leggett, and also for the tenants on the Hart property, and waived all objections to the acquiring of said property.

Mr. Carpenter also appeared and waived all objections, whereupon, on motion of Commissioner Dowd, the hearing was then closed.

The regular order of business was then taken up.

The minutes of the Stated Meeting of November 10, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of the monthly estimates of work done by the contractors for the month of October, as per vouchers Nos. 2148 to

2161, inclusive, amounting to \$460,921.49.

The report of the Committee was adopted, and the vouchers ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee on Construction reported in favor of appropriating one hundred dollars (\$100) for the purpose of furnishing twelve fourteen-feet disc rods, to meet the demands of the Division
