GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my supervision for the quarter ending April 30, 1893:

WORK OF CONSTRUCTION UNDER NEW PLAN.

NORTH RIVER.

SECTIONS SOUTH OF WEST FOURTEENTH STREET.

CLEANING OF PAVEMENT.

The pavement on the new made land between Pier "A" and West Tenth street, North river, has been cleaned and sprinkled from time to time, as required, under resolution of the Board, May 12, 1892.

West Washington Market Section—Resolution of the Board, July 9, 1891.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

STONE FILLING.

Cobble was discharged between caps, by William Turner, under Treasurer's orders therefor.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

Deck plank was laid and fastened.

MASONRY.

33 pieces of granite were set on wall foundation and backed up with 149 batches of concrete, and 14 pieces of coping were set on wall foundation.

EARTH FILLING.

1,411 loads of earth filling were received from Brown & Fleming, and same were placed in rear of wall, making a total received up to date, with tickets, of 24,874 loads, and 657 loads without tickets.

PIER, NEW 14, N. R.

The work of widening Pier, new 14, North river, under resolution of the Board of Docks, of April 28, 1892, is in progress.

BUILDING CRIB.

Crib was sunk at outer end of pier and rip-rap discharged into crib, under Treasurer's orders therefor.

REMOVING ROCK.

The work of removing the rock on both sides, inner and outer ends, of Pier, new 14, North river, is in progress.

BUILDING SHED FOUNDATION.

25 foundation piles were driven, regulated and staylathed; piles were sawed off; caps and horizontal braces were placed and fastened and deck planking was laid.

Chamber Street Section—Resolution of the Board, November 21, 1878.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

MASONRY.

10 pieces of coping were set on wall foundation.

EARTH FILLING.

No filling has been done on this section during the quarter. The total number of loads received from Brown & Fleming to date, without tickets, and placed in rear of wall, remains 52,885 loads.

Jay Street Section—Resolution of the Board, January 30, 1892.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

STONE FILLING.

Rip-rap were discharged in rear of wall by H. P. Sheridan, under Treasurer's orders therefor.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

Deck planking was laid and fastened.

MASONRY.

138 pieces of granite were set on wall foundation and backed up with 425 batches of concrete; temporary backing logs were placed on wall; joints in granite were pointed and 14 pieces of coping stone were set.

EARTH FILLING.

14,066 loads of earth filling were received from Brown & Fleming and same were placed in rear of wall, making a total received to date of 17,614 loads from Brown & Fleming without tickets.

Franklin Street Section—Resolution of the Board, November 13, 1890.

EARTH FILLING.

No filling has been done on this section during the quarter. The total number of loads received up to date from Brown & Fleming without tickets remains 43,530 loads.

Canal Street Section—Resolution of the Board, December 10, 1891.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

STONE FILLING.

Cobble was levelled off of wall foundation and bulkhead built to retain same.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

6 extra vertical piles were driven; 72 piles were sawed off to grade; foundation piles were located and longitudinal caps and cross-caps were placed and fastened.

MASONRY.

4 bulkhead blocks were set on wall foundation and chain-holes between blocks were filled with concrete in bags.

BUILDING SEWER.

The work of building a new sewer at the foot of Canal street is in progress.

PIER, NEW 36, N. R.

Pier, new 36, North river, is being extended under resolution of the Board, March 23, 1893. In progress.

PIER, NEW 38, N. R.

Preparations are being made for the extension of Pier, new 38, North river, under resolution of the Board, March 1, 1893.

PIER, NEW 40, N. R.

Pier, new 40, North river, is being extended under resolution of the Board, October 6, 1892.

BUILDING SEWER.

The work of building a sewer under the extension to Pier, new 40, North river, is in progress.

PIER, OLD 42, N. R.

Pier, old 42, North river, is being torn up and removed, and a new pier is being built upon the site of same, under Contract No. 433. In progress.

SECTIONS NORTH OF WEST FOURTEENTH STREET.

West Twenty-third Street Section, South End—Resolution of the Board, November 5, 1880.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

DREDGING.

Mud was excavated and removed from bulkhead-wall area by Morris & Cumings Dredging Co., under Treasurer's orders therefor.

STONE FILLING.

Cobble and rip-rap were discharged on wall foundation by Brown & Fleming and H. P. Sheridan, under Treasurer's orders therefor.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

220 vertical piles were driven, regulated and staylathed; 52 bracing piles were driven and regulated; 3 binding frames were built and sunk to place; piles were sawed off; foundation piles were located and 210 feet of longitudinal and 22 transverse caps were placed and fastened with treenails.

WEST TWENTY-SIXTH STREET.

160 vertical piles were driven, regulated and staylathed; foundation piles were located; 42 feet of longitudinal capping were placed and fastened; 3 binding frames were built and 2 mooring piles were driven in ship.

West Forty-third Street Section—Resolution of the Board, September 3, 1891.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

67 pieces of granite were set and backed up with 191 batches of concrete and trench was dug for temporary sewer box at West Forty-fourth street.

West Fifty-second Street Section, North End—Resolution of the Board, February 6, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

DREDGING.

Mud was excavated and removed from bulkhead wall area by Morris & Cumings Dredging Company, and mud was pumped from wall foundation.

MASONRY.

172 batches of concrete were placed in bags and set on wall foundation and 32 batches of concrete were placed on top of concrete in bags; 5 nine foot base blocks and 7 standard blocks were set on wall foundation, and chain holes were filled with concrete in bags.

EARTH FILLING.

1,307 loads of earth filling were received and placed in rear of bulkhead wall and 1,916 loads of filling were received from the Department of Street Cleaning, making a total of 5,820 loads of earth filling and 1,916 loads of ashes to date.

West Fifty-seventh Street Section—Resolution of the Board, August 1, 1889.

PIER AT WEST FIFTY-SIXTH STREET.

The temporary plank approach to Pier at West Fifty-sixth street was repaired.

EAST RIVER.

Stanton Street Section—Resolution of the Board, March 1, 1893.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

Borings were taken over site of bulkhead-wall to ascertain the nature of the bottom; 5,444 cubic yards of mud were excavated and removed from site of wall by Morris & Cumings Dredging Company, under Treasurer's order therefor.

PIER FOOT OF STANTON STREET.

Test piles were driven over site of proposed pier to ascertain the nature of the river bottom.

East Twenty-fourth Street Section—Resolution of the Board, April 25, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

STONE FILLING.

Cobble and rip-rap were deposited on wall foundation under Treasurer's orders therefor.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

18 vertical piles were driven in wall foundation; piles were sawed off; foundation piles were located; transverse caps placed, 125 square feet of deck planking were placed and backing logs were placed and fastened.

MASONRY.

10 concrete blocks were set in wall and chain-holes between blocks were filled with concrete in bags; 79 pieces of granite were set and backed up with 148 batches of concrete; 4 pieces of coping were set on "E" course of wall, and joints in the granite were cleaned out and pointed.

EARTH FILLING.

383 loads of earth filling were received from Thomas Smith, under Secretary's Order No. 12762, and same were placed in rear of wall.

East Twenty-fifth Street Section—Resolution of the Board, October 27, 1892.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

176 vertical piles were driven, regulated and staylathed; 108 foundation piles were sawed off and foundation piles were located.

MASONRY.

2 concrete foundation blocks were set in wall and chain-holes were filled with concrete in bags.

PIER AT EAST TWENTY-FIFTH STREET.

A new pier is being built at the foot of East Twenty-fifth street, under resolution of the Board, September 22, 1892.

EAST TWENTY-SIXTH STREET.

The work of building the bulkhead-wall through the northerly line of East Twenty-sixth street, through Twenty-sixth street until it meets the wall in front of Bellevue Hospital, was begun on the 28th of April, 1893, and is in progress.

PIER AT EAST NINETY-FOURTH STREET.

The work of building a new pier at the foot of East Ninety-fourth street, under Contract No. 430, was completed on the 14th of April, 1893.

East Ninety-sixth Street Section—Resolution of the Board, October 31, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

STONE FILLING.

431 cubic yards of rip-rap stone were deposited on wall foundation by H. P. Sheridan, under Treasurer's Orders therefor.

MASONRY.

41 pieces of granite were set and backed up with 115 batches of concrete; 7 pieces of coping were set on "E" course and joints in granite were cleaned out and pointed.

East Ninety-ninth Street Section—Resolution of the Board, September 1, 1892.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

DREDGING.

9,296 cubic yards of mud and 6,218 cubic yards of sand were excavated and removed from site of bulkhead-wall by the Morris & Cumings Dredging Company, under Treasurer's Orders therefor.

STONE FILLING.

308 cubic yards of cobble stone were deposited on wall foundation by J. A. Bouker, under Treasurer's Orders therefor.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

Test piles were driven over site of wall foundation to ascertain nature of river bottom; 39 vertical piles were driven, regulated and staylathed and foundation piles were located.

REMOVING FERRY-BRIDGE.

The old ferry-bridge at the foot of East One Hundredth street was broken up and removed.

East One Hundred and Second Street Section—Resolution of the Board, July 17, 1890.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

STONE FILLING.

318 cubic yards of rip-rap stone were deposited in front and rear of bulkhead wall by H. P. Sheridan, and 91 cubic yards of cobble stone were deposited on wall foundation by J. A. Bouker, under Treasurer's Orders therefor.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

139 vertical piles were driven, regulated and staylathed; foundation piles were located; piles were sawed off and backing logs were placed.

MASONRY.

8 concrete blocks were set; chain holes between blocks were filled with concrete in bags, and joints in granite were cleaned out and pointed.

WORK OF CONSTRUCTION NOT UNDER NEW PLAN.

Bulkhead One Hundred and Thirty-eighth to One Hundred and Fortieth Streets, H. R.

14,438 loads of filling were received, under Secretary's Order No. 11226, and same were placed behind the bulkhead at the above premises. In progress.

DEPARTMENT YARDS.

West Fifty-seventh Street Yard.

The blacksmith has done ironwork for the different sections of the work; for floating property and for general repairs.

Molds and cores were stripped and 3 special base blocks, containing 102 cubic yards and 13 1/2 bulkhead-wall blocks, containing 472.98 cubic yards, were made.

1,500 barrels of Portland cement were received and stored and samples tested and recorded. Samples from 500 barrels of Portland cement received at East Seventeenth Street Yards were tested and recorded.

Sand, cement and broken stone were issued to the various sections of the work.

The yard has been maintained in good order.

East Twenty-fourth Street Yard.

Ironwork was made and repaired by the blacksmith for the work of construction on the East river and for the new pier at the foot of East Twenty-fifth street.

2 standard concrete blocks were made, containing about 70 cubic yards of concrete.

The yard has been maintained in good order.

FLOATING PROPERTY.

The Floating Property of the Department consists of the following:

100-ton derrick "City of New York," 12-ton derrick No. 1, 12-ton derrick No. 2, 12-ton derrick No. 3, 10-ton derrick.

Tug "Manhattan."

Tug "Pier."

14 pile-drivers, Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13 and 14.

15 deck scows, "B," "C," "D," "E," "F," "H," "I," "K," "L," "M," "N," "O," "P," "R" and "S."

4 divers' scows, "A," "G," "N" and "S."

Boring machine "Woodcock."

Steam launch "Inspector."

Naphtha-engine launch.

29 yawl boats, 2 skiffs, 2 bateaux, 1 rowboat and 5 sounding-boats.

2 sets of land ways, one 30 feet high and one 45 feet high.

1 set 50 feet inclined pile-driver ways.

Rock-drilling machine with ways, 19 feet high.

100-ton derrick has handled blocks for the various sections of the bulkhead-wall, as required, and various repairs have been made by the crew and the same has been kept in good order and condition.

12-ton Derrick No. 1—This derrick has been in commission during the quarter, and has been repaired and used on the various sections of the work.

12-ton Derrick No. 2—This derrick has been in commission during the quarter, and has been repaired and used on the various sections of the work.

12-ton Derrick No. 3—This derrick has been in commission during the quarter, and has been repaired and used on the various sections of the work.

10-ton Derrick—This derrick has been in commission during the quarter, and has been used on the various sections of the work.

Tugs "Manhattan" and "Pier"—These tugs of the Department have been employed in the work of towing for the Department.

Naphtha-engine Launch—This launch has been used from time to time for examinations of the water-front, for carrying small parcels, tools, etc., to the different parts of the work.

Steam-launch "Inspector"—Various repairs have been made from time to time, and she has been kept in use during the quarter.

Divers' scows "A," "G," "N," and "S"—Have been kept in good order.

The deck scows have been kept in almost constant use.

The small boats, skiffs, etc., have been kept in good order and condition.

Materials and Supplies.

Various materials and supplies for the use of floating property have been received and expended in part and the remainder has been stored for future use, as required.

Miscellaneous.

Various pieces of work have been done at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard for the use of floating property, and for other work, such as hanging fenders for scows, straight edges, ladders, signs, pike poles, etc. The force of floating property has also been employed in filing saws, spinning oakum, pitch, pumping out scows and in general care of floating property.

PLACING OF MATERIAL FROM DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING.

During the icy weather, large quantities of the material of the Street Cleaning Department were placed at the following-named premises, temporarily, and only until the river would permit the passage of scows in taking the material to sea. Nearly all of the material has been removed during the quarter:

Thirtieth street, North river; Fifty-fifth street, North river; Seventy-ninth street, North river; Bulkhead, Ninety-seventh to Ninety-eighth street, North river; Burling slip, East river; Rutgers slip, East river; One Hundred and Tenth street, Harlem river; and Lincoln avenue, Harlem river.

SURVEYING PARTY.

In connection with the construction of the bulkhead or river wall and the new piers at the different sections on the North, East and Harlem rivers, bench marks and base lines have been frequently verified, and from them lines, grades, etc., have been furnished from time to time, as required.

Lines, grades, etc., have also been furnished for the work of repairs under contract. Surveys of the water-front on the North, East and Harlem rivers, and the structures thereon, have been made at various places, as required, and the same have been plotted and placed on file, and tracings therefrom have been prepared and reported.

11,929 disk soundings to ascertain the depth of water have been taken in 96 slips, and 3,418 rod soundings to ascertain the depth of soft mud have been taken in 40 slips by the surveying and sounding parties, of which 3,403 disk soundings in 40 slips and 497 rod soundings in 12 slips were on the North river, and 6,526 disk soundings in 30 slips and 2,921 rod soundings in 14 slips were on the East and Harlem rivers.

Of the above, 2,366 disk soundings in 14 slips and 2,488 rod soundings in 6 slips were for construction, and 4,958 disk soundings in 28 slips and 930 rod soundings in 25 slips were for general repairs and examinations—soundings taken before and after dredging.

Of the soundings herein reported, 4,605 disk soundings in 43 slips were taken on the North and East rivers.

Most of the soundings have been plotted and placed on file.

All of the dredging done by the Department of Docks during the quarter has been supervised.

Dredging done by lessees, claimants and others, under permit of the Board of Docks, has been supervised.

The measurements of all material dredged by the Department of Docks has been done.

Reports, estimates, etc., of work done have been prepared and receipts given.

Work other than dredging by lessees, claimants and others, by order or permit of the Board of Docks, has been supervised.

The automatic tide gauges on the North river, Port Morris, Pier "A" and West Fifty-seventh Street Yard have been attended to.

The minutes of the meeting held the 18th instant, were read and approved.

Leander N. Lovell, agent of the Old Colony Steamboat Company, appeared, and accepted on behalf of said company the offer of the Board of December 24, 1891, for the purchase of 178 feet of bulkhead between Piers, old 28 and 29, North river, for the sum of \$500 per front foot, and agreed to submit an acceptance of said offer duly executed by his company to the Board at its next meeting.

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to proceed with the construction of sufficient concrete blocks for the bulkhead or river-wall between the northerly side of Pier, old 28, North river, and the northerly side of Pier, old 29, North river, a distance of about two hundred and fifty-three feet, and also that he be and hereby is directed to proceed with the construction of about two hundred and fifty-three feet of said bulkhead or river-wall, between the northerly side of Pier, old 28, North river, and the northerly side of Pier, old 29, North river; and that all the work hereby ordered, be performed otherwise than by contract, as provided for by section 714 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, and that it be done by the force of the Department by day's work, except so much of the labor and material as is now or may hereafter be contracted for, and that all the material and dredging necessary for the above-mentioned work of the wall, not heretofore contracted for, or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

On motion, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

An approximate estimate of the cost of the building is also to be submitted.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.
