DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks, held Friday, April 28, 1899, at 2 o'clock P. M.
Present—The full Board.
The minutes of the meeting held Friday, April 21, 1899, were approved.
Representatives of the Harlem Board of Commerce appeared in relation to the setting aside of the Pier at the foot of West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street for the landing of steamboats plying upon the Hudson river.
Henry E. Howland, attorney, appeared on behalf of William Turner in relation to securing a berth for coal boats at the Pier to be built at the foot of East Twenty-second street. He was informed that every possible facility would be afforded his client in the carrying on of his business.
The following communications were again tabled for one week:
From the Corporation Counsel—Transmitting corrected form of lease to the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company of Piers, new 44 and 45, North river, together with bulkhead between same.
From the Cunard Steamship Company—Requesting the consent of this Department to the assignment of the lease of Pier, new 40, North river, with adjoining bulkheads.
From the White Star Line—Requesting the consent of this Department to the assignment of lease of Piers 44 and 45, North river, with adjoining bulkheads.
From the Old Dominion Steamship Company—Requesting additional wharfage facilities on the North river.
From William P. Clyde & Co.—Submitting application for wharfage facilities on the North river.
The communication from the Pacific Mail Steamship Company, requesting a renewal lease of Pier, new 34, North river, with adjoining bulkhead, was tabled for one week.
The communication from John Wagner, requesting renewal permit to maintain boat-house at the foot of West One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, North river, was referred to the Treasurer.
The communication from Andrew Marshall, requesting permission to construct boat-house, shed and runway north of One Hundred and Sixty-third street, North river, was referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.
The following communications were referred to the Treasurer and Commissioner Meyer:
From the Secretary—In relation to the expiration of lease of the franchise of the ferry from the foot of Grand street, Borough of Manhattan, to the foot of Broadway, Borough of Brooklyn.
From the Old Dominion Steamship Company—Requesting that Pier, new 26, North river, be extended out to the pierhead line of 1897; also requesting a renewal lease of said Pier with adjoining bulkheads.
The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board:
Merchants' and Tanners' Line, to maintain scale at Pier, old 42, North river.
R. W. Cameron & Co., to maintain engine-house, tally-house and tool-box on Pier 9, East river.
John Downs, to maintain tally-house on Pier 9, East river.
Harlem and Morrisania Consolidated Transportation Line, to maintain shed and tally-house on Pier 22, East river.
New York and Norwalk Steamboat Company, to maintain sheds and tally-houses on Pier 23, East river.
E. C. Strong & Co., to maintain small covered shed in front of their oyster boat at Fulton Market, East river.
Charles S. Murray, to maintain watchman's house on the bulkhead south of the Pier foot of North Second street, Borough of Brooklyn.
The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:
Central Hudson Steamboat Company, to cut two new gangways on Pier, new 24, North river, and to close the existing gangways thereat.
Robert M. Ferris, to dredge in the slip between Piers 17 and 18, East river.
Gas Engine and Power Company and Charles L. Seabury & Co., Consolidated, to dredge on each side of their marine railway at Morris Heights, Harlem river.
Union Ferry Company, to dredge in the slip at the foot of Sackett street, Borough of Brooklyn.
Bernard Brady, to improve his property between Front and Prospect streets, Stapleton, Staten Island, in accordance with plans and specifications to be hereafter submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief; all structures that may be erected under this permit to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board.
The following permits were granted to continue during the pleasure of the Board, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:
Walter P. Delmour, to erect a boat-house about 10 by 12 feet northerly of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, North river, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.
Young Men's Christian Association, to erect a boat-house near the foot of Bryant street, Borough of The Bronx.
William H. Williams, to erect a pile platform on his property at Steinway, Long Island, and to fill in the basin in the rear of same, in accordance with plans to be hereafter submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.
J. F. Schmadeke, to erect a coal pocket, tower and derrick between Sackett and Union streets, Gowanus canal, Borough of Brooklyn, in accordance with plans to be first submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.
The Bush Company, Limited, to construct a shed on its Pier at Forty-second street, Borough of Brooklyn, in accordance with plans and specifications to be hereafter submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.
The following communications were ordered on file:
From the Comptroller—Advising that his certificates have been indorsed upon Contract No. 651 for the construction of a steel propeller, and Contract No. 652 for dredging at Rutgers slip, East river, and that same are now valid contracts.
From the Corporation Counsel—
1st. Returning printer's proof of Contract No. 654 for building a new wooden pier at the foot of Rutgers slip, East river, with certain amendments made therein. Secretary directed to request the Corporation Counsel to advise the Board as to the manner of executing contracts in the future.
2d. Transmitting approved form of bond in connection with the assignment of the lease of Pier, new 38, North river, to be executed by the Southern Pacific Company, in accordance with resolution adopted March 24, 1899. Secretary directed to transmit said form of bond to the Southern Pacific Company for execution.
3d. In relation to the communication from F. A. Freeman as to the construction of a sewer at Freeman avenue, Long Island City.
4th. In relation to recovering possession of the south half of the Pier foot of Eighth street and the north half of the Pier foot of Seventh street, East river.
5th. Advising that the matter of collecting wharfage at the bulkhead foot of Dock street, Borough of Brooklyn, has been referred to the Brooklyn office of the Law Department for attention.
From the Department of Correction—Transmitting copy of report from the Consulting Engineer of the Board of Public Improvements in relation to repairs required to the landing stage at Riker's Island. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make the necessary repairs thereto.
From the Department of Water Supply—In relation to the placing of fire-hydrants along the westerly side of West street, between West Eleventh and Gansevoort streets, North river.

From the Department of Highways—In relation to the regulating, grading and paving of Tompkins street, between Stanton and East Fourth streets, and at the foot of Fourth street, East river.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—
1st. Protesting against the action of the Board in refusing to grant permission for the erection of a wooden dumping-board on the Pier foot of East Seventeenth street, together with the report of the Engineer-in-Chief in relation thereto. Secretary directed to transmit copy of said report to the Commissioner of Street Cleaning.

2d. Requesting that dredging be ordered in front of the new Pier at Riker's Island, East river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to prepare requisition and the Treasurer authorized to issue order for the necessary dredging thereat.

From the Chief of Engineers, U. S. A.—Advising that the modification of the bulkhead-line on the East river, between East Twenty-third and East Twenty-fourth streets, in accordance with the resolution adopted by this Board March 10, 1899, was approved by the Secretary of War on April 17, 1899. Secretary directed to transmit a copy of the map showing said modification to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their approval.

From Rollins & Rollins, attorneys for the estate of John Roach—Requesting that no action be taken at present on their application for a lease of the Pier foot of East Ninth street and of the south half of the Pier foot of East Tenth street.

From the Knickerbocker Steam Towage Company—Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted April 21, 1899, agreeing to lease to them Pier, new 1, North river. Secretary directed to request the Corporation Counsel to prepare the necessary form of lease.

From P. H. Flynn—Advising that the work of dredging at the foot of Delancey street, East river, has been completed.

From the Patten Line—Requesting that repairs be made to the sheathing on the Pier foot of Little West Twelfth street. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make the necessary repairs thereto.

From David McClure, attorney—Offering for sale the property of the heirs of Margaret W. Chanler, deceased, between Fourteenth and Fifteenth streets, Tenth avenue and the North river, for the sum of \$850,000. Offer rejected.

From W. F. Russell—Requesting permission to occupy berth for the steamer "Republic" at the Pier foot of West Thirty-fourth street on the days of the international yacht races. Application granted, compensation for the privilege to be fixed by the Treasurer.

From John J. Hopper—Requesting that the permit for the southerly half of the Pier foot of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, North river, be transferred to Farrell & Hopper. Application granted.

From John Groppe—Requesting renewal permit for derrick on the Pier foot of North Second street, Borough of Brooklyn. Application denied, said pier having been set aside for recreation purposes.

From the North and East River Steamboat Company—Requesting that a sluiceway be cut on the east side of Pier, new 32, East river, for the purpose of facilitating their business thereat. Engineer-in-Chief directed to cut said sluiceway and to report the cost thereof for collection from said company.

From the President—Transmitting copy of communication from the Staten Island Chamber of Commerce suggesting certain improvements in the ferry and transportation facilities between Whitehall street and Staten Island. Secretary directed to notify the Staten Island Rapid Transit Company and the Staten Island Chamber of Commerce that a hearing in relation to the ferry facilities will be given by the Board on Friday, May 5, 1899, at 2 o'clock P. M.

From the Treasurer and Commissioner Meyer—
1st. Recommending that the application of the Hudson Subway Company for permission to construct a tunnel at the foot of Dey street, North river, be denied. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that the application of the Consolidated Gas Company for a lease of the bulkhead between Ninety-eighth and Ninety-ninth streets, North river, be denied. Recommendation adopted.

3d. In relation to the application of the Brooklyn Ferry Company of New York of March 3, 1899.

On motion, said report was approved, and the recommendations contained therein adopted, as follows:

1. That the Department of Docks and Ferries build the Twenty-second street Pier, as ordered by the Board March 3, 1899.

2. That the Department of Docks and Ferries cancel the existing lease of the Twenty-second street bulkhead, as the proposed permanent improvement entirely removes that bulkhead.

3. That the application of the Ferry Company to occupy the north side of the Twenty-second street Pier for a ferry rack without charge, be denied, but that a reasonable compensation be charged therefor.

4. That permit be granted to the Ferry Company, at its own expense, to extend the lower bridge and slip of the ferry running from Twenty-third street to Broadway, Brooklyn, and to extend the middle "A" Pier of said ferry.

5. That the lease of the ground under water of the ferry running from Twenty-third street to Broadway, Brooklyn, be cancelled, as the contemplated improvement to be made by the Department covers all this land under water.

6. That a permit be granted the Ferry Company to build a new slip on the north side of Twenty-third street Pier, outboard end, for the purpose of operating its ferry from Twenty-third street to Greenpoint, and to remove the waiting-room from the lower end of the side structure of the ferry running from Twenty-third street to Broadway, and to replace same on the Twenty-third street Pier, to be used as a waiting-room for the ferry running from Twenty-third street to Greenpoint.

7. That the application of the Ferry Company to use the north wall for storing its ferry boats, without charge, from the intersecting line of the north side of Twenty-third street to the bulkhead, be denied.

8. That permit be granted the Ferry Company to build, at its own expense, a platform from the rear of the permanent slip to the intersecting wall.

9. That the application of the Ferry Company to pay no rental while the bulkhead-wall is under construction be denied.

10. That a new lease be granted the Ferry Company to operate a ferry from Twenty-third street to Greenpoint, as suggested in section 6 of this report, and that the amount of compensation for said ferry from Twenty-third street to Greenpoint be fixed at a yearly sum of \$16,750; and that simultaneously with the cancellation of the old lease to operate the ferry from Twenty-third street to Greenpoint, the new lease to operate the ferry from the point mentioned in section 6 of this report be granted.

From the Treasurer—
1st. Recommending that the application of the Raritan Transportation Company for a lease of Pier, new 1, North river, be denied, the premises having already been leased. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that the application of the John P. Kane Company for permission to use and occupy the southerly side of the Pier foot of East Ninety-fifth street be placed on file, said company having made other arrangements. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that the application of the Lehigh Valley Transportation Company for permission to remove its platform from the bulkhead north of Pier, old 56½, to the bulkhead adjoining the south side of the Pier at the foot of Gansevoort street, North river, be denied, the premises in question having been set aside for use as an oyster basin. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Recommending that the application of the Bridgeport Steamboat Company for a lease of the Pier foot of Catharine street, East river, be denied. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Recommending that the application of the New Jersey Steamboat Company for a lease of the Pier foot of Watts street, North river, be denied. Recommendation adopted.

6th. Recommending that the application of the Old Colony Steamboat Company for a modification of the resolution adopted March 10, 1899, in relation to the rental to be charged for the land under water covered by the extension to Pier, old 28, North river, be denied. Recommendation adopted.

7th. Recommending that the application of I. C. Dieffenbach for permission to berth the steamer "Northport" on the north side of the Pier foot of East Twenty-fourth street be denied. Recommendation adopted.

8th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the Citizens' Steamboat Company for the privilege of berthing the steamer "Holmdel" at Pier, old 42, North river, be fixed at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

9th. Recommending that the application of W. A. Skinkle for permission to erect an addition to the boat-house foot of West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, North river, be denied. Recommendation adopted.

10th. Recommending that the communication from the Mayor, dated January 24, 1898, in relation to the resolution adopted by the Board of Trade and Transportation as to the deepening

of the harbor channels, be placed on file, a bill authorizing such work having been passed by the last Congress. Recommendation adopted.

11th. Recommending that the application of C. L. Rickerson for permission to use and occupy the bulkhead between Piers, new 41 and 42, North river, be denied, said bulkhead having already been leased. Recommendation adopted.

12th. Recommending that the application of the New York Central Coal Company for permission to use and occupy the bulkhead between East Sixty-second and East Sixty-third streets be denied, said company having abandoned its idea of using the premises. Recommendation adopted.

13th. Recommending that permission be granted M. Conklin to maintain watchman's house at the Pier foot of West Eighteenth street during the pleasure of the Board, provided the consent of the lessee is obtained. Recommendation adopted.

14th. Recommending that the application of Joseph Cornell for permission to use and occupy a berth at Pier, old 58½, North river, be denied, a permit having been granted for a berth on the northerly side of the Pier foot of West Thirteenth street. Recommendation adopted.

15th. Recommending that permission be granted Charles W. Davis to berth the steamer "Mary Gordon" at Pier, new 32, East river, during the pleasure of the Board, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

From the Dock Superintendent—

1st. Report for the week ending April 22, 1899.

2d. Recommending that permission be granted M. Biglin to erect a hoisting mast on the Pier foot of East Eighty-sixth street during the pleasure of the Board, the hoisting mast to be for public use and to be located so as not to interfere with the mooring of vessels at said pier. Recommendation adopted.

From Dock Master Harrison, reporting repairs required to Pier, new 6, East river, and to the pavement at the approach thereto. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make the necessary repairs to said premises.

From Dock Master Hennessy, reporting repairs required to the bulkhead foot of East Fifty-fourth street; to the Pier foot of East Sixtieth street; to the bulkhead platform between East Sixtieth and East Sixty-first streets; to the Pier foot of East Sixty-first street; to the bulkhead platform between East Sixty-first and East Sixty-second streets; to the Pier foot of East Sixty-second street; to the bulkhead foot of East Seventy-fifth street; to the bulkhead foot of East Seventy-sixth street, and to the bulkhead and platform at the foot of East Seventy-ninth street. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make the necessary repairs thereto.

From Dock Master Bollas, reporting repairs required to the bulkhead north of Union street bridge, Gowanus canal, Borough of Brooklyn. Secretary directed to notify the owners to make the necessary repairs thereto, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Report for the week ending April 22, 1899.

2d. Reporting damage to Pier, new 48, North river, and recommending that the lessees be directed to make the necessary repairs thereto. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that he be directed to clear the marginal street between Fiftieth and Fifty-seventh streets, North river, and to place drain-boxes thereat, where necessary. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Recommending that repairs be made to the deck sheathing on Pier, new 43, North river. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Recommending the cancellation of the lease of the bulkhead between East Seventeenth and East Eighteenth streets in order to facilitate the work of improvement thereat.

On motion, the following preambles and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, In and by an agreement made the first day of July, 1898, by and between The City of New York, by the Board of Docks, party of the first part, and Murray & Co., parties of the second part, all and singular the wharfage which may arise, accrue or become due for the use and occupation, in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, of all that certain public wharf property situated on the East river, in the Borough of Manhattan, The City of New York, County of Kings, known and described as follows, to wit: Bulkhead between Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets, East river, Borough of Manhattan, about one hundred and eighty-two feet, was leased for a term of one year and ten months from July 1, 1898, together with the right to enter upon the said wharf property for the purposes of this lease, and to collect the said wharfage; and

Whereas, In and by said lease the parties of the second part covenant and agree that if, at any time during the term hereby created, the said Board of Docks shall determine to proceed with the work of building or rebuilding wharves, piers, bulkheads, basins, docks or slips within a section or district of the water front, which shall include the wharf property hereinbefore described, according to any plan or plans now adopted and approved, and pursuant to any existing or future law, and if the said Board shall determine that, for the purpose of such building or rebuilding, it will be necessary to terminate the interest of the parties of the second part in the wharfage to arise, accrue or become due from the said wharf property, or from any part thereof, or if, at any time during the term hereby created, the said Board of Docks shall determine that the said wharf property, or any part thereof, shall be used for some other purpose than for the purpose of the collection of wharfage, and that it will be necessary to terminate the interest of the parties of the second part in such wharfage, then upon the receipt by the said parties of the second part of written notice of a resolution of the said Board of Docks to that effect, describing the wharf property, or the part thereof affected thereby, the interest of the said parties of the second part in said wharfage and in the said wharf property, or part thereof under this lease, shall be thereby terminated, and the rent hereby reserved shall cease from the date of the receipt of such notice, and no claim for damages or compensation in favor of said parties of the second part by reason of the termination of such interest in said wharfage or wharf property, or for damages or injury to any steam or sailing vessel, or water craft moored thereto, or on, in or about the same, or to or on account of any structures or improvements that may have been erected or made by said parties of the second part, or by any person or persons whomsoever;

Resolved, That the said Board of Docks hereby determines to proceed with the work of building and rebuilding wharves, piers, bulkheads, basins, docks or slips within the section or district of the water front of The City of New York, between East Seventeenth and East Twenty-fourth streets, on the East river, which said district includes the wharf property hereinbefore described, according to the plan of the Board of Docks adopted December 17, 1888, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund December 19, 1888; and further

Resolved, That the said Board of Docks hereby determines that, for the purpose of such building and rebuilding, it will be necessary to terminate the interest of Murray & Co., the said parties of the second part in said lease mentioned, in the wharfage to arise, accrue or become due from the said wharf property, or from any part thereof; and be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Docks hereby terminates the interest of Murray & Co., the said parties of the second part in said lease mentioned, said termination to take effect May 8, 1899.

Resolved, That a copy of these preambles and resolutions, terminating the interest of said Murray & Co., the said parties of the second part in said lease mentioned, be served upon said Murray & Co.

Resolved, That the permit granted Murray & Co. to maintain a dumping-board on the bulkhead between Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets, East river, be and hereby is revoked, to take effect May 8, 1899.

6th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 19041, in relation to the modification of the lines along the westerly shore of Riker's Island.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That this Board recommends to the Secretary of War that the bulkhead and pierhead line on the westerly side of Riker's Island, as established by the Secretary of War, January 9, 1891, be and hereby is modified so as to extend from the angle in the bulkhead and pierhead line at the southwesterly corner of Riker's Island north seventeen degrees forty-five minutes west along the bulkhead and pierhead line, as heretofore established, to within fifty feet of the next course; thence to run exterior to on lines parallel with and fifty feet from the bulkhead and pierhead line heretofore established to the northerly end of the course which bears north eight degrees thirty minutes east; thence in a straight line to the angle in the bulkhead and pierhead line at the northerly end of Riker's Island, as heretofore established.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Murphy, submitted his report of receipts for the week ending April 28, 1899, amounting to \$37,864.65, which was received and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:
