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### BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.

The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York met at the office of the Board, No. 21 Park row, on Wednesday, April 10, at 2 o'clock P.M., pursuant to notice.

The roll was called and the following members were present and answered to their names: The Comptroller (Deputy Comptroller Levey), the Commissioner of Water Supply (Deputy Commissioner Haslin), the Commissioner of Highways (Deputy Commissioner Shannon), the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, the Commissioner of Sewers, the Commissioner of Bridges, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond.

The President, Hon. Maurice F. Holahan, presided.

The minutes of the meeting of April 3, 1901, were approved as printed.

#### CHANGE OF GRADES IN SEVENTY-FOURTH STREET, BROOKLYN.

The following report from the Chief Topographical Engineer was read, and the matter was referred to the Local Board:

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU, April 8, 1901.

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, *Secretary, Board of Public Improvements*:

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, recommending the change of grade of Seventy-fourth street at Tenth avenue, from the present elevation of 80 feet to an elevation of 84.3 feet, and the introduction of a crown in the grade of said street 330 feet east of the easterly line of Fort Hamilton avenue; said crown to have an elevation of 92.2 feet above high-water datum, I submit herewith a map or plan entitled "Plan and profile showing change of grade in Seventy-fourth street, from Seventh avenue to Twelfth avenue, in the Thirtieth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York," and recommend that the matter be referred to the Local Board for a revised resolution, because the requested change from Tenth avenue to Fort Hamilton avenue affects the street between Seventh avenue and Twelfth avenue.

The change of grade at the intersection of Eleventh avenue became necessary in order to have the proper fall between Tenth avenue and Eleventh avenue, on account of fixing the grade at Tenth avenue intersection as 84.3 feet above high water.

#### APPROACH TO DELANCEY STREET BRIDGE, MANHATTAN.

The following report from the Chief Topographical Engineer was placed on file:

NEW YORK, April 4, 1901.

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, *Secretary, Board of Public Improvements*:

SIR—The Topographical Bureau submitted a report to the Board of Public Improvements on March 6, 1901, describing the different sketches which were made for the laying out of approaches to the entrance of the New East River Bridge at Delancey and Norfolk streets, and investigations were made since to ascertain the assessed valuation and the market value of the property to be taken by the different projects.

The following list was prepared, which includes not alone the complete lots when they fall entirely within the lines, but also the full value of a lot if only part of the same is to be taken:

- Project No. 1—Diagonal approach from Sixth street to Bowery; estimated valuation of buildings and land, as given by the Tax Department, \$2,712,000.
- Project No. 2—Widening of Delancey street, from Norfolk street to the Bowery, and Spring street, from Bowery to Elm street; taxable valuation, \$1,720,000.
- Project No. 3—Widening of Broome street, from Norfolk street to the Bowery; taxable valuation, \$1,016,300.
- Project No. 4—Widening of Norfolk street, from Broome to Hester street, respectively Division street; taxable valuation, \$453,000.

This statement relative to the probable cost of the land and buildings was prepared in order to counteract the wild statements of the newspapers, estimating the cost of the diagonal approach to the Bowery and Sixth street at from \$22,000,000 upwards, whilst the estimate, according to the records of the Tax Department, is only \$2,712,000 and the cost of construction probably not more than \$250,000, making a total expense of about \$2,962,000.

I also transmit a set of black prints showing the different projects relative to the proposed approaches to the New East River Bridge.

In reply, I inclose herewith a blue print showing changes of grades recommended for Atlantic avenue, and I also inclose a copy of the report of Deputy Commissioner Farrell, of the Borough of Brooklyn, on this subject.

DEAR SIR—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 30th ultimo, transmitting map showing the proposed change of grades in Logan street, between Atlantic avenue and Fulton street, and streets adjacent thereto. This change of grade is made in accordance with recommendations from this Department, under date of October 30, 1900, reporting on petition for the improvement of Logan street. Subsequent to that recommendation and on December 22, 1900, recommendation was made for change of grade of Atlantic avenue, which it was proposed to pave with granite blocks between Dresden street and Chestnut street. The plan submitted to the Topographical Bureau shows one or two slight changes on Atlantic avenue from the recommendation made by this Department. For instance, on Norwood avenue, recommendation was

made for a grade of 37.04 and the grade proposed on the accompanying plan is 36.80. At Conduit avenue I recommended 33.0 and this plan proposes 32.50.

Herewith I beg to submit blue print showing changes recommended for Atlantic avenue, and would request that the matter be submitted for the consideration of the Topographical Bureau.

DEAR SIR—Complying with the request made to me by a letter dated March 15 from the Secretary of the Board, I have the honor to submit the following report on the resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Nineteenth District, Borough of Manhattan, recommending that Manhattan street, from Columbus avenue to Twelfth avenue, be repaved with asphalt on the present foundation.

The estimated cost of repaving Manhattan street, from Columbus avenue to Twelfth avenue, with asphalt on the present pavement, including ten years' maintenance, is \$80,000.

This improvement cannot be recommended at the present time because of lack of funds.

In consequence of lack of funds I cannot recommend that the improvement be authorized.

Hon. JAMES KANE, *Commissioner of Sewers*:

DEAR SIR—Reporting upon the resolution of the Board of Local Improvements of the Eighteenth District of this borough, which recommends that the proper sewer connections be made on both sides of East Fifty-eighth street, between Sutton place (Avenue A) and the East river, I beg to say that there is no sewer in this short block, although a number of houses front thereon on the south side.

There is also no sewer in Avenue A, between Fifty-eighth and Fifty-ninth streets, although the whole block front, both sides, is covered with private houses. Both the street and the avenue should have public sewers, although the drainage of these houses is secured by private drains either directly into the river or into some nearby sewer; yet such means are not favored by the Health authorities, and every street should have a public sewer so that the proper sanitation of the neighborhood can be cared for by the public authorities.

I recommend therefore that the Board of Public Improvements be informed that public sewers are needed in both of the above-mentioned blocks, and that the proper resolutions shall be passed accordingly.

SIR—I transmit herewith, for adoption, a map or plan entitled, "Plan of drainage, showing location, size and grades of sewers in the Arrochar Watershed, designated Sewerage District No. 4A, in the Fourth Ward, Borough of Richmond, City of New York."

This map provides for the construction of sewers in Sea avenue, Duer avenue, Tompkins avenue and Railroad avenue, connecting with a new trunk sewer in Fingerboard road, New York avenue to Nautilus street, and outlet sewer in Nautilus street to New York Bay.

The area drained by this outlet sewer in Nautilus street, comprises 312 acres, and is bounded on the south by the United States Government Reservation and Richmond avenue; on the west by Sea avenue, McFarland place, Glen avenue, Sherman avenue and a line produced northerly to Maryland avenue; on the north by Maryland avenue, and on the east by New York Bay.

In connection with this plan of sewerage District No. 4A, I forward a general outline map showing the whole extent of the watershed of the Arrochar District for use of the Commissioner of Sewers.

This map shows the elevations taken by the Topographical Bureau, denotes the depressions in the district, and explains why the main outlet should be constructed in Nautilus street.

Sewer in Franklin street, from Woolsey street to Willow street.

—I have to state, that the filed plan of sewerage for the above streets has to be modified before the construction can be commenced, and I submit therefore, for adoption, a map or plan entitled: "Modified plan of drainage, showing location, size and grades of sewers in Sewerage Districts Nos. 4 'E,' 4 'G,' 4 'H,' 5 'B,' and 5 'C,' First Ward (formerly Long Island City), Borough of Queens, City of New York."

On this modified plan of drainage, 4 "E" and 5 "C" relate to Lathrop street; 4 "H" to Camelia street; 4 "G" to Blackwell street, and 5 "B" to Franklin street.

The sewer plan 4 "G," showing sewer in Blackwell street, from Graham avenue to Broadway, was requested by the Commissioner of Sewers in another communication, and the plan for the sewer in Pomeroy street, from Jamaica avenue to Broadway, is not included in the submitted map, because a radical change of the filed grade will have to be made before the sewer plans can be made.

I recommend, therefore, that the request for sewer in Pomeroy street be held in abeyance.

I return the maps from the Commissioner of Sewers, mentioned in the two communications; the one in relation to Camelia street and other streets, and the one in relation to Blackwell street, which had been referred at a meeting of the Board of Public Improvements on March 20, 1901.

The sewerage district plans, prepared in the Topographical Bureau, define the location and size of sewers alone. The grades of streets have no legal standing until a special map for the same, with block dimensions, has been approved and filed by the Board.

It is, therefore, not obligatory upon the Department of Sewers to adhere to the grades of the streets, and the existing surface of the street can be used for manholes or basins, if, in the opinion of the Commissioner of Sewers, it is expedient to leave them as they are until such time when the Department of Highways will grade the street to an established grade and raise or lower basins and manholes.

In the case of Jersey street, the sewer can be constructed without grading the street, and there is no doubt that the grading at the present time would be a hardship to the property-owners.

In addition, I wish to state, that the sewerage district maps are prepared in anticipation of petitions for these sewers, and that the construction of sewers can be taken up in such streets, which are tributary existing outlets.

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it extend to the wishes of the petitioners such favorable consideration and action as will enable the Queens County Water Supply Company to make full response to the requirements of the inhabitants along the aforesaid avenue, if embraced within the territory of its franchise, and as the terms thereof and the law in the matter may make obligatory so to do.

Also,

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, did submit to this, the Local Board thereof, at its meeting held March 15, 1901, petition of owners of real estate in (Wyckoff Heights) Second Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, that this Board recommend their desires for the adoption of a system of house numbering and the placing of signs on the corners of streets bearing the names thereof, as a prerequisite to the obtaining of free postal delivery in said section, together with the many other advantages which such system of numbers and the placing of street signs affords, as therein set forth; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Municipal Assembly, City of New York, that it give the subject matter of the petition such prompt consideration and action as will cause favorable response to be made to the requirements of the petitioners and residents in said section.

Also,

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, did at meeting of the Local Board of said borough, which was held January 4, 1901, submit for its consideration and action the petition of owners of real estate on Junction avenue, between Grove street and Cooke avenue, and in Cooke avenue, from Junction avenue to a point about three hundred and fifty feet westerly of said avenue, in (Elmhurst) Second Ward of aforesaid borough, asking that permit be granted to the Citizens' Water Supply Company to enable it to extend its water-mains in and along said streets from and to the points aforesaid; and

Whereas, Request was made on behalf of the petitioners at meeting of the Local Board held March 15, 1901, that its former action upon the foregoing be now modified, so as to confine its recommendation to the extending of water-mains within a more limited distance; now, in accordance therewith, it is hereby

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it take such action as will enable the Citizen's Water Supply Company to extend its water-mains in Junction avenue, from Grove street to Cooke avenue, a distance of 250 feet, in ward and borough aforementioned.

The original petition to lay out on map of Rockaway Beach, section of Borough of Queens, a new street between Bayview and Eldert avenues, from the Boulevard to Jamaica Bay, upon which public hearing was had on February 1, 1901, and thereupon referred to a "Committee"; since which another petition was filed limiting the new street to railroad crossing, instead of across same to the bay, and approved of by the Local Board on this March 15, 1901, was reported adversely upon by said "Committee," whereupon, motion was adopted that report as made be accepted, the "Committee" discharged, and the petition denied.

**THE FOLLOWING IS AN EXTRACT FROM** the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held Tuesday, February 19, 1901:

The Comptroller presented the following report and accompanying resolution relative to the redemption of six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, maturing July 1, 1901:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1899, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-restrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII. of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Whereas, Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), matures July 1, 1901, and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897;

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be unable to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of the City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:

#### CHAPTER 630.

AN ACT to authorize the extension of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

#### ADOPTED BY THE CITY.

Became a law April 23, 1900, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, a majority being present. The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for the comptroller of the city of New York, in his discretion, to provide for the extension of all or any part of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, as the same may from time to time mature. Certificates of stock or bonds so extended shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding ten and one-half per centum per annum, and shall be stamped across their face with the terms of such extension, which shall be for a period not exceeding twenty years.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately. Proposals will be received by the Comptroller at his office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, from the holders of six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, for extending the maturity of all or any part of the respective amounts of such stock held by them to the following dates:

JULY 1, 1917,  
JULY 1, 1918,  
JULY 1, 1919,  
JULY 1, 1920, and  
JULY 1, 1921.

Stock so extended will be payable in gold and will bear interest from July 1, 1901, at the rate of three and one-tenth (3 1/10) per cent. per annum, payable, also in gold, semi-annually, on the first day of January and of July in each year. The Comptroller proposes to apportion the amount of stock thus extended so that, as nearly as practicable, one-fifth of the whole amount extended shall be redeemable at each of the five maturity dates above mentioned.
