Hon. E. V. FROTHINGHAM, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—The following is a report of the business transacted by the Bureau of Sewers during the quarter ending June 30, 1911. In this report you will find statements relative to the construction of new sewers and alterations and improvements to old sewers, and work of repairing sewers where such work was too great to be undertaken by a laboring force. Also statement of work done by Mechanics and Laborers.

The present mileage of the sewer system is 525.54 miles, including culvert connections from catch basins to sewer. In connection with this mileage there are 6,386 receiving basins.

During the past quarter 2,836 feet of sewers were added to the sewer system and 8 receiving basins. This is considerably above the reports for the last quarter; still it shows that the system in this Borough is gradually being completed. The above number of feet represents new work, which adds to the mileage of the system.

The amount of sewer work done under the title of "Alteration and Improvement" and "Reconstruction" amounts to 1,402 feet.

During the quarter the following contracts for sewer work were advertised and let:

Extension to barrel sewer under pier at 36th street, North River.
Alteration and improvement to sewer in 72d street, between Amsterdam and Columbus avenues.

Receiving basin on the northwest corner of 167th street and Audubon avenue.

Reconstruction of sewer in 8th street, between University place and Greene street.

Three sewers have been finished during the last quarter, namely: Outlet sewer from Haven avenue to Riverside drive, in Haven avenue from Fort Washington avenue to summit north of 171st street; alteration and improvement to sewer in 83d street, between 2d and 3d avenues; and alteration and improvement to sewer in 75th street, between 4th and 5th avenues.

The latter two contracts were made in response to complaints of citizens as to the faulty condition of the old pipe sewer then in existence. This class of work has been in progress for many years. The sewers which we are called upon to change are those which were laid in the latter '60's and early '70's with the materials and according to the methods in vogue at that day, and we find that after 40 years or more of service these sewers are incapable of performing the duty required of them at the present time.

Another sewer which has been finished, although not accepted, is the construction of a barrel sewer under the pier at the foot of 40th street and the Hudson River, extending to the outer end of the pier. This work was undertaken to remedy one of the greatest nuisances existing in New York Harbor. A number of slaughter houses are in operation in this neighborhood, the refuse from same is discharged into the sewer, which in turn discharges it into the river. Conditions are improved somewhat when it is carried far out from the bulkhead line, but wherever discharged it befoils the water of the river and is one of the chief contributors to the polluted condition of these waters, about which there has been so much criticism of late. Some treatment on shore, before such refuse reaches the river or the bay, is much needed.

The work in progress now amounts in money value to \$132,960, which is about the same as reported for the previous quarter.

With some few exceptions, the principal work of the Bureau in the lower part of the City is the alteration and improvement of old pipe sewers which have outlived their usefulness. We are daily in receipt of letters and petitions calling for changes in this class of work.

In the matter of improving the conditions at the river front, I might mention such works as the extension of the outlet sewer at 79th street and the East River and the extension of sewer at 36th street and the North River; also the contemplated extension of sewer at 129th street and the Hudson River, Market street; East River, and Albany street. Hudson River.

Perhaps the most important thing to report is that the new separate system, which it is the intention to establish in certain parts of the City, is now about to be installed in a small territory in the northerly end of the same, namely, the territory north of 15th street and west of Broadway, reaching to the Harlem Ship Canal. Contracts for sanitary sewers and storm sewers have been prepared and are now ready to be let for such work in 218th street, between Broadway and Park Terrace West. We have also engaged in the work of preparation, a similar work in Park Terrace East, between 218th street and a point 100 feet south of 215th street.

A sewer system on this plan for the territory above mentioned has been filed and as soon as the streets are regulated and graded this system will be installed in all the streets.

This completes the layout of the sewer system in all the territory in this Borough, excepting one small area, which is yet unimproved and unmapped, namely, what is known as Inwood Hill, being a high ridge which extends from Dyckman street north to the Ship Canal and bounded on the east by Seaman avenue and on the west by the Hudson river. I am informed that the work of laying out this territory so as to have it form a part of the City map is now in progress, so that in some future day we will be called upon to supply the same with a system of sewers. Office of District Prison, New York, October 5, 1911.

Hon. PATRICK A. WHITNEY, Commissioner, Department of Correction:

Dear Sir—I respectfully transmit herewith a quarterly report of improvements and other work done at District Prisons for the three months ending September 30, 1911.

At Second District Prison extensive repairs to boilers and general overhauling of plumbing work was done by staff, the material thereto, such as iron pipes and general plumbing supplies, was furnished by the Department. The work of overhauling and placing in first-class serviceable condition a Fairbanks-Morse pump, situated in engine room, has been practically completed. Considerable glazing and minor carpenter repairs were done throughout the prison. Some of the electrical appliances were changed in accordance to the recommendations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. This work was done under the supervision of the Department Electrician.

At Fourth District Prison considerable work of general repairs to plumbing was done by staff; by paid labor was done the installation of new iron grill doors. This work was done upon the recommendation sent to you heretofore and approved by you for the prevention of fire. In addition to making this building more fireproof a number of fire extinguishers were provided and are placed in different parts of the prison.

Considerable repairs to the electric lighting system have been done, new fuses, wherever necessary, have been adjusted, and all such work was done under the supervision of the Department Electrician and by recommendation of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

At Fifth District Prison considerable repairs were done by staff to the heating pipes and radiators, the same have been overhauled and valves repacked and made ready for setting in of the cold weather. The prison has been renovated on the inside and outside. The exterior of the prison has received a coat of white paint; also the bars have been painted with a light color. The installing of a new Croton supply pipe from street to prison has been one of the improvements done by paid labor, also upon the recommendation of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity the tank on roof received a new stop-cock, preventing same from overflowing, thereby creating a saving in the water supply.

At Seventh District Prison considerable work was done in plumbing repairs, the material thereto being furnished by the Department, and the work was done by staff; new bricks and grate were installed in kitchen range, new circulation pipe on hot water line in female prison. Installing of a hot water line to storeroom, putting in new plumbing supplies on circulation line in laundry; cleaning out toilet line in male prison, cleaning out wash line in laundry and making general repairs to faucets, gas jets throughout the prison; adjusting new brass globe holders on jets, wherever necessary. Overhauled and repaired sewer in cellar, cleaning out same and restoring the disturbed surface with a new layer of concrete.

The female prisoners transferred from the Workhouse to the District Prisons to serve their sentences are employed in cleaning, scrubbing, cooking and doing laundry work in the institutions.

The male prisoners are employed in cleaning, painting, cooking, plumbing and general utility work.

Attached herewith you will find statement showing the disposition of prisoners received for the three months ending September 30, 1911; also the amounts of moneys collected from fines and telephone charges from prisoners committed by the City Magistrates and paid over to the City Chamberlain and Department of Health Pension Fund. Branch Workhouse, Rikers Island.

By the prisoners employed at outdoor labor the following was accomplished: One hundred and fifty cubic yards of earth was removed from the bank and used to grade off the eastern end of the island.

The lawns have been cared for, the grass cut and weeds destroyed. From the farm the following vegetables were obtained: 1,100 ears of corn, 200 quarts of green peas, 8 bushels lima beans, 15 bushels string beans, 10 barrels turnips, 300 bushels tomatoes, 12 bushels beets, 15 bushels spinach, 4,250 heads cabbage, 500 heads lettuce, 125 bunches leeks, 500 bunches radishes, 6 barrels onions, 11 barrels carrots and 9 barrels parsnips. Of these the following were sent to the Storekeeper on Blackwells Island: 1,000 heads cabbage, 500 heads lettuce, 6 bushels string beans, 16 crates tomatoes, 24 dozen corn, 25 bunches radishes, 3 bushels butter beans, 3 dozen cucumbers.

The roads have been kept in good condition, and men have been employed caring for the beach, gathering driftwood, refuse, etc.

All necessary repairs have been made to the launch "Sweep."

Carpenters—Made 3 outside toilets for prisoners, using 25 9-inch W. P. boards and 15 pounds nails; made 1 oil shed, using 50 9-inch W. P. boards and 20 pounds nails; put new floor in 2 stalls of stable, using old 2-inch lumber; put front in wooden cart, using 1½-inch lumber; repaired stoop at rear of mess hall, using 5 9-inch W. P. boards and 2 pounds nails; repaired 10 wheelbarrows; Dormitory No. 1, put in 4 lights of glass and 4 sash cords; Dormitory No. 2, put in 4 lights of glass and 1 sash cord; Dormitory No. 3, put in 6 lights of glass; Dormitory No. 4, put in 2 lights of glass; mess hall, put in 6 lights of glass and 3 sash cords; Keepers' quarters, put in 3 lights of glass and 2 sash cords; sharpened 10 axes, 6 saws and 5 hatchets.

Blacksmiths—Shod 18 horses, straightened out iron guard rail and put same back on stern of launch "Sweep," repaired 3 pumps for launch, repaired 12 chains, repaired 9 wheelbarrows, sharpened 90 picks, 56 wedges, 56 bars, 2 spike holes and 2 ice hooks.

Tinsmiths and Plumbers—Made and put up 16 feet of leader on Dormitory No. 1; made and put up 14 feet of leader on Dormitory No. 2; made and put up two leaders on Dormitory No. 3, each 16 feet long; made and put up two leaders on Keepers' quarters, each 18 feet long; repaired roof of Keepers' quarters, using 3 sheets of tin, 1 pound of solder and 5 pounds roofing nails; repaired roof of mess hall, using 5 sheets of tin, 1½ pounds solder and 2 pounds roofing nails; repaired roof of Dormitories Nos. 1 and 2, using 8 sheets of tin and 4½ pounds solder; repaired 3 faucets in bathroom of Dormitory No. 2; put 4 washers on faucets in Keepers' quarters; repaired 26 pots and 16 pans.

Laundry—Washed 1,250 summer shirts, 1,250 summer pants, 1,400 pairs of socks, 600 cot bottoms, 1,500 hand towels and 800 pillow slips.

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Health of Inmates.

The general health of the inmates has been good and no serious case of acute disease has occurred in the last three months. The following are the number of cases treated: Impaired heart, 2; eczema, 7; fever, 3; acne, 2; venereal, 3; favus, 1; rheumatic, 3; common cold, 7; colitis, 1; contusion and bruises, 4; scabies, 1; hip disease, 1; diarrhoea and colic, 9; sprain, 3; piles, 1; boils and pimples, 2; constipation, 8; observation, 1; total, 69. A large number of treatments were given at the morning clinic for epilepsy, venereal, enuresis, skin rashes, oral conditions, colds and many minor conditions.

Spiritual Welfare.

The spiritual welfare has been carefully cared for by the Catholic, Protestant and Hebrew Chaplains of the Department of Correction, and attendance at religious service has been usually large, though not compulsory.

Scholastic Education.

Vacation Time—Calisthenic exercises and military drill, one hour daily; library, one hour daily.

Tailoring Industry.

The inmates in this department have been employed in making new suits, shirts, etc., for their own use; also on old work, repairing and pressing.

Shoe Department.

Inmates have been employed at repair work only.

Plumbing Industry.

The work of the plumbing class has been confined to repairs in the different buildings of the reformatory and practice shop work.

Painting Department.

The inmates of this department have been occupied in practice work for beginners, and at the same time receiving elementary instruction, and as advanced put on work such as painting the interior of school building, dining rooms, kitchen pantries, etc.

Tinsmith Industry.

The inmates in this department have been occupied at their usual work, under their instructor, in making new articles for this and other institutions of the department and doing repair work.

Electrical Department.

Instructions in the elementary theory of magnetism, calculating units, volts, amperes, etc., and first lessons in practice work are given daily.

Carpentry and Manual Training.

In this department the boys are taught the use of tools and begin practice work. Accordingly as advanced they are put on the general work done, which comprises new and repair work required in the different buildings of the reformatory and the making of new work for other institutions of the department.

Cement Industry.

The work of the cement class comprises the making of concrete and laying sidewalks; also the manufacture of cement blocks, lintels, water tables, coping stones, etc., to be used in the construction and repair work of buildings of the Department.

Bricklaying.

This is a new industry, established lately, and has proved successful. The boys of this class have advanced rapidly, showing daily improvement, as the work recently done will show.

Borough of Brooklyn.

Report for the Quarter Ending September 30, 1911.

The new female prison has been turned over and is now in use. Prison vans Nos. 9, 10, 12, 14 and 15 have been given a general overhauling, painting and lettering. A railing of ornamental wrought iron has been erected on either side of the main entrance steps. The corrugated iron shed that was dividing the old female from the male prison has been removed and these two tiers are now used as the boys' prison. Twenty-seven bronze wire screens have been put on the lower windows facing the street in the administration and storehouse buildings and new female prison to prevent the passing of anything to or from the prison. Twenty-six oak pews, with kneelers attached, have been installed in the prison chapel.

The female prisoners under sentence here are employed in cleaning and scrubbing in and around the female prison and in the administration building.

The male prisoners under sentence here are employed in cleaning around the male prison, kitchen and stable and in repairing and painting about the institution.

Appended herewith please find a statement showing the number of prisoners at commencement of quarter, the number received, transferred and discharged; the amount of fines received from Court of Special Sessions and ten City Magistrates' Courts, which have been paid over to the City Chamberlain.



Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to The New York Magnaphone and Music Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this _____ day of _____ 1911, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and The New York Magnaphone and Music Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right or privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other electrical conductors in the conduits under the streets and avenues within the territory comprised in the Borough of Manhattan and that part of the Borough of The Bronx west of the Bronx River; such wires to connect only the premises of subscribers with the central stations of the Company and to be used for the purpose of maintaining a system whereby music and information in relation to matters of general interest may be distributed electrically from the central stations of the Company to two or more subscribers simultaneously and for no other purpose whatsoever.

Section 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The rights and privileges herein granted shall not be construed in any way give the Company the right or privilege to engage in a business permitting communication between subscribers and this contract is entered into on the mutual and express understanding and agreement by and between the parties hereto that the Company will not in any way engage in a business which will permit communication between its subscribers or claim the right to do under this contract and the right and privilege herein and hereby granted and conferred; it being understood that this is not a grant to do a telephone business within the general accepted meaning of the term.

Second—The said right to lay, construct, maintain and operate wires or other electrical conductors in conduits for the purpose aforesaid shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of twenty-five (25) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, without any privilege of renewal thereof.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in cash within three (3) months after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500).

During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500).

During the third term of five (5) years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts,

if such percentage shall exceed the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000).

During the fourth term of five (5) years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500), and which shall be equal to four (4) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500).

During the remaining term of five (5) years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be the gross receipts of the Company from all sources within the Borough of Manhattan and the portion of The Bronx lying westerly of the Bronx River.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to The City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of The City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payment for similar rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim any benefit thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fifth—The right and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the wires, electrical conductors and other property of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract, as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its wires, electrical conductors and other property, or any portion thereof, constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Seventh—Said wires, electrical conductors and other property shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction shall be commenced by the Company until written permits therefor have been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues, over which such officials have jurisdiction, and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

Eighth—All wires or other electrical conductors of the Company laid pursuant to this contract shall be placed in ducts, conduits or subways (referred to in this paragraph as subways). Such subways shall be leased from the company or companies having control thereof under the provisions of law, or from the City should it succeed to the rights of such company or companies. If the City shall construct or acquire subways for electrical conductors in the Borough of Manhattan or the portion of the Borough of The Bronx west of the Bronx River, the Company hereby agrees to lay its wires and electrical conductors in such subways, and the City agrees to lease to the Company during the term of this contract such space as may be required for the business herein authorized.

Ninth—The Company shall, upon request from any individual or corporation occupying or owning premises in the territory in which the Company is operating, not in arrears to it for service already rendered, extend its wires to such premises and furnish its service to such individual or corporation, provided that such premises are not more than one-half (1/2) mile from any other premises in which the Company has its apparatus installed at the time such request is made.

Tenth—The Company shall file with the Board on the first day of November in each year a map or plan upon which shall be plainly indicated the number of wires which are used by the Company on the 30th day of September next preceding, and the streets and avenues in which the same are located, and also those which were put in during the preceding year.

Eleventh—The Company shall commence the operation of its system of distribution of music and matters of general interest, as herein authorized, within six (6) months from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and shall have in operation the apparatus for the delivery of such service at one thousand (1,000) points upon subscriber's premises within five (5) years from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Twelfth—The Board may, by resolution, direct the Company to install its apparatus and neces-

sary appurtenances thereto in any or all of the free wards of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and in the assembly halls of any or all of the public schools within the portion of the City for which a franchise is hereby granted. Upon notice by the Board to the Company that any such resolution has been adopted the Company shall install such apparatus and the necessary appurtenances thereto, free of charge, and shall furnish service, as directed, at one-half the regular rates charged by the Company for similar service, provided that the Company shall not be required to extend its wires for the purpose of connecting with such hospitals or schools a distance greater in any case than one-half (1/2) mile.

Thirteenth—It is agreed that the Board shall have absolute power to regulate all charges or rates for services rendered by the Company to subscribers pursuant to this contract, provided that such rates shall be reasonable and fair, but the Company shall not at any time within the term of this contract charge more than twenty dollars (\$20) per month for an unlimited music service.

Fourteenth—The Company shall not require nor receive from its subscribers any deposit or advance payment in excess of the cost to it of apparatus leased or furnished to the subscriber on his premises, and of what is reasonably necessary to insure payment of current bills, and on such amounts so paid the Company shall pay interest at the statutory rate whenever such money is held for more than one month. Unpaid bills shall never be charged against property unless due from the owner thereof, and no person not himself in arrears shall be denied service because of previous default of the same premises as in arrears to the Company for service.

Fifteenth—The wires of the Company shall be employed for no other purpose than those expressly set forth herein, and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate wires for illegal purposes.

Sixteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Seventeenth—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken by reason of this grant.

Eighteenth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at reasonable rates or at the rates herein fixed, or at the rates which may be hereafter fixed by the Board, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Nineteenth—If, for a period of any three (3) consecutive months after the commencement of the operation of the system proposed by the Company, as herein provided, such system shall not be operated, or if the same shall not be operated for a period of any six (6) months out of any consecutive twelve (12) months after the commencement of operation, the Board may declare the right and franchise and this contract terminated without further proceedings in law or in equity.

Twentieth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.

2. The amount paid in as by last report.

3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.

4. The funded debt by last report.

5. The total amount of funded debt.

6. The floating debt as by last report.

7. The total amount of floating debt.

8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.

9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.

10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.

11. The total amount expended for same.

12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.

13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.

14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.

15. Number of subscribers served by the Company.

16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.

17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.

18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-first—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross receipts from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts from the operation of the system hereby authorized from all subscribers served by the Company, together with such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-second—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), either in money or security, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed or at the rates which may be hereafter fixed by the Board as herein provided, and in default of the payment of such annual charges, the City shall collect the same with interest from said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company. In case of failure by the Company to comply with the terms of this

contract relating to the filing of annual statements, the furnishing of service to applicants as herein provided, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any demand or direction of the Board or other Municipal officer, made pursuant to the terms of this contract or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force in such cases and in any of these events, the Company shall, except as herein otherwise provided, pay to the City a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) for each violation, which sum or sums may be deducted from said fund.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President, or other officer, to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any default made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Twenty-third—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the wires and electrical conductors constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-fourth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Twenty-fifth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers, shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Section 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New York.

Section 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to, and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

THE CITY OF NEW YORK, ACTING BY THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION for the First District (hereinafter called "the Commission") invites proposals to construct Section 9 of the Lexington Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad.

The points within the City between which the said part is to run and the route or routes to be followed are briefly as follows:

Section No. 9—Begins at a point about 50 feet north of the centre line of East 67th street and extends thence under Lexington Avenue to a point about 70 feet south of the centre line of East 79th street; with a station at East 68th and East 69th streets and a station at East 77th street.

The general plan of construction calls for a subsurface railroad having four tracks. Turnouts, cross-overs, connections and sidings, etc., will be constructed, all of which are more particularly indicated on the contract drawings.

Bidders will not be required to do the station-finish work, nor to provide or lay tracks, ties or ballast.
