contract to the Chamberlain Metal Weather Strip Company, in the sum of \$7,100.

Dr. Brannan reported that he had inquired into the complaint of E. D. Wender, transmitted by the Mayor's office under date of June 12, against Fordham Hospital, and that he had found that the patient had been properly cared for and that there was no harshness or unnecessary delay in the treatment of the patient, and that a report thereon was sent to the Mayor under date of June 22. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the report was approved.

Dr. Brannan referred to the noise made by the elevators at Harlem Hospital and recommended that rubber bumpers be installed in all the elevators in the department and take such other measures as may be necessary to eliminate or reduce the noise made by the elevators, which matter was referred to the General Medical Superintendent.

The President referred to the reports received from the dental service and particularly to the large number of patients from the Out-patient Departments that are treated in the dental clinics. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to instruct the Director of the Dental Service that in view of the fact that the dental clinics were opened primarily for children, and secondly, for the adults of the hospital, that no patients be admitted from the Out-patient Department except in unusual cases and then only upon the approval of the General Medical Superintendent.

Mr. Farley presented a communication from McKim, Mead & White, dated June 11, transmitting a sketch plan of an additional elevator in pavilions A and B, the estimate cost of which is \$29,000. In view of the high cost, it was moved, seconded and carried to defer action for the time being.

Mr. Farley reported on the application for final payment of James McCullagh for the installation of plumbing fixtures in the new building for the Out-patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital and presented a letter, dated June 14, from McKim, Mead & White, relating thereto. As the work was substantially completed at the expiration of the contract time, it was moved, seconded and carried, on the recommendation of the Building Committee, to accept the work under the contract and authorize the final payment.

Mr. Farley reported that he had inquired into the application of the National Surety Company, dated May 26, for final payment on the contract for the completion of the abandoned contract of the International Gas and Electric Fixture Company for the installation of lighting fixtures in pavilions I and K and presented communications relating thereto from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, under date of May 18, and from McKim, Mead & White under date of June 4. Owing to the delays for which the contractor was not at fault and for the reasons set forth in the communications from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, the Building Committee recommended that the work be formally accepted by the Trustees and payment authorized in full. After discussion, on motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved.

Mr. Farley reported that it is necessary to extend the salt water pump suction pipe at Neponset Beach Hospital, on account of the change in the water line and presented an estimate from D. Donegan Co., for \$700, and that there were no funds in our appropriation for the work. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to authorize the work provided funds can be obtained for it.

Mr. Farley referred to the need of providing a place at Gouverneur Hospital where the visiting physicians can leave their automobiles while making rounds. After discussion, this subject was referred to the General Medical Superintendent.

Mr. Farley also referred to the lack of elevator service at Harlem Hospital, particularly as two of them are not running on three afternoons of the week on account of the lack of employees. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to authorize the engaging of the employees required for full elevator service at Harlem Hospital.

Mr. Sachs referred to the situation created by the war in that a great many physicians and surgeons connected with private and public hospitals are called to military service. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to inform the Medical Boards of the Department that it is the desire of the Trustees to have all the hospitals properly staffed at all times and to present nominations for temporary appointments to the places made vacant by reason of the men being called into service and to have one or two men in reserve for every position to be filled, the men to hold temporary appointments, and the appointments to be made as prescribed by the rules of the department.

COMMUNICATIONS.

A letter, dated June 14, was presented from the Mayor's Committee on National Defense in regard to the rates to be paid for the treatment of naval patients in New York City. Dr. Brannan reported that he had answered this communication, and it was moved, seconded and carried that if it meets with the approval of the Mayor's Committee and is consistent with the requirements of the charter, the Trustees are willing to accept navy patients at the rates mentioned.

A letter, dated June 28, was presented from N. Gilbert Seymour, in regard to providing a place for the children's open-air school heretofore conducted on the boat "Huddleston." This subject was considered in connection with that part of the General Medical Superintendent's report relating to the transfer of the "Huddleston" for repair to the pier at the foot of East 28th street. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to inform Dr. Seymour that the Trustees regret that it is impossible to allow the use of the roof of the new building for the Out-patient Department for school purposes and that it would be impossible to give positive assurances that the boat would be ready for use early in September, as it will depend entirely upon the completion of the seawall where the boat was moored. The Trustees however resolved to make a special request of the Commissioner of the Park Department to exact from the contractor the early completion of at least that portion of the seawall so as to permit the boat to be put in place by the first week in September.

A letter, dated June 23, was presented from the Reverend Thomas Worrall, Episcopal Chaplain to Bellevue Hospital, tendering his resignation. On motion, duly seconded and carried the resignation was accepted.

A communication, dated June 19, was presented from the Protestant Episcopal City Mission Society nominating the Rev. E. V. Collins as Chaplain to Bellevue Hospital to succeed Mr. Worrall. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this nomination was approved. The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for June 13 were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the nominations for appointment and reappointment were referred to the Conference Committee of the respective divisions. The resignations of Rolfe Floyd, Assisting Visiting Physician, First Division, and Warren Coleman, Visiting Physician, Second Division, were accepted with regret. The recommendation that Frank S. Meara be made a member of the Executive Committee and Walter L. Niles as Alternate was approved. The nominations of Catherine Merritt for one year's appointment on the house staff from July 1, 1917, and Charles W. Dunn, as interne for six months from Jan. 1, 1917, and as Resident Surgeon from July 1, 1917, were approved, as was also the granting of certificates for six months' pathological service to the following men: Drs. Mahon, Blanton, Ingeman, Healy, Wood and Townsend. The recommendation that the heads of the various services be permitted to ask for voluntary aides who are not connected with the hospital to come to the hospital on certain days at certain definite hours and help carry on the work of the house staff to be done in each instance only after the approval of the General Medical Superintendent was approved by the Trustees.

A communication, dated June 27, was presented from the Executive Committee of the New York County Chapter of the American Red Cross requesting the department to obtain from each employee a donation of one day's pay during the year 1917 for the Red Cross. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was resolved that it is the sense of the Board that it would be inadvisable to ask the employees of the department to make such a donation, particularly as they are paid low wages and the department is experiencing great difficulty in retaining employees, also that it is a question as to whether the Trustees would be justified in placing such a proposition before the employees in the absence of information regarding the policy adopted by the City administration.

Reference was made to the department's request for special revenue bonds to meet the deficits of the department presented to the Board of Aldermen under date of May 25 and subsequently addressed to the Comptroller. On motion, duly seconded and carried a communication was authorized to the Board of Aldermen in accordance with the suggestions set forth in a letter from the Comptroller under date of June 23.

A letter, dated June 21, was presented from W. M. Polk, Dean of Cornell University Medical College, in regard to the nomination of Walter L. Niles to take the place of Dr. Coleman on the Executive Committee, in the absence of Dr. Meara. As a similar communication was referred to in the minutes of the Execu-

tive Committee, this letter was ordered placed on file.

Four letters, dated June 12, June 18, June 21 and June 25, were presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment (a) waiving specifications for the purchase of coal until again put in force by the Board; (b) approving modification of salary schedule No. 2094; (c) procedure to be followed in conducting the business of the Board of Estimate during summer months; (d) revision of salary schedule No. 2052; (e) accepting the legacy of \$10,000 of William Washington Cole.

Two resolutions from the Board of Aldermen adopted (a) June 12, authorizing the purchase in the open market, without public letting, of eggs and sugar in amounts not exceeding \$1,000 each; (b) June 12, authorizing the purchase in the open market, without public letting, of wire screens for pavilions A and B, Bellevue Hospital.

Resolved, That Section 156 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 156. Milk, skimmed milk and cream; grades and designations. All milk, skimmed milk, or cream held, kept, offered for sale, sold or delivered in the City of New York shall be held, kept, offered for sale, sold, or delivered in accordance with the Regulations of the Board of Health and under any of the following grades or designations and not otherwise:

"Grade A—For Infants and Children": 1. Milk, skimmed milk or cream (raw). 2. Milk, skimmed milk, or cream (pasteurized).

"Grade B—For Adults": 1. Milk, skimmed milk, or cream (pasteurized).

"Grade C—For Cooking and Manufacturing Purposes Only": 1. Milk, skimmed milk, or cream not conforming to the requirements of any of the subdivisions of Grade A or Grade B, and which has been pasteurized according to the Regulations of the Board of Health or boiled for at least two (2) minutes.

"Condensed Skimmed Milk."

The provisions of this section shall apply to milk, skimmed milk, or cream used for the purpose of producing or used in preparation of sour milk, buttermilk, homogenized milk, milk curds, sour cream, Smeteny, Kumys, Matsoon, Zoolak, and other similar products or preparations, provided that any such product or preparation be held, kept, offered for sale, sold, or delivered in the City of New York.

The provisions of this section shall, however, apply to cream sold under any foreign name meaning cream, such as smeteny, crema, and rahm, and to all cream products and preparations such as homogenized products and milk curds. 
