BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

STATED SESSION.

LAW DEPARTMENT, OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION, New York, May 6, 1879.

Hon. EDWARD COOPER, Mayor: SIR—I duly received your communication of the 30th of April last, requesting my opinion as to when the terms of office of the Inspectors of Weights and Measures will expire. There have been in this city, during the past six years, two lawfully appointed Inspectors of Weights and Measures, Jacob J. Banta and Theodore S. Kent, whose terms of office expired on the ist of May instant. I am informed, however, that a person named Thomas McCormick has for several years claimed to be an Inspector of Weights and Measures, and has collected fees as such Inspector, and now claims to be in office, and that his term of office will not expire for some time to

The office of Inspector of Weights a. d Measures in this city was created by chapter 161 of the Laws of 1821, which authorized the Common Council to appoint one Inspector. By chapter 167 of the Laws of 1834, the Common Council was authorized to appoint two Inspectors, and to remove them at pleasure. The last-named act has continued in force from the date of its passage to the present time. No statute has ever been passed which authorized the appointment of a greater num-ber than two Inspectors, but section 27 of the Charter of 1857 transferred the power of appointment to the City Inspector, who was thereby authorized to appoint such number of Inspectors of Weights and Measures as then or thereafter might exist. It seems to have been supposed that this statute author-ized an increase in the number of Inspectors, for the ordinances of 1859, adopted soon after the pas-sage of the Charter of 1857, empowered the City Inspector to appoint four Inspectors of Weights and Measures. The City Inspector's Department was abolished by section 13 of chapter 74 of the Laws of 1866, which statute created the Metropolitan Sanitary District and Board of Health, and the same section transferred all the powers then possessed by the City Inspector with reference to the inspectors of Weights and Measures was changed, so as to confer upon the Mayor the power to appoint a like number. The charter of 1870 did not contain any express provision as to the appoint. Inspectors of Weights and Measures. Section go created the Health Department, and section 120 excepted the City of New York from the provisions of said act of 1866, and section 93, as amended by section 26, of chapter 383, of the Laws of 1870, transferred to said Health. Department the authority, powers and duties possessed by the Metropolitan Board of Health. There is some question where the power of appointment of Inspectors of Weights a

Section 117 of the Charter of 1873. Section 117 of the Charter of 1873 declared that the terms of office of the then Inspectors of Weights and Measures, as well as the terms of many other officers in that section mentioned, should expire on or before May 1, 1873, and section 25 of the same act authorized the Mayor to nominate, and by and with the consent of the Aldermen, to appoint, certain officers therein mentioned, and also all other officers not elected by the people. There can be no question that the charter of 1873 legislated out of office the Inspectors who were in office at the time of its passage, and conferred the power to appoint such Inspectors upon the Mayor and the Aldermen.

There can be no doubt, moreover, that at the time of the passage of the charter of 1873, there were but two offices of Inspectors of Weights and Measures. As above stated, however, the ordi-nances, as published in 1859 and 1866, authorized the City Inspector, and afterwards the Mayor, to appoint four Inspectors of Weights and Measures. The late Mayor Havemeyer was undoubtedly misled by this ordinance, and supposing that there were actually four offices to be tilled, instead of two, on May 19, 1873, sent a communication to the Board of Aldermen, in which he stated that he nominated, and with their consent appointed, the following persons Inspectors of Weights and Measures : James Crawford, Nicholas McCormick, Theodore S. Kent, and Jacob J. Banta.

On May 20, 1873, these four nominations were confirmed in the reverse order in which the nominations were made.

In May 20, 1873, these four hominations were confirmed in the reverse order in which the nominations were made. In September, 1873, Mayor Havemeyer removed, or attempted to remove, Banta, and appointed in his place Lewis Kneissel. The removal of Banta was made by the Mayor alone, and was not approved by nor submitted to the Governor, as provided in the Charter of 1873. Subsequent to his attempted removal, Banta brought two actions of quo warranto, one against Kneissel and the other against Kent, it being claimed, as I understand, by Banta, that Kent had intruded upon the district which belonged to Banta. These actions were referred to ex-Judge James C. Spencer, who on January 4, 1876, made a report in each case. He decided that Banta had not been legally removed, because his removal had not been approved by the Governor, and that consequently Kneissel had not been legally appointed. But he moreover held that there were but two offices of Inspectors of Weights and Measures, and that as Mayor Havemeyer had nominated four persons, none of the appointments were valid. After these reports had been made, as I am informed, by some jugglery between the litigants, or their attorneys, the cases were stricken from the calendar, and thereupon appeals were taken to the General Term. In the case of Kneissel, the General Term held, Daniels, J., delivering the opinion, that there were but two offices of Inspectors of Banta and Kent were valid, but that Nicholas McCormick and James Crawford never had any title whatever to the office of Inspector of Weights and Measures, because there were aligned before of Scawford never had any title whatever to the office of Inspector of Weights and Measures, because there were no offices to be filled by them. The appeal in the case of Banta against Kent was dismissed for certain technical reasons, which it is not necessary now to consider. The decision of Judge Daniels was concurred in by Chief Justice Davis and by Judge Brady. and by Judge Brady.

not necessary now to consider. The decision of Judge Daniels was concurred in by Chief Justice Davis and by Judge Brady. For some reason which I have not been able to ascertain, this important case has never been reported, and I have no doubt that the omission of it from the regular reports of the Supreme Court has caused a great deal of trouble and embarrassment. Long before this decision was rendered, Nicholas McCormick died, and in March, 1874, Mayor Havemeyer nominated, and the Aldermen confirmed Thomas McCormick Inspector of Weights and Measures in his place. The communication from the Mayor to the Aldermen, making the nomination, stated that the appointment was for a term of six years from the approval thereof. As Banta and Kent were still in office and the original ap-pointment of Nicholas McCormick was void, this nomination by the Mayor, and confirmation by the Aldermen of Thomas McCormick did not make him an Inspector of Weights and Measures. He however, as I understand, proceeded to act immediately under this void appointment, and was so acting at the time when the above-mentioned decision of the General Term was rendered. Although not a party to the litigation, he undoubtedly knew of the decision, and should at once have ceased to act as an Inspector of Weights and Measures. Notwithstanding the decision, however, which was con-curred in by the three very able and learned judges who held the General Term, Mr. McCormick utterly disregarded it, claiming, as I am informed, that it did not affect him because he was not actually a party before the Court. This claim is too flimsy and frivolous to deserve any attention. Of course the decision would not have estopped McCormick from further litigation of the question, but such decision was a declaration of the law which, so long as the decision remains unreversed, he was bound to take notice of and to respect. It certainly is a very novel doctrine that the decisions of the Courts are not to be regarded by any persons except those who are parties to the litig them without any authority of law.

them without any authority of law. I understand that McCornick claims and gives out that the validity of his appointment as inspector, and his right to collect fees as such have been recognized and enforced by the courts, in decisions rendered since the above-mentioned decision of the General Term of the Supreme Court. This claim is without any foundation. So far as I am aware, the question of the validity of McCornick's appointment has never been passed upon, except in the case above referred to, and the decisions which he claims, as I understand, recognize the validity of his appointment, were obtained by imposi-tion upon the courts in which such decisions were given. Great complaints having been made in regard to the exaction of fees for the inspection of weights and measures, the Common Council, in January, 1878, repealed that portion of the ordinances which authorized Inspectors of Weights and Measures to collect such fees. After this repeal, McCornick brought an action in the First District Court against McKesson & Company, for fees which he claimed to be entitled to from that firm. This action appears to have been a collusive one, for it was tried upon an agreed statement of facts, This action appears to have been a collusive one, for it was tried upon an agreed statement of facts, and in this statement it was admitted, in substance, that McCormick had been duly appointed an Inspector of Weights and Measures. It being thus conceded that McCormick was an Inspector of Weights and Measures, the question of the validity of his appointment was not considered nor passed upon by the court. Judgment having been rendered in McCormick's favor, an appeal was taken to the General Term of the Common Pleas, which affirmed the judgment of the District Court. As I understand, it was not disputed, either in the District Court or before the General Term of the Common Pleas, that McCormick was an Inspector, nor did either court pass upon that question. The decision in this case, therefore, was solely to the effect that the Common Council could not, without abolishing the office of Inspector entirely, abolish the fees. The decision, even on this point, is not sustained by the reasons given, for, as appeared from the foregoing statement, the office of inspector was created by the Legislature, and the Common Council had no power over it. But even if the decision were correct on the point passed upon, it had no bearing whatever upon the question of the validity of McCormick's appointment. Camp, hereto attached, and do appraise the same at such amended valuations. On motion, the resolution was adopted, the Recorder, Comptroller, and Chamberlain voting in the affirmative, and the Mayor in the negative. The following resolution was submitted, viz.: Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby fix the terms of sale of real estate, adjourned to May 8, 1879, as follows :
