The 601 deaths represent a death-rate of 15.82, against 16.75 for the previous week and 17.46 for the corresponding week of 1893.

Contagious and infectious diseases continue to increase, the number of cases reported of diphtherin, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 131, 25, 53, 16 and 19, against 94, 29, 50, 39 and 11 for the previous week, a total of 244 against 223. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Eleventh, Twelfth, Seventeenth, Eighteenth and Nineteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Thirteenth and Twenty-first Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Twelfth Ward, and the decrease in the Fourteenth Ward. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Twentieth Ward, and the decrease in the Sixteenth and Eighteenth Wards. Ten of the 16 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and only 1 below Fourteenth street. Thirteen of the 19 cases of small-pox were between Twenty-sixth and Fortieth streets, West, and 3 of the remaining 6 were below Canal street, east of Broadway.

Third—That the limits of our assessment for benefit include all those lots, pieces, or parcels of land situate, lying and being in the City of New York, which, taken together, are bounded and described as follows, viz.: Northerly by the centre line of the blocks between One Hundred and Eightieth street and One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street, from the westerly line of Kingsbridge road on the westerly line of the blocks between One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street, from the westerly line of Kingsbridge road; and westerly by the easterly line of Kingsbridge road; and westerly by the easterly line of Kingsbridge road; and westerly by the easterly line of Kingsbridge road; and w
