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BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

(FINANCIAL MATTERS.)

MINUTES OF MEETING OF BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK, HELD IN ROOM 16, CITY HALL, WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 30, 1907.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Herman A. Metz, Comptroller; Patrick F. McGowan, President, Board of Aldermen; John F. Ahearn, President, Borough of Manhattan; Bird S. Coler, President, Borough of Brooklyn; Louis F. Haffen, President, Borough of The Bronx; Joseph Bermel, President, Borough of Queens; George Cromwell, President, Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. George B. McClellan, presided.

The Secretary presented the following communications from the Comptroller, submitting statements of the amounts to be included in the Budget for the year 1908 for State taxes, rents, for the payment of the principal of and interest on the City Debt, a statement showing the condition of the Fund for Street and Park Openings on September 30, 1907; also a statement of deficiencies in the product of taxes at December 31, 1906.

Which were ordered printed in the minutes and placed on file.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—I submit herewith communications from the Comptroller of the State of New York, showing the amounts to be included in the Budget for the year 1908, for the compensation of Judges, Clerks, Stenographers and other Court expenses, for the Counties of Kings, Queens and Richmond, to wit:

County of Kings.....	\$54,692 37
County of Queens.....	52,244 01
County of Richmond.....	15,598 40

These items amount, in the aggregate, to the sum of one hundred and twenty-two thousand five hundred and thirty-four dollars and seventy-eight cents (\$122,534.78), which is an increase over the amount included for similar items in the Budget for the year 1907 of the sum of forty-six thousand eight hundred and thirty dollars and sixty-five cents (\$46,830.65).

Heretofore these items have been treated as State taxes and included in the Budgets under the heading "The City of New York," and have been made a charge against the City at large, instead of the respective counties. The Corporation Counsel, under an opinion dated October 14, 1907, holds that these items do not constitute a tax for State purposes, and hence do not come within the provisions of section 1595 of the Charter, and that they should not be charged against The City of New York, but, on the contrary, that they are County charges for expenses of the counties of Kings, Queens and Richmond, and under section 902 of the Charter, as well as under the acts referred to in the communications from the State Comptroller, they should be levied and collected upon the taxable property of the respective counties of Kings, Richmond and Queens, and should, accordingly, be so included in the Budget.

I therefore recommend that these items be included in the Budget for 1908 of the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the respective counties of Kings, Queens and Richmond.

I also present statement in detail showing the amounts necessary to be included in the Budget for 1908 for the payment of the principal of and interest on the City Debt, which, compared with the appropriations for the same purposes for the year 1907, are as follows:

Accompanying the same is a statement showing all bonds maturing during the year 1908, payable from the Sinking Fund or from assessments, and also, item by item, the detail in which the Sinking Fund installments have been calculated.

A statement is also submitted herewith showing the condition of the Fund for Street and Park Openings on September 30, 1907. The excess of the liability of this fund over the cash balance was three million nine hundred and eighty-six thousand two hundred and one dollars and forty-seven cents (\$3,986,201.47), and the amount of Corporate Stock authorized to be issued to reimburse the fund, and remaining unissued, is one million nine hundred and sixty thousand one hundred and sixteen dollars and sixty-three cents (\$1,960,116.63).

Section 174 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 70 of the Laws of 1905, authorizes the Comptroller to issue "Street and Park Opening Assessment Bonds" to replenish the "Fund for Street and Park Openings" to the extent of the uncollected assessments, which are liens on property benefited, and the assessments to be imposed in proceedings in which the awards only have been confirmed.

The estimated amount of assessments in street and park opening proceedings remaining to be laid on property benefited thereby, in which the awards have been confirmed and substantially paid, is \$8,440,956 34

The estimated amount of assessments laid and not yet collected is 6,378,778 10

Under this authority provision can be made for the above balance or excess of liability of two million twenty-six thousand and eighty-four dollars and eighty-four cents (\$2,026,084.84) over cash balance and Corporate Stock authorized to be issued for account of this fund, by the issue of Assessment Bonds, and the necessity of including said balance or excess in the Budget for 1908 does not exist.

The Secretary presented the departmental estimates for the year 1908, also printed copies thereof bound and indexed, which he was ordered to include in a separate volume of the minutes.

The Secretary then presented the following departmental estimates from the Law Department (supplemental); Coroner, Borough of Richmond; Sheriff, Kings County (amended estimate); Supreme Court, Second Department (corrected estimate), and College of The City of New York (supplemental estimate), received too late to be

incorporated in the volume above referred to, which were ordered printed in the minutes of this date:

Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

DEAR SIRS—Your Board is now considering the application of the County Clerk, under the law passed at the last session of the Legislature, for ten thousand square feet of office space in the Hall of Records for the use of the Commissioner of Records.

Unless the floor occupied by the Department of Taxes and Assessments is set aside for this purpose, the granting of the application would mean the taking of one of the three floors now used by this Department.

In order to condense on two floors the offices now occupying three floors, it would be necessary to make a number of very substantial changes in the building.

The easterly end of the eighth floor is now used for the filing rooms of the Department, and is filled with steel cases. If it is decided to set aside the eighth floor for the use of the Commissioner of Records, it would be necessary to subdivide a number of the rooms on the sixth and seventh floors, to erect partitions, change the electric wiring and lighting system and make other structural changes in the building. The filing cases, book cases, wardrobes and other furniture on the eighth floor would be needed on the sixth and seventh floors, and they would require many changes and alterations. It would also be necessary to cut the floors in the building to make arrangements for rewiring the desks and filing cases.

All of this work would be very costly, and it would probably be necessary to make a contract at public letting for the proposed alterations. It is very difficult to form an estimate of the actual cost, but I am sure that it will be not less than fifty thousand dollars.

I therefore suggest that if the application of the County Clerk is granted, an appropriation of fifty thousand dollars be included in the Budget for 1908, to cover the necessary expenses in this matter. In case that were not done, I would probably be obliged to apply subsequently for a special bond issue.

I suggest that the following title be used for the appropriation:

Law Department—For changes and alterations, new steel cases and furniture for the quarters occupied by the Law Department in the Hall of Records

Hon. JOSEPH HAAG, Secretary to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, New York City:

SIR—Herewith I furnish estimate of salaries and expenses in the Coroner's office, Borough of Richmond, for 1908, and respectfully ask you to consider the merit of the request.

The increase asked for the Clerks in the Coroner's office is very small in comparison with those of the other boroughs and departments, and the hours of duty longer and uncertain. There have been no increases of salary in this Department in six years, and the number of Coroners have been reduced, the duties of Physician and Chief Clerk have been materially increased and those of the Clerk to the Coroner and the Assistant Clerk proportionately so. In regard to the Stenographer, I would say that he is an exceptionally good Court Stenographer and one whom the office was fortunate in securing. For nine months the office was hiring outside Court Stenographers, as it was impossible to secure the services of a Stenographer for the Coroner's Court at the salary set aside for such work in the Budget. The need of a Replevin Clerk is also very necessary, and this borough is the only one in the City which is without a Replevin Clerk. The request for \$500 additional is for the board and maintenance of horse and wagons, an absolute necessity in a territory of sixty square miles, without adequate transit facilities, especially during the night time.

DEAR SIR—Herewith is submitted a supplemental estimate of the College of the City of New York of eight thousand four hundred dollars (\$8,400), for the employment, at \$1,400 per annum each, of six (6) Assistant Engineers in addition to those provided for in the estimate of the College previously submitted.

At a recent meeting of the Board of Trustees of the College, Messrs. Geo. B. Post & Sons, architects of the buildings, submitted a report from Mr. Alfred R. Wolfe, the Consulting Engineer of the Mechanical Plant, in which he states that in order to properly care for and safely operate the extensive and complicated machinery installed in the five large college buildings, it will be necessary to employ six (6) Assistant Engineers, in addition to those provided for in the original estimate of the College.

The buildings are now practically completed, and, with the exception of the Chemical Building, are being used by the students, but before the mechanical plant can be safely operated to the fullest extent in all its branches it will be necessary to make provision for the employment of a sufficient and competent force of Enginemmen to care for and operate it.

THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

Conditions Governing Payments to Charitable Institutions.

The appropriations in this Budget are made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts and records of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show all receipts, disbursements and population in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller. Records must show the addresses of parents, guardians or nearest relatives of inmates and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to make provision for dependents in the institutions.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions for recurring expenses of "care, support, education and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys and all their books of record and accounts shall at all reasonable times be open to the visitation, inspection and examination of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Finance and at all proper times the Department of Public Charities shall have access to the record of inmates.

4. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an apportionment has been made, he shall in his discretion suspend payments and give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease making further payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon end.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon the per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as proper charges upon the City. Except in emergency cases in hospitals, the Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public hospitals. *The City shall not be liable for any payment to charitable institutions in excess of the apportionment which may have been made to such institutions, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.*

6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

7. No money shall be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers.

8. That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.

9. Magistrates are requested to transfer dependent, and, when judicious, no proper guardianship children, and all cases coming to their attention in the courts where no crime is proven against the child to the Commissioner of Charities, who can commit to institutions. Magistrates are earnestly requested not to commit a dependent child to an institution on a court commitment.

10. The Commissioner of Charities is instructed to take such steps, either by appeal to the national authorities or by proper bills to the Legislature, as to provide

that the children of emigrants abandoned within one year after arrival in this City be returned to the country whence they came.

11. In determining the acceptance of patients in private hospitals as proper charges (see Rule 5) the Commissioner of Charities shall first consider the nature of the service actually rendered to the patients by the hospitals. The records of the institutions and the bed-card notes showing the treatment given shall be received as the essential evidence in deciding acceptances or rejections.

12. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City and no money will be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children, under the supervision of the State Board of Charities, and has been placed in this Budget by the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

This order has no relation to the class of children of such mental and physical condition as those cared for in the City Institution at Randall's Island.

13. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
