LAYING OUT AN EXTENSION OF THIRTEENTH STREET, FROM NINTH AVENUE AT COLLEGE POINT TO JACKSON AVENUE, IN CORONA, QUEENS.

The following resolution of the Local Board of the Newtown District, Borough of Queens, and report of the Chief Engineer were presented:

Whereas, A petition for a local improvement described below has been received by the President of the Borough of Queens; and

Whereas, He has appointed a time for a meeting of this Local Board not more than fifteen days after the receipt by him of the said petition, at which meeting the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Local Board, and he has caused a notice to be published in the City Record that said petition has been presented to him and is on file in his office for inspection, and of the time when and the place where there would be a meeting of this Local Board at which the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Board, which time was not less than ten days after the publication of this notice; and

Whereas, The said petition was duly submitted thereafter to the said Local Board, which did duly consider the same and give a full hearing thereon; now therefore it is

Resolved, by the Local Board of the Newtown District, pursuant to titles 2 and 3 of chapter 10 of the Greater New York Charter, That the said petition be and the same hereby is granted; and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit:

To extend Thirteenth street, College Point, southwesterly in a straight line to Jackson avenue, Corona, and to construct a bridge over Flushing Bay, in a line with Thirteenth street, in the Third Ward of the Borough of Queens; and it is hereby further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Commissioner of the Department of Bridges and to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Newtown District, Borough of Queens, adopted on April 13, 1908, recommending an extension of Thirteenth street, from Ninth avenue at College Point southwesterly in a straight line to the intersection with Jackson avenue in Corona.

The plan presented with this resolution indicates that the proposed extension of Thirteenth street as improved north of Ninth avenue, is to be given a width of 100 feet, and that a bridge is to be constructed through that portion of its length which crosses the head of Flushing Bay.

No maps have yet been adopted laying out a street system for College Point and the map which has been approved for the Corona section is only of a tentative character. It would therefore be impracticable to favor the improvement described which could only be intelligently discussed as a part of a comprehensive plan for development or until after such a plan had been outlined.

A general study of the situation shows that the present course of traffic from College Point to Long Island City follows the causeway and Lawrence street over the new Flushing bridge to Jackson avenue, and that the more direct connection desired with the latter street would effect a saving in distance of about 4,000 feet.

Assuming that a bridge of the same type as the one recently built over the Flushing Creek, distant about one-half mile to the south, would answer all of the requirements and that concrete steel masonry arches would be used for the approaches, it is probable that the structure which would be required to cross the bay would cost approximately \$1,000,000.

There can be no question but that the plan is commendable in so far as it relates to the provision of a more direct route of travel, but it is extremely doubtful if the present needs would justify the expenditure involved, and it is equally improbable that the property benefited by the proposed improvement and which would be composed largely of the College Point territory would desire to contribute a substantial part of the cost.

I would therefore recommend that the resolution be disapproved, but would suggest that when the map of this territory is prepared consideration be given to the possible future need of a bridge across the bay and that the street system be adopted to such an improvement if a location can at that time be determined upon which would meet with the approval of the Department of Bridges.

—made by The City of New York, acting through its Board of Estimate and Apportionment under sections 61 and 62 of the Railroad Law, asking the Public Service Commission to determine whether certain streets laid out on maps attached to the applications shall be constructed under, over or at grade of the various branches of the Long Island Railroad Company in the Borough of Queens, City of New York, I advise you that the Commission this day considered the said applications and instructed me to inform you that the Commission is of the opinion that it has no power to take the action requested by the City, namely, to alter the existing railroad grades for the purpose of accommodating the new streets shown on the maps annexed to the applications.

I am informed through the office of the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that unless the Commission is able to change the railroad grades at the point of intersection of these new streets, the City desires to withdraw its applications and I therefore return you herewith all maps which accompanied the five resolutions of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated January 15, 1909.

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—On January 15, 1909, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted resolutions approving the final maps of Sections 1, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 29, 30 and 31 of the Borough of Queens, subject to ratification by the Public Service Commission as to the method by which the proposed streets were to be carried across the tracks of the Bushwick, Evergreen, Manhattan Beach and Montauk Branches of the Long Island Railroad, and the Lutheran Cemetery Branch of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company.

These railroads now operate approximately at surface grade, and it would be not only very expensive but also quite impracticable to elevate or depress the existing or proposed streets. It was therefore proposed to change the elevation of the railroad as required for securing a suitable relationship and for at the same time removing grade crossings. The applications to the Public Service Commission were based on the provisions of sections 61 and 62 of the Railroad Law.

Section 61 provides that before a street is laid out across the tracks of a steam railroad, a hearing on the question of its necessity shall be given by the City authorities to the railroad corporation affected, and that if the street is deemed necessary an application shall be made to the Public Service Commission for a determination as to whether the street shall cross over or under the railroad or at grade, and as to the details of the plan for the crossing.

Section 62 authorizes the municipal corporation to apply to the Public Service Commission for the removal or alteration of an existing grade crossing or for the substitution of another when a change in method is required for the public safety, and the Commission is similarly authorized to determine whether the highway shall be carried over or under the railroad, or across its tracks at grade.

In the accompanying communication from the Public Service Commission, bearing date of April 9, 1909, the Board is advised that the Commission "has no power to take the action requested by the City, namely, to alter the existing railroad grades for the purpose of accommodating the new streets shown on the maps annexed to the applications."

It therefore appears that no provision has been made under existing laws, for laying out new streets across railroads in cases where a reasonable treatment involves a change in the grade of the railroad. The maps referred to were of this character and have not yet been filed. Under these conditions there appears to be no alternative but to rescind the resolutions of January 15, 1909, under which they were conditionally approved, thus leaving the matter before the Board as still unconsidered other than to the extent of having given a public hearing.

Anticipating that the present Railroad Law might be construed in this way and realizing that an expeditious and clear method was needed for the treatment of cases of this character, and which largely prevail in all parts of the Borough of Queens, as well as in substantial portions of Richmond and to some extent in Brooklyn, a bill has been prepared and is now before the Legislature (Senate No. 796, Assembly No. 1362), which provides for the preparation and legalization of those portions of the City plan which adjoin or intersect railroads and in a reasonable way.

It is suggested that the attention of the Corporation Counsel be drawn to the opinion recently rendered by the Public Service Commission, and that he be requested to use every effort to secure the passage of this bill.

Until after this or similar legislation has been granted by the Legislature it will not be possible to legalize any map laying out new streets across a railroad and the mapping of the undeveloped territory will be seriously delayed. In the meantime I would suggest that such maps as are submitted be given a public hearing as heretofore, and that in case they are considered as proper for adoption in all respects except as to the railroad, further action be deferred until legislation is obtained and with the understanding that as soon as the way becomes clear they will be formally approved.

To permit of carrying out such improvements as are believed to be urgent and which are located in areas of this character, special maps of the single streets affected might be adopted and filed, the railroad lands being in each case excluded. In this way it would be possible to avoid definitely mapping any more streets than are actually required for immediate use until some assurance can be given that the map is a legal one. A large number of streets shown on the final maps now presented are of this character and in many of them opening proceedings have been authorized. The Corporation Counsel has recently advised that he is unable to advance such proceedings until the street map has been filed and I would suggest that the attention of the President of the Borough of Queens be called to the possibility of removing the delay by adopting the procedure suggested for such cases.

DEEDS OF CESSION FOR LAND LYING WITHIN THE LINES OF SUNNYSIDE AVENUE, IN THE BLOCK BETWEEN VERMONT STREET AND MILLER AVENUE, BROOKLYN.

Sir—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on March 12, 1909, a communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Brook-



lyn requesting that the Corporation Counsel be authorized to accept deeds to land lying within the lines of Sunnyside avenue, between Vermont street and Miller avenue and pursuant to the provisions of section 224 of the Charter, the land offered not comprising an unbroken length of more than 200 feet.

In reporting upon this request it was shown that an opening proceeding had been authorized, but that the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment had not been appointed, and that the deeds in which the petition related affected all of the property within the limits of the block described other than such as had been retained by the original owners who had parted with their holdings outside of the street lines, but refused to join in the deeds.

At the same time there were submitted petitions from three property owners requesting that the Corporation Counsel be authorized to accept deeds to land in Sunnyside avenue within the limits of the block between Barby street and Hendrix street and which they were desirous of conveying to the City. It was suggested that all of these requests be granted by the Board, but my attention has recently been called to the fact that the resolution as drawn and adopted, related only to the three parcels which were made the subject of separate petitions.

I would therefore suggest that a new resolution be adopted which would include all of the lands referred to by the Borough President in his communication.

AMENDING DISTRICT OF ASSESSMENT FOR ACQUIRING TITLE TO WESTCHESTER AVENUE, BETWEEN MAIN STREET AND EASTERN BOULEVARD; TO LANE AVENUE, BETWEEN WESTCHESTER AVENUE AND WEST FARMS ROAD; AND TO THE PUBLIC PLACE BOUNDED BY LANE AVENUE, WESTCHESTER AVENUE AND WEST FARMS ROAD, THE BRONX.

SIR—On February 26, 1909, a resolution was adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment amending the district of assessment proposed in the proceeding relating to the acquisition of title to Westchester avenue, between Main street and Eastern boulevard; to Lane avenue, between Westchester avenue and West Farms road; and to the public place bounded by Lane avenue, West Farms road and Westchester avenue, Borough of The Bronx.

My attention has just been called to a slight typographical error in the technical description of the boundary of this district, affecting the course which was intended to be located midway between Benson avenue and Overing street, and which appears in the resolution as continuing to a point 100 feet northeasterly instead of southeasterly from St. Raymond avenue. Herewith I am transmitting another description correcting this error and its adoption is recommended.

Beginning at a point on a line midway between Parker street and Zerega avenue, where it is intersected by the prolongation of a line midway between Frisby avenue and Glebe avenue, as these streets are laid out northeasterly from Zerega avenue, and running thence northeasterly along the said line midway between Frisby avenue and Glebe avenue, and along the prolongation of the said line, to the intersection with a line midway between Zerega avenue and Rowland street; thence northwesterly along the said line midway between Zerega avenue and Rowland street to the intersection with a line midway between Glebe avenue and St. Raymond avenue, as these streets are laid out between Zerega avenue and Rowland street; thence northeasterly along the said line midway between Glebe avenue and St. Raymond avenue, and along the prolongation of the said line, to the intersection with a line midway between Overing street and Benson avenue; thence northwesterly along the said line midway between Overing street and Benson avenue, to a point distant 100 feet southeasterly from the southeasterly line of St. Raymond avenue; thence northeasterly and always distant 100 feet southeasterly from the southeasterly line of St. Raymond avenue and the prolongation thereof to the intersection with a line midway between Brocket avenue and Halperin avenue; thence northwesterly along the said line midway between Brocket avenue and Halperin avenue to a point distant 100 feet northeasterly from the northeasterly line of Blondell avenue; thence southeasterly and always distant 100 feet northeasterly from the northeasterly line of Blondell avenue to a point distant 600 feet northwesterly from the northwesterly line of Westchester avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of Westchester avenue; thence northeasterly, northwesterly, and northwesterly and always distant 600 feet northwesterly, westerly and northwesterly from the northwesterly lines of Westchester avenue, and the prolongation thereof, to a point distant 600 feet easterly from the westerly line of Pelham Bay Park, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of Pelham Bay Park; thence southwesterly along a line parallel with the westerly line of Pelham Bay Park, as laid out immediately northwest of Westchester avenue, and along the prolongation of the said line, to the intersection with the prolongation of the northwesterly line of Morris Park avenue, as laid out east of Westchester avenue; thence southwesterly along the said prolongation of the northwesterly line of Morris Park avenue to a point distant 250 feet easterly from the westerly line of Pelham Bay Park, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of Pelham Bay Park; thence southwesterly and always distant 250 feet easterly from the westerly line of Pelham Bay Park to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Bulre avenue and Roberts avenue, as these streets are laid out adjoining the Eastern boulevard; thence southwesterly along the said line midway between Bulre avenue and Roberts avenue, and along the prolongation of the said line, to the intersection with a line midway between Jarvis avenue and Mahan avenue; thence southeasterly along the said line midway between Jarvis avenue and Mahan avenue to a point distant 100 feet southeasterly from the southeasterly line of Roberts avenue; thence southwesterly along a line parallel with Roberts avenue, as laid out between Crosby avenue and the Eastern boulevard, and along the prolongation of the said line, to a point distant 600 feet southeasterly from the southeasterly line of Westchester avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of Westchester avenue; thence southwesterly and always distant 600 feet southeasterly from the southeasterly line of Westchester avenue to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Parker street and Zerega avenue, as these streets are laid out adjoining Westchester avenue; thence northwesterly along the said line midway between Parker street and Zerega avenue, and along the prolongation of the said line, to the point or place of beginning.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, adopted a resolution on January 11, 1907, authorizing the acquisition of title to Westchester avenue, between Main street (West Farms road) and the Eastern boulevard at Pelham Bay Park; to Lane avenue, between Westchester avenue and West Farms road; and to the public place bounded by Lane avenue, West Farms road and Westchester avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York; and

Whereas, The resolution authorizing the proceeding laid down an area of assessment for length in the said proceeding; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, deeming it for the public interest so to do, adopted a resolution on February 26, 1909, amending the area of assessment as laid down on January 11, 1907; and

Whereas, An error was made in the technical description of the boundary of the district of assessment adopted on February 26, 1909; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in pursuance of the provisions of the Greater New York Charter hereby gives notice that the following is the proposed corrected amended area of assessment for benefit in this proceeding:

Beginning at a point on a line midway between Parker street and Zerega avenue, where it is intersected by the prolongation of a line midway between Frisby avenue and Glebe avenue, as these streets are laid out northeasterly from Zerega avenue, and running thence northeasterly along the said line midway between Frisby avenue and Glebe avenue, and along the prolongation of the said line, to the intersection with a line midway between Zerega avenue and Rowland street; thence northwesterly along the said line midway between Zerega avenue and Rowland street to the intersection with a line midway between Glebe avenue and St. Raymond avenue, as these streets are laid out between Zerega avenue and Rowland street; thence northwesterly along the said line midway between Glebe avenue and St. Raymond avenue, and along the prolongation of the said line, to the intersection with a line midway between Overing street and Benson avenue; thence northwesterly along the said line midway between Overing street and Benson avenue, to a point distant 100 feet southeasterly from the southeasterly line of St. Raymond avenue; thence northeasterly and always distant 100 feet southeasterly from the southeasterly line of St. Raymond avenue and the prolongation thereof to the intersection with a line midway between Brocket avenue and Halperin avenue; thence northwesterly along the said line midway between Brocket avenue and Halperin avenue to a point distant 100 feet northeasterly from the northeasterly line of Blondell avenue; thence southwesterly and always distant 100 feet northeasterly from the northwesterly line of Blondell avenue to a point distant 600 feet northwesterly from the northwesterly line of Westchester avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of Westchester avenue; thence northeasterly, northwesterly, and northwesterly and always distant 600 feet northwesterly, westerly and northwesterly from the northwesterly lines of Westchester avenue, and the prolongation thereof, to a point distant 600 feet easterly from the westerly line of Pelham Bay Park, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of Pelham Bay Park; thence southwesterly along a line parallel with the westerly line of Pelham Bay Park, as laid out immediately northwest of Westchester avenue, and along the prolongation of the said line, to the intersection with the prolongation of the northwesterly line of Morris Park avenue, as laid out east of Westchester avenue; thence southwesterly along the said prolongation of the northwesterly line of Morris Park avenue to a point distant 250 feet easterly from the westerly line of Pelham Bay Park, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of Pelham Bay Park; thence southwesterly and always distant 250 feet easterly from the westerly line of Pelham Bay Park to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Bulre avenue and Roberts avenue, as these streets are laid out adjoining the Eastern boulevard; thence southwesterly along the said line midway between Bulre avenue and Roberts avenue, and along the prolongation of the said line, to the intersection with a line midway between Jarvis avenue and Mahan avenue; thence southeasterly along the said line midway between Jarvis avenue and Mahan avenue to a point distant 100 feet southeasterly from the southeasterly line of Roberts avenue; thence southwesterly along a line parallel with Roberts avenue, as laid out between Crosby avenue and the Eastern boulevard, and along the prolongation of the said line, to a point distant 600 feet southeasterly from the southeasterly line of Westchester avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of Westchester avenue; thence southwesterly and always distant 600 feet southeasterly from the southeasterly line of Westchester avenue to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Parker street and Zerega avenue, as these streets are laid out adjoining Westchester avenue; thence northwesterly along the said line midway between Parker street and Zerega avenue, and along the prolongation of the said line, to the point or place of beginning.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed corrected amended area of assessment at a meeting of the Board to be held in The City of New York, Borough of Manhattan, in the City Hall, on the 7th day of May, 1909, at 10.30 a. m., and that at the same time and place a public hearing thereon will then and there be had.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board cause these resolutions and a notice to all persons affected thereby to be published in the City Record for ten days prior to the 7th day of May, 1909.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

#### OPERATION OF THE STREET IMPROVEMENT FUND.

The following communication from the Comptroller was presented:

No. 280 Broadway, New York,  
April 12, 1909.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—In a report submitted about a year ago I called attention to the fact that the Street Improvement Fund was not being properly replenished by the payment of assessments, and that this condition was believed to be largely due to unnecessary delay on the part of the Borough Presidents in presenting assessment lists to the Board of Assessors. Partly for the purpose of correcting this condition and partly to avoid a further increase in the City debt, the authorization of further improvements was refused for several months and until after evidence was presented to show that the assessment lists were being prepared more rapidly, and they were later allowed at a limited rate dependent partly upon the estimated needs of each of the Boroughs and partly upon the rapidity with which the assessment lists were being reported from each.

The lists confirmed last year and entered upon the books of the Collector of Assessments and Arrears for collection aggregates approximately \$11,000,000, and on the basis of past experience it is probable that the entire amount will be returned during the present year. The Board of Assessors have also informed the Board that on Jan-



uary 19 last lists had been submitted to them and were awaiting confirmation aggregating in value nearly \$7,000,000.

To meet the accumulated demands for original improvements, and particularly those which relate to sewers for thickly settled communities where existing sanitary conditions require immediate correction, and to permit of developing the outlying sections as is necessary to permit of increasing property values, and also recognizing that any outlay from the Street Improvement Fund would not create a permanent addition to the City debt if properly administered, I believe that it would be proper to now remove the limitations heretofore imposed upon the expenditures, providing this can be done in such a way as to insure a prompt return of the assessment so that the capital involved may be utilized as far as possible.

The Chief Engineer of your Board informs me that an examination which he has made relative to the operation of the Street Improvement Fund, including the records for the last ten years and tracing the time interval required for each of the various steps in carrying out an improvement, show as follows:

Authorization to expenditure.....	15 months

He also states that the pressure recently exerted to secure greater promptness in carrying out improvements gives ample warrant for assuming that without change in present method the time interval for each step would be now safely estimated as follows:

Authorization to expenditure.....	12 months

I understand that it would be reasonable to assume that the average time interval required for confirming an assessment can be reduced to about five months, the efficiency of the Board of Assessors having now been increased to conduct this work in the large volume which it has recently been called upon to consider, in much less time than heretofore.

The new assessment law insures the ultimate return of assessments, but it is probable that the present time interval will not be materially affected.

In my judgment the time interval between authorization of an improvement and the actual expenditure is still too great as is also that between the latter and the return of the assessment list. The present delay in the completion of work and preparing assessment lists appears to be due partly to the authorization of trunk sewers in separate sections with long time intervals between authorizations, and the subsequent withholding of the assessment list until after all portions of the trunk have been completed, thereby causing a large expenditure for the preparation of maps but frequently requiring a delay of several years as an instance of which may be cited the Sixty-fifth street trunk sewer in Brooklyn; partly to single authorizations and subsequent contracts involving such a large amount of work that it cannot be completed until after many years have gone by; as an illustration of which may be instanced the Grand Boulevard and Concourse improvement in The Bronx, authorized in 1902 at a cost of over \$1,000,000 and still incomplete; partly to the premature authorization of improvements which cannot be completed by reason of failure to acquire all of the rights needed for entering upon the land as in the case of the St. George ferry improvement in Richmond, and the Lacombe avenue sewer in The Bronx; and partly to unexplained delays in making up the assessment lists as in the case with the Elmhurst sewerage system and disposal works and the Jamaica disposal works, in the Borough of Queens, both of which have been finished several years.

If all of these unnecessary delays were overcome and the work of the Board of Assessors were expedited, as appears reasonable to assume, I believe that it should be possible to reduce the time interval between authorization and expenditure to eight months, and the interval between expenditure and the actual return of the assessment list to six months. This progress would represent a total time interval of about two years and seven months between authorizations and collections, and of approximately two years between the actual expenditure and the collection. If this result could be accomplished the capital required for the operation of the Street Improvement Fund could be reduced one-third without any embarrassing effect.

I would, therefore, recommend that in removing the restrictions heretofore placed upon the value of improvements authorized and chargeable against the Street Improvement Fund the Board adopt the following rules:

First—That when an improvement is originally presented for consideration the resolution be accompanied with an approximate estimate of the cost of the work and the value of the property benefited, and that the Board then authorize the Borough President to prepare plans, specifications, assessment maps and an estimate of cost based on actual survey, the entire expense of the work done subsequent to the date of this authorization to be charged against the Street Improvement Fund and later included in the assessment.

Second—That an improvement be authorized after the Borough President submits a statement showing that all of the above described work has been done, that he has secured the approval of the form of contract by the Corporation Counsel, and that he is prepared to place the improvement under contract as soon as he receives the consent of the Board, this report being accompanied by a further statement indicating the length of time to be allowed the contractor for carrying out the work and also showing the expenditures charged against the improvement up to the date of the submission.

Third—That in other than exceptional cases improvements be limited in value to not more than \$100,000 each, those involving a greater amount being subdivided into separate resolutions to accomplish this result, and planned in sections of such length that the work on each can be completed within a year.

Fourth—That portions of a trunk system of sewers be hereafter simultaneously authorized to such extent as needed, to include all of the improvements required for a reasonable time in the future, so that the assessment for the entire work can be included in a single list and without incurring delay.

Fifth—That the quarterly reports submitted by the Borough Presidents to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereafter include a statement showing all of the improvements which have been placed under contract, but which are not complete, with the date of contract and the amount expended on each at the end of the quarter.

These provisions are included in the accompanying resolution, the adoption of which is recommended.

A communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, relating to the authorization of physical improvements, was presented and placed on file:

The following resolution was then adopted:

Resolved, That authorizations of local improvements hereafter granted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall be subject to the following rules and conditions:

First—That when an improvement is originally presented for consideration the resolution be accompanied with an approximate estimate of the cost of the work and the value of the property benefited, and that the Board then authorize the Borough President to prepare plans, specifications, assessment maps and an estimate of cost

based on actual survey, the entire expense of the work done subsequent to the date of this authorization to be charged against the Street Improvement Fund and later included in the assessment.

Second—That an improvement be authorized after the Borough President submits a statement showing that all of the above described work has been done, that he has secured the approval of the form of contract by the Corporation Counsel, and that he is prepared to place the improvement under contract as soon as he receives the consent of the Board, this report being accompanied by a further statement indicating the length of time to be allowed the contractor for carrying out the work and also showing the expenditures charged against the improvement up to the date of the submission.

Third—That in other than exceptional cases improvements be limited in value to not more than \$100,000 each, those involving a greater amount being subdivided into separate resolutions to accomplish this result, and planned in sections of such length that the work on each can be completed within a year.

That portions of a trunk system of sewers be hereafter simultaneously authorized to such extent as needed, to include all of the improvements required for a reasonable time in the future, so that the assessment for the entire work can be included in a single list and without incurring delay.

Fifth—That the quarterly reports submitted by the Borough Presidents to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereafter include a statement showing all of the improvements which have been placed under contract, but which are not complete, with the date of contract and the amount expended on each at the end of the quarter.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

#### CONSTRUCTING A SEWER THROUGH NEPTUNE AVENUE, BROOKLYN.

The following communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn was presented:

Brooklyn, April 7, 1909.

The Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—In communication to the Board of March 5 I presented an application for a special allowance of \$108,000 in the allotment of the proceeds of street improvement bonds to provide for the construction of an outlet sewer at Coney Island through Neptune avenue, stating that the very small allowances parcelled out by the Board on the basis of the Comptroller's resolution of September 18, 1908, were exhausted by distributions to care for small assessment improvements throughout the Borough.

This matter was referred to the Engineer of the Board, who immediately reported out the resolution, but had no authority to make this special allotment for work of urgent character referred to in his recommendation of May 2, 1908.

I therefore submit for immediate consideration resolution as follows:  
"Resolved, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, That the allotment for the Street Improvement Fund for the Borough of Brooklyn for the quarter beginning April 1, 1909, be increased by the sum of one hundred and eight thousand dollars (\$108,000), to be expended by the President of that Borough in the construction of a sewer through Neptune avenue, as provided for by resolution of this Board of March 12, 1909."

#### PAVING OCEAN AVENUE FROM A POINT 180 FEET NORTH OF AVENUE F TO AVENUE H, AND FROM AVENUE I TO KINGS HIGHWAY, WHERE NOT ALREADY PAVED, BROOKLYN.

The following communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn was presented:

OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN,  
Brooklyn, April 8, 1909.

The Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—On June 27, 1907, a Local Board resolution providing for the paving of Ocean avenue, with asphalt on a concrete foundation, in the vicinity of Avenue F, to Kings highway, at an estimated cost of \$86,000, was passed and forwarded to the Board of Estimate for approval.

Owing to the narrow restrictions in the allotment for assessment work, against which I have repeatedly protested without effect, it has been impossible to carry on this important work, and the street is in a disgraceful condition. Provision for all the subsurface improvements has been made, and there is every reason for proceeding with this improvement as soon as the Board of Estimate allows the development of the City to proceed.

I therefore urge present consideration of resolution as follows:

"Resolved, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, That an additional allowance for the Street Improvement Fund for the Borough of Brooklyn for the quarter beginning April 1, 1909, be made to the amount of eighty-six thousand dollars (\$86,000), for the purpose of paving with asphalt on a concrete foundation, Ocean avenue, from a point 180 feet north of Avenue F, to Avenue H, and from Avenue I to Kings highway, where not already paved."

#### RESOLUTIONS GOVERNING THE WIDTH AND USE OF ROADWAYS AND SIDEWALKS, ETC.

This matter was before the Board at the meeting held on September 25, 1908, and was referred to the Corporation Counsel and the Borough Presidents.

The following report of the Chief Engineer and communications were presented:  
REPORT NO. 6584.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT,  
OFFICE OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER,  
April 7, 1909.

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

SIR—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on September 25, 1908, there was presented a report from the Division of Public Improvements calling attention to the lack of uniformity among the various Boroughs in the treatment of streets having the same width, and to the fact that by reason of ordinances included in the aldermanic code and purporting to give the abutting property owners permission to use portions of the street width, it frequently became necessary to widen streets at a very large cost when such widening would not be imperative in case the encroachment were to be removed. There was also presented a copy of a communication from the Corporation Counsel advising that there was no power, either in the Legislature or Common Council to legalize the appropriation of any portion of a street which would prevent the use of the entire width of the sidewalk.

A form of resolution was at this time submitted, which was intended to definitely regulate the width of the sidewalk and roadway for all of the City streets, applying



uniformly to all of the Boroughs and at the same time providing for the gradual removal of encroachments, the resolution being enforced only as street improvements were made subsequent to its adoption.

The attention of the Board was also called to the great expense frequently imposed upon property owners benefited by street opening proceedings by reason of the erection of buildings partly or wholly within street lines, cases of which character have recently been reported upon relative to buildings erected subsequent to the initiation of opening proceedings and evidently either through ignorance of the City plan or for the purpose of securing an extravagant award or for preventing the street improvement. To correct this condition it was suggested that the President of each Borough be requested to instruct his Superintendent of Buildings to refuse permits for new buildings or for alterations to old ones which would encroach upon the street lines as laid out upon the City plan. It was understood that the legality of this course, in so far as it applied to streets not owned by the City, might be seriously questioned, but it was believed that the adoption of the resolution would enable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to institute an opening proceeding in case the applicant for such a permit should appeal to the Court to compel its issue, and to thereby frustrate the object sought.

Both these resolutions were referred to the Corporation Counsel and to the Presidents of the various Boroughs with the request that they advise the Board whether, in their judgment, the proposed treatment would be followed with advantageous results.

Since this date responses have been received from the Corporation Counsel, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Queens, and the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

Concerning the proposed treatment of streets less than 50 feet wide the Presidents of Queens and Richmond concur in the suggestions made, but the Chief Engineer of The Bronx urges that such streets should not be allowed. The latter criticism is manifestly a proper one in so far as future street planning is concerned but the provision was intended to relate to streets and alleys which are now in use.

In the matter of the treatment of the roadway which of wider streets the Presidents of Queens and Richmond and the Chief Engineer of The Bronx agree with the plan proposed, except that the President of Queens urges that franchises should not be given for single track trolley roads which would occupy streets having a width of less than 50 feet or for double track roads for streets less than 60 feet wide, and he suggests that for existing cases of this character the determination as to the width of roadways and sidewalks should be left to the President of the Borough affected. The Chief Engineer of The Bronx urges that the minimum roadway width for single track trolleys be fixed at 35 feet and for double track roads at 45 feet, and that if a widening of the streets is required it be provided for in the franchise and at the expense of the railroad company. In so far as these suggestions relate to future franchises it is evident that they do not properly belong to this discussion but that they are rather questions of policy for the Board to determine when granting such privileges. The roadway widths proposed were based on an allowance of 8 feet 4 inches for a single trolley car and of 18 feet 6 inches for two cars on a double track line. The minimum roadway width of 30 feet and 40 feet originally suggested for single and double track trolley lines, respectively, were intended to leave a minimum clear space between the car and the curb of about 11 feet in each case. These limitations seem to be reasonable ones and I believe that they should be retained. In case peculiarities exist in any particular street which could not be covered by a general ordinance and it seems to be anticipated by the President of the Borough of Queens, the determination could be made the subject of a special resolution in case the general resolution now presented were to be approved.

In the matter of treatment of corners the President of the Borough of Richmond approves the suggestions made, as does also the President of the Borough of Queens, except that he suggests 6 feet as the minimum radius and the adoption of standard signs, and he also shows that the acute corners provided for in the resolution are not used in his Borough, sharp angles being removed by flaring the intersection. The Chief Engineer of The Bronx advises that owing to peculiarities which often exist at intersections it would be inadvisable to hamper the treatment by rigid rules. The criticism as to the adoption of staggered areas for each radius is well founded, but I believe that the minimum should be 5 feet as originally proposed and that the radius should not exceed 12 feet for the wider streets instead of ranging up to 20 feet as suggested by the President of the Borough of Queens. The criticism of the Chief Engineer of The Bronx is doubtless a justifiable one in so far as it relates to the special treatment which will be frequently required, but there appears to be no reason why it should not be overcome by a special rule and thus made a matter of record. The proposed temporary park spaces are objected to by the Corporation Counsel, by the President of the Borough of Queens and by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx, the latter holding that such a provision would be illegal. It will therefore be necessary to omit this provision.

Concerning the refusal of permits for buildings and alterations which would involve an encroachment upon the street lines as laid out upon the City plan, the President of the Borough of Manhattan submits a report from his Superintendent of Buildings advising that the course suggested could be adopted.

In the accompanying communication from the President of the Borough of Richmond, dated March 20, 1909, the attention of the Board is drawn to the fact that "ample time to consider the provisions of the report has elapsed, and the development of at least the early portions of the City is being seriously handicapped because of the non-consideration of maps laid for approval" and he requests that the Board immediately consider the proposed resolutions and adopt them at the earliest possible date.

Reconsidering the criticisms which have been offered as to the desirability of adopting standard dimensions but the radii of curb corners and as to the lack of power to authorize the enclosures of any portion of the sidewalk as a temporary park space as being merely, and also to permit of reconciling the resolution relating to roadway and sidewalk width with those which have been adopted relating to Fifth Avenue and Forty-second Street since the date when it was originally submitted, the form has been amended and is again presented for consideration. It is my belief that it adequately meets the requirements and I can see no reason why it should not be adopted. The roadway and sidewalk width for streets of various widths as contemplated under this resolution are as follows:

Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—I am in receipt of a communication from Joseph Haag, Esq., Secretary to your Board enclosing therewith a pamphlet communication from the Engineer in charge of public improvements, submitting a proposed ordinance governing the width of roadways and sidewalks, and a suggestion that the President of each Borough instruct the Superintendent of Buildings to refuse to issue permits for buildings which would encroach upon streets laid out upon the City map, with the request that the Corporation Counsel advise your Board at the earliest date possible, whether the proposed treatment could be adopted with beneficial results.

After an examination of the report and the proposed ordinance in question, I am unable to advise you as to whether or not that part of the proposed ordinance embraced within paragraphs 1 to 3, inclusive, would be, if enacted, beneficial or practical, as that is a matter peculiarly within the knowledge and province of the Presidents of the several Boroughs of The City of New York. In my opinion those portions of the proposed ordinance would be legal if enacted.

With respect to paragraph 4 of the proposed ordinance, I am of the opinion that such a provision is not only legal, but that any other permit than the one mentioned would be clearly illegal, with or without the enactment of such an ordinance.

With respect to paragraph 5 of the proposed ordinance, I am of the opinion that so much of such paragraph as proposes to give authority for the enclosure by abutting owners of any portion of the sidewalk, whether such space is treated as a park space or whether surrounded by an ornamental or any other kind of fence or enclosure, would be clearly beyond the power of the Board of Aldermen or any other body or officer of The City of New York to grant, it having been decided repeatedly by the courts of highest jurisdiction that the streets are for public use only and that no portion of them can be taken for other than a public use.

SIR—In the matter of the proposed ordinance governing the width of roadways and sidewalks in streets, etc., in the Greater New York, recommended by you in a communication addressed to His Honor the Mayor, and dated September 21, 1908, I beg to say that there are so many questions involved in this proposition that I am not able to go over the matter as thoroughly as I would like, but there are certain suggestions which I might make offhand, and I give these below:

1. The roadway width of streets:
  - (a) No street of 20 feet in width should henceforth be allowed.
  - (b) No street less than 50 feet in width with dwelling houses facing thereon should henceforth be allowed.
  - (c) Streets of from 50 to 60 feet wide should have a roadway of 30 feet; no sidewalk privileges.
  - (d) Streets, width 60 to 66 feet 8 inches, roadway one-half of street width.
  - (e) Streets wider than 66 feet 8 inches, roadway 80 per cent. of width, less 20 feet.
  - (f) Manhattan.
  - (g) For street in which there is a single-track railroad the minimum roadway is to be 35 feet.
  - (h) Streets in which there is a double-track railroad the minimum roadway width is to be 45 feet.
  - (i) Where a franchise is desired in streets having a narrower roadway than is here required, part of the franchise should be the paying of the assessment for the widening of the street, which might be wide enough for traffic if there were no railroad.
  - (j) No sidewalk should be permitted of less width than 10 feet.

2. Curb Corners—This section seems not only unnecessary, but as proposed would be frequently impracticable; the numerous conditions governing a street, such as elevated railroad columns, heavy grades in opposite directions, intersecting streets, require the careful consideration of the conditions by the Engineer, and he should not be hampered by rigid rules.

3. Roadways—These should be centrally located in general, though at times there arise conditions where it is not advisable.

4. Encroachments on Streets—No encroachment shall be permitted upon any roadway unless authorized by a franchise.

5. Sidewalks—No encroachment should be allowed upon the sidewalk, nor within the lines of the street below a horizontal plane 10 feet above the curb. No park space should be provided. The street control should be vested in one authority.

DEAR SIR—Referring to your communication of recent date, I beg to transmit herewith two copies of a proposed ordinance governing the width and use of roadways



and sidewalks for streets in The City of New York, the same being your proposed ordinance transmitted to me sometime ago for such suggestions as might be necessary where special treatment of a street is desired, such as the widening of a roadway, or the introduction of parking, and for such modifications as may seem proper to satisfy our conditions in this Borough.

The changes I would recommend affect the clauses governing the width of roadways for such streets as are now occupied, or shall be occupied in the future, by street railways. It seems to me that in case a street railway is now being operated on a street which it would be practically impossible to widen, that the final determination of the widths for roadways and sidewalks should be left to the discretion of the President of the Borough in which such street is located, rather than to adopt a fixed rule such as was suggested, which in some cases would require the greater part of the width of the street for a roadway, leaving little or nothing for sidewalks.

Another recommendation affects the matter of curb returns. These must necessarily vary under different conditions, and the rule by which they were fixed, as suggested, made it practically impossible for a contractor or a mason who might wish to keep a supply of stock sizes, to do so, on account of the fact that the radii for the said returns varied in length inch by inch, from about 5 feet to 20 feet. I have modified this resolution so that eight standard sizes will cover all conditions that might arise.

In the case of acute angles, no provision had been made for a condition that now exists on our final maps. On these maps the Topographical Bureau has seen fit to cut off the acute angles by a line at right angles to either of the intersecting house lines. I have therefore added a clause that would govern the location and width of the sidewalks under these conditions.

Another change I have suggested is one regarding the clause on encroachments, by eliminating that part of the clause suggested, which gave a discretionary authority to certain officials permitting the private use or temporary inclosure of certain portions of legally opened streets.

The above changes and modifications of proposed ordinance governing the width and use of roadways and sidewalks for streets in The City of New York by the Consulting Engineer of the Borough of Queens, meets my hearty approval.

*Proposed Ordinance Governing the Width and Use of Roadways and Sidewalks for Streets in The City of New York by the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as Modified by the Consulting Engineer of the Borough of Queens.*

Whereas, The utilization of portions of the public highways for private use is unauthorized by law, and not only frequently necessitates the laying out and acquisition of title at large expense to a greater street width than is actually required for public use, but also withdraws from the taxable area land which is at present devoted to private use.

Resolved, That unless otherwise provided by franchise or by a special ordinance of this Board, the following rules shall apply to all streets which may hereafter be improved within the limits of The City of New York:

1. The roadway width of street shall be such as to give a clear space between curb lines, as follows:

(a) For streets less than 20 feet wide and used for vehicular traffic, the width of the roadway shall correspond with the street width less the space occupied by the curb.

(b) For streets having a width ranging from 20 feet to 50 feet and not occupied by a railroad, the width of the roadway shall be 60 per cent of the total width of the street.

(c) For streets having a width ranging from 50 feet to 60 feet and not occupied by a double track railroad, the roadway shall have a width of 30 feet.

(d) For streets having a width ranging from 60 feet to 66 feet 8 inches, and not occupied by a double track railroad, the width of the roadway shall be one-half of the total width of the street.

(e) For all streets having a width of over 66 feet 8 inches, except Fifth avenue, between Twenty-fifth street and Forty-seventh street, Borough of Manhattan, the roadway width shall be 80 per cent of the street width less 20 feet, provided, however, that if the street is occupied by a double track railroad, the minimum roadway width herein prescribed for such railroad shall be required.

(f) For Fifth avenue, between Twenty-fifth street and Forty-seventh street, Borough of Manhattan, the roadway width shall be 55 feet.

(g) For streets in which there is a single track railroad, the minimum width of roadway shall be 30 feet. No franchise shall be granted hereafter upon streets less than 40 feet 6 inches in width.

(h) For streets in which there is a double track railroad the minimum roadway shall be 40 feet. No franchise shall be granted hereafter for a double track railroad on streets less than 60 feet in width.

2. The curb corners at street intersections where the interior angle is 30 degrees or more shall be turned with a curve having a radius equivalent to 10 per cent of the width of the wider street; provided, however, that the radius shall not be less than 6 feet, nor less than 20 per cent of the distance between the building line corner and the point of intersection of the curb tangents; provided further, that this clause shall be subject to the following standard dimensions for stock articles cut or formed to radii 6, 8, 10, 12, 14, 16, 18 and 20 feet; and that in case any length of radius falls between the standards, the next higher standard dimension shall be used.

For intersections where the interior angle is less than 30 degrees a tangent shall be inserted in the curb line at the corner, at right angles to the line, bisecting the said interior angle and at a distance from the building line corner equivalent to the width of the wider sidewalk of the intersecting streets, the said distance being measured along the bisecting line. For intersections of streets where the acute interior angle has been eliminated by a line at right angles to either house line, a tangent curb line shall be placed parallel to such line and at a distance equivalent to the width of the wider sidewalk. The curves to connect the above tangents with the curb lines of the intersecting streets shall each have a radius of 6 feet.

3. The roadway shall be centrally located between the street lines, and for streets having a width of 20 feet or more the remaining spaces on each side of the roadway shall be designated as the sidewalks.

4. No encroachments shall be permitted upon any roadway unless authorized by franchise.

5. No encroachment of a permanent nature shall be permitted upon the sidewalk space of streets owned in fee or shall hereafter be permitted upon an easement street, between the elevation of the curb and a horizontal plane 10 feet above the elevation of the curb.

Resolved, That all ordinances, resolutions, permits and licenses heretofore passed, issued, or granted by The City of New York or by any board, body, council or officer thereof, or any department, division, bureau or officer thereof, permitting, licensing or allowing any encroachment of whatever kind or description upon the public street in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby in all respects cancelled and revoked, with the exception of the special ordinance adopted by this Board on April 10, 1908, prohibiting encroachments upon Fifth avenue, between Twenty-fifth street and Forty-seventh street, Borough of Manhattan, which ordinance is hereby perpetuated.

In all cases where the widths provided for roadways and sidewalks of streets now occupied by railroad tracks shall conflict with provisions of this resolution, the President of any borough shall have the authority, in cases of proposed repavements or pavements, to regulate the widths on such streets for roadway and sidewalks.

GENTLEMEN—On September 25, 1908, there was reported to the Board from the Division of Public Improvements, office of the Chief Engineer, a proposed ordinance governing "widths and use of roadways and sidewalks for streets in The City of New York." This proposed ordinance was prepared after long consultation with

representatives of the different Boroughs and we are advised met the views of a large majority of the interests affected. The present ordinance conditions governing the subject are exceedingly unsatisfactory, and as the courts have decided that it is not within the province of any even legislative body to accord rights of issue permits which shall cause a permanent interference with the full public use of the streets, fence line to fence line, the present ordinance is invalid, and comments for such construction, even though revocable, are without warrant in law.

Inasmuch as ample time to consider the provisions of the report has elapsed, and the development of at least the outlying portions of the City is being seriously handicapped because of the non-adoption of maps filed for approval, we would ask that immediate consideration be given by the Board to the ordinance in question, and that it be adopted at the earliest possible date.

To that end, we would ask that the matter be reported out and placed upon the earliest possible calendar.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO SECTIONS 970, 979, 980, 981 AND 985 OF THE GREATER NEW YORK CHARTER.

The following communication from the Corporation Counsel was presented:

CITY OF NEW YORK—LAW DEPARTMENT,  
OFFICE OF THE CORPORATION COUNSEL,  
New York, April 12, 1909.

JOSEPH HAAG, Esq., Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIR—I inclose herewith for consideration by your Board a proposed act amending sections 970, 979, 980, 981 and 985 of the Greater New York Charter, revised, as amended.

These amendments provide:

First—That your Board, in proceedings which embrace more than one street, may fix and determine upon a separate area of assessment for each street and authorize the making of partial reports, both as to awards and as to assessments for benefit embracing each street.

Second—That it may impose part of the cost and expense of a proceeding upon any entire Borough or Boroughs and authorize the Commissioner of Assessment to make such an assessment for benefit, by reference to the tax maps of said Borough or Boroughs, in proportion to the benefit received, in which case it is to fix his compensation.

Third—That it may fix and determine upon zones or sub-zones of benefit within the entire area of assessment in pending as well as in future proceedings, and fix the proportion or percentages of the cost and expense of the proceeding which shall be distributed by the Commissioner of Assessment within such zone or sub-zone.

Fourth—That it may direct that the whole or part of the entire cost and expense of preparing rule, damage, benefit and tax maps for the use of Commissioners of Estimate and the Commissioner of Assessment shall be included in the cost and expense of the proceeding to be assessed upon the property benefited.

In your communication to me of March 2, 1909, transmitting copies of the papers relative to filing a partial report covering the awards in the proceedings for acquiring title to Rosedale avenue, Commonwealth avenue, St. Lawrence avenue, Taylor avenue, Beach avenue, Throer avenue and Leland avenue, Borough of The Bronx, it was stated that this matter was referred to me to advise the Board whether or not the recommendations contained in the report of the Chief Engineer are practicable.

I am of the opinion that the only practicable method of expediting a proceeding which embraces more than one street is to authorize the Commissioners therein to make their awards and their assessments on the installment plan, i. e., street by street. The amendment above referred to will be the best method to remedy the defect that now exists in the law with reference to joining several streets in one proceeding.

In your communication to me of March 15, 1909, transmitting copies of the papers in the matter of acquiring title to Riverside drive, from West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street to the Henry Hudson Memorial Bridge, Borough of Manhattan, you stated that this matter was referred to me with the request that I prepare a bill and secure its adoption at this session of the Legislature which will permit of laying out zones of benefit for assessable improvement, and of collecting an assessment levied upon one or more Boroughs as a whole, in connection with the annual tax levy or in a series of such levies.

The amendments contained in the proposed act will, in my opinion, enable such a procedure to be adopted which will be legal. It is a serious question where part of an assessment for benefit can be imposed upon a part of The City of New York as a tax levy. Accordingly, I have provided that this assessment shall be still levied by the Commissioner of Assessment to be appointed in the proceeding, that assessment maps need not be prepared, but that reference need only be made in the assessment list to the block, lot and ward numbers, as shown on the tax maps of each Borough, and that a set of such tax maps be filed in the Bureau of Street Openings for reference by the Commissioner of Assessment in his report. In case an assessment is levied on an entire Borough or Boroughs, the compensation of the Commissioner of Assessment is to be fixed by your Board.

I have heretofore stated to you that I would prepare an amendment to the present Charter providing that the cost and expense of the preparation of rule, damage and benefit maps by the Borough Presidents of the respective Boroughs should be included in the assessment for benefit in the proceedings for which they are prepared. The proposed act contains suitable amendments for this purpose, and also includes a provision that the preparation of the tax maps required for the use of an assessment laid upon an entire Borough or Boroughs shall also be included in the assessment for benefit.

### MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held at the Commission's Offices, No. 299 Broadway, on Wednesday, March 10, 1909, at 10 a. m.

Present—President Frank L. Polk and Commissioners R. Ross Appleton and Arthur J. O'Keefe.

The President, Mr. Frank L. Polk, presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the rules by changing clause 4 of Rule VIII, to read as follows:

"4. An application presented within the prescribed limits of time, but found to be defective, shall be suspended, and notification shall be given to the applicant of the particulars in which it requires correction. Such an application shall be accepted if corrected, and returned five days before the date of examination, but not otherwise."

These were an opposition and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

Joseph H. Maloney appeared before the Commission, as directed, to show cause why his appointment as Patrolman in the Police Department should not be revoked, under paragraph 6 of Rule XI, for having deceived the Commission as to his age. At the conclusion of the hearing the candidate was granted one week in which to produce official proof as to the date of his birth.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meeting held March 3 were approved.

On motion it was:

Resolved, That clause 4 of Rule VIII, of the Municipal Civil Service Rules be and the same hereby is amended to read as follows:

"4. An application presented within the prescribed limits of time, but found to be defective, shall be suspended, and notification shall be given to the applicant of the particulars in which it requires correction. Such an application shall be accepted if corrected and returned five days before the date of examination, but not otherwise."

On the recommendation of the Committee on Transfers the following transfers were approved:

Joseph F. Flattery, from the position of Process Server, at a salary of \$1.15 per service in the Law Department, to that of Process Server, at a salary of \$1.050 per annum, in the Bureau of Buildings, Borough of Brooklyn.

Alfred A. Sparks, from the position of Laborer to that of Messenger in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, under the authority of paragraph 3 of Rule XIV, he having formerly held a position of similar character.

John Coonan, from the position of Inspector (competitive class), salary 50 cents per hour, to that of Lineman (labor class), salary \$4.50 per day, in the Department of Bridges, under the authority of paragraph 3 of Rule XIV, he having formerly held the position of Lineman.

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for, and proposed to be granted to the South Shore Traction Company, and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor; and, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the South Shore Traction Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced, and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the South Shore Traction Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained; and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

#### PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract made this day of 1909, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the South Shore Traction Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the following rights and privileges:

First—To construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway with the necessary wires and equipment for the purpose of conveying persons and property in the Boroughs of Queens and Manhattan of The City of New York, upon the following routes, to wit:

Beginning at the westerly side line of the Queensboro Bridge plaza, the same being the northwesterly side line of Jackson avenue; thence by double track southeasterly across Jackson avenue to a proposed new street, as named and laid out upon a map or plan, which map was adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 26, 1905, and approved by the Mayor June 13, 1905; thence by double track in and upon said proposed new street and across the proposed viaduct to be constructed as a part of such proposed new street to Thompson avenue; thence by double track in and upon Thompson avenue to Hoffman boulevard; thence by double track in and upon Hoffman boulevard to Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpike or Fulton street; thence by double track in and upon Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpike or Fulton street to Central avenue; thence by double track in and upon Central avenue to Archer place; thence by double track

—and signed by James T. Wood, as President, and W. H. Spencer, Chief Engineer, a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations, alterations and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers, which are consistent with the foregoing description, and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Second—To operate the cars of the Company upon two tracks when constructed upon the Queensboro Bridge and approaches thereon, such tracks to be assigned to the Company by the Commissioner of Bridges; beginning at the northwesterly side line of Jackson avenue at the bridge plaza, in the Borough of Queens, and there connecting with the tracks of the Company above described; thence in and upon said bridge plaza to the easterly approach to the Queensboro Bridge; thence upon and along said bridge approach and across intersecting streets and avenues to the Queensboro Bridge; thence upon and along the Queensboro Bridge to the westerly bridge approach; thence upon and along said westerly bridge approach to the westerly terminus thereof at Second avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan. The said route is more particularly shown upon the map heretofore referred to, and is to be operated by the Company as a continuous route in connection with the route heretofore described.

Sec. 2. The grant of the right or privilege to construct, maintain and operate the said railway from the Queensboro Bridge plaza, at Jackson avenue, Borough of Queens, to the intersection of Central avenue and the boundary line between the Borough of Queens and the County of Nassau, upon the route heretofore described, is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—It is agreed that the Company, before commencing construction on any portion of the routes heretofore described as lying between the intersection of Hoffman boulevard with Piercen street and the intersection of Merrick Plank road with Central avenue, shall notify the Board in writing which of the routes herein described between those points the Company selects and adopts as the route upon which it shall construct the railway. Upon such notification by the Company to the Board, all of the rights and privileges hereby granted upon the routes not so selected and designated shall be considered null and void and of no effect, and the Company shall be deemed thereupon to have waived all rights or franchises which are hereby granted upon the routes not so selected and designated by the Company. The Company further agrees that it shall select and designate its route as herein provided not later than eighteen (18) months from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

Second—The Company shall not construct a double-track street surface railway upon any portion of the routes heretofore described between Jackson avenue and the intersection of Merrick Plank road with Central avenue, unless the streets and avenues in which such routes are described shall have at the time when such railway shall be constructed, a roadway at least 30 feet in width, and the Company shall not construct a double-track street surface railway in Guilford street if it now exists or may be extended, unless the roadway of that street shall exceed 30 feet in width.

Third—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property benefited on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within six (6) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consent shall be filed with the Board within such time, but the Board may, for cause shown, grant an additional period not exceeding three (3) months within which to obtain and file such consents of property owners, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time or such extension of such time as shall be granted by the Board, the Company shall, within one (1) month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Fourth—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of twenty-five (25) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at or before the expiration of the term of the original term of this contract, and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be subject to the approval in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation in the City be fixed at a sum less than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable; but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may have their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation as ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract then the Company shall pay the annual rate therefore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Fifth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

Sixth—If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Seventh—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or

other terms and conditions over the routes heretofore described.

The use of the railway, constructed by the Company under this contract, including the tracks, wires and other equipment, or any structures used in connection therewith in streets, avenues and private property heretofore described shall be permitted by the Company to any individual or corporation to which the City may have granted, or may hereafter grant, the right or privilege to use such streets, avenues and private property for street railway purposes, upon payment by such individual or corporation to the Company the following:

(a) An initial payment to be mutually agreed upon by said corporation or individual and the Company, and in case of failure on the part of such individual or corporation and the Company to agree upon the amount of such initial payment, such amount shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner: One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the individual or corporation; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall determine the amount of such payment. Such appraisers, in fixing such amount, shall consider compensation to the Company for: First, the sinking fund which may have been or should have been set aside for the retirement of the total investment represented by such property of the Company as is used by said individual or corporation, from the date of the granting of this franchise to the date upon which said individual or corporation begins the use of such property of the Company; second, the moneys expended by the Company in its organization and promotion; third, the increased value of the territory as a district suitable for railway operation, which increase may have resulted from the operation of the Company; fourth, the loss of business to the Company which may result from direct competition on its own lines; fifth, any other purpose or purposes which the appraisers may deem as justly due to said Company by such individual or corporation for the use of such property. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne by such individual or corporation.

(b) An annual payment which shall equal the legal interest on such proportion of the actual cost of the construction of such railway and structures, and additions and betterments thereto, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same; and also such proportion of the cost of keeping the tracks and electrical equipment in repair, and the cost of additions and betterments thereto, such proportion of laying and replacing of pavement and removal of snow and ice and all other duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract in connection with the maintenance or the operation of said railway as used, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same, together with the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars (thereon of such individual or corporation). Provided, however, that if, in the opinion of the Company, the legal rate of interest upon the cost of such railway shall be an insufficient sum to be paid for the use of such tracks, it may appeal to the Board, and the Board may fix a percentage upon the cost to be paid to the Company, at a sum in excess of the legal rate of interest, if, in its opinion, such action is justified.

The Company shall not at any time remove, but shall, upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction at operation, upon the routes heretofore described, of any street surface railway which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed by the Company pursuant to this contract.

Seventh—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of Queens, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board, and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Provided, however, that the Board, at any time after the first ten (10) years of this contract, upon giving to the Company one (1) year's notice, may require the Company to operate its railway upon the whole or any portion of its route lying in and northwesterly from the Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpike, or Fulton street, and at any time after the first fifteen (15) years of this contract upon giving to the Company one year's notice, may require the Company to operate its railway upon the whole or any portion of its route lying southeasterly from the Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpike, or Fulton street, by underground electric power, substantially similar to the system now in use on the street surface railways in the Borough of Manhattan, or by any other practical motive power than in use which does not require the use of poles and overhead wires in the streets and avenues, and thereupon to discontinue the use of the overhead trolley system and remove its poles, wires and other structures used by it for that purpose, from the streets and avenues of the City.

Eighth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railway shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water, Steam, Gas and Electricity.

Ninth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within six (6) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are obtained, or from the date upon which the decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court that such railway ought to be constructed is rendered in lieu of such consents, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within two (2) years from the date of obtaining such consents or such decision, otherwise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deemed with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided, that such period may be extended by the Board for a period of periods not exceeding in the aggregate six (6) months each; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be ascertained by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided, further, that in no case







payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the efficiency of the public service rendered, the removal of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice and the quality of construction of the roadway, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice in writing to the Company; or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this contract relating to the roadway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheel-guards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheel-guards, in case of the violation of the provisions relating to these matters.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or after a hearing appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding at right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Seventeenth.—The Company within three (3) months after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, exclusive of the rights conferred upon the Commissioners of the City of New York, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City a further sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) either in money or security to be approved by him, which said further sum shall be returned to the Company upon completion of the construction of a double track street surface railway from Jackson avenue at the Queensboro plaza and the intersection of Hoffman boulevard with Brown street, and put the same in operation within fifteen (15) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are obtained, necessary for the lawful construction of such railway, or from the date upon which the decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court that such railway ought to be constructed is rendered in favor of such consent.

For the purpose of facilitating the work of the Company in constructing and putting in operation said section of its railway, it is hereby consented that the Company may construct its temporary overhead crossing on Thomson avenue within the lines of said avenue.

If such railway shall be constructed and put in operation at any time within such period, a certificate stating that such railway has been constructed and put in operation shall be prepared by the President of the Company, and delivered to the Board, and the Board shall immediately thereafter verify the correctness of such statement and either accept such statement as correct, or, if it deems it to be incorrect, return said certificate to the Company, specifying in writing the respects in which it deems such statement to be incorrect. If such statement is found by the Board to be correct, or is thereafter proven to be correct, the Board shall thereupon adopt a resolution directing the Comptroller to return to the Company the said sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000). Unless such a certificate is delivered to the Board by the Company, and the statement therein contained accepted by said Board as correct, or proven by the Company to be correct, then such sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) shall be forfeited to and become the property of the City. If at any time prior to the time specified in this clause for the completion and operation of that portion of the line described in this clause, the right to construct a street surface railway upon all or any portions of such line is granted to any other railroad corporation, then and in that case the Board shall thereupon by resolution authorize and direct that the Comptroller of the City of New York return the said sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) to the said South Shore Traction Company.

Eighteenth.—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become imperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Nineteenth.—The words "streets or avenues" and "highways and avenues," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, boulevards, footpaths, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property in which the City has title" encountered in the route hereinabove described, and upon or in which authority is hereby given to the Company to construct a railway.

Twentieth.—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

See 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law, pertinent herein, shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

See 6. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, therein duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed, and the party of the second part, by its officers,

thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to include the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
