Whereas, a resolution was adopted by the Industrial Commission on the 17th day of July, 1917, granting to the Harrison Radiator Corporation of Lockport, N. Y., a variation from the provisions of Section 79-a-2 of the Labor Law, permitting six exits as the required number in a proposed building to be located at Walnut, Elm, Washburn and Seymour aves., Lockport, N. Y.; and

Whereas, an examination of the plans and inspection of said building was made and a report of such examination is on file in the offices of the Commission, from which examination it appears that the said building is two (2) stories high, of fireproof construction, sprinklered, approximately 396 feet 8 inches by 162 feet 8 inches; is occupied by owners and used for the manufacture of automobile radiators (metal), with an occupancy of about two hundred and fifty (250) persons above the ground floor; exits are shown to be three interior fireproof enclosed stairways, each 48 inches wide, two fireproof horizontal exits by means of bridges, each 7 feet wide, leading to a building 23 feet distant, and one fireproof horizontal exit by means of a bridge 44 inches wide to a building approximately 10 feet distant; and

Whereas, the occupancy, as stated above, is about 250 persons above the ground floor; and

Whereas, an occupancy allowance of not more than 500 persons above the ground floor is desired; and

Whereas, the six proposed exits as described above will accommodate an occupancy of approximately 750 persons if the building be sprinklered and approximately 500 persons without sprinkler system.

Be it resolved that the resolution permitting six exits as the required number of exits to consist of three interior fireproof enclosed stairways constructed in accordance with Section 79-a-3 of the Labor Law, and three horizontal exits as described above, be and the same is hereby amended to permit an occupancy of not more than 500 persons.

Be it further resolved that the said variation as amended be granted only during the period that the conditions above set forth as to exits, number of occupants, nature of industry, etc., etc., are maintained.

Resolutions Adopted.

Whereas, the Division of Factory Inspection has submitted to this Commission the following requests for variation of law, made by the parties named herein, whereby appeal is made from a strict compliance with the orders issued by the Division of Inspection, the granting of which would necessitate a variation of law; and

Whereas, the Division of Factory Inspection has had a reinspection made of the premises in each case, and in accordance with the reports submitted recommends as follows:

Premises affected, (1) Buffalo; appellant, Buffalo Weaving Co. Provide hot water and individual towels for use of employees. This order

is applied to the entire Rubber Department of company; upon reinspection by the Division of Industrial Hygiene, it was reported that the Department could accept running hot water and individual towels for employees engaged in mixing the rubber before being vulcanized.

Recommendation: That order be modified to permit of acceptance of two faucets for hot water and individual towels for men

Premisses affected, (16) Niagara Falls, Main and Division sts., appellants. Jenks Brothers. Prohibit occupancy. 3 approved means of exit. This matter was before the Commission on Feb. 8, 1917, at which time it was decided that the orders were to be complied with. On June 20th the Commission accepted the construction of an addition to the building 8 feet wide, the full length of the building and exits to be provided therein and the factory occupancy to be located there when same was completed.

It is now claimed that this addition will cost \$18,000, and permission is asked to leave the present interior stairway unenclosed and erect at the southeast corner of the building a 44-inch fireproof enclosed stairway with 10-inch tread, 7½-inch drive.

Recommendation. In view of the provisions of Chapter 694, Laws 1917, recommend that this exit be accepted pending the adoption of the rule covering exits from Mercantile Buildings (factory occupancy) at time of inspection being 23 on 2d floor.

AND it appearing that there are practical difficulties and unnecessary hardships in complying with the strict provisions of the law and the rules and regulations of the Industrial Code on the premises stated herein, and that in granting the variation stated in each case the spirit of the law and of the rules and regulations will be observed and public safety insured; and

It further appearing that each of the appellants has been notified that he would be given an opportunity to be heard at this time and place if he desired to appear, and such of the appellants who appeared having been heard by the Commission, therefore

Be it resolved that the Commission grant the variations set forth above with the understanding that said variations be effective only during the time that the conditions remain as of this date.

(g) No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this subdivision or right under any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

The provisions for the reimbursement of the City for work done by it or amounts expended by it on behalf of the Company, or amounts paid by it to any person by reason of any act or default of the Company or for the collection by it of the annual charges, or of liquidated damages, are and shall be in addition to the City's right as herein reserved to forfeit the right and privilege hereby granted.

Fourteenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board or any official of the City acting under the powers herein reserved, the right and privilege hereby granted may be forfeited by resolution of the Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the tracks and bridge or viaduct constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall therupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or equity. 
