Executive Summary

The Civilian Complaint Review Board ("CCRB") is an independent municipal Agency that investigates complaints of NYPD misconduct. Every month, the CCRB prepares an Executive Director report for its public meeting. Data for April 2023 included the following highlights:

- 1) Of the cases in the CCRB active investigations docket, 49% have been open for 4 months or fewer, and 65% have been open for 7 months or fewer (page 10). In April, the CCRB opened 513 new cases (page 4), and currently has a total open docket of 3,410 cases (page 11).
- 2) The CCRB substantiated allegations in 30% of its fully investigated cases in April (page 17).
- 3) The CCRB fully investigated 64% of the cases it closed in April (page 14) and resolved (fully investigated, mediated or attempted mediation) 65% of the cases it closed (page 18). The Agency closed 26% of the cases as unable to investigate/withdrawn (page 14).
- 4) For April, investigations using video evidence resulted in substantiated allegations in 32% of cases compared to 11% of cases in which video was not available (page 23).
- 5) The Monthly Report includes a breakdown of complaints and substantiations by NYPD precinct and borough of occurrence (pages 5-6, 25-31).
- 6) In April the Police Commissioner finalized 10 decision(s) against police officers in Administrative Prosecution Unit (APU) cases (page 37). The CCRB's APU prosecutes the most serious allegations of misconduct. The APU conducted 8 trials against members of the NYPD year-to-date; no trials were conducted against respondent officers in April.

The CCRB is committed to producing monthly reports that are valuable to the public, and welcomes feedback on how to make its data more accessible.

Glossary

In this glossary we have included a list of terms that regularly appear in our reports.

Allegation: An allegation is a specific act of misconduct. The same "complaint" can have multiple allegations – excessive force and discourteous language, for example. Each allegation is reviewed separately during an investigation.

APU: The Administrative Prosecution Unit is the division of the CCRB that has prosecuted "charges" cases since April 2013, after the signing of a 2012 Memorandum of Understanding between the CCRB and NYPD.

Board Panel: The "Board" of the CCRB has 15 members. Following a completed investigation by the CCRB staff, three Board members, sitting as a Board Panel, will make a finding on whether misconduct occurred and will make a recommendation on what level of penalty should follow.

Case/Complaint: For the purposes of CCRB data, a "case" or "complaint" is defined as any incident within the Agency's jurisdiction, brought to resolution by the CCRB.

Disposition: The Board's finding as to the outcome of a case (i.e. if misconduct occurred).

FADO: Under the City Charter, the CCRB has jurisdiction to investigate the following categories of police misconduct: Force, Abuse of Authority, Discourtesy and Offensive Language, collectively known as "FADO".

Intake: CCRB's intake team initially handles complaints from the public. Intake takes complaints that come via live phone calls, voicemails, an online complaint form, or in-person.

Investigation: CCRB investigators gather evidence and interview witnesses to prepare reports on misconduct allegations. An investigation ends when a closing report is prepared detailing the evidence and legal analysis, and the case is given to the Board for disposition.

Mediation: A complainant may mediate his or her case with the subject officer, in lieu of an investigation, with the CCRB providing a neutral, third-party mediator.

Unable to Investigate / Withdrawn: When the CCRB is unable to obtain a sworn statement from the complainant/alleged victim, the case is closed as unable to investigate. When the complainant/alleged victim asks that their complaint be withdrawn, the case is closed as withdrawn.

Closed Pending Litigation: Sometimes when a complainant is involved in criminal or civil litigation, their attorney advises against making sworn statements until the conclusion of the court case. When a complainant declines to cooperate with an investigation on the advice of their attorney, the complaint disposition is "Closed Pending Litigation."

Complaints Received





Figure 1: Total Intake by Month (January 2022 - April 2023)







Figure 3: New CCRB Complaints by Year (YTD 2010 - YTD 2023)

The CCRB's Intake team processes misconduct complaints from the public and referrals from the NYPD. Under the New York City Charter, the CCRB's jurisdiction is limited to allegations of misconduct related to Force, Abuse of Authority, Discourtesy and Offensive Language. All other complaints are referred to the appropriate agency. Figure 1 refers to all complaints that the CCRB receives and Figures 2 and 3 refer to new cases that remain with the Agency. In April 2023, the CCRB initiated 513 new complaints.

Figure 4: CCRB Complaints Received By Borough of Occurrence (April 2023)




Figure 5: CCRB Complaints Received By Borough of Occurrence (YTD 2023)




Figure 6: CCRB Complaints Received By Precinct of Occurrence (April 2023)

As described in the previous section, the CCRB has jurisdiction over four categories of NYPD misconduct. The charts below show what types of allegations are contained in the CCRB complaints received.




Figure 7: CCRB Complaints Received By Type of Allegation (April 2022 vs. April 2023)




Figure 9: CCRB Complaints Received By Type of Allegation (YTD 2022 vs. YTD 2023)

Figure 15: Number of Active Investigations (January 2022 - April 2023)




Figure 16: Open Docket Analysis




Figure 17: Open Docket Analysis with % Change

Body Worn Camera Footage Requests

Since the widespread roll out of body worn cameras in 2018, the collection of footage from these cameras has become an integral part of CCRB investigations.

The timeliness of the response to BWC footage requests has a direct impact on the length of time it takes to complete an investigation. The longer it takes to fulfill BWC requests, the longer CCRB investigations remain on the open docket.

Figure 20: Percentage of Open Investigations Docket with Pending BWC Requests (January 2022 - April 2023)





Figure 21: Fulfilled BWC Requests (January 2022 - April 2023)



Closed Cases

Resolving Cases

In April 2023, the CCRB fully investigated 64% of the cases it closed, and resolved (fully investigated, mediated or mediation attempted) 65% of the cases it closed.




Figure 22: Case Resolutions (January 2022 - April 2023) (%)

Dispositions

Cases fully investigated by the CCRB generally receive one of five outcomes:

- If the alleged misconduct is found to have occurred, based on the preponderance of the evidence, the allegation is closed as **substantiated**.
- If there is not enough evidence to determine whether or not the alleged misconduct occurred, the allegation is closed as **unable to determine**.*
- If the preponderance of the evidence suggests that the event or alleged act did not occur, the allegation is closed as **unfounded**.
- If the event did occur, but was not improper by a preponderance of evidence, the allegation is closed as within NYPD guidelines.**
- If the CCRB was unable to identify any of the officers accused of misconduct, the case is closed as **officer unidentified**.

Additionally, a case might be **mediated**, with the subject officer and complainant discussing the incident in the presence of a neutral third-party moderator, or closed as **mediation attempted**, the designation for a case in which both the officer and the civilian agree to mediate, but the civilian fails to appear twice for the scheduled mediation session or fails to respond to attempts to schedule a mediation session. Finally, a case that cannot be fully investigated because the CCRB was unable to obtain a sworn statement from the complainant/victim is closed as **unable to investigate**.

Case Abstracts

The following case abstracts are taken from complaints closed this month and serve as examples of what the different CCRB dispositions mean in practice:

1. Substantiated

An individual was walking home just after midnight when an unmarked police vehicle drove past him in the opposite direction. The vehicle made a U-turn and approached the individual. Subject officer 1, the driver, pulled the vehicle next to the individual and subject officer 2 exited the vehicle, approached the individual and began searching the fanny pack that was strapped to the individual's chest. Neither subject officer 1 nor subject officer 2 gave the individual a right to know business card. The incident was captured on BWC. The individual did not display behavior that indicated that he was hiding weapons on his person – the reason given by subject officer 1 for initiating the stop of the individual and the subsequent frisk and search of the individual's property. The investigation found that the subject officers could not articulate any probable cause for stopping the individual and the subsequent frisk of his property. The investigation also found that the subject officers were mandated by statute to give the individual a RTK business card since their stop and search did not result in the arrest or summons of the individual. The Board substantiated the Abuse of Authority allegations.

2. Unable to Determine

An individual stated that she was homeless and fell asleep at a ferry terminal. The subject officer and another officer approached her. The subject officer woke her up. She asked the officers for their names, and they provided them to her verbally. She asked them to repeat their names again and the subject officer told her "we're going to do this the hard way." She believed that meant that the subject officer was going to use force to remove her from the terminal. The individual got up and started walking away from the officers and they followed her. The individual told the officers that taxpayer money is wasted on them, and the subject officer responded, "I'm going to call the ambulance on you so you can get picked up by the ambulance." The subject officer was interviewed about the incident and stated that he was alone during his tour and denied interacting with the individual and making the statements to her. Surveillance video did not show the individual interacting with the subject officer. Without additional witness testimony, the investigation was unable to determine if the subject officer made the statements to the individual. The Board closed the Abuse of Authority allegations as Unable to Determine.

3. Unfounded

An individual saw a vehicle illegally parked and called 311 to file a complaint. She received a call approximately an hour later stating that the vehicle had been issued a summons by an officer. The individual returned to the vehicle and did not see a summons. She believed that an officer had lied about issuing a summons. The investigation received the summons for the vehicle that the individual had complained about. The vehicle in the summons had a license plate matching the one reported by the individual, including its location, the parking infraction, and the time of the infraction. The Board closed the Abuse of Authority allegation as Unfounded.

4. Within NYPD Guidelines

An individual was shopping inside a store when she saw a woman yelling at the subject officer. The woman was yelling that she had rights as she cursed at the subject officer. The individual saw the subject officer nearly push the woman as she went down an escalator. The incident was captured on the store's surveillance video and BWC. The woman had been caught shoplifting in the store by the subject officer. As she tried to leave without paying, she was stopped by the subject officer by the escalator. The woman hit the subject officer with her bag and pushed him. The subject officer pushed her back. The woman continued to physically attack the subject officer and he pinned her arms to take her to the ground to arrest her. The Board found the subject officers' conduct to be within the Department's guidelines and closed the Use of Force allegation as being Within NYPD Guidelines.

5. Officer Unidentified

An individual stated that he called for medical assistance and several police officers, EMTs, and FDNY members responded to his home. He stated that after he returned home from the hospital, an unidentified member of the building staff told him that officers had made three entries into his apartment while he was gone. The individual had a photo of his door which showed scratches that he said had not been there before. The investigation interviewed the officers who responded to the 911 call, and they all denied entering the individual's apartment after they finished assisting the individual in getting medical attention. An EMT who was interviewed stated that since there was a strong odor of gas in the individual's apartment, FDNY could have entered the individual's home to determine that there was not a gas leak. The investigation was unable to speak with building staff about which of them reported the entries into the individual's apartment. The building's management was also unresponsive to requests for surveillance video. Without additional pertinent information, the investigation could not identify a subject officer. The Board closed the Abuse of Authority allegations as Officer Unidentified.

^{*} Unable to determine is reported to the Commissioner as Unsubstantiated, meaning that there was insufficient evidence to establish whether or not there was an act of misconduct.

^{**} Within NYPD Guidelines is reported to the Commissioner as Exonerated, meaning there was a preponderance of the evidence that the acts alleged occurred but did not constitute misconduct.

Figure 23: Disposition Counts of Full Investigations (April 2023)





Figure 24: Disposition Counts of Full Investigations (YTD 2023)

^{*}Administrative closure is a special category that deals with NYPD's Internal Affairs Bureau-referred cases or spin off cases with no complainant/alleged victim, and in which CCRB attempts to locate or identify a complainant/alleged victim has yielded no results.

Dispositions - FADO Allegations

"Allegations" are different than "cases." A case or complaint is based on an incident and may contain one or more allegations of police misconduct. The allegation substantiation rate is 18% for the month of April 2023, and the allegation substantiation rate is 16% year-to-date.

Dispositions - Untruthful Statement Allegations

Following the 2019 passage of Ballot Question #2 and the subsequent City Charter Revision, CCRB's jurisdiction was expanded to include untruthful material statements made by police officers. As a result, CCRB added a new "Untruthful Statement" category of allegations.

There are four specific allegations in the new "Untruthful Statement" category: 1) False official statement, 2) Misleading official statement, 3) Inaccurate official statement and 4) Impeding an investigation.

Figure 31: Percentage of Cases Substantiated (January 2022 - April 2023)





Figure 32: Disposition of Substantiated Complaints* (2023)

To determine the disposition associated with the complaint as a whole, the CCRB uses the most severe of the substantiated allegation dispositions. The order of severity is: 1) Charges 2) Command Discipline B 3) Command Discipline A 4) Formalized Training.

Substantiation Rates and Video

In general, investigations relying on video evidence result in much higher substantiation rates.

Figure 33: Substantiation Rates for Full Investigations without Video (Jan 2023 - Apr 2023) (% substantiated shown)





Figure 34: Substantiation Rates for Full Investigations with Video (Jan 2023 - Apr 2023) (% substantiated shown)



Board Discipline Recommendations for Substantiated Officers

After a CCRB investigative team has completed its investigation, a panel of Board members determines whether to substantiate the allegation(s) and make a disciplinary recommendation against the officer(s).

- "Charges and Specifications" are the most severe form of discipline. A decision to assign
 Charges commences a process that may result in an administrative trial in the NYPD Trial
 Room. An officer may lose vacation days, be suspended, or be terminated if the officer is
 found guilty.
- "Command Discipline B" and "Command Discipline A" are recommended for misconduct that is moderately serious. An officer can lose up to ten vacation days as a result of Command Discipline B and up to five vacation days as a result of Command Discipline A.
- "Formalized Training" are the least severe discipline, often recommended for officers who misunderstand a policy. This determination results in training at the Police Academy or NYPD Legal Bureau (Formalized Training).
- When the Board has recommended Formalized Training or Command Discipline, the case is sent to the NYPD Commissioner to impose training and/or other penalties. Cases where the Board recommends charges are prosecuted by the CCRB's Administrative Prosecution Unit.

Administrative Prosecution Unit

The CCRB's Administrative Prosecution Unit (APU) prosecutes police misconduct cases when the Board has recommended charges, in the NYPD Trial Room. The APU is also able to offer pleas to officers who admit guilt rather than going to trial. Following a plea agreement or the conclusion of a disciplinary trial, cases are sent to the Police Commissioner for final penalties.
