

Sanitary Bureau.

Santary Bureau,

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending September 9, 1882:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1386, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 619 tenement-houses, 68 private dwellings, 39 other dwellings, 19 manufactories and workshops, 27 stores and warehouses, 36 stables, 55 slaughter-houses, 2 public sewers, 1 brewery, 24 sunken and vacant lots, 52 yards, courts and areas, 54 cellars and basements, 140 waste-pipes and drains, 182 privies and water-closets, 36 street gutters and sinks, 14 dangerous stairways, 2 smoky chimneys, 5 cesspools, and 7 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 538.

During the past week 213 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

82 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on youchers from the

82 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

138 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 42 premises where contagious diseases were found, and e disinfected and fumigated 39 houses and 39 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Two cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 509 births, 52 still-births, 237 marriages, and 609 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, September 9, 1882. This shows a decrease of 41 births, 5 marriages and 11 deaths, and an increase of 5 still-births when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was an increase of 73 births, 9 still-births and 75 mar-

riages, and a decrease of 257 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 4; scarlatina, 6; diphtheria, 11; croup, 7; erysipelas, 2; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrheeal diseases, 22; inanition, 1; cancer, 2; marasmus, tabes, mesenterica and scrofula, 4; convulsions, 3; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; premature and preternatural births, 4; while the deaths from whooping cough increased 7; malarial fevers, 10; alcoholism, 3; rheumatism and gout, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 24; pneumonia, 3; aneurism, meningitis and encephalitis, 8; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; Bright's disease and nephritis, 4; suicide, 3; drowning, 3. The number of deaths from bronchitis, and hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 178 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 236 under two years, 282 under five years, and 37 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 28 less than the number reported during last week, and represent 46.31 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending September 16, 1882, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending September 9, 1882.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 613 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, September 16, 1882, which is an increase of 4, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 75 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1881. The actual mortality for the week ending September 9, 1882, was 630, which is 27.4 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.46 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,286,654.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 117 were in institutions, 339 in tenementhouses, 137 in houses containing three families or less, 137 in hotels and boarding-houses, 15 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 123 on the first, 150 on the second, 117 on the third, 60 on the fourth, 20 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 600 were stated to be residents see New York City, and 0 non-residents; 56 were stated to be single, 132 married, 55 widowed, and the condition of 366 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 609; still-births, 52; bodies in transit; permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 81 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 2 transcripts of the birth record, 4 of marriage, and 39 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending September 9, 1882, was 72.3 degrees Fahr, the mean reading of the barometer was 29.950, the mean humidity was 84, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 868, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.80 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 582 deaths and still-births, or 88.05 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 20; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 239; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 74; Greenwood (undenominational), 33; Lutheran, (undenominational), 85; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 22; Evergreen (undenominational), 31; Woodlawn (undenominational), 76; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 9; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 9; Machpelah, L. (Jewish), 11; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 6; Washington (undenominational), 71; Fourth, 9; Fifth, 5; Sixth, 13; Seventh, 23; Eighth, 17; Ninth, 32; Tenth, 19; Esevententh, 39 New Amsterdam, Demerara, 36.9.
