

Blacksmiths—Made 253 and repaired and altered 69 iron bedsteads, made 192 stonecutters' steel points, 213 steel chisels, 88 steel drills, 6 pick axes, 2 iron key safes, 12 steel axes, 12 pitching tools, 2 rivet sets, 4 dowels, 240 feathers, 144 wedges, 60 plugs, 80 spikes, 401 hooks, 4 wall scrapers, 4 caulking irons, 21 soldering irons, 900 rivets, 54 bucket handles, 50 bucket straps, 50 bucket ears, 15 new tires on wheels, 1 steel punch, 1 clinker hook, 1 fire hoe, 2 slice bars, 1 iron wheelbarrow, 48 feet lattice work, 27 feet iron railing, 1 iron door and frame, 1 lock, 16 keys, 2 iron meat forks, also all necessary repairs to carts, wagons, wheels, wheelbarrows, prison vans, ambulances, carriages, machinery, etc., etc., and sharpened all steel tools used in quarry, stone shed and building gang.

Tinsmiths—Made 1,314 mess pans, 327 quart cups, 2 coal hods, 613 leader pipe, 2 galvanized-iron sinks, 4 kettles, 12 spittoons, 249 wash basins, 17 watering cans, 2 ash shovels, 10 sprinkling cans, 16 chimney caps, 2 dippers, 7 pails, 18 dust pans, 1 bread box, 31 elbows, 8 sauce pans, 12 document cases, 1 galvanized ash can, 6 water coolers, 36 bake pans, 932 feet galvanized-iron ridging, 56 feet galvanized moulding, 500 feet valley strips, 195 feet gutter lining, 6 refrigerators lined; also all necessary repairs to tinware belonging to the institution, and roof of prison, Charity Hospital, Lunatic Asylum, Randall's Island Hospital, etc., etc.

Broom and Brush Makers—Made 222 dozen brooms, 1 dozen wisp brooms, and 256 dozen scrub brushes.

Shoemakers-Made 2,040 pairs men's and 540 pairs women's shoes; repaired 2,105 pairs

Tailors and Cotmakers—Made 1,450 pairs pants, 480 pairs woolen mitts, 55 caps, 3 canvas covers; repaired 373 woolen jackets, 1,349 pairs pants, 679 vests, 6 caps, 883 cot bottoms.

At the Sewing Room—The female prisoners have made 400 aprons, 1,708 shirts, 1,500 pairs pants, 10 awnings, 700 dresses, 6 sheets, 6 pillow-cases, 550 petticoats, 200 chemises, 150 night-gowns, 247 pillow-ticks, 2 table-cloths, 500 pairs suspenders, 100 towels, 2 bed-ticks, 660 pairs shoes bound; repaired 1,199 under-shirts, 3,718 mens' shirts, 959 socks, 480 pillow-ticks, 407 dresses, 488 chemises, 191 petticoats, 4 bed-ticks.

At the Stone Shed—The prisoners have cut 1,176 feet building-stone, 34 feet chimney caps, 245 feet roof coping, 47 feet hand coping, 58 feet water-table, 438 feet steps, 196 feet sills and lintels, 24 feet slip sills, 38 feet platform stone, 26 feet window-jambs, 12 feet corner-stone.

By prisoners employed at out-door labor, the roads and sea-wall have been kept in proper repair; 125 tons of coal have been discharged from coal boats.

CITY PRISON, NEW YORK, July 1, 1886.

The following improvements and repairs have been made at First and Third District Prisons, from April 1 to June 30, 1886, by prison labor and without expense to the Department of Public Charities and Correction, except the cost of the material.

#### FIRST DISTRICT PRISON.

Painting—Painted with one coat oil and two coats white paint, the halls and cells of the new female prison, boys' prison and ten-day house; also painted the cell doors and iron railings of the same, and the cell windows on first, second and third tiers male prison, storm-house, iron gates,

Mason work—Pointed up with cement the walls of male prison and walls on Elm and Leonard streets, and made an entrance to female prison from Warden's office; built up walls, removed iron

railings, gates, etc.
Plumbing—Built a water-closet in Franklin street wall, also three cesspools in yard.

Carpenter work—Making 50 pair crutches; repairing floors, blinds, windows, chairs; making fracture and water beds, splints, etc.

Mason work—Repairing and plastering ceilings in Wards 15 and 16; whitewashing cellars, etc.

Painting and calcimining—Wards 15 and 16; the operating rooms attached; painting 30 pair blinds; glazing, etc.

Female help—Washing, cooking, scrubbing; attending in wards.

Male help—Attending as firemen, sweepers, stretcher carriers.

Labor Report for Quarter ending June 30, 1886.

Carpenters—Made I medicine closet, 3 douche stands, 2 Buck's extensions, 2 sets arm splints, I set leg splints, I large closet, 2 small tables, 2 folding screens, 10 pairs crutches, 36 dozen swabsticks, 200 tallies, I bulletin board. Repaired 20 blinds, 8 window sashes, 30 chairs, 80 stools, 2 bedsteads; re-covered 4 head-rests and 10 screens; planed tops of 5 dining-room tables; sheathed dock for launch; put in 75 sash-cords, 6 sash-weights, and other small jobbing.

Painters—Painted 17 rooms, 14 closets, 9 medicine chests, 7 medicine boxes, 12 wardrobes, 44 windows, 59 doors, 34 bath-tubs, 16 foot-tubs, 21 screens, 7 ice-boxes, 23 boxes, 10 radiators, 24 stands, 20 tables, 12 pantries, 36 chairs, 44 stools, 27 pails, 33 pairs blinds, 26 window guards, I lattice fence, I rowboat, 34 cans, 300 card-racks, railing, boat-house, cupolas, main stairway, rear doors of hospital, steam-pipes and basins throughout the building; put in 171 lights of glass.

Tinsmiths—Made 6 respirators, 4 galvanized iron covers, I box, I wash-basin, 17 galvanized iron pitchers, I galvanized iron water-cooler, I large galvanized iron bread-box, I quart tea-pot, 4 cake pans, I tea strainer, I square box, I cup, 2 joints 4½-inch stove-pipe, I galvanized iron 20-gallon acid can, 6 muffin rings, I galvanized iron pan, galvanized iron on launch, cut 800 tin tacks for windows. Repaired zinc in ward closets; took down stones and put up stone in tent; repaired roof, and a large quantity of miscellaneous tinware.

Plasterers—Repaired walks, gutters, sewer-pipes, traps, arch in boiler-room; plastering of wards and rooms; cemented flag-joints of kitchen; whitewashed cellar and closets.

Hon. H. H. PORTER, President Department Public Charities and Correction:

SIR-I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Board the following labor report for the quarter ending this date:

WORK DONE BY CARPENTERS.

Put down new floor in main office and reception room; repaired floor in Ward 19; put up new timbers over gasomèter; making benches and seats under trees; repairing and covering window-screens; re-ceiled dining-room pantry; making pickets for grass plats; putting in sash-cords; made heater covers for valves; repaired floors in hallway of second story; also floors of several of the wards and closets; made patterns for castings for donkey engine; made several new mosquito frames for doors, windows, etc.; repaired fence at new hospital at One Hundred and Twentieth street; repairs to carts, wheelbarrows, etc.; repairing small ferry boat, and caulking same; setting new locust posts at cow-yard, and general repairs to locks, hinges, doors, water-closets, floors, windows, etc., where required throughout the building.

BY PAINTERS.

Painted new ceiling in dining-room pantry; oiled new floors in main office and reception room; painted new pickets, benches around the grounds; repainted small ferry boat; put in new glass in windows, skylights; radiators painted; new timbers over gasometers painted two coats; and such other work as was necessary to be done.

BY ENGINEER AND HELP.

Relaid 275 feet of Croton water pipe; relaid 85 feet of sewer-pipe, and 200 feet of gas-pipe; also relaid 175 feet of steam-pipe, together with general repairs to plumbing and gas fixtures throughout the several buildings.

BY LAUNDRESS AND HELP.

The number of pieces washed was 70,928.

GAS-WORKS.

317,700 cubic feet of gas was manufactured to supply the Randall's Island and Infants' Hospitals and pavilions.
