## MEETING HELD JULY 10, 1878.

Present—Commissioners Wenman (President), Wetmore, Conover, and Lane.

The annual sale of sheep by public auction was directed to be had on Wednesday, August 21, 1878, when 4 five-year-old ewes, 1 four-year-old ewe, 5 yearling ewes, and 27 ram lambs will be sold.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.

the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a de-  
faulter, as security or otherwise, upon any obligation to  
the Corporation. (Sec. 99 of Charter of 1873.)

The lease will contain the usual covenants and con-  
ditions, reserving to the Corporation the right to cancel  
the lease whenever the premises may be required by  
them for public purposes.

The lessees will be required to give a bond for double  
the amount of the annual rent, with two sureties, to be  
approved by the Comptroller, conditioned for the pay-  
ment of the rent quarter-yearly, and the fulfillment on  
their part of the covenants of the lease.
