

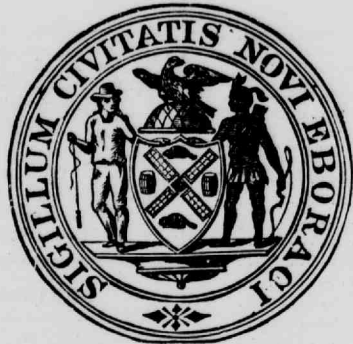

DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS.

[BOARD OF EXAMINERS.]

At a meeting of the Board of Examiners, held pursuant to the call of the Superintendent of Buildings, at the office of the Department of Buildings, No. 2 Fourth avenue, on Tuesday, the 5th day of August, A. D. 1879, at 3 o'clock P. M.

There being present thereat—Superintendent Henry J. Dudley, John Banta, Edwin Dobbs, Henry Dudley, and James M. McLean.

Superintendent Henry J. Dudley presiding.

The reading of the minutes of the previous meeting having been, upon motion, dispensed with, the Chairman submitted for the action of the Board the hereinafter named petitions and applications, to wit:

Application of William Doud, owner, for permission, in the proposed alterations to the four-story brick building, No. 168 West Twenty-second street, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the said building to be altered and extended in conformity with Alteration Plans and Specifications relative thereto, No. 908, filed July 22, 1879. Application, upon motion, granted.

Application of J. H. Miller, for permission, in the proposed alteration of the frame building on the northeasterly corner of Varick and North Moore streets, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the building to be extended in conformity with the Specifications and Plans for Alterations No. 923, filed relative thereto July 28, 1879. Application, upon motion, granted.

Application of William Astor, owner, by James Webb & Sons, builders, for permission to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the two brick five-story buildings, Nos. 5 and 7 East Thirty-third street, to be altered and extended in conformity with Alteration Plans and Specifications No. 931, relative thereto, filed July 29, 1879. Application, upon motion, granted.

Application of the South Baptist Church, owner, by E. C. Hussey, architect, for permission, in the erection of a church edifice on premises Nos. 355 and 357 and part of 359 West Fifty-first street, to be one story, 54 by 97 feet and 53 feet in height, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the same to be erected in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications relative thereto, No. 595, filed July 17, 1879. Upon motion, Resolved, that this Board approve of the action of the Superintendent of Buildings in rejecting the plan submitted for the construction of the above named church.

Petition of George M. Walgrove, architect, on behalf of Henry T. Guion, owner, for permission, in the erection of seven (7) three-story and basement brick and brown stone dwellings, on premises northwest corner of One Hundred and Fifteenth street and Avenue A, each to be 15 by 50 feet and 40 feet in height, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit the bearing wall on line of One Hundred and Fifteenth street to be built twelve (12) inches in thickness, and also to permit the brick wall on second or top story of the proposed bay window on One Hundred and Fifteenth street, to be built eight (8) inches in thickness only. The buildings in all other respects to be built in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 576, filed July 10, 1879. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of James E. Ware, architect, on behalf of Mrs. Ann Cohen and Mrs. Henrietta Ketchum, owners, for permission, in the erection of two model tenements, to be each 24 feet 8½ inches on front, on rear, one 24 feet 8½ inches and one 15 feet 6 inches, both to be 90 feet in depth, 4 stories, 48 feet in height, on premises Nos. 760 and 758 Second avenue, to so far vary or deviate from the provisions of the Building Law as will permit him to construct the walls of the light-shafts of wood, sheathed outside entirely with corrugated iron, and thereby render them fire-proof, the central shaft to be divided in centre with iron division, and the extreme shafts inclosed on outside at party lines with same material, all in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 570, filed relative thereto July 8, 1879. Petition withdrawn.

Petition of William C. Spears, builder, on behalf of the estate of R. M. Lydig, owner, for permission, in the proposed alteration to the four-story brick building No. 34 Lighthouse street, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the said building to be altered in conformity with Alteration Plans and Specifications relative thereto, No. 615, filed May 10, 1879, and second application, No. 615, filed July 24, 1879, as follows, to wit: The present walls now standing are 12 inches in thickness from the foundation, and the building is to be over 50 feet in height; it is proposed to increase the thickness of the walls to the top of the second story floor-beams as per plan submitted. For a distance of 21 feet from front line on Lighthouse street the span is wide, and is supported in the middle by partition; it is proposed to make the bearing walls of extra strength by adding 8 inches to each wall to the height above mentioned. From said point (20 feet from front line on Lighthouse street) to the end of old wall the span is in no place more than 15 feet 6 inches, and here it is proposed to add 8 inches to the face of the wall to the height above mentioned, the 8-inch brick-work to be tied into the present wall by cutting out the furring strips of the old wall and tying in new wall with headers, and by driving spikes in old wall at intervals between lines of headers, which are substituted for the old furring strips. Petition was, upon motion, granted, upon condition that the said walls be lined up with 8 inches of brick-work to top of present walls, and continued thence to roof with walls 16 inches in thickness.

Petition of William Shears, architect, for and on behalf of Elise Patrick, owner, for permission in the erection of a four-story brick building, on premises No. 200 West Houston street, 25 by 110 feet, 40 feet in height, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the use of the present easterly and westerly walls now standing on the said premises (both of which walls are 60 feet in depth and 35 feet in height, the easterly wall being independent and the westerly wall a party-wall, both 8 inches in thickness), by lining up said walls with 8 inches of brick-work, from the top of the foundation wall to the top of the present walls, said lining to be laid in cement-mortar, and properly anchored with iron holdfasts, with close joints, in conformity with Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 594, filed relative thereto, July 17, 1879. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of John C. Burne, architect, on behalf of Thomas Kennedy, owner, for permission in the erection of four three-story and basement brick and brown-stone dwelling-houses, on the west side of Lexington avenue, 25 feet south of Sixty-second street, to be allowed to so far deviate from the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the erection of one story 11 by 13 feet extensions (to rear of said buildings), with walls of only 8 inches in thickness, in conformity with Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 177, filed March 21, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, granted.

Petition of John C. Burne, architect, on behalf of Mrs. Emma Johnston, owner, for permission to be allowed, in the erection of two three-story brick and brown stone dwelling-houses on south side of East Eighty-eighth street, 197 feet west of Avenue A, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit of the erection of the rear and side walls of the two small extension buildings (to be built on said premises) with walls of but eight (8) inches in thickness, in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 561, filed July 3, 1879. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of John C. Burne, architect, for and on behalf of William F. McEntee, owner, for permission, in the erection of a four-story brick tenement dwelling on premises southeast corner of Third avenue and One Hundred and Fourth street, to be 22 feet 5 inches by 50 feet, and 45 feet in height, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit of the erection of the bearing wall of said building on line of street with walls but twelve inches in thickness (instead of 16 inches), in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 616. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Alfred C. Hoe, architect, on behalf of Samuel Weyman, owner, for permission, in the erection of a five-story brick and iron store and warehouse on premises No. 8 East Fourteenth street,

to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit the use of the wall on the westerly side of said premises now used as a party-wall for the building No. 6 East Fourteenth street, said wall being 20 inches in thickness in foundation and 16 inches thick thence to top thereof. It is proposed to line up the same with 8 inches of solid brick-work, laid up in cement mortar, close joints, and to anchor same with iron holdfasts not more than 30 inches apart alternated. The wall on easterly side to be taken down and a new party-wall of the dimensions required by law built in its stead, all in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 608, filed July 21, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, granted, upon condition that the wall referred to be lined up with 12 inches of brick-work to the top of the second story floor beams, and 8 inches of brick-work thence to top.

Application of Eli F. Macgowan, Superintendent of the East River Ferry Co., for permission to erect on premises foot of Seventh street, East river, a frame structure for a sitting room for ferry passengers, such structure to be 25 x 60 feet, and to be one story, 16 feet in height, with gravel roof, in conformity with application therefor No. 477, filed July 25, 1879. Which application was, upon motion, granted, upon the condition that the exterior of the structure be covered with metal.

Petition of Smith T. Brush, builder, on behalf of M. Garcia, owner, for permission, in the erection of a one-story brick stable on rear of premises No. 5 East Nineteenth street, 25 x 12 feet, and to be 11 feet in height, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit the same to be built with walls of but eight inches in thickness, in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 621, filed relative thereto July 26, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, granted.

Petition of J. Sullivan, owner and builder, for permission, in the erection of the six three-story and basement dwellings on the premises on easterly side of Lexington avenue, commencing on north-easterly corner of Lexington avenue and Ninety-first street, to be allowed, in the construction of the corner building, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit of the erection of the bearing wall thereof on line of Ninety-first street but 12 inches in thickness from basement floor to roof, in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications relative thereto No. 619, filed July 25, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, granted.

Petition of John L. Hamilton, on behalf of Marx and Rawolle, owners, for permission, in the erection of a two-story brick stable and carriage-house on the north side of West Fifty-ninth street, 300 feet west of Tenth avenue (to be 19 feet 6 inches by 47 feet, and 15 feet in height), to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the said building to be erected in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications relative thereto No. 586, filed July 15, 1879, which provide for the use of the easterly wall of the building adjoining on westerly side of the premises described. Petition was, upon motion, granted.

Petition of William Christie, on behalf of Messrs. Christie & Walker, owners and builders, for permission, in the erection of a four-story stone and iron front brick tenement and store, with brick stable on rear thereof, on the southeast corner of Fourth avenue and One Hundred and Fifth street (main building to be 21 feet by 51 feet 6 inches, and 48 feet in height, and stable on rear to be 18 feet by 21 feet, and 18 feet in height, divided into two stories), to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit them to build the bearing wall on line of One Hundred and Fifth street, above the second story floor beams, but twelve inches in thickness, in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 503, filed relative thereto June 13, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, granted.

Petition of M. C. Merritt, architect, for and on behalf of Robert H. McCurdy, owner, for permission, in the proposed alteration to the four-story and basement brick and brown-stone front store, on premises No. 10 East Fourteenth street, to be allowed to so far deviate from the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the use of the party-wall between Nos. 10 and 12 East Fourteenth street, by lining up said wall to the under side of the second story floor beams with eight (8) inches of brick-work, laid in cement mortar, and properly anchored, in conformity with Alteration Plans and Specifications No. 932, relative thereto, filed July 30, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, granted.

Petition of John Hankinson, builder, on behalf of M. Myers, owner, for permission, in the proposed alteration of the two and a half story brick peak-roof building, No. 367 Hudson street, to be allowed to build an extension to said building of brick, 17 feet by 24 feet, and 12 feet in height, and to be permitted to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit such extension to be built with walls but eight inches in thickness, in conformity with Alteration Plans and Specifications No. 940, filed August 1, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Hugh Meehan, builder, on behalf of E. M. Meehan, owner, for permission, in the erection of five four-story brick tenement dwellings on premises northeast corner of One Hundred and Ninth street and Fourth avenue, one to be 28 feet by 52 feet, and two to be 26 feet by 52 feet, all to be 45 feet in height (three to be built on north side of One Hundred and Ninth street, commencing on northeast corner of said street and Fourth avenue, and two to be built on south side of One Hundred and Tenth street, commencing on southeast corner of One Hundred and Tenth street and Fourth avenue), to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law, in the erection of the two corner buildings as will permit the bearing walls of each on the line of Fourth avenue to be built but twelve inches in thickness from curb level to line of roof, in conformity with Plans and Specifications for New Buildings Nos. 587 and 589, filed relative thereto July 15, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Charles Hoffman, owner, by Julius Boeckell, architect, for permission, in the proposed alteration of the one-story brick dwelling on south side of Sixty-second street, 200 feet west of Avenue A, to be allowed to so far deviate from the provisions of the Building Law, as will permit the said building to be altered, and an additional story built thereon, in conformity with Alteration Plans and Specifications No. 904, filed relative thereto July 22, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, denied.

Petition of Julius Boeckell, architect, on behalf of William Kaiser, owner, for permission, in the proposed alteration to the four-story brick store and tenement dwelling No. 391 Second avenue, with a one-story brick extension thereto, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit two additional stories to be built upon said extension, in conformity with Alteration Plans and Specifications No. 922, filed relative thereto July 28, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, denied.

Petition of E. H. Cockburn, owner and builder, for permission, in the erection of ten (10) three-story and basement (brown stone front) brick dwellings, on north side of One Hundred and Tenth street, northeast corner of Fourth avenue (each to be 15 feet 6 inches by 50 feet and 38 feet in height), to be allowed to so far deviate from the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the bearing wall of the corner building on line of Fourth avenue to be built but twelve (12) inches in thickness from basement floor to roof, in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 636, filed relative thereto, August 1, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Anthony Smythe, owner, for permission, in the erection of four three-story and basement brick and brown stone dwelling-houses (each 15 feet by 45 feet and 45 feet in height), on north side of One Hundred and Fourteenth street, 130 feet east of Fourth avenue, to be allowed to so far deviate from the provisions of the Building Law as will permit of the construction of the party walls of said buildings from the level of the third story beams but eight (8) inches in thickness, said buildings in all other respects to be built in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 657, filed relative thereto November 4, 1878. Which petition was, upon motion, denied.

Petition of Philip Teets, owner, for permission, in the erection of a three-story and basement brick dwelling-house, on south side of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, 50 feet west of Seventh avenue, 15 feet by 100 feet and 40 feet in height, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the said building to be erected in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 625, filed relative thereto July 28, 1879, and which plans provide for the erection of the same with eight-inch walls. Which petition was, upon motion, denied.

Petition of George Codling, owner, for permission, in the proposed erection of a brick one-story office building on north side of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, 150 feet west of Eighth avenue (to be 19 feet by 35 feet and 12 feet in height), to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the said structure to be built with walls of but eight inches in thickness, in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 613, filed July 24, 1879, relative thereto. Which petition was, upon motion, laid over until the filing of a proper petition therefor.

Application of William W. Owens, architect and builder, on behalf of the Gillespie estate, owners, for permission to so far deviate from the provisions of the Building Law, in the proposed alteration of the three-story and basement brick building No. 155 West Thirteenth street, as will permit of the alteration of said building in conformity with the Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 915, filed relative thereto July 25, 1879. Which application was laid over until the filing of a petition therefor.

Petition of James E. Ware, architect, by Oscar S. Teale, on behalf of H. Middendorf, owner, for permission, in the erection of the four-story brick apartment dwelling house, on northeast corner of Twenty-ninth street and Third avenue (24 feet 8 inches by 59 feet and 51 feet in height), to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as will permit the gable or bearing wall of said building above the first story thereof to be constructed but twelve (12) inches in thickness (instead of 16 inches), in conformity with the Plans and Specification for New Buildings No. 632, filed relative thereto July 31, 1879. Which petition was, upon motion, granted.

Application of Francis J. Hawkes (a carpenter) to be examined as to his qualifications and competency to fill the position and discharge the duties of an Inspector in the Department of Build-

ings, in the City of New York. Said applicant, upon examination, having been found to be duly qualified and competent, was, upon motion, so declared.

Application of William Walker (a carpenter) to be examined as to his qualifications and competency to fill the position and discharge the duties of an Inspector in the Department of Buildings, in the City of New York. Said applicant, upon examination, having been found to be duly qualified and competent, was, upon motion, so declared.

There being no further business before the Board, the minutes of the meeting were read, and, upon motion, approved as recorded, and, upon further motion, the Board adjourned subject to the call of the Superintendent of Buildings.

Gall & Co. to place and keep a stepping-stone on the sidewalk, near the curb-stone, in front of No. 21 Union square, not to exceed two feet in height, two feet and six inches in length, and two feet in width, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Whereas, In the work of reconstructing the elevated railroad on Greenwich street, now in progress, the old material and the new is piled in such quantities, not only in Greenwich street, but also in many of the intersecting streets, that they are nearly impassable, and, as a consequence, great annoyance and frequently loss and damage is inflicted upon those of our citizens who are compelled to travel in said streets, whether as pedestrians or in vehicles, and is in violent conflict with the rights of all our citizens to the free uses of the streets of this city; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized and directed to prevent any unnecessary or avoidable impediment or obstruction to the free use of Greenwich street by the New York or any other railroad company, and to prevent any obstruction or incumbrance whatever by any such elevated railroad company of any of the streets intersecting Greenwich street; that he report immediately every violation of the ordinances of the city, or this resolution, to the Corporation Attorney for prosecution, and that he take whatever measures he may deem necessary, and exercise the full power conferred upon him by law or ordinance, to prevent such unnecessary or avoidable obstruction of Greenwich street, or any incumbrance or obstruction whatever of any of the streets intersecting Greenwich street by the New York Elevated or any other railroad company.

Approved by the Mayor, August 4, 1879.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to P. McNevin & Co. to place and keep a sign at No. 68 Chatham street, said sign to be not more than 6 by 4 feet, and to be placed on the Duane street entrance of said premises; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.
