BUREAU OF TOPOGRAPHICAL SURVEYS.

Plane table work on the topographical surveys of Richmond Hill, Woodhaven, Morris Park and vicinity.

298 buildings were located.

64,227 feet of taping.

125 bench-marks were established.

1,275 4-10 acres were covered by survey.

768,900 linear feet of contour lines located, contours being at five (5) intervals.

In taking elevations with Wye level for profiles of streets:

62 bench-marks established.

94,470 feet of streets leveled.

In making contour line surveys with Wye level:

4,842 elevations were taken.

Twenty (20) monuments were set.

In carefully establishing lines of streets in Richmond Hill and in running accurate traverses by which to sustain topographical surveys:

- 444 angles were turned.
- 242,500 feet were chained.
- 142,750 feet were taped.
- 56 streets were inspected as to legal status.
- Taking tide-gauge observations at Flushing Bay.

Work Done by Office Force.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), to provide means for the erection of temporary pavilions, under the jurisdiction of the Board of Trustees of the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, to relieve the overcrowding of Bellevue Hospital.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment December 9, 1904, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), to provide means for the erection of temporary pavilions, under the jurisdiction of the Board of Trustees of the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, to relieve the overcrowding at Bellevue Hospital, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

No. 733.

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen, in pursuance of the authority conferred upon it by the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, deeming such course to be for the best interests of the City, hereby authorizes and empowers the Fire Commissioner to purchase in the open market, instead of by contract at public letting, coal for the use of the fire-boat berthed at pier foot of Ninety-ninth street, East river, to the amount of four thousand dollars (\$4,000).

No. 734.

Whereas, A resolution has been duly passed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment permitting the purchase of four Ducker portable buildings for use by the Board of Trustees of the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, in accordance with the specifications hereto annexed; and

Whereas, It is deemed advisable because of the approach of the cold weather and the necessity for acquiring additional accommodations for the use of possible patients in the near future; therefore be it

Resolved, That, pursuant to the power given to this Board by section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the said Trustees are hereby authorized and empowered to purchase without contract let after public advertisement the Ducker portable buildings, four in number, at an expense not to exceed fifteen thousand dollars.

Specifications for Four Ducker Portable Buildings.

Material—The entire building, with the exception of the cover to the roof sections, to be made of thoroughly seasoned and carefully selected yellow pine. The roof sections are to be covered with galvanized metal, laid on sheet asbestos. Between the clapboards and the inner lining of the building heavy builders' felt must be used, which is also to be used between the double floors. Seven-eighths-inch siding to be used for the outside of the building, and lining to consist of ½-inch narrow, tongued, grooved and beaded yellow pine.

Construction—The entire building to be made up in strong sectional frames of 2 foot 9-inch, joints absolutely air and water tight, everything to be fitted and finished before leaving the factory, and to be erected on posts to be furnished by contractor, building to be erected without the use of nail or screw so as to be easily taken down, moved and re-erected if necessary.

Size of Building—20 feet by 100 feet by 9 feet 6 inches by 15 feet to ridge, and to be made to accommodate thirty (30) patients each. There is also to be in each building toilet-room, bathroom and closet. This building must furnish thirty-two thousand (32,000) cubic feet of air space, or about one thousand and sixty-six (1,066) cubic feet to each patient.

Sanitary Equipment—Each building is to have bath, lavatory, water-closet and urinal.

Whereas, Nassau Electric Railroad Company has presented to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York its application in writing for a grant to it of the franchise or right to construct, maintain and operate, and for its consent that the applicant construct, maintain and operate a double track street surface railroad as an extension of its existing railroad through, upon and along the surface of certain streets in the Borough of Brooklyn, a description of such streets being as follows:

Upon and along Navy street, from the intersection of Navy street and Concord street to the intersection of Flushing avenue and Navy street, and upon and along Hudson avenue from the intersection of Concord street and Hudson avenue to the intersection of Flushing avenue and Hudson avenue, to connect at the intersections at Concord street with Hudson avenue and with Navy street with the tracks of the Nassau Electric Railroad Company upon Concord street, and to connect at the intersections of Hudson avenue and of Navy street with Flushing avenue with the tracks of the Brooklyn City Railroad Company on Flushing avenue, together with the necessary sidings, switches, turnouts, poles, wires and appurtenances.

Therefore be it

Resolved, That Thursday, the fifth day of January, 1905, at two o'clock in the afternoon, and the Chamber of the Board of Aldermen, in the City Hall, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, be and they hereby are designated as the time and place when and where the application of the Nassau Electric Railroad Company to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York for a grant of the franchise or right to use certain streets in said City for railway purposes and for the construction, maintenance and operation of a double track street surface railroad as an extension of its existing railroad through, upon and along the surface of certain streets in the Borough of Brooklyn, named in the preamble to this resolution, will be first considered, and that the City Clerk shall cause public notice thereof to be published for at least fourteen (14) days in two daily newspapers published in The City of New York, to be designated in writing therefor by his Honor the Mayor, according to the provisions of law in such case made and provided, such notice to be published at the expense of the applicant.

Whereas, The Brooklyn City Railroad Company has presented to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York its application in writing for a grant to it of the franchise or right to construct, maintain and operate, and for its consent that the applicant construct, maintain and operate a single track street surface railroad as an extension of its existing railroad through, upon and along the surface of certain streets in the Borough of Brooklyn, a description of such streets being as follows: Upon and along Tillary street, from the intersection of Tillary and Fulton streets to the intersection of Tillary and Washington streets, and to connect at the intersection of Tillary and Fulton streets, with the double track street surface railroad of the Brooklyn City Railroad Company on Fulton street, and to connect at the intersection of Tillary and Washington streets with the double track street surface railroad of the Brooklyn City and Newtown Railroad Company on Washington street, together with the necessary sidings, switches, turnouts, poles, wires and appurtenances, including such as may be necessary to connect with said railroad tracks on Fulton street and on Washington street, and such as may be necessary to connect with depots, car barns or tracks for storage of cars on lands abutting on Tillary street, between Fulton and Washington streets; therefore be it

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health of the City of New York, held December 14, 1904, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 108 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Sec. 108. It shall be the duty of every owner, tenant, lessee, occupant or person in charge of any and every building, or place of business in the generally built-up portions of The City of New York, forthwith to provide, or cause to be provided, and at all times thereafter to keep and cause to be kept and provided, within such building or place of business, and for the exclusive use of such building or place of business, separate receptacles for receiving and holding, without leakage, all the ashes, garbage and liquid substances that may accumulate during thirty-six hours, from said building or place of business, or the portion thereof of which such person may be the owner, tenant, lessee, occupant, or in charge, and every such receptacle designed and used to hold ashes shall be made of or lined with some suitable material.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, in contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits, thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
