Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment December 9, 1904, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), to provide means for the erection of temporary pavilions, under the jurisdiction of the Board of Trustees of the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, to relieve the overcrowding at Bellevue Hospital, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

Whereas, A resolution has been duly passed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment permitting the purchase of four Ducker portable buildings for use by the Board of Trustees of the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, in accordance with the specifications hereto annexed; and

Whereas, It is deemed advisable because of the approach of the cold weather and the necessity for acquiring additional accommodations for the use of possible patients in the near future; therefore be it

Resolved, That, pursuant to the power given to this Board by section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the said Trustees are hereby authorized and empowered to purchase without contract let after public advertisement the Ducker portable buildings, four in number, at an expense not to exceed fifteen thousand dollars.

Specifications for Four Ducker Portable Buildings.

Material—The entire building with the exception of the course of the restriction.

Material—The entire building, with the exception of the cover to the roof sections, to be made of thoroughly seasoned and carefully selected yellow pine. The roof sections are to be covered with galvanized metal, laid on sheet asbestos. Between the clapboards and the inner lining of the building heavy builders' felt must be used, which is also to be used between the double floors. Seven-eighths-inch siding to be used for the outside of the building, and lining to consist of ½-inch narrow, tongued, grooved and headed yellow pine. beaded yellow pine.

Construction—The entire building to be made up in strong sectional frames of 2 foot 9-inch, joints absolutely air and water tight, everything to be fitted and finished before leaving the factory, and to be erected on posts to be furnished by contractor, building to be erected without the use of nail or screw so as to be easily taken down, moved and re-erected if necessary.

Size of Building—20 feet by 100 feet by 9 feet 6 inches by 15 feet to ridge, and to be made to accommodate thirty (30) patients each. There is also to be in each building toilet-room, bathroom and closet. This building must furnish thirty-two thousand (32,000) cubic feet of air space, or about one thousand and sixty-six (1,066) cubic feet to each patient.

Resolved, That the Local Board of Chester, Twenty-fifth District, also recommend that the said Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners prepare plans for the extension of the Interborough Railroad to Clason Point, Throgg's Neck and to Pelham Bay Park. Adopted December 8, 1904.

It shall be the duty of every owner, tenant, lessee, occupant or person in charge of any and every building, or place of business in the generally built-up portions of The City of New York, forthwith to provide, or cause to be provided, and at all times thereafter to keep and cause to be kept and provided, within such building or place of business, and for the exclusive use of such building or place of business, separate receptacles for receiving and holding, without leakage, all the ashes, garbage and liquid substances that may accumulate during thirty-six hours, from said building or place of business, or the portion thereof of which such person may be the owner, tenant, lessee, occupant, or in charge, and every such receptacle designed and used to hold ashes shall be made of or lined with some suitable material.

"All such materials and substances shall be separated and put into their respective receptacles, and such receptacles shall not be filled to within four inches of the top thereof.

"Such receptacles, as well as any light refuse or rubbish to be removed, shall be kept within the premises until the proper time for removal and shall then be placed in the area within the stoopline only, and there shall remain until such materials or substances are removed by the Department of Street Cleaning, but in no case shall such receptacles be placed where they shall be or become a nuisance.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and a lace of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same nurpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, rs contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any rortion of he profits, thereof.
