While, since the beginning of last year, as stated in the first quarterly report and annual report for the same, the consumption of water was given in considerable detail and was based on careful computation from the best available data, I have still reason to think that the margin of error in the results could and should be considerably reduced by improved methods, and I am at present at work to make the necessary arrangements to secure much closer approximations.

The work on this division has been: Repairs to bridges, building fences, filling in surface of road, cleaning gatehouses, gates and stopcocks; cutting grass and weeds, collecting samples of water for the Laboratory and patrolling reservoir and streams.

The electrozone plant at Brewsters, N. Y., has been operated continuously during the quarter.

WESTCHESTER COUNTY DIVISION.

Titicus Reservoir.

The work at this reservoir has been: Repairing fences, rebuilding stone wall fences, repairing culverts, cutting grass and weeds on the embankments of reservoir and along the highways of City property, cleaning gatehouses, gates and stopcocks; collecting samples of water for the Laboratory and patrolling reservoir and streams.

The work at this reservoir has been: Cutting grass and weeds on the embankment of reservoir and along the highways of City property, cleaning gatehouses, gates and stopcocks; collecting samples of water for the Laboratory and patrolling reservoirs and streams.

BRONX RIVER DIVISION.

The work on this division has more particularly been cleaning, clearing and burning brush and weeds and keeping clear and clean the pipe line, the State road and other public highways, the Bear Gutter channel, the Wampus pond and outlets, the Byram river and around the gatehouse at diverting dam and east side of Kensico river. The usual watchfulness and care by the Watchmen and Patrolmen have been given to all streams, channels and reservoirs.

Division No. 1.

The work in this division has been: Cleaning shores of lake, cleaning screens and screen chambers, cleaning new aqueduct between gatehouse and Shaft No. 1, repointing coping on wall in front of gatehouse, building catch basin at the corner of the new gatehouse, and the intakes of both aqueducts have been kept clean. Collecting samples of water for the Laboratory. Care of dam, gatehouses and gates.

Division No. 2.

The work on this division has been: Building, repairing and painting fences, building fence gates, repairing gutter and building drain, hauling brick and sand, filling and grading, building stone wall fence, concrete and brick work at head house, Shaft No. 5, and pointing the masonry of same; cleaning the new aqueduct at Shaft No. 5, cleaning gutters, bridges, drains and crosswalks; cutting grass, and cleaning up line of aqueduct.

Division No. 3.

The work on this division has been: Excavating on the east side of the Pocantico gatehouse, cleaning new aqueduct at Pocantico gatehouse and the grating at Shaft No. 11A, cleaning drains, gutters and crosswalks, cutting grass and cleaning up line of old aqueduct, and at Shafts Nos. 8, 9, 10 11A and 11B of the new aqueduct.

Division No. 4.

The work on this division has been: Building, repairing and painting fences, hauling earth and telephone poles, cleaning crosswalks, drains, gutters and culverts; cutting grass and cleaning up line of old aqueduct and the grounds of the new aqueduct at shaft sides.

The analyses of the various distributing reservoirs for the Borough of Manhattan show an increase in turbidity, free ammonia, microscopic organisms and bacteria over the corresponding quarter for last year. This increase is due partly to meteorological conditions and partly to an increase in the shallow flowage above Croton lake. From a sanitary standpoint, however, the general condition of the water has been practically the same as that supplied during the corresponding quarter for 1905.

The water supplied to the Borough of The Bronx has also shown an increase in turbidity and microscopic growths, due to the presence of such growths in Kensico Reservoir and Rye pond. The deterioration in the physical condition of the water has been entirely due to the unusual weather conditions, but throughout the quarter the water has been perfectly safe for drinking purposes.

On August 1, 1906, a new company, known as Repair Company No. 8, Martin Gleason, Foreman, was organized and made the first report to this office on August 8, 1906.

Of the hydrants found improperly closed and which the men of the repair companies, after examination, have closed properly, about 25 per cent. of the total amount occurred in district of Company No. 5 (Melrose, Harlem river to Burnside avenue and Tremont avenue, Borough of The Bronx), and although the Police have been notified to arrest persons opening hydrants without the customary permit from The Bronx borough office, the opening of hydrants in that vicinity seems to have increased instead of diminished.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

During the quarter no complaints were received regarding inadequate supply in the First Ward, although during summer months pressures were considerably reduced, requiring increased supply from the Bowery Bay Building and Improvement Company for fire protection.

In the Third Ward the supply is at present sufficient, but due consideration should be given to future needs. It is desirable that steps be taken by the City to acquire title to the uplands adjacent to the ponds near Bayside Pumping Station, so that the water in these ponds may be protected from contamination, and utilized as a supply after being filtered by means of infiltration galleries or other method. The full yield at the Flushing Pumping Station is being utilized at present; a greater yield may be secured by driving additional large wells to a depth varying between 100 and 125 feet.

The contract of D'Ambra & Tuccillo for laying of mains in the First Ward is progressing satisfactorily and nearing completion. Plans are being prepared for laying additional mains in this ward. All necessary preparations have been made to carry out contract for which bids were submitted on the 26th, and work may proceed as soon as possible.

Plans are being prepared for an increased distribution service in the Third Ward, and if same is carried to completion will prove of much benefit in supplying the demand of a greatly increased service.

Action in the matter of installing a 20-inch supply main from the Bayside Pumping Station to connect with present main at Cemetery Lane and Broadway, supplementing the present 12-inch main, has been postponed until an increased yield is assured from this point, or until the water in Oakland Lake is utilized as a supply after filtration. In the plans being prepared for the Third Ward provision has been made for continuing the present 12-inch line from Orient avenue to City line, to supplement existing 6-inch line.

It is very desirable that the present submerged 12-inch flexible joint main crossing Little Neck creek be relaid; plans for same have already been prepared.

BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

During the quarter examinations and reports have been made on six applications of the Fire Department for new mains and hydrants, and examinations and reports have also been made on a number of applications by the various private companies operating in the Borough of Richmond, for permission to make extensions to their systems.

Permission having been given to Milliken Brothers to construct a temporary trolley line in Western avenue, and also to lay suction mains from the bay to their plant, after the matter had been examined and reported on by this Department, we have supervised and inspected the laying and construction of the same in accordance with the clause inserted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the permit. A permit with a similar provision was issued to the Staten Island Electric Railway Company and their work has also been inspected.

Plans and specifications have been prepared for the laying of forty-nine thousand eight hundred and two (49,802) linear feet of water main, ranging in size from eight to sixteen inches in diameter. As the entire force in the Borough of Richmond consists of three men, a large portion of their time during the quarter was taken up with the preliminary surveys and the preparation of the plans in connection with this proposed extension. The specifications are now in the hands of the printer and the plans are completed, so that it will be possible to advertise the work in a very short time. One hundred and seven (107) new hydrants and one hundred and thirty-two (132) new gate valves have been provided for in connection with the same.

MECHANICAL DIVISION.

BOROUGHS OF MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX.

Ninety-eighth Street Pumping Station.

On No. 1 engine, during the past quarter, slight repairs were made to the following extent:

The drain pipe fittings and valves on the water end were thoroughly overhauled and renewed where necessary, and the check valve on the discharge main was repaired. The water end of this pump was entirely overhauled and the old studs in the cylinder head were replaced by new ones. Holes were drilled in the air chamber and a water column mounted. New sections were placed in the steam line of No. 1 engine, the old pipe being in a very poor and leaky condition at the joints.

No. 2 engine received a new jacket pipe and new sections were also put in the steam line of this pump. The T from which the steam line of No. 2 pump branched from the main line was calked and provided with a clamp in order to repair a leak. New studs for the cylinder head on the water end were put in place, it being necessary to drill out the old studs and tap the holes. A water column was mounted on the air chamber and the gate valves on the suction and discharge line were overhauled.

The jacket pipe on No. 3 engine was renewed and new unions were used, and the drain pipe from the stuffing box was replaced with a new one. A spanner wrench was made to order to fit the valves on the water end of this pump. This engine was also provided with an indicator reducing motion, and, as in the case of the other two engines, the old cylinder head studs were replaced with new ones. New joints were made in the steam jacket return line and a new bearing was provided for the compensating cylinder on the left hand side.

Further repairs were made in this station by the renewal of the exhaust line from the air compressor to the feed water heater, and the drain from the feed water heater was repaired. A new auxiliary exhaust line to the feed water heaters was put in, providing steam from the exhaust of the feed pumps. The pipe and fittings on the oil pump in the oil room were overhauled.

In the fire-room new hangers were put in place for the main steam line, and the low pressure steam line was repaired. The stop valve for the by-pass between the main steam and the low pressure line was overhauled, and the stop valve on the latter line was also ground and renewed.

A storeroom will be built in the Ninety-seventh street end of the coal house for the accommodation of small supplies, and the placing of two manholes for ventilation in the Ninety-eighth street area is contemplated.

One Hundred and Seventy-ninth Street Pumping Station.

In this station during the past quarter new joints were made in the separator piping on No. 2 engine and the piping from the high pressure jacket to the separator was repaired. New joints were made in the steam line of No. 1 engine and the steam line to the Blake engines was calked. Engines 1, 3 and 4 were provided with new brackets and shafts for the valve gear.

In the boiler-room new tubes were placed in No. 1 boiler and the steam line was repaired, the old line being in very poor condition. In making these repairs to the main steam line, new lengths of pipe and new valves were supplied, thus giving practically a new line. In order to connect up the new line it was necessary to shut down the low service pumps for a short time, and the Worthington pump in the High Bridge station was used to keep up the level in the reservoir.

Plans are being prepared for adjustable ventilators on the present monitors on the engine-room roof. It is also proposed to provide this station with an iron and glass office for the use of the Engineer in charge, and a complete new steam line will soon be installed in the engine-room.

The roof over the engine room in this station will require attention within a short time.

High Bridge Pumping Station.

This station has not been in regular service during the last quarter. Pumping has been done only to try the Worthington pump after the repairs had been made, and in helping out the One Hundred and Seventy-ninth Street Station when it was necessary to shut down. The steam radiators in this station are split from freezing. Provision has been made already to overhaul and completely repair the steam heating plant.

Jerome Avenue Pumping Station.

No extensive repairs were made in this station during the past quarter. In July a leak was repaired in the high pressure cylinder head and the bearings of the rock shaft of No. 2 engine were repaired. Later the jacket pumps were repaired and new

keys were fitted to the rock shaft of the air pump of No. 3 engine. A leak developed in the steam line in the engine room, but not of a serious nature. This leak was repaired in August. A complete new steam line will be installed in the engine room within a short time; the contract for this work is let and a partial delivery of the material has been made.

A crack about eight inches long appeared in the flange of the lower casting of the water cylinder of No. 2 Worthington pumping engine. This crack is in what is apparently the strongest part of the pump. It passes through one bolt hole and through the entire flange extending down six inches below the flange. Repairs are now nearly completed on this casting, the patch being ready to bolt on the inside of the lower, or discharge, chamber of the pump cylinder.

Reference has already been made to plans now under preparation to provide adjustable ventilators on the present monitors on the engine room roof.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

First Ward—Pumping Station No. 1.

No. 1 engine and the feed pumps were repacked on both the steam and water ends, but owing to a broken nut on the stuffing box it was necessary to shut down No. 1 engine on July 26. No. 2 engine, which was started up at that time, has been in service since.

A new steam line was connected up to a drainage pump in the cellar under the engine room.

The boilers were cleaned thoroughly, and all scale removed, the drums and combustion chambers also receiving careful attention. The boilers were run alternately while this work was being done.

The only repair work at present required in this station is the replacement of the broken nut above referred to and the renewal of one of the guides on the vacuum pump of No. 1 engine.

First Ward, Pumping Station No. 2.

The new No. 2 station is now ready for service and will be in operation as soon as the wells are properly cleaned. The old boiler which was removed from Whitestone and set in the new station was tested up to 176 pounds and no leaks developed.

The contractor was unable to finish work on the 16-foot well, owing to the large quantity of water he had to handle, until he could provide himself with a pump of large capacity. The work of cleaning this well consists practically of redigging it, the well being filled with bricks from the walls of the old station, which was destroyed by an explosion.

Third Ward, Pumping Station No. 3.

This station is in good condition at the present time and the recent repairs were not very extensive. In addition to thoroughly cleaning the boilers, including the drums and combustion chambers, the feed water heater was cleaned each week and a new automatic valve attached. A wooden casing was constructed around the lagging of No. 2 engine and varnished. The engine room floor was also cleaned and varnished. The boiler setting was repaired and pointed up and all piping in the boiler room was painted. The steam packing rings of the feed pump were repaired.

Third Ward, Flushing Pumping Station.

As in the other stations the boilers in the Flushing station were cleaned and freed from scale. This station was wired for twenty-two incandescent lights, the power to be obtained from the public service. The cost of the equipment was \$329. Twenty new grate bars were used to replace old ones, and a number of new fire hose and blades were purchased.

The steam piping on the high pressure side of engine No. 1 was renewed, and also the piping to the siphon under the floor.

Third Ward, Bayside Pumping Station.

The work of renewal and repair in the Bayside station during the last quarter consisted in fitting a new disc to and reseating the stop valve on the Holly engine, replacing twenty grate bars and six front bars. Owing to delay in the delivery of the grate bars the boilers could not be changed over for the purpose of cleaning. The boiler room doors were refitted, and the door jambs made tight. This work was done by the Department employees. This station is reported to be in excellent condition.

BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

Tottenville Pumping Station.

The repairs done at this station during the past quarter were very slight and were done by the men in the station. A considerable amount of work will be necessary to bring this station into good shape. The rods on well pumps Nos. 3, 5, 6, 7 and 8 will have to be taken out and new packing put on the valves. No. 3 well needs flushing and cleaning and pipe covering is required on the steam line to the well pumps.

The area included between Eleventh and Twenty-third streets and Seventh avenue and Broadway was nearly completed at the end of the quarter, and it is intended to use that portion of the high-pressure fire system as a low pressure system, in anticipation of the completion of the high-pressure fire stations, thus making immediately available for fire protection not less than 150 hydrants of the most approved and modern type, and over 20,000 feet of mains, from which no water would be drawn for domestic purposes, so that the full pressure will be at all times available for fire protection. For this purpose a temporary connection between the high pressure fire main on Fifth avenue and the low pressure main on the same avenue will be made. The district thereby protected is an important dry goods section, so that the additional protection should have high practical value.

High-Pressure Pumping Stations.

The following contracts were entered into during the quarter:

Suction Mains—

The Continental Asphalt Paving Company being the low bidder for this work, was awarded the contract on August 21, 1906. This contract included the suction mains and appurtenances for the station at Oliver and South streets, and the station at Gansevoort and West streets.

Pumping Station Buildings—

The contracts for building the pumping station buildings at Oliver and South Streets and at Gansevoort and West streets were awarded on September 11, 1906, to T. Cockerill & Sons.

The contracts for the plumbing and gas fitting for these buildings were awarded on September 17, to Frank J. Fee.

Filtration.

The office force have been almost continuously employed in making detail contract plans for that part of the plant to be built first, i. e., the concrete work of eight clear water reservoirs and for forty-two filter beds and appurtenances, such as galleries and conduits. This work is nearly completed.

Plans and specifications have been prepared and a contract made for the construction of an experimental station at the southern end of Jerome Park Reservoir. This station is for the purpose of settling certain questions in regard to the removal of color from the Croton water, and also to test two new and promising methods of washing filter sand, both of which indicate a material reduction in maintenance expenses, and one of which has been successfully in use, on a small scale, in the Brooklyn filter plants. The contract for this work was awarded to Leslie McHarg & Co. on September 25.

The tests relating to the removal of color, which we had begun at the Brooklyn filtering plants, with the aid of Mr. D. Jackson, who has charge of our Mt. Prospect laboratory, during the last quarter, were discontinued on August 21, as the station was needed for the regular work of the department. These tests will be prosecuted at the next experimental station when it goes into commission.

Arrangements were made with the United Water Improvement Company to erect an experimental station adjoining ours at Jerome Park, in order to allow this department to ascertain the merits of the Ozone Purification System, cost of operation and all other matters relating thereto. The cost of installation, maintenance, operation and removal of this experimental station is to be exclusively defrayed by the United Water Improvement Company, and it is specifically provided that in agreeing to the installation and operation of this plant the City in no way binds itself to adopt the Ozone Purification System, whatever the results of the tests may be, nor incur any liability towards the company.

Force and Office Room.

We have experienced great difficulty in securing additional force and in retaining the good men now in our employ, owing to the greater pay which these men can

obtain elsewhere, especially with the Board of Water Supply, who are much less restricted than we are in the matter of salaries, and also owing to the provision of the Charter under which we cannot appoint as Assistant Engineer in this department any candidate who has not had ten years' practical experience. No such requirement is needed in other departments of the City, nor in those of the Aqueduct Commissioners or Board of Water Supply, which do similar work, and we thus have here an anomalous situation of being unable to appoint as Assistant Engineers men of proved competence who have been for years faithfully discharging the duties of Assistant Engineer, and who, by a simple transfer, can secure the appointment we unjustly withhold from them. It seems obvious that a modification of this provision would be of great advantage to the department, which is now seriously handicapped in its work by the requirements it imposes.

We have not yet secured the additional office space required to conduct our work properly, and our force is not only crowded into the rooms they occupy, but is divided in two floors, the ninth and the fifteenth, with the obvious resulting inconvenience and loss of time. It is expected that arrangements will soon be completed to install the whole engineering force either on the fifteenth or on the ninth floor, as outlined in a previous report.

Owing to an abnormal increase in the daily consumption of water in this borough on June 28 over that of June 25, 1906 (the increase amounting to 17,417,000 gallons), a letter was addressed to you by the former Chief Engineer, under date of June 28, 1906, recommending that a contract for four engines and four boilers for two temporary pumping stations be not advertised, but that to take the place of said engines and boilers the Board of Aldermen be immediately requested to authorize the expenditure of an amount of money not to exceed \$60,000, without the formality of public letting, for the construction of emergency stations. As yet the resolution has not been adopted by the Board of Aldermen.

Expecting that the resolution would be adopted, pumping engines, boilers, well-points, etc., were obtained for five proposed pumping stations, and the erection of said stations and the installation of the machinery and boilers was begun.

It was estimated that about 15,000,000 gallons of water per day additional was to be added to the supply by installing the new emergency plants. The greater amount, if not the whole of this additional increase in the supply could have been more expeditiously and economically obtained by from time to time sinking and connecting additional wells at several of the existing pumping stations where there are pumping capacities considerably in excess of the yield from the wells, and by cleaning and repairing existing wells at many of the stations than by obtaining the additional supply from the proposed stations, and had their been a sufficient number of properly organized and equipped well gangs in the service, those additional wells could have been installed by the department force in a short time and the old wells cleaned and repaired, and the necessity for calling for the adoption of the above-named resolution could have been avoided; but, unfortunately, it appears that the well branch of the service has not received attention commensurate with its importance.

Pending the planning and execution of the work of installing a system of supply calculated to collect all the available waters in the saturated sands and gravel above and below the blue clay stratum, and a minimum number of tubular wells, and pump the water direct into distribution reservoirs from highly economical plants, it is my intention to recommend that provision be made in next year's Budget for the necessary number of men with whom to establish properly organized well gangs under intelligent direction to systematically clean and repair existing wells and connections and to sink and connect additional wells to keep pace with the constantly increasing demands for more water.

During the quarter improvements to the existing driven well plants, the starting up one new station, a moderate rainfall and the careful management of the supply and distribution systems, we were enabled to get and maintain the height of water in the distribution reservoir normal, and higher than it has been for some years past.

Negotiations have been started looking towards an increase in supply from the temporary stations along the line of the Massapequa infiltration gallery, and from emergency line stations now building and those proposed to be built; also from stations to be built within the borough limits.

It was expected that the supply from the Massapequa infiltration gallery would have increased materially by this time the total supply for the borough, but owing to various causes the contractor has made very slow progress on this gallery, and during the quarter the total amount of pipe laid was 1,430 feet of 36-inch pipe on the west line of the gallery and 1,039 feet of double line of 33-inch pipe laid on the east line of the gallery.

A pumping plant was erected by the City near Seaford, to utilize the supply which might be obtained from approximately 1,300 feet of gallery which had been laid at the west end of the line. This station was started on August 23, and has since been furnishing between three and one-half and four million gallons daily.

On the Wantagh gallery the west leg has been completed, and the east leg has been laid up to Station 5 + 60, the total amount of pipe laid on both legs during the quarter amounting to 2,073 feet. This gallery has yielded an average of over thirteen million gallons daily during the entire quarter, but the yield is reducing on account of the low rainfall.

On March 28 of this year an agreement was made by and between The City of New York and Silas W. Titus, of No. 662 Carroll street, Borough of Brooklyn, to clean and remodel the twenty-one (21) deep wells then in use at the Jameco Pumping Station, install an air lift system, develop the wells to their full extent and to deliver the water into the conduit. At the time Mr. Titus took charge of the wells the total yield from them was about one million eight hundred thousand gallons per day of twenty-four hours; at the end of the quarter Mr. Titus was delivering into the conduit about five million four hundred thousand gallons per day.

In addition to the deep well development mentioned above a contract was made calling for the sinking of wells at the Spring Creek, Aqueduct, St. Albans, Rosedale, Forest Stream, Clear Stream, Wantagh and Massapequa Pumping Stations.

As the water obtained from these wells will not probably interfere with the shallow well supply, any water obtained would be a net gain in the supply, whereas any development of the supply obtained from the saturated sands above the clay bed in the vicinity of surface streams or ponds reduces the surface yield. Therefore the yield of stations like Wantagh and Massapequa Galleries does not represent an increase in the supply equal to the yield of the stations. This is strikingly shown by the reduced gravity supply of the new watershed during this summer, this supply falling as low as eight million gallons at a time.

A temporary plant connected to the new driven well line at the New Lots Pumping Station was started at the beginning of the quarter and a supply of approximately two million gallons per day is being derived from this source.

Early in the quarter typhoid cases were discovered on the Kossel Farm, located on the Jerusalem Turnpike, just east of the east branch of our East Meadow stream. Immediate steps were taken to prevent the pollution of the water, and the supply from East Meadow was turned off and allowed to waste from July 29 to September 15, during which time no water was taken from this source of supply into the conduit.

Practically all the waste during the quarter was due to the shutting down of the filter plants for various causes, the run-off of the streams being utilized where the water was not filtered; * * *

* * * with the exception of the East Meadow stream, where the waste was due to the pollution of the water referred to above.

The analyses made of the water during the quarter showed the supply to be in excellent condition, and a general improvement over the supply last year.

Distribution System.

The distribution system has been extended in the outlying districts as rapidly as we were able to obtain material from the foundries.

The work of laying the trunk distribution main through Fort Hamilton avenue, under the contract with the Isaac Harris Company was delayed on account of a strike at the valve works, and the main is not as yet completed.

The work of relaying the mains on Wythe avenue and on some of the adjoining streets between Flushing avenue and North Twelfth street has been practically completed and it is expected that tests made in the district will show an ample supply of water available for fire purposes.

The contract for setting additional hydrants on the 20 and 30-inch mains in the borough has been completed, thus greatly increasing the supply of water available for fire purposes along the lines of these mains. This contract provided for only about half of the hydrants required for all the 20 and 30-inch mains in the borough, and an additional contract will be made as soon as the money is available.

The general work of repairing and caring for the distribution mains and their appurtenances has been carried on, but the lack of men makes it impossible to do all the work that is necessary to efficiently look after the system.

The table attached hereto gives in detail the work done in laying mains and setting gates and hydrants during this quarter.

Throughout the distribution system I find that there are numerous cases where mains are not cross-connected and where they are too small for furnishing an adequate supply to fire hydrants, and that certain important districts are inadequately provided for with main feeders; also that a great number of the hydrants are in need of repairs, and that a number of gates on the large trunk mains are inoperative; also that a number of important main lines have no hydrants connected to same.

With the force of men available, the work of repairing the hydrants and defective gates and eliminating dead ends where possible and also cutting in hydrants, progress

must necessarily be slow, and it is hoped that the force may be materially increased during the coming year, and also that the necessary contracts may be entered into to bring the distribution system much nearer to a standard of perfection.

Water Waste Investigation.

The work on the water waste investigation was recommended early in July, and was carried on for four weeks. During this period the inspecting force varied from 16 to 20 and the number of premises examined were 8,500.

The good results obtained are very apparent, and I would recommend the appointment of twenty (20) or more Water Waste and Meter Inspectors to be placed under the direction of some assistant in this bureau, whose duty it would be to see that the work of inspection is systematically carried out and properly performed, and where defective plumbing fixtures are found, to see that same are promptly and properly repaired. The cost and expense to the City of this inspection would be amply compensated for by the great saving in the City's water.

Next to metering all premises where City water is used, this house to house inspection and the enforcement of repairs to defective fixtures is the most effective means of checking the waste, and unless authority be obtained to apply meters generally, there should at all times be a systematic inspection system in vogue.

HIGH-PRESSURE FIRE SERVICE STATIONS.

Coney Island System.

At the Coney Island Station a fence has been erected around the portion of the property near the station, and the surrounding grounds have been graded and a top dressing of soil placed and seeded. The station was operated on four alarms for fires in July, none during August and two during September.

There were 3,285,000 gallons of water pumped by the plant, of which slightly less than ten (10) per cent was used for fire purposes, the additional being pumped for the purpose of testing the plant.

Main System.

The work of installing the mains, hydrants and appurtenances in the river front, office building and dry goods districts has materially progressed during the quarter, and it is expected that all of the mains will be completed before the end of the next quarter. The hydrants have all been delivered, with the exception of the fireboat hydrants, which were delayed on account of the question as to the form of nozzle to be used. This question has been settled by the contractor supplying swivel connections for the fireboats and nozzles for the hydrants. The pumps, motors and appurtenances for the high-pressure fire service stations are being constructed, but the work on the buildings has been delayed, and while bids for these stations were received, the contractor has not yet been ordered to begin work.

It has been impossible to make satisfactory arrangements for the salt water suction main as yet, and no progress has therefore been made in the work of preparing and letting this contract.

Plans, specifications and estimates are being prepared to extend this system into the Eastern District and Greenpoint section and along the Gowanus Canal. A request will be made for the necessary appropriation to thus extend the system so that these sections of the borough can obtain the benefits from increased fire protection and reduced fire rates.

Pumping Stations.

The pumping at the Ridgewood Station has been equal to the full capacity of the station, without leaving any adequate reserve for emergencies, and it has been impossible to shut down pumps except for pressing repairs.

The pumps have been operated so continuously that the slip has materially increased, and in the case of the Davidson pumps it is expected that tests which are now being made will show a large percentage of slip. New plungers have already been ordered for the water ends of these pumps, and they will be inserted as soon as possible.

The work of remodeling the Gravesend Pumping Station has been carried on, but the failure of the concern that was to furnish the boilers has seriously retarded the completion of this work.

At the New Lots Station the installation of the new pumps has gone on slowly, the rest of the work being practically completed. A temporary plant at this station has been operated for the entire quarter and has added materially to the supply.

In connection with the pumping stations, I beg to report that upon my assuming charge of this bureau I found most of the pumping plants and their surroundings in almost a deplorable condition, particularly the machinery and boilers in the Ridgewood Station. All of the temporary stations are of frame construction, and none of the stations are provided with fire fighting apparatus of any description, not even fire hose, and the machinery and boilers in most of the stations were in a very bad state of repairs and the boilers in sore need of cleaning; the machinery and boilers in most instances are of a very uneconomical type. In connection with these pumping stations, a matter of the utmost importance to this department, is the lack of proper means of knowing or ascertaining the quantities of coal delivered to the various stations, and whether or not the department receives the coal which is paid for by the city. Also there appears to have been no records kept for many years past of the duties and cost of pumping at the various stations. Under the reorganization contemplated in this branch of the bureau these important records will be regularly worked up and reported quarterly.

To bring these stations up to the proper standard of efficiency will entail a great deal of time and expense.

Line stations have been operated almost continuously with such repairs as we were enabled to make from time to time.

Additional Steel Conduit Line.

The work was continued on the contract for laying the 72-inch steel conduit line, by T. A. Gillespie, contractors, and fair progress made during the summer. Delays in removing the buildings on the property purchased by the city interfered somewhat with the progress of the work, and also difficulty with the Long Island Railroad Company over the crossing at Aqueduct. These obstacles have all been removed, and there is no reason why the work should not make rapid progress from now until cold weather stops further pipe laying.

Surveys have been continued east of Clear Stream so as to definitely locate the line of the proposed extension of the pipe line, and as soon as these surveys are completed maps will be forwarded, showing the land to be acquired.

Ponds, Conduits and Reservoirs.

The usual work of patrolling the ponds and streams and protecting the supply from pollution has been carried out during the quarter.

The following schedule gives a summary of the work done on cleaning closets and cesspools to prevent surface pollution of the supplies:

The general condition of the supply shows an improvement over the corresponding quarter for last year, which would naturally be expected from the increased percentage of driven well water being obtained this year.

July 25—For furnishing and delivering cast iron flanged pipe, special castings, etc.

August 1—For furnishing and delivering double-nozzle hydrants.

August 24—For furnishing, delivering and laying water mains and removing existing water mains in Flushing, Franklin, Marcy, Metropolitan, Myrtle, Nostrand avenues, etc.

The following are the contracts for which bids were received, together with the names of the lowest bidders and the total amount of their bids on the basis of the Engineer's estimate of the work to be done:

The opinion is as follows:

PATRICK J. TRACY, Esq., Supervisor, City Record:

Sir—In reply to your favor of November 24, 1906, with reference to a request by the Department of Health for permission to install a printing plant and purchase supplies necessary therefor to print the indices of births, marriages and deaths recorded in the said Department, I beg to advise you as follows:

Section 1528 of the Charter provides:

"All printing for said City * * * shall be executed and all stationery shall be supplied under contracts to be entered into by said Board of City Record."

Under this provision it is clear that all printing and stationery must be supplied through contracts to be entered into by the Board of City Record, and the only exception to this proviso is found in the last sentence of the section quoted supra. This portion of said section that is material reads:

"Nothing herein contained shall apply to the printing or supplies of stationery for The City of New York * * * where by the concurrent vote of the Mayor, Council to the Corporation and Comptroller, it shall be decided to have such printing done or such stationery furnished without contract let after advertisement for bids or proposals, but in such cases such printing shall be done and such stationery procured in the manner and on such terms and conditions as the said officers shall deem to be for the best interests of the City."

The question therefore arises whether under the resolution adopted by the Board of Health, the Mayor, the Corporation Counsel and the Comptroller, if agreeable, have the power to permit the Board of Health to acquire a printing plant and purchase supplies to meet the emergency suggested in the resolution accompanying your communication. I am of the opinion that the power therein contained that " * * * in such cases such printing shall be done and such stationery procured in the manner and on such terms and conditions as the said officers shall deem for the best interests of the City" is not broad enough to authorize the expenditure of moneys for the purchase of a printing plant to be used by the Board of Health in printing the indices of births, marriages and deaths. The policy of the framers of the Charter was to centralize the printing and the purchase of supplies for all Departments in the Board of City Record, and to endeavor to place a construction upon this section of the Charter which would permit the purchase of a printing plant for the Board of Health would open the door to every Department under the City Government to ask for a plant of its own, and it does not seem to me that it is in the best interests of the City, independent of my legal opinion as to the law, that such a practice would conduce to the best interests of the City.

On December 7, 1906, your Honorable Board adopted a resolution containing recommendations as to the form of bids to be asked for various routes, including the Seventh and Eighth avenue and the Jerome avenue routes referred to, which were in accordance with the suggestions contained in the said communication of this Board dated October 11, 1906.

Since the adoption of the said resolution by your Board, the detailed plans and specifications have been prepared, the proposed contract has been drawn and carefully revised, a public hearing, after advertisement, has been held, pursuant to law, and the form of contract herewith transmitted has been finally adopted by this Board. Provision is therein made for inviting alternative bids from contractors, as required by your Board—

1. For construction alone, and
2. For construction, equipment and operation.

The said proposed contract has also been submitted, as required by law, to the Corporation Counsel for his approval as to form.

DEAR SIR—You will remember that in the fall of 1906 the Rapid Transit Board discussed the traffic conditions north of the Ninety-sixth street station, and it was evident that some plan should be adopted which would remedy the congested condition at this place. Since then the Engineers of the Board have been in consultation with the officials of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, and, after a prolonged discussion of this matter, a plan has been agreed upon involving the construction of two additional tracks on the west side of the present subway and one track on the east side, together with crossovers, this construction extending from Ninety-sixth street to One Hundred and Third street. This plan would effectively relieve the situation, and the estimated cost of the work is about \$850,000. I submit herewith blue print of our drawing No. 1715-A, showing the general layout of the subway at this point and the new additional tracks necessary to carry out this scheme.

The Interborough Company have expressed a willingness to undertake the construction of these additional tracks, as stated in a letter received from Mr. E. P. Bryan, President of the Company, dated March 27, 1907, copy of which I inclose herewith.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—I am in due receipt of your communication bearing date January 7, referring to my opinion dated December 31, 1906, relative to a bill in the matter of claims for damages to property owners on the easterly side of Park avenue.

You quote from my opinion a paragraph, of which the end is: "On the face of the papers they are apparently expenses which should be paid by the Rapid Transit Commission."

You now ask me to advise you if I mean said expenses are properly charged against and should be paid out of the administration account of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners.

In answer to this communication I have to say that the account in question is the proper one from which these expenses should be paid.

In my previous opinion I called your attention to the fact that one of the items of the expenses is a charge for services of a person as expert on behalf of the City. This expense, of course, you will not pay in the absence of proof that in fact an expert was employed on behalf of the City, and even in that case I should advise you to communicate the facts fully to this Department before taking any further action in regard to the proposed payment of such a claim.

It is exceeding difficult to understand how, under any circumstances, there could have been an expert witness for the City in a proceeding to which the City was not a party.

My previous letter to you on this general question, of December 31, 1906, was quite definite, but as the matter is very important and to avoid any possible misunderstanding as to the position of this Department in regard to the Park avenue claims, I will add a few words at the risk of repetition.

As I stated to you before, the Law Department has no knowledge of what has been done in regard to the Park avenue claims, but has certain information indirectly acquired in regard thereto.

What seems to have happened is this:

The Rapid Transit Commissioners, in aid of their application to the Appellate Division to secure its approval of a change of route in Park avenue, and acting upon the suggestion of the Appellate Division, instituted a proceeding before ex-Judge Parker, as Referee, without notice to the City and without participation in the proceedings by the City, to determine the amount of damages suffered by the abutting property owners by reason of the change of route in question.

The Rapid Transit Commissioners had a perfect right to take any proceedings which were necessary in support of an application which they had the right to make to the Appellate Division, and for that reason I have stated to you already that I think the expenses incurred by the Rapid Transit Commissioners in aid of their application, excepting the bill of the alleged City's expert, might be paid out of the maintenance expenses of the Commission.

I do not admit any liability on the part of the City for any alleged damages caused to abutting property owners by the construction of the rapid transit road in Park avenue on any route other than the legal one. But I feel justified in approving the expenses incurred by the Rapid Transit Commissioners in a proceeding which they had apparently the right to institute as a part of their proceeding to secure the approval of the Appellate Division.

I have learned indirectly that within the last few days Judge Parker's report has been confirmed by the Appellate Division, and that that Court has reiterated its declaration that the damages to the property owners should be paid. It abstains, as did Judge Parker in his report, from saying by whom these expenses are to be paid, and so far as I know, nothing has yet occurred which makes the City liable for the alleged damages.

Indeed, the litigation seems to have proceeded upon the theory that the City was neither a proper or necessary party thereto.

I think the foregoing observations sufficiently state the position of this Department in this matter.

Resolved, That section 21 of the Sanitary Code of the Department of Health be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 21. For all lodging-houses in The City of New York containing rooms in which there are more than three beds for the use of lodgers, or in which more than six persons are allowed to sleep, a permit from the Board of Health shall be required, and no person shall have, lease, let or keep any such lodging-house or the lodgings therein, or assist in the keeping, hire, or assist in hiring, or conduct the business of any such lodging-house, or the lodgings therein, except pursuant to the terms and conditions of such permit. The beds in all lodging-houses and in every room in which beds are let for lodgers shall be separated by a passage-way of not less than two feet, horizontally,

and all the beds shall be so arranged that under each of them the air shall freely circulate, and there shall be adequate ventilation.

Four hundred cubic feet of air space shall be provided and allowed for each bed or lodger. Lodging-houses shall be conducted in accordance with rules and regulations adopted from time to time by the Board of Health, and which are hereby made a part hereof.

INVITATION TO CONTRACTORS.

LEXINGTON AVENUE ROUTE.

THE CITY OF NEW YORK (HEREIN after called The City), acting by its Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners (hereinafter called the Board), contemplates building a rapid transit railroad along the routes described below. By this advertisement The City invites proposals to construct such railroad upon the routes and in accordance with the detailed plans and specifications adopted therefor. Such proposals may be submitted for any one or more of the eleven separate parts of which such railroad consists, as hereinafter stated.

The points within the City between which the said several parts of the said road are to run and the route or routes to be followed, are briefly as follows:

Section 5-O-3: This part of Section 5-O, as described in the routes and general plan, begins at Lexington avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street and runs southerly under Lexington avenue to a point about 50 feet north of One Hundred and Third street.

Section 5-O-2: Begins at the southerly end of Section 5-O-3, and runs southerly under Lexington avenue to a point about 50 feet north of Seventy-first street.

Section 5-O-1: Begins at the southerly end of Section 5-O-2, and runs southerly under Lexington avenue to a point between Forty-second and Forty-third streets, the southerly end of Section 5-O, as described in the routes and general plan, and runs thence under private property, Forty-second street and private property again to a point in Park avenue, between Thirty-eighth and Forty-first streets, at which a junction can conveniently be made with the existing subway.*

Section 5-B: Begins at the northerly end of Section 5-O, above described, and runs thence northerly under the Harlem river to the Borough of The Bronx, where it continues under Third avenue and Morris avenue and then curves under private property to a point in One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, between Morris avenue and Cortlandt avenue, at which a junction can conveniently be made with the present subway.

Section 5-C-1: This part of Section 5-C, as described in the routes and general plan, begins at the northerly end of Section 5-O above described, and runs thence northerly under Lexington avenue and the Harlem river to the Borough of The Bronx, and then continues under Park avenue to One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street.

Section 5-C-2: This part of Section 5-C consists of a spur beginning at a point on the main line of the route of Section 5-C at Park avenue and One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, and runs under private property, One Hundred and Fifty-third street, Exterior street and Sedgwick avenue to the intersection of Sedgwick avenue and One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street.

Section 5-C-3: This part of Section 5-C consists of a loop beginning in the Borough of The Bronx at a point in Park avenue between One Hundred and Fifty-first and One Hundred and Fifty-second streets, and runs thence northwesterly and westerly under private property and connects with the spur Section 5-C-2 above described near the point where the centre line of said spur would intersect One Hundred and Fifty-first street if produced.

Section 5-D-3: This part of Section 5-D, as described in the routes and general plan, begins at the southerly end of Section 5-O, above described, in Lexington avenue, between Forty-second and Forty-third streets, and runs thence southerly under Lexington avenue to a point about half way between Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh streets, at which point the tracks will diverge into two branches. One of these branches will curve southwesterly under private property to Thirty-sixth street, and then run westerly under Thirty-sixth street, curving southerly into Fifth avenue, and then under Fifth avenue to a point where it will be rejoined by the second branch diverging as above stated. The second branch will run from the said point of divergence southerly and westerly under Lexington and Thirty-fifth street to Fifth avenue, where it will rejoin the branch first above described at a point between Thirty-fourth and Thirty-fifth streets. From the last mentioned point the route of this section will run southerly under Fifth avenue along Madison square and into Broadway; thence southerly under Broadway to a point about half way between Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets.

Section 5-D-2: Begins at the southerly end of Section 5-D-3 and runs southerly under Broadway (passing under Union square) to a point about 50 feet north of Reade street.

Section 5-D-1: Begins at the southerly end of Section 5-D-2, and runs thence southerly under Broadway, Vesey street, Church street, Trinity place and Greenwich street to a suitable terminus under Battery Park.

The general plan of construction calls for a railroad placed in subways or tunnels. The road is intended to be operated by electricity or some other power not requiring combustion within the tunnels, and the motors are intended to be capable of moving trains at a speed of not less than forty miles per hour for long distances, exclusive of stops.

For all of Sections 5-O-1, 5-O-2, 5-O-3 and 5-A there will be four tracks. For Section 5-B there will be two tracks. For Section 5-C-1 and Section 5-C-2, there will be two tracks. In the loop above described as Section 5-C-3, there will be one track. For Section 5-D-3 there will be four tracks as far south as the point between Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh streets, where the line diverges as above described; there will be two tracks from the point of divergence through Thirty-sixth street and Fifth avenue to the point where the lines reunite and two tracks from the point of divergence through Lexington avenue and Thirty-fifth street to the point in Fifth avenue where the lines reunite, and for the remainder of the distance southerly under Fifth avenue and Broadway there will be four tracks. For Section 5-D-2 there will be four tracks. For Section 5-D-1 there will be four tracks to Chambers street station. South of the Chambers street station southerly under Broadway, Vesey street, Trinity place and Greenwich street there will be two tracks. Additional tracks for terminal purposes are to be constructed under Battery place and Battery Park. Suitable stations, as shown on the plans, together with crossovers, turnouts and sidings, as may be necessary, are to be provided.

The tracks are to be of standard gauge. The tunnels are to have a height of not less than 13 feet in the clear, and a maximum width of 15 feet for each track, except at stations, curves, etc., where the width may be increased. The roof of the tunnels is generally to be as near the surface of streets as street conditions and grades will permit, but will be depressed whenever necessary to avoid grade crossings as well as where approaching the Harlem river. The roof and sides of the tunnels will be of iron or steel and masonry.

Entrances to stations will in general be placed within private property, rights in which will be acquired for the purpose.

If the contract covers two or more parts of the road, the deposit shall be the aggregate of the deposits required in respect of each of the several parts contracted for.

(2) By giving a bond in a penalty equal to the amount of the deposit as above required. At the option of the contractor, cash or approved securities may be deposited instead of giving a bond.

If securities are deposited for any purpose under this contract they must be of the character of securities in which savings banks may invest their funds and must be approved by the Board. Bonds must be in one of the forms annexed to the form of contract.

In addition, and as further security to the City, 10 per cent. of each amount certified from time to time to be due to the contractor will be retained until the railroad is completed.

Each bidder must state in his proposals the names and places of business of the proposed sureties on the bond proposed to be given, and describe any securities proposed to be deposited.

If the Board shall give notice to any bidder that his or its proposal is accepted and the contract is approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and if the bidder shall fail within ten days thereafter or within such further period, if any, as may be prescribed by the Board, to execute and deliver the contract and make the deposit in cash or securities, and to execute and deliver the bond with sureties, then this invitation to contractors and proposal accepted as aforesaid shall be a contract binding the bidder to pay to the City the damages by it sustained by reason of such failure, and in such case the bidder hereby absolutely assigns to the City the ownership of the check accompanying his or its proposal as a payment on account of such damages.

Such check must not be inclosed in the sealed envelope containing the proposal, but must be separately delivered to the Board or to its Secretary, who will give a proper voucher for the deposit.
