Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock A. M., on Wednesday, September 17, 1913.

Present—Ardolph L. Kline, Mayor; William A. Prendergast, Comptroller; Robert R. Moore, Chamberlain, and Henry H. Curran, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The Mayor, Hon. Ardolph L. Kline, presided.

The Chair announced an adjournment of the hearing in the matter of the modified plan for the improvement of the water-front between Wall street and Maiden lane, on the East River, Borough of Manhattan, made and adopted by the Commissioner of Docks in accordance with law June 24, 1913, and transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval, to be continued at 11 o'clock in the forenoon on Wednesday, September 24, 1913.

The Comptroller offered the following:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York direct that there shall be placed upon the record their high appreciation of the long and valuable public services of their late presiding officer,

their admiration of his great abilities, his unfailing courage and devotion to public duty; their sense of personal loss in the absence of his association and assistance; and that they convey to the members of his family deepest sympathy in their great bereavement.

And for such other and further relief as may be just and proper, reserving to The City of New York the right to oppose each and any award, recommendation and computation included in said report.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 320 of the Greater New York Charter.
