### Resolution Naming Sea Side Avenue, Rockaway Beach, Borough of Queens.

Resolved, That the name of Beach 103d Street, from the Long Island Railroad south to the Atlantic Ocean, Rockaway Beach, in the Borough of Queens, be and the same is hereby changed to and shall hereafter be known and designated as Sea Side Avenue, and the President of the Borough be and he is hereby authorized and requested to number or renumber the buildings on said thoroughfare in such manner and to such extent as may be necessary and to note the changes on the maps and records of The City of New York.

### An Ordinance to Amend Section 13 of Article 2 of Chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Restricted Streets.

Be it Ordained, By the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. Subdivision 2 of section 13 of article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to restricted streets, as amended, is hereby further amended, in part, at the appropriate place under the caption "Manhattan, on," the following words and figures:

Broadway, between Bowling Green and 134th street;

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

### An Ordinance to Amend Section 97 of Article 9 of Chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Streets.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Section 97 of article 9 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to streets, is hereby amended to read as follows:

§97. Fees; borough of Richmond.

1. Restoration of pavement. Fees for the restoration of pavement shall be paid by the person responsible for a street excavation in the Borough of Richmond, as follows:

a. For areas less than 10 square yards:	
Restoring granite or other blocks with portland cement joints on concrete foundation, per square yard	\$9 30
Restoring granite or other blocks with sand or tar joints, brick sheet asphalt and bituminous concrete; on concrete foundation and bituminous macadam pavement, per square yard	4 90
Restoring concrete pavement, per square yard	3 50
Restoring macadam bounded with tarvia, per square yard	2 80
Restoring macadam surfaced with tarvia and grits, and improved granite block on sand grouted, per square yard, and new curb on concrete, per linear foot	1 75
Restoring granite or other blocks of sand with sand joints per square yard	1 40
Restoring plain macadam, per square yard	1 10
Restoring old curb on concrete, per linear foot, and old bridging per square foot	70
Restoring new flagstone, per square foot	40
Restoring cement sidewalk per square foot, and old curb on sand per linear foot	35
Restoring unpaved streets, per square yard	20
Restoring old flagstone, per square foot	15

2. Areas in excess of 10 square yards. The fees for such excavations in the borough of Richmond shall be such as may be determined by the President of the borough or his representative. The area of surface to be repaved shall in all cases be com-

puted by the president of the borough or his representative, from the diagram in the application as verified or corrected by comparison with the maps and records on file.

3. Inspection of back filling. The fee for the inspection of the back filling of any trench in a street in the borough of Richmond shall be as follows:

For trenches not more than 4 feet in depth, nor more than 30 feet in length	\$3 00
For trenches over 4 feet and under 9 feet in depth and not more than 30 feet in length	4 50
For trenches over 9 feet and under 15 feet in depth and not more than 30 feet in length	6 00

For trenches of greater dimensions than the foregoing, special charge, as may be determined by the president of the borough, or his representative.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

### Resolution Authorizing the Commissioner of Street Cleaning to Purchase Horse Blankets Without Public Letting.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning be and he is hereby authorized and empowered to purchase 1,000 horse blankets weighing ten pounds each, 90 inches by 96 inches, lined with canvas and leathered and strapped, at the rate of eleven dollars and ninety-five cents (\$11.95) each, or a total expenditure of eleven thousand nine hundred and fifty dollars (\$11,950) in the open market without public letting.

### Resolution Authorizing the Commissioner of Street Cleaning to Purchase Wheels for Bottom Dumping Wagons and Parts for Squeegee Machines Without Public Letting.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning be and he is hereby authorized to purchase, in the open market without public letting, 40 front wheels and 40 rear wheels for Watson bottom dumping wagons at a total expenditure of \$1,622, made up as follows:

40 front wheels at \$17.55 each, 20 rear wheels at \$21 each, 20 rear wheels at \$25 each.

—and also repair parts for Kindling squeegee machines amounting to \$1,615.14 and parts for Hvass squeegee machines amounting to \$721.70.

### An Ordinance to Amend Section 15 of Article 2 of Chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to "Traffic Regulations," and Particularly to "Right of Way."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. Subdivision 2 of section 15 of article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "traffic regulations," is hereby amended to read as follows: § 150. Right of way.

2. Vehicles having precedence. The officers and men of the fire department and of the fire patrol, with their apparatus of all kinds, when going to, or on duty at, or returning from a fire; all ambulances, whether of public or private character, and all other vehicles when employed in carrying sick or injured persons to hospitals or other places for relief or treatment; vehicles of the police department; vehicles of the several bureaus of buildings; emergency vehicles of the department of water supply, gas and electricity and of public service corporations, and vehicles of all physicians who have a police permit shall have the right of way in any street and through any procession, except over vehicles carrying the United States mail. The police department is hereby empowered to issue a permit for such right of way to any duly registered physician, making application therefor, which permit shall not be transferable.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

### An Ordinance Selecting a Site to Be Acquired for Use as a Disposal Plant in the Bureau of Sewers, Under the Jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Queens.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby selects a site for use as a disposal plant in the Bureau of Sewers, under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Queens, the following lands described in metes and bounds as follows:

All that piece or parcel of land situated, lying and being in the Fourth Ward of the Borough of Queens, adjacent to the Jamaica Disposal Plant, bounded and described with reference to the street system as established by section 189 of the Final Maps of the Borough of Queens, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 9, 1916, and filed with the Clerk of Queens County on October 27, 1916, as follows:

Beginning at the point formed by the intersection of the centre line of Atfield Avenue, as laid out south of Stanley Avenue, with the southerly line of Stanley Avenue; running thence easterly along the southerly line of Stanley Avenue to its intersection with the prolongation of the easterly line of Atfield Avenue, as laid out north of Stanley Avenue; thence northerly along the easterly line of said Atfield Avenue 150.16 feet to the southerly line bounding the property of the Jamaica Disposal Plant; thence easterly along said southerly bounding line to the easterly line bounding the property of the Jamaica Disposal Plant; thence northerly along said easterly bounding line 211.6 feet to the northerly line bounding the property of the Jamaica Disposal Plant; thence easterly along the prolongation of said northerly bounding line to the centre line of Baker Avenue; thence southerly along the centre line of Baker Avenue to a point distant 250 feet south of the southerly line of Stanley Avenue; thence westerly and parallel to Stanley Avenue to the centre line of Atfield Avenue, as laid out south of Stanley Avenue; thence northerly along the centre line of said Atfield Avenue to the point or place of beginning.

Sec. 2. The Corporation Counsel is hereby authorized and directed to institute condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of said lands and premises.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall not preclude the acquisition of the above described lands and premises, or any part thereof, by purchase from the owner or the respective owners thereof, at a price to be fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Sec. 4. The Clerk of the Board is hereby directed to prepare two similar surveys, maps or plans of said lands and premises and file the same, one in the office of this



Board and the other in the office of the Clerk of the County of Queens, in accordance with the provisions of section 1432 of the Greater New York Charter.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

**An Ordinance to Amend Article 1 of Chapter 13 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Hospitals.***Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:*

Sec. 1. Section 5 of article 1 of chapter 13 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

§5. Members of the fire and police departments and the department of street cleaning.

A member of the uniformed forces of the fire or police departments who shall be injured while actually employed in the discharge of police or fire duty, as the case may be, or while under orders of his superior officers in the police station or fire house, as the case may be, or who as the result of illness traceable directly to the performance of police or fire duty, as the case may be, or a member of the uniformed force of the department of street cleaning who shall be injured while actually employed in the discharge of duty, when certified to by the head of the department, shall be received by any hospital for care and treatment at the usual ward patient rates. The bill for such care and treatment at such rates, when certified by the superintendent or other person in charge of such hospital and approved by the police commissioner, fire commissioner or the commissioner of street cleaning, as the case may be, shall be paid subject to audit by the comptroller.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

**Dock Department—Lease to the John W. Sullivan Co. of the Southerly Half of the Pier at the Foot of E. 9th St., East River.**

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, dated April 16, 1918, requesting approval of a lease to the John W. Sullivan Company of the southerly half of the pier at the foot of E. 9th st., Manhattan, commencing at the inshore end of the pier and extending offshore a distance of 200 feet, for a term of five years from May 1, 1918, with the privilege of renewal for a further term of five years, at a rental for the first term of \$3,300 per annum and for the renewal term 5 per cent. advance; the remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now used by the Department of Docks and Ferries.

Which was referred to the Committee on Docks and Leases of Water-front Property.

**Dock Department—Lease to the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company of Pier at the Foot of E. 112th St., Manhattan.**

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks: Pier A, North River, April 20, 1918.

Hon. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sir—I beg to recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt



a resolution approving of and consenting to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of the following described lease:

Lessee: The New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of Connecticut, having its principal office at New Haven, Connecticut.

Description of Property: The north and south sides and outer end of the pier foot of East 112th Street (subject to the provisions of chapter 837 of the Greater New York Charter). The lessee shall have no use of the surface of the pier and there is expressly reserved to the City all rights of ingress and egress to and from the recreation structure on said pier.

Terms: Five years from the 10th of May, 1918, with privilege of renewal for a further term of five years.

Rental: For the first term \$6,000 per annum and for the renewal term five per cent. advance.

Remaining Terms and Conditions: The remaining terms and conditions of the lease shall be similar to those contained in wharf property now used by this Department.

The pier at the foot of East 112th Street is a recreation pier, inaccessible from the street, as it is located in front of the Thomas Jefferson Park. The present lessee is Henry L. Joyce, who pays a rental of \$3,300 per annum, under a lease which expires May 10, 1918. The north side of the pier is sublet, with the consent of this Department, for \$5,000 per annum, and wharfage is collected from the south side, but not to any considerable amount, owing to the peculiar character and location of the pier.

I do not know of any other person, firm or corporation who could make any use of this pier except the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, who would use it merely for the purpose of tying up its railroad floats en route to and from its Harlem River Terminal. Very truly yours,

The rental for the first term to be six thousand dollars (\$6,000) per annum, and for the renewal term five per cent. advance on the rental for the preceding term. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now in use by the Department of Docks and Ferries.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

**Dock Department—Lease to the Pawtucket and New York Transportation Company of the Outer 200 Feet of the Pier at the Foot of E. 5th St., Manhattan.**

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks dated April 20, 1918, requesting approval of a lease to the Pawtucket and New York Transportation Company, of the outer 200 feet of the pier at the foot of E. 5th st., Manhattan, for a term of five years from May 1, 1918, with the privilege of renewal for a further term of five years, at a rental for the first term of \$8,400 per annum, and for the renewal term, five per cent. advance. The lessee to have the privilege of erecting and maintaining upon the leased premises, shed for the protection of freight in transit, which shed shall be erected in accordance with plans to be submitted and approved by the Chief Engineer of the Dock Department, and shall revert to and become the property of The City of New York at the expiration or sooner termination of the lease. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now used by the Dock Department.

**Dock Department—Amendment of Lease to the United States Government of Certain Wharf Property Between W. 44th and W. 57th Sts., Manhattan.**

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks dated April 18, 1918, requesting authority to amend the lease to the United States Government of the wharf property between W. 44th and W. 57th st., Manhattan, authorized by resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on December 27, 1917, in the following particulars, to wit:

Parcel K—Pier No. 86, at or near the foot of 46th st., the United States Government, to pay no rent for the months of January and February, 1918, but to pay three-quarters of the rent for March, and full rent after April 1, 1918.

**Dock Department—Request of, for an Issue of \$11,000 of Corporate Stock to Rebuild Bulkhead South of E. 115th St., Harlem River.**

A Communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, dated March 15, 1918, requesting the adoption of a resolution recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue corporate stock in the sum of \$11,000, to pay costs of material and labor necessary to rebuild the bulkhead south of E. 115th st., Harlem River, Borough of Manhattan.

Which was referred to the Committee on Dock Leases and Water-front Property.

**Dock Department—In the Matter of the Ferry Lease to the Brooklyn and Manhattan Ferry Company from 23d St., Manhattan, to Broadway, Brooklyn.**

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, dated April 23, 1918, transmitting for consideration copy of communication from the Brooklyn and Manhattan Ferry Company, dated April 22, 1918, calling attention to conditions affecting the operation of the ferry from 23rd st., Manhattan, to Broadway, Brooklyn, and suggesting that the City join with the Company in the discontinuance of this ferry at the close of business May 31, 1918.

**Dock Department—In the Matter of Fire Insurance on Ferryboats and Other Floating Property.**

The Comptroller brought up for consideration the following communication from the Commissioner of Docks, laid over at the last meeting, requesting the adoption of a resolution approving of the policy of authorizing the Dock Department to secure and carry for the benefit of The City of New York, fire, accident and collision insurance, including also loss or damage to hull or machinery through

negligence, bursting of boilers, breakage of shafts or any latent defects in the machinery or hull, or from any other causes.

April 1, 1918.

Hon. JOHN F. HYLAX, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sir—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held July 8, 1907, a resolution was adopted authorizing the Commissioner of Docks to secure and carry for the benefit of The City of New York, fire, accident and collision insurance on the ferryboats which are now or may hereafter be operated by the City.

Insurance was accordingly secured and carried on the ferryboats operating on the municipal ferries between the foot of Whitehall Street, Manhattan, and the 39th Street, Brooklyn, and St. George, Staten Island, until July 16, 1914, when it was discontinued by the previous City Administration.

In my opinion, it is absolutely necessary that the ferryboats should be insured. They are, owing to the nature of their construction and operation, subject to unforeseen damage which must be repaired immediately if the successful operation of the ferries is to be continued.

The preparation of contracts, the approval of forms by the Corporation Counsel, advertising, awarding, attaching certificates and approval of sureties by the Comptroller, consumes about two months, even if these preliminaries are pushed vigorously, and in the meantime the damaged boats are lying idle, which means a serious derangement of the ferry service.

The dry docks in this port are now working to their full capacity, night and day, and extraordinary wages are paid to workers. Besides the natural increase in the number of commercial craft in this harbor, there is an ever increasing number of United States Army and Navy vessels requiring repairs and overhauling, which will make the dry dock repair situation daily more acute. I am informed that in the near future it will be impossible to secure bids on a contract calling for a lump sum for repairs to vessels, including ferryboats, so that no damage can be made good by contract after advertised bids except on a cost and percentage basis, which means that all such work must be done practically without public letting. In my opinion, the best way to overcome these difficulties is to insure the ferryboats. In the past when insurance was carried, the companies upon notice of damage immediately ordered the boats to a dry dock and the work was expeditiously completed.

A tentative proposition for fire, marine and collision insurance on the ferryboats belonging to the City has been received as follows:

It will be noted that the quotations above involve a lower rate under Proposition "B," which is based upon insuring each of the boats for a larger amount than they have heretofore been insured for. Owing to the increased cost of labor and material the boats cannot be replaced or rebuilt in case of total loss for the amounts set forth in Proposition "A."

It will also be noted that Proposition "B" provides for \$825,000 more insurance than is provided for in Proposition "A" for a premium only \$4,500 in excess of that quoted in Proposition "A." \$100,000 additional insurance is provided for the six large boats and \$75,000 additional insurance is provided for the three small boats. These amounts of insurance can be collected in case of total loss by fire or marine disaster.

Boat insurance rates are governed largely by the amount of insurance carried in proportion to the reproducible value, hence the lower rates for the larger amounts of insurance.

The City has heretofore insured these boats at rates varying from \$1.53 to \$2.11. In view of the fact that the losses sustained by the City heretofore have consisted entirely of damage to the boat by collision, etc., and that if these boats were to be damaged during the ensuing year to the same extent physically, it would cost the insurance companies twice as much to make the repairs at the present time as it cost them while the former insurance existed, it is apparent that the rates quoted above are much lower than the City has heretofore paid.

The policies which it is proposed to furnish will cover all the hazards included in the former policy with additional features of coverage, as follows:

"Loss or damage to hull or machinery through negligence, bursting of boilers, breakage of shafts or any latent defect in the machinery or hull or from other causes."

The policies formerly used restricted coverage of this nature unless caused by stranding.

In brief, the advantages which will be gained by insuring the ferryboats are as follows:

- (1) The City will not be liable for damages resulting from collision or accident.
- (2) It enables this Department to make immediate repairs to damages in excess of \$1,000 and avoids the delays under the present system caused by the preparation and advertising for contracts, and in addition the obtaining of appropriations by the action of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.
- (3) It affords the public the quickest relief in the matter of bringing transportation service back to normal.
- (4) The adjustment of claims against the Municipal ferryboats are more readily made and greatly facilitated through the medium of the insurance adjusters.

For your information I submit herewith a statement of the most recent collisions and accidents to the ferryboats:

The amount of damage liable to occur in any one year is problematical, but it is reasonable to assume that the cost of insurance will be in excess of the claims paid, but there is always the risk of a disaster or complete loss.

The inconvenience and delay caused by public letting is exemplified in the case of the ferryboat "Manhattan," which was out of use from November 25, 1917, to March 6, 1918, due to loss of propeller wheel and consequent damage to the tail shaft. In this case, after all the preliminaries had been gone through, extending over a period of some months, the contract was advertised and no bids were received, which made it necessary to obtain permission from the Board of Aldermen to award this work without public letting. Meanwhile, the loss of the services of the boat made it impossible to maintain the schedule.

The loss of the services of the ferryboat "Manhattan" made it necessary to place the ferryboat "Mayor Gaynor" on the Staten Island Division. As this boat is comparatively small—built for the 39th Street Service—it has not the speed of the larger boats, and the result was the disruption of the running schedule.

In view of the above I beg to recommend that a resolution be adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approving of the policy of authorizing this De-



partment to secure and carry, for the benefit of the City of New York, fire, accident and collision insurance, including also loss or damage to hull or machinery through negligence, bursting of boilers, breakage of shafts or any latent defects in the machinery or hull or from other causes.

In case this resolution is adopted I will take up the matter of obtaining the necessary appropriation for the payment of the premiums. Yours respectfully,

The City of New York, Department of Finance, Comptroller's Office, April 22, 1918.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—The matter of insurance of the ferryboats and other floating equipment and property of the Department of Docks and Ferries was the subject of consideration in making up the budget for 1915, at which time the Dock Commissioner asked to have included in the 1915 budget a sufficient sum to pay the premiums on such insurance.

At that time a report was made, a copy of which, marked Exhibit "A," is annexed hereto and made a part hereof. Upon the consideration of such report the Committee on Tax Budget of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, with the acquiescence of the then Dock Commissioner, declined the request, and no appropriation for this purpose was made in the 1915 budget. Since that time no request has been made for any such appropriation. Respectfully submitted,

Mr. CHARLES S. HERVEY, Deputy Comptroller, Committee on Tax Budget, The City of New York:

Dear Sir—Pursuant to the direction of the Committee on Tax Budget, I have caused an examination to be made for the purpose of enabling the Committee to determine whether or not it is advisable to recommend the discontinuance of the present policy of the Department of Docks and Ferries with regard to its marine insurance risks. As a result of the examination thus made, I beg to submit the following statement.

On April 16, 1902, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted a resolution stating that in their judgment the general policy of the City in carrying its own fire and marine risks "shall hereafter be made a uniform policy."

The City having acquired a floating plant of 10 ferryboats at a cost of \$2,000,000, the Commissioner of Docks, at a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held on April 26, 1906, presented a request asking an opinion as to the advisability of having this additional risk covered by fire and marine policies. This was given favorable consideration by the adoption of the following resolution:

"Resolved, That it is the judgment of this board that the Commissioner of Docks should carry marine, fire, accident and collision insurance on the ferryboats and other floating property belonging to The City of New York."

The following table summarizes the financial result of the adoption of the foregoing resolution; the details being shown in a statement appended to this report.

It is interesting to note in this connection, that the policies covering the present line of insurance are for the year ending August 15, 1915, and as the premiums were paid in full on August 31 last, a pro rata amount of approximately \$23,500 for 7½ months of 1915, has been paid from funds appropriated for 1914.

The officials of three railroads and one large industrial corporation were communicated with as to their marine insurance policy in connection with their floating equipment, with the following result:

Erie Railroad Company—

This company carries insurance on its fleet of ferry boats, tugs, lighters and barges to approximately one-third of their cost. It operates 8 ferry boats, upon which damage claims have been collected as follows:

The Commissioner of Docks was again heard in regard to the matter.

Which was referred to the Committee on Dock Leases and Water Front Property.

Dock Department—In the Matter of the Request of, for Authorization to Pay the Premium on Fire Insurance on Wharf Property Between W. 44th and W. 58th Sts., North River.

The Comptroller brought up for consideration the matter of the request of the Commissioner of Docks, laid over at the last meeting.

Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad—

This company provides for its own marine insurance on a fleet of 135 tugs, lighters, barges, car floats and ferry boats, etc., by a yearly operating charge of \$30,000, which is credited to a Marine Insurance Reserve. For the 5½ years ending June 30, 1914, there had been credited to this reserve \$165,000 00  
Damages charged against this reserve during the same period, were..... 71,747 00

Leaving a balance in reserve of ..... \$93,253 00

United States Steel Corporation—

This company operates a large fleet of tugs, lighters, barges, lake freighters, etc. In answer to our inquiry, it was stated that they do not cover their marine insurance risks by policies placed with insurance companies, but carry the risks themselves. No notice was taken of the request to furnish us with detailed statistics. It is safe to assume, however, that their method is along the same lines as that of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad.

Pennsylvania Railroad Company—

To the inquiry addressed to this company no reply was received.

Conclusions and Recommendations.

In view of the 8 years experience of the Department of Docks and Ferries, under its present policy, supported by that of the corporations interviewed, it would appear the better policy for the City to carry its own marine insurance, at a saving of approximately \$24,000 per annum. There are, however, three objections to this plan which will have to be considered.

No. 1—Damages due to accidents may be disproportionate as between years.

No. 2—The department's lack of proper equipment for the repair of heavy damages (dry-dock).

No. 3—The serious embarrassment to the service resulting from the delay incident to the preparation of specifications and contracts; the approval of forms by the Corporation Counsel, advertising and awarding contracts; attaching certificates and the approval of securities, etc., by the Comptroller in connection with contracts involving an expenditure in excess of \$1,000 (Charter, section 419).

In addition to the objections stated under No. 3: The Department of Docks and Ferries has expended the following amounts during the past five years for the charter of ferry boats:

A considerable proportion of the above expense has been due to the lack of sufficient reserve boats (2 at present) to meet the service requirements while the regular boats were laid up for repairs due to ordinary maintenance and to damage on account of accidents.

The experience of the Department for the past eight years has shown that the average time for repair and damages has been ten days, while the procedure involved in letting contracts has averaged 60 days.

In view of the foregoing it would appear that unless the Board of Aldermen grants its permission to the department, under section 419 of the Charter, to provide for the repair of its ferry boats and other floating property upon non-contract orders, the difference in the time required for the repair of damages under the present policy of the department (10 days) and that involved in letting contracts (60 days), would ultimately necessitate the purchase of one or more ferry boats at a cost of \$250,000 to \$300,000 each, or increased appropriations to meet the additional expense of chartered boats, if the efficiency of the service is to be maintained for the present and future traffic.

The adoption of the policy of the Erie Railroad Company—that of insuring its floating equipment to the extent of 1-3 its cost, would overcome these objections. This policy would provide for an annual fixed charge of, approximately ..... \$13,000 00  
And would result in a yearly saving of about..... 25,000 00

\$38,000 00

The form of insurance policy provides for repairs of damages by the insurance company, hence no additional equipment would be required by the department.

The experience of the Erie Railroad has also shown that the possibility of damages to the extent of 1-3 the cost of its equipment is remote and as to total loss very improbable; any one accident never having exceeded \$50,000 to repair. Furthermore, the adoption of this policy would also cover fire as well as marine risks.

Hon. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor, and Chairman, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sir—At a meeting of the Board of Aldermen held December 18, 1917, a resolution was adopted authorizing the Commissioner of Docks to enter into a contract, without public letting, for the insurance at the minimum rates fixed by the Board of Fire Underwriters and Insurance Exchange of certain property located on the North River, between West 44th and West 58th Streets, to be leased to the United States Government.

Pursuant to this authority a contract was made by my predecessor with John



M. Riehle & Company, Inc., 68 William Street, for the insurance for one year from January 1st, as follows:

Insurance will also be placed to the extent of \$1,000,000 on the pier at West 46th Street and the shed thereon as soon as the work is accepted from the contractor. The premium on this parcel will amount to \$14,850.

This will make a total insurance on the four piers of \$2,225,000, for which the premium for one year is \$31,387.76.

This insurance can be placed for three years for \$78,469.40, while the cost of obtaining new policies annually will amount to \$94,163.28, making a saving of \$15,396.88 by insuring for a period of three years, which, of course, will carry with it the right of cancellation and rebate in case the insurance is cancelled before the expiration of the three years. Or if the Government should vacate the premises before the expiration of three years there will probably be no difficulty in arranging with the new lessee for taking over the insurance and reimbursing the City for a proportionate amount of the premium.

At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund December 27, 1917, the Commissioner of Docks was authorized to execute a lease for these four piers and adjoining bulkheads, together with the sheds thereon, at an increase in rental to cover the premiums to be paid by the City for insurance.

While this insurance was contracted for and the leases made to the Government during the year 1917, there was no appropriation obtained for the payment of the premium.

The time for payment of these premiums expires on April 20th, 1918, and I have requested an extension of time for payment. I therefore beg to request that a resolution be adopted at as early a date as practicable by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, authorizing the payment of this premium of insurance to the amount of \$78,469.40, out of the revenues for the redemption of the City debt, as the moneys received for rental of the piers, including the excess amount on account of insurance are deposited to the credit of that fund. #### Street Cleaning Department—Renewal of Lease for, of Premises at 3906 Fourth Ave., Brooklyn.

Mr. Henry L. Steinert, Law Clerk in the Department of Street Cleaning, appeared before the Board and explained the reason why there was no provision made in the budget for the rent of these premises after May 1, 1918.

The Comptroller then presented the following report:

March 25, 1918.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sirs—The Commissioner of Street Cleaning, in a communication dated January 31, 1918, requests a renewal of the lease of premises occupied as a section station at 3906 Fourth Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, for a period of three years from May 1, 1918, at the same rental and upon the same terms and conditions as now occupied.

Provision for a renewal of this lease was made in the 1918 budget to May 1, 1918, anticipating that the premises would be no longer required after that date. However, it has since been found inadvisable to give up these premises on that date, and therefore request for renewal is made by the Commissioner.

These premises have been occupied for this purpose under leases made as follows:

Apr. 1, 1899, to May 1, 1900, \$350 a year, May 17, 1899.  
May 1, 1900, to May 1, 1903, \$350 a year, July 24, 1900.  
May 1, 1903, to May 1, 1906, \$350 a year, Mar. 4, 1903.  
May 1, 1906, to May 1, 1909, \$350 a year, Feb. 7, 1906.  
May 1, 1909, to May 1, 1912, \$350 a year, Mar. 1, 1909.  
May 1, 1912, to May 1, 1915, \$350 a year, Mar. 13, 1912.  
May 1, 1915, to May 1, 1918, \$350 a year, Mar. 3, 1915.

There is no City owned property in the vicinity that is available for this purpose. The nearest City owned property is on the west side of 4th Avenue, between 40th and 41st Street, but occupied as Public School 136. There is no property in the vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use or that could be made available for the purposes of this lease.

The rent for the renewed lease, compared with other rents in the vicinity, is as follows: The premises occupied by the City consist of a store with a floor area of 640 square feet, and at a rental of \$350 a year is at the rate of 54.7 cents per square foot. Two stores at 3910 Fourth Avenue, each containing 288 square feet, rent for \$264 a year each, or at the rate of 91 cents a square foot.

There is no other privately owned property that could be rented or used in lieu of the above premises to the advantage of the City. Under the circumstances, the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, of a renewal of the lease to the City of the store premises, with cellar, at No. 3906 Fourth Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning, for a period of three years from May 1, 1918, at an annual rental of three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350), payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates and make all inside and outside repairs; the lessee to furnish heat, light and janitor service; lessor, J. S. McGarry; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

#### Street Cleaning Department—Renewal of Lease for, of Premises at No. 162 Fourth Avenue, Brooklyn.

Mr. Henry L. Steinert, Law Clerk in the Department of Street Cleaning, appeared before the Board and explained the reason why there was no provision made in the budget for the payment of rent of these premises after May 1, 1918.

The Comptroller then presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

March 18, 1918.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sirs—The Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, in a communication dated February 13, 1918, requests the renewal of the lease of premises occupied as a Section Station at 162 Fourth Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, for a

period of three years from May 1, 1918, at the same rental and upon the same terms and conditions as now occupied.

Provision for the renewal of this lease was made in the 1918 budget, with the expectation that it would not be required after that date. It has been since found necessary to continue this station.

These premises have been occupied for this purpose under leases made as follows:

May 1, 1889, to May 1, 1900, \$360, May 17, 1899.  
May 1, 1900, to May 1, 1903, \$360, Feb. 23, 1900.  
May 1, 1903, to May 1, 1906, \$360, Mar. 4, 1903.  
May 1, 1906, to May 1, 1909, \$360, Feb. 7, 1906.  
May 1, 1909, to May 1, 1912, \$360, Mar. 1, 1909.  
May 1, 1912, to May 1, 1915, \$360, Mar. 27, 1912.

There is no City-owned property in the vicinity that is available for this purpose. The nearest City-owned property is on the north side of Butler Street, 98.4 feet east of Fourth Avenue, not available, being occupied for P. S. No. 133.

There is no property in the vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use or that could be made available for the purposes of this lease.

The rent for the renewed lease, compared with other rents in the vicinity, is as follows: The premises leased by the City consists of a store 18 feet by 56 feet, comprising a floor area of 1,008 square feet, which, at the rental of \$360 a year, is at the rate of 35.7-10 cents per square foot. The rent demanded for a vacant store with an area of 300 square feet at 167 Fourth Avenue, is \$240 a year, or at the rate of 80 cents per square foot.

There is no privately owned property that could be rented or used in lieu of the above premises to the advantage of the City.

Under the circumstances the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

The matter is submitted for consideration.

Flanagan as general guardian of the infants Marie Morris, Joseph Morris and James Morris; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

#### Street Cleaning Department—Renewal of Lease for, of Premises at 403 Butler St., Brooklyn.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

April 30, 1918.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sirs—When the question of the renewal of the lease of premises at No. 403 Butler Street, Brooklyn, for the purposes of the Department of Street Cleaning, was brought forward for action in January I declined to sign the report then prepared, or recommend a renewal of the lease upon the existing basis. The chief reason for this is the discrepancy between the assessed valuation and what appears to be the actual value of the property. The actual value seems to be at least 50 per cent. in excess of the assessed valuation. The rental, \$6,000 a year, makes a return of approximately 13 per cent. on the assessed valuation. The matter remained in abeyance until April 25th, at which time the matter was taken up for definite conclusion between myself and the owner of the property.

The owner claims to have made considerable expenditures in the fixing of the new skylights and the painting of the outside of the premises, and he claims that after paying the cost of the improvement and the taxes the return on the investment is reasonable. The owner informs me that he has had nothing to do with the assessed valuation of the property, either directly or indirectly, and has never made an application for a reduction in the assessment. This is a matter that is wholly in the hands of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, and any action that may be taken by it toward a readjustment of the assessment would be challenged by the owner only in case any unreasonable assessment is made, in which event he would of course desire to protect himself against any excessive valuation.

Provision for the renewal of this lease was made in the 1918 Budget.

These premises have been occupied for this purpose under leases made as follows:

Ten years from date occupied at \$5,000 a year, July 20, 1904.  
Jan. 20, 1915, to July 20, 1918, at \$6,000 a year, Dec. 2, 1914.

There is no City-owned property in the vicinity that is available for this purpose. The nearest City-owned property is on the north side of Butler Street, 98 feet 4 inches east of Fourth Avenue, occupied as Public School 133.

There is no property in the vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use or that could be made available for the purposes of this lease.

There is no other property in the vicinity of this class and size with which comparison may be made.

There is no other privately owned property that could be rented or used in lieu of the above premises to the advantage of the City.

Under the circumstances, I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal of said lease upon the same terms and conditions as the present lease, to wit:

Of the premises No. 403 Butler Street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning, for a period of three years from January 20, 1918, at an annual rental of \$6,000, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and assessments and make all repairs to the roof and such other outside repairs as may be deemed necessary by the City; the lessee to pay water rates and make such inside alterations and repairs as it may deem necessary. Lessor, John M. Gray, 244 Wyckoff Street, Brooklyn. Respectfully,

Lessor, John M. Gray.

—the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interest of the City that such lease be made.

#### **Sheriff, Queens County—Request of, for Designation of a Building as the Common or County Jail.**

A communication was received from the Sheriff of Queens County, requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to designate any building or portion thereof in the County of Queens as the Common or County Jail of said county, sufficiently large and adequate for the purposes for which common jails may by law be used, as well as for the purposes of confining witnesses and criminal prisoners who by law are committed to the custody of the Sheriff of Queens County, as well as for civil prisoners.

Which was referred to the Committee on Available Space for Public Office for Public Officials in Public Buildings.

Resolutions Unanimously Adopted by the Board of Directors of the Maritime Association of the Port of New York at a Special Meeting held on Thursday, April 18, 1918.

Whereas, The Maritime Association of the Port of New York has a membership of over one thousand (1,000) directly representing the shipping interest of the Port of New York, and is necessarily vitally interested in all questions relating to waterfront matters, and in providing adequate pier facilities for these interests; and

Whereas, The United States Government has found it necessary to take over many important docks for essential war purposes; and

Whereas, Many of the important steamship lines which formerly occupied these piers must be accommodated elsewhere; and

Whereas, It is most desirable that the City of New York should co-operate with the United States Government in providing wharfage facilities for the transportation companies which are engaged in the handling of essential war cargoes and supplies for our troops, and also for the transportation of materials and supplies necessary to the sustenance of our European Allies, which are of paramount importance at the present time; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Maritime Association of the Port of New York, by action of the Board of Directors in special meeting assembled, respectfully requests the Mayor of the City of New York, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and the Commissioner of Docks, not to make any extended leases of pier property during the period of the war; and the aforesaid officials are further requested not to lease any pier property to undisclosed interests whose affiliations are not fully known, and to ascertain the purpose for which any pier property is to be utilized, so as to prevent any speculation in City pier property; and be it further

Resolved, That in view of the limited wharfage facilities in the Port of New York, and the fact that shipping has been compelled to load and unload in the stream on account of the lack of such facilities, the proper officials are respectfully requested to take action to ascertain what piers in the City of New York now under lease are not fully utilized, to the end that the Commissioner of Docks may co-operate with said lessees during the period of the war, in order that such wharfage facilities may be placed at the disposal of the Department of Docks, to be made available for shipping interests engaged in the loading of vessels carrying materials and supplies for essential war purposes; and be it further

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Docks be respectfully requested to inform the Maritime Association of the Port of New York of all pier leases terminating within the next year; and be it further

Resolved, That the Mayor of the City of New York, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and the Commissioner of Docks be strongly urged to provide more open wharfage facilities for the adequate need of transient shipping interests of this Port; and be it further

Resolved, That the facilities of the Maritime Association of the Port of New York, in so far as its bulletin board and official publication are concerned, the latter of which is mailed monthly to all its members, are hereby placed at the disposal of the Commissioner of Docks for the purpose of placing before the maritime interest of the Port of New York any information regarding wharfage facilities, such as available open piers, piers leased but not fully utilized and that may have space from time to time for transient shipping, piers on which the leases are terminating, etc., etc., it being our opinion that the fullest publicity should be given these matters for the information of the shipping interests of the Port of New York; and be it further

Resolved, That copies of these resolutions be transmitted to the proper City officials.

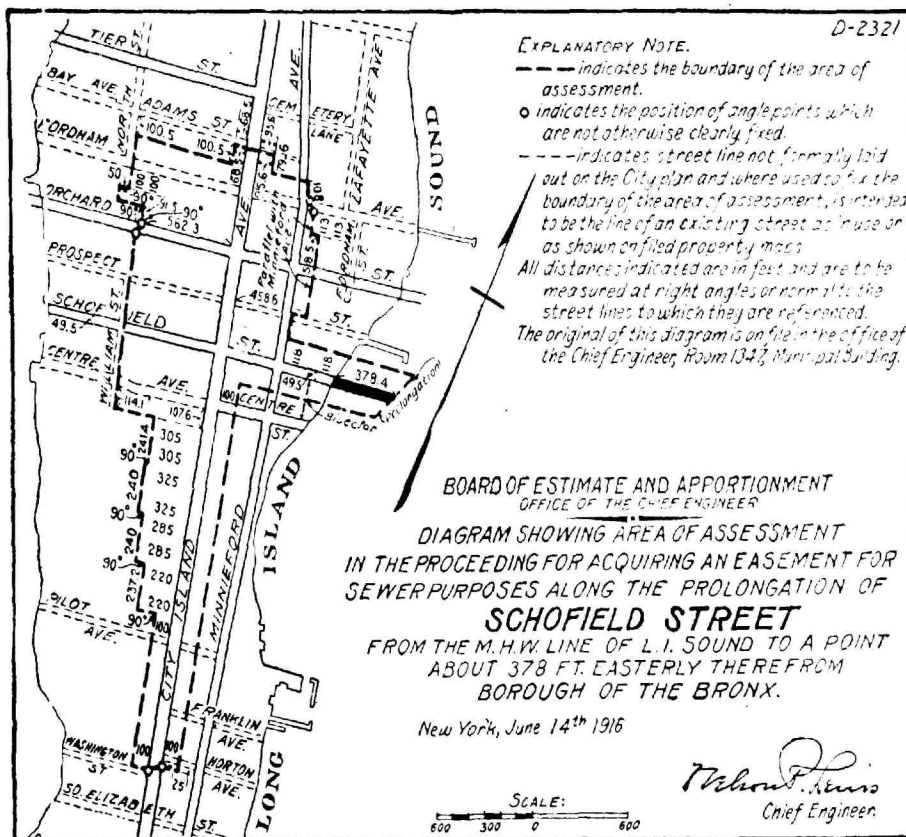

## NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

### TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from the demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that this has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture

of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the date of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials or labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. ### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS ON WORK TO BE DONE FOR, OR SUPPLIES TO BE FURNISHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or her name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done or the supplies are to be furnished. Plans and drawings of construction work may be seen there.
