The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and possible for the amount of water used or water.

Notice is therefore twen to all householders that, in liturther applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of water of water used of water house of water wasted.
