PROCLAMATION.

BY ALONZO B. CORNELL, GOVERNOR.

STATE OF NEW YORK, EXECUTIVE CHAMBER.

With gratitude to our Heavenly Father for his continued protection and the many manifestations of Divine favor bestowed upon the people of this State, THURSDAY, THE TWENTY-FOURTH DAY OF NOVEMBER, instant, is hereby designated and set apart as a day of Thanksgiving to him for the measure of prosperity which has attended us during the year now rapidly drawing to a close.

Although the parched earth has withheld a portion of its usually generous production, yet careful cultivation has been reasonably remunerated, and the garnered harvests will amply supply the necessities of those dependent upon them. Commercial and industrial pursuits have continued to enjoy exceptional prosperity; labor has been well employed and fairly compensated; a good condition of public health has prevailed; while idleness and want have never, perhaps, been less observed or known in our midst. Despite a great National calamity, by which the chosen ruler of the country has been removed through assassination, the public peace has been undisturbed, and the laws have been generally respected.

#### EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, November 7, 1881.

To all Inspectors of Election and Poll Clerks in the City and County of New York :

In view of the fact that there have heretofore been irregularities and delay on the part of Inspectors of Election and Poll Clerks in certain of the election districts of this city in the performance of the duties imposed upon them by the statute, and which they are sworn well and truly to perform, I deem it my duty to call your attention to certain sections of the law in order to preclude all possibility of misunderstanding on your part of your duties with regard to exactness and expedition in their performance. The election districts of this city each contain as nearly as practicable two hundred and fifty voters. This number is so small as to make possible an exact and speedy count. The polls close at four o'clock on the afternoon of election day. Ample time is thus given to every honest and intelligent Inspector and Poll Clerk to well and thoroughly perform his duties before midnight. The statute provides that as soon as the poll shall have been finally closed the Inspectors of Election public, and shall not be adjourned or postponed until it shall have been fully completed and the several statements required to be made by the Inspectors shall have been made out and signed by them. "Within twenty-four hours after the several statements shall have been subscribed, one of the said Inspectors shall deliver to the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen the statement directed to him: another Inspector shall deliver to the County Clerk the statement directed to him; and a third Inspector shall deliver to the Chief of the Bureau of Elections the statement directed to him. One of the Poll Clerks shall deliver to the Mayor the tallies directed to him, and the other Poll Clerk shall deliver to the Chief of the Bureau of Elections the tallies directed to him."

Any willful neglect of duty by either Inspectors or Poll Clerks in these as in other matters covered by the election laws, or any corrupt or fraudule it conduct or practice in the execution of the said laws is by statute declared to be a felony and is punishable by imprisonment in States prison for a term of not less than one nor more than five years. Heretofore election frauds have been practiced in this city by keeping back the returns in certain districts a sufficient length of time to determine what majorities were required in favor of one candidate or another and then to alter the returns accordingly. Any detention of, or delay in making returns is therefore suggestive of wrong-doing and open to suspicion. Two Inspectors of Election are now on their way to States prison for fraudulent practices in their offices as such Inspectors.

In view of the foregoing facts and of the duty imposed upon me by the Charter to be vigilant and active in causing the laws of the State to be executed and enforced, I desire to call your atten-

either Inspectors or Poll Clerks shall be brought to the attention of the District Attorney and prosecuted to the full extent of the law. In order that there may be as little delay as possible the Mayor's office will be open at 7 o'clock on the morning of November 9 for the receipt of the tallies of Poll Clerks, and the attention of the District Attorney will be called to all cases in which there has been failure on the part of the Poll Clerks to return the tallies to this office during the day succeeding the election. The provision which the statute makes for all offenses, either willful or of neglect, is stringent and sweeping. The penalties provided are heavy, and no Inspector or Poll Clerk should jeopardize his reputation or his liberty by failure to perform his duties with the utmost expedition and

#### BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

The minutes of the meeting held October 31, 1881, were read and approved.

The Comptroller offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Provisional Estimate made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 31, 1881, of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business in the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, for the calendar year eighteen hundred and eighty-two (1882), be submitted to the Board of Aldermen, with the reasons for it in detail, as required by section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873.

REASONS FOR THE PROVISIONAL ESTIMATE FOR THE YEAR 1882.

The Provisional Estimate for the year 1882, heremith submitted to the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, has been adopted and agreed on by the Board of Estimate and Apportion-

The amounts allowed are such as are prescribed or provided for by law, or such as conform to the artimental Estimates and to the estimates of necessary expenditures other than those included in partmental Estimates, except as to the amount of certain items, for which appropriations were asked for, that have been modified or disallowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in making such Provisional Estimate, in the manner and for the reasons stated in detail under the heads of appropriations respectively:

The Common Council.

The sum of \$64,250 is appropriated, being the amount required in the Estimate to pay the expenses of the Common Council in the year 1882, of which amount the sum of \$45,000 is provided by law for salaries of the Aldermen; the sum of \$18,000 is allowed for Clerks and Officers, and \$1,250 for contingencies, these latter sums being deemed sufficient for the purposes specified.

The sum of \$30,000 is appropriated for the Mayor's Office, being the amount of the Estimate for the expenses in the year 1882, and which amount is deemed sufficient.

The sum of \$200,500 is appropriated, being the amount of the Departmental Estimate for the year 1882; the amount for salaries, Chamberlain's Office, is reduced \$5,000, under chapter 551, Laws of 1880. The sum appropriated is deemed sufficient.

#### State Taxes.

#### Interest on the City Debt, Payable from Taxation.

The sum of \$8,191,988.45 is appropriated as required by law, including interest on the Debt of the territory annexed from Westchester County, and being \$48,977 less than the amount appropriated for the purpose in 1881.

#### Redemption of the Principal of the City Debt.

The sum of \$297,609.24 is appropriated, as required by law, including \$40,000 for the Debt of the Annexed Territory, and \$157,609.24, payable from taxation annually for the redemption of bonds and stocks issued after June 3, 1878, as provided by section 8 of chapter 383 of the Laws

#### Rents of Armories and Drill-rooms and other Premises.

The sum of \$69,040.38 is appropriated for rent of Armories and Drill-rooms, and \$40,000 for rent of other premises used for public purposes under leases by the city.

#### Judgments.

The sum of \$300,000 is appropriated, estimated to be required for that purpose in 1882.

#### The Law Department.

The sum of \$144,928 is appropriated for the salaries and other expenses of this Department, including the Bureau of the Corporation Attorney, the Public Administrator, and the Attorney for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes, which sum is deemed sufficient.

#### The Department of Public Works.

The sum of \$2,389,900 is appropriated for all purposes of this Department, which amount is deemed sufficient for the ensuing year.

#### The Department of Public Parks.

The sum of \$644,500 is appropriated for all purposes of this Department for the year 1882, which is deemed sufficient.

The amount is \$701,000 less than the Departmental Estimate, various items being reduced and disallowed.

#### The Department of Public Charities and Correction.

The sum appropriated is \$1,312,500, being \$7,500 less than the Departmental Estimate.

The amount required for 1882 is not so great as for the present year, for the reason that appropriations are not required for the construction of buildings, and the amount is \$174,916 less than in

The sum of \$2,500 was appropriated for expense of burial of honorably discharged soldiers and sailors or marines, under chapter 203, Laws of 1881.

#### The Health Department.

The sum of \$296,262 is appropriated, being \$13,390 less than the Departmental Estimate, on salaries and some other items therein in excess of the amounts required.

#### The Police Department.

The sum appropriated is \$3,360,680, being \$40,060 less than the appropriation for 1881, and \$212,430.50 less than the Departmental Estimate for 1882, being a reduction of \$88,200 for salaries of additional Sergeants, Patrolmen, and Doorman; \$4,464 for salaries clerical force; \$10,266.50 for supplies for Police; \$9,500 for alterations, fitting up, etc., station-houses, and \$100,000 for construction of two new station-houses in Twenty-eighth and Thirty-fourth Precincts.

These reductions are made mainly for the reason that the necessity for an increase of the Police force is not appeared, but they information being required and that it is not depended which the make

force is not apparent, further information being required, and that it is not deemed advisable to make so large an expenditure for new station-houses at this time.

#### The Department of Street Cleaning.

This Department was created by chapter 367, Laws of 1881.

An appropriation is made of \$1,000,000 for the cleaning of the streets, removing ashes and garbage, and snow and ice, and also for purchase of new plant.

This sum may be reduced in the Final Estimate, as it is proposed by the Commissioner to enter into the propriet of the laws.

into contracts to carry out the provisions of the law.

#### The Fire Department.

The sum of \$1,464,850 is appropriated, being \$34,000 less than the Departmental Estimate for 1882, for new houses, for engine and hook and ladder companies, which expenditure, it is believed, may be judiciously postponed until the following year.

#### The Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The sum of \$101,600 is appropriated, being \$1,000 more than the appropriation for 1881, and \$3,700 less than the Departmental Estimate for 1882, the amount allowed being deemed sufficient.

#### The Board of Education.

The sum of \$3,500,000 is appropriated for the public schools in 1882, this amount being deemed sufficient for conducting them and providing for all necessary expenditures during the ensuing year, including the purchase of sites for and the construction of school buildings.

In some sections of the city the school accommodations are said to be more than are required, while in others they are deficient, especially in regard to primary schools.

If the school buildings where they are not needed were sold and a better distribution of the public schools were made, this difficulty would be, to a great extent, obviated; while under an economical system of conducting them, it is believed they would be supported at much less expense, and with greater public benefit. with greater public benefit.

#### The College of the City of New York.

The sum of \$140,000 is appropriated, being the same in amount as for last year, which is deemed to be sufficient for this purpose in the ensuing year.

## Advertising, Printing, Stationery, and Blank Books.

The sum of \$171,200 is appropriated, being the amount of the Departmental Estimate and of the Appropriation for 1881.

#### Salaries-City Courts.

The sum of \$336,100 is appropriated, being \$13,085 less than the Departmental Estimate for 1882, and \$200 more than the appropriation for 1881.

The salaries of the city courts being fixed by law, limited discretionary power over the appropriations for this purpose is vested in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The sum of \$10,000 asked for by the Board of Police Justices for the salaries of five Stenographers is disallowed, their services not being considered necessary.

Were discretionary power vested in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the regulating of the number and salaries of Clerks and Attendants, the allowance for this purpose would be materially reduced.

## The Judiciary.

The sum of \$870,250.58 is appropriated under this head for salaries of Judges, Clerks, Officers, and all persons connected with the Judiciary and the County Officers, excepting the Police and Civil

The same discretionary power in regard to the number and salaries of the Clerks and Attendants of the Courts referred to above, would also enable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to materially reduce the allowance for that purpose.

The sum appropriated is \$50,977.76, being a reduction of \$1,500 on the Departmental Estimates for post-mortem examinations, and \$4,977.76 more than the appropriation for 1881, arising from additional allowances, as provided by chapter 465, Laws of 1881.

The sum of \$50,000.00 is appropriated, the amount of the estimate for 1882, and \$10,000.00 more than the appropriation for 1881, in consequence of increased expenses under the new Code.

#### Election Expenses.

The sum of \$160,150.00 is appropriated, this amount being deemed sufficient for this purpose.

The several amounts named are deemed sufficient for these objects.

#### Asylums, Reformatories, and Charitable Institutions.

The sum of \$1,004,966.86 is appropriated, being \$21,191.45 less than the appropriation for 1881, and a reduction of \$67,153,64 on the total amount of the estimates for this purpose in 1882.

These appropriations are made in pursuance of the requirements of law, allowing specific sums annually and per capita payments for the support of the inmates of the institutions.

#### Revisionary Powers of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment possesses only very limited powers of revision over the Departmental Estimates and total amount of the annual appropriations.

About two-thirds of the total annual appropriations are for objects and purposes, the amount of which is either fixed or provided for by law, upon which the Board can exercise no revisionary or discretionary authority, such as the State taxes, redemption of the principal and payment of the interest of the city debt, salaries of the judiciary, city courts, public officers, Fire and Police Departments, asylums, reformatories, and charitable institutions, and other objects and purposes, leaving about one-third only of the total annual appropriations subject, in a partial degree, only to revision by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The appropriations in the Final Estimate for the year 1881, amounted to \$31,354,322.59, the sum of \$20,360,839.24 being for objects and purposes fixed or provided for by law, and \$10,993,483.35 for general purposes, including the public schools and other expenses required for conducting the public business in each department and branch of the city government.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE, No. 31 CHAMBERS STREET, NEW YORK, November 2, 1881.

Hon . WILLIAM R. GRACE, Mayor, and Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,567, as follows, viz.: 4 public buildings, 617 tenement-houses, 93 private dwellings, 63 other dwellings, 7 manufactories and workshops, 16 stores and warehouses, 28 stables, 27 slaughter-houses, 4 lodging-houses, 2 manure dumps, 1 stock yard, 1 foundry, 1 smoke house, 22 sunken and vacant lots, 1 public sewer, 74 yards, courts, and areas, 127 cellars and basements, 235 waste-pipes and drains, 190 privies and water-closets, 33 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 7 dangerous stairways, 3 smoky chimneys, 5 cesspools, 6 other nuisances.

The total number of proporte thereon received from the Inspectors was AFI.

The total number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 451.

During the past week 131 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to consignees of 75 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

109 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 147 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 120 houses, 120 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. 20 cases of contagious disease were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

#### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 512 births, 46 still-births, 222 marriages, and 648 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 29, 1881. This shows a decrease of 19 births, 9 still-births, 34 marriages, and 31 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1880, there was a decrease of 23 births, and an increase of 3 still-births, 9 marriages, and 104 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 30; cancer, 7; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 8; meningitis and encephalitis, 4; convulsions, 6; apoplexy, 9; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 33; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 8; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; drowning, 4. While the deaths from scarlatina increased 3; diphtheria, 7; croup, 6; whooping cough, 6; erysipelas, 1; typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 14; bronchitis, 6; pneumonia, 7; heart diseases, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 5; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 7; surgical operations, 1; suicide, 1. The number of deaths from cerebro-spinal fever, malarial fevers, puerperal diseases, inanition, alcoholism, rheumatism and gout, and premature and preternatural births was the same in the two successive weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 106 were in institutions, 349 in tenement-houses, 173 in houses containing three families or less, 10 in hotels and boarding-houses, 8 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 126 on the first, 172 on the second, 130 on the third, 73 on the fourth, 21 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth. 644 were stated to be residents of New York City and 4 non-residents; 76 were stated to be single, 136 married, 72 widowed, and the condition of 364 was not stated—these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. If any taxes of any year shall remain unpaid on the first day of November, after the assessment-rolls and the warrants to collect such taxes have been delivered to the Receiver of Taxes in the City of New York, it shall be the duty of said Receiver to give public notice, by advertisement for at least ten days in two of the daily newspapers, and in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, respectively, that unless the same shall be paid to him at his office on or before the first day of December, in any such year, he will immediately thereafter proceed to collect such unpaid taxes, as provided in the following section of this act:

Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the amount thereol; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall

seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and collected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of the sact.

Section 2. All existing provisions of law which impose a

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing aws. existing aws.
Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of the City of New York to give public notice by advertisement

for at least ten days, in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, immediately after the confirmation of any assessment for a local improvement or street opening in said city, that the same has been confirmed specifying the title of such assessment and the date of its confirmation by the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments in proceedings for local improvements, and by the Supreme Court in proceedings for street openings, and also the date of entry in the record of titles of assessments kept in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Croton water rents, notilying all persons, owners of property affected by any such assessment, that, unless the amount assessed for benefit on any person or property shall be paid within sixty days after the date of said entry of any such assessment, interest shall thereafter be collected thereon as provided in the following section of this act, and all provisions of law or ordinance requiring any other or different notice of assessments and interest thereon are hereby repealed.
