DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held Thursday, July 29, 1897, at 12 o'clock M. Present—The full Board.

Tresent - The full board. The minutes of the meetings held July 22, 23, 23, 26 and 27, 1897, were approved. Frederick Vilmar, representing the Harlem Regatta Association, appeared in reference to the application of the said association to the Board of Street Opening and Improvement for the establishment of a small park or recreation ground on the south bank of the Harlem river, between Third and Fourth avenues.

A representative of the Frank Roosevelt Estate appeared in opposition to said project. On motion, the matter was referred to the Dock Superintendent to examine and report as to whether the premises are required for commercial purposes.

Clarence E. Seagrist appeared in response to the notice of July 27, 1897, and made a state-ment in reference to his failure to remove, within the time specified in the terms of the sale, the buildings on the block bounded by Bethune and West Twelfth streets, West street and Thirteenth avenue.

President O'Brien moved that the Counsel to the Corporation be requested to institute pro-ceedings to enforce the bond given by said Seagrist and surcties, in the penal sum of \$5,000 for his failure to comply with the terms of the sale, which was lost, the President voting in the affirmative and Commissioners Einstein and Monks in the negative.

A representative of Owen & Co. appeared in reference to the repairs required to the bulkhead at East Forty-seventh street.

On motion, the report of Commissioner Monks, recommending that the Engineer-in-Chief be directed to prepare plans, specifications and form of contract for repairing said bulkhead, and that upon the completion of the work the rental be fixed by the Board of Docks, was ordered on file

and said recommendation adopted. The opinion from the Corporation Counsel in relation to the application from the Real E-tate Trust Company for permission to erect a fence on a line between Sixty-second and Sixty-third streets, distant 120 feet easterly from the easterly side of Avenue A, was referred to the Dock Superintendent to examine and report as to whether the erection of the fence would interfere with the rights of the tenants in the full use of the property occupied under permits from this Department.
