

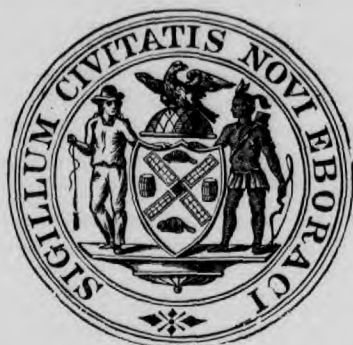

FIRST DISTRICT, BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

W. Moulton of the First Ward, Borough of Richmond, and was received and ordered on file.

The following resolution was offered by Alderman Vaughan and was unanimously adopted.

Whereas, The thoroughfares known as Fisher, Wood and Johnson avenues and Church, William and Centre streets, between Amboy avenue and Broadway, in the Borough of Richmond (each covering a distance of about one thousand eight hundred feet), are insufficiently lighted, making them dark and hence dangerous and a menace to the life and limb of the residents and tax-payers who find occasion to use said thoroughfares at night; and

Whereas, The dangers which ordinarily surround a grade cross are enhanced by the absence of sufficient light at the crossing on Church street, at Broadway; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Local Board of the First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, respectfully recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that are lights be placed at the following locations, at as early a date as practicable, so that better protection may be afforded to the many residents and others who find occasion to use said thoroughfares:

Corner Church street and Amboy avenue;
Corner Church street and Broadway;
Fisher avenue, half way between Broadway and Amboy avenue;
Wood avenue, half way between Broadway and Amboy avenue;
Centre street, half way between Broadway and Amboy avenue;
William street, half way between Broadway and Amboy avenue;

Johnson avenue, half way between Broadway and Amboy avenue, Tottenville, Fifth Ward, Borough of Richmond,

—under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies.

The matter of the application of the Postal Telegraph Cable Company to erect poles and string wires across the Borough of Richmond was laid over on motion.

The following resolution was offered by Councilman Bodine:

Whereas, An organization of citizens of the Borough of Richmond, have undertaken the praiseworthy task of establishing a memorial library in our midst, with the two-fold object of, first, commemorating the brilliant services of our soldiers in the war in which the stars and stripes have been upheld; and, second, of erecting a public library that shall educate and ennoble our people; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board, representing as it does the people of every section of the borough, heartily endorses the action of the Memorial Library Committee, promises it its sympathy and aid to the best of its ability and most earnestly appeals to the citizens generally to support it in a manner becoming loyal Americans devoted to honor, patriotism, progress and educational advancement.

Resolved, That, considering the time and circumstances, not an hour should be lost in pushing this very laudable work; and, therefore, every citizen of the Borough of Richmond should unhesitatingly render that aid that is necessary to bring success.
