Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at meeting held October 17, 1902, adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, that the salary of an additional Transitman and Computer in the Department of Finance be fixed at fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500) per annum."

No. 690.

AN ORDINANCE changing the lines and grades of East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street, from Webster avenue to the Bronx river, and from the Bronx river to East Second street, in the Borough of The Bronx.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: That, in pursuance of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, adopted by that Board on the 28th day of November, 1902, be and the same hereby is approved, viz.:

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the lines and grades of East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street, from Webster avenue to the Bronx river and from the Bronx river to East Second street, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to change the grades and lines of the aforesaid streets as follows:

"A"—Change of Lines.

The northern line of East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street, between Webster avenue and the Bronx river, to be on the prolongation westerly of the northern line of East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street, east of the Bronx river, where said line agrees with the northerly line of the existing Nineteenth avenue.

The southern line of East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street, between Webster avenue and the Bronx river, to be southerly and distant 100 feet measured at right angles and parallel to the above-described northern line of East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street.

"B"—Grades.

The grade at the intersection of East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street and Webster avenue to be 91.5 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

The grade over the property of the New York and Harlem Railroad to be 93 feet above mean high-water datum.

The grade for the bridge over the Bronx river to be 88 feet above mean high-water datum.

"A"—Change of Lines.

"The northern line of East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street, easterly of the Bronx river, to coincide with the northern line of Nineteenth avenue, and the southern line of East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street to be 100 feet southerly therefrom and parallel to the northerly line.

"B"—Grades.

"The elevation of the floor of the bridge over the Bronx river to be 88 feet above mean high-water datum.

"The grade at the western side line of Bronx Boulevard to be 90 feet above mean high-water datum.

"The grade at the eastern side line of Bronx Boulevard to be 92 feet above mean high-water datum.

"The grade at the western side line of Second street to be 111 feet above mean high-water datum.

"The grade at the eastern side line of Second street to be 113 feet above mean high-water datum.

"The grades at the western and eastern side lines of White Plains road to be 171 feet above mean high-water datum.

"The grade at the curb intersections at an unnamed street located about 190 feet easterly of White Plains road to be 181 feet above mean high-water datum, and at the intersection of the curb lines of Olinville avenue to be 190 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore."

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of Brooklyn be and he is hereby authorized to contract for and purchase coal without public letting, to be used in the Bureau of Sewers, the amount thereof not to exceed the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500).

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and hereby is requested, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000), the proceeds whereof shall be applied to the purchase of coal for the poor of The City of New York, to be distributed during the present winter by the Commissioner of Charities, or such other public official within whose jurisdiction the matter may come and as the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment may deem fit to designate.

Filed with statements, and bill ordered to be made out in accordance therewith, and the amount due under said contract to be collected.

From F. A. Spencer, Labor Clerk, Municipal Civil Service Commission, dated December 1, 1902, asking for a list of all persons in the employ of the Board of Elections, classified in Schedule "G." Filed and to be answered.

Resolved, That the Supervisor of the City Record be authorized to prepare, with the approval of the Corporation Counsel, forms of proposals or estimates and contract and specifications for furnishing to the City writing papers of special tints and qualities to be used in the printing of checks, warrants and other documents representing a money value issued by the City, said paper to be, as to quality and colors, such as may be decided upon by the Comptroller and the Supervisor, the paper to be watermarked at frequent intervals with the title "The City of New York," so that it shall appear at least in part upon every such warrant, check, etc., that may be printed; and

Resolved, That the Supervisor be authorized to provide a design, subject to the approval of the Board of City Record and the Municipal Art Commission, to be used as a safety tint, to be printed upon said paper, this being intended to be a further safeguard against imitation or alteration, all the original designs, dies and "dandy" rolls to be and remain the property of The City of New York.

In connection with this resolution the Comptroller submitted the following correspondence from J. R. Sparrow, Supervising Accountant, and the Supervisor of the City Record:

City of New York—Department of Finance,
Comptroller's Office, September 9, 1902.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

Sir—I have long been of the opinion that it would be desirable for The City of New York to contract for whatever tinted flat papers it required for printing checks, warrants and other documents having a monetary value, in order that paper uniform as to quality and tint might be secured.

The maintenance of the borough tints oftentimes works a hardship on bidders for printed matter, in that the amount of printed matter required is not sufficient to justify the contractor in ordering such a supply of the tinted paper as would make it an object to the mill to manufacture it. The contractor does not feel justified in carrying in stock the paper not required, and he, of course, can have no positive assurance that any left-over material can be used in future orders for the City. The result is that our borough tints as established are not maintained, but every new lot of warrants, vouchers, payrolls, etc., means the introduction of a shade of paper different from that which preceded it.

I have talked with the Supervisor of the City Record on this matter and he has, under date of the 27th ult., written me a letter, which I attach hereto.

My purpose in bringing this matter to your attention is to enable you to submit the matter to the Board of City Record if, in your judgment, the plan suggested would work to the City's good.

J. R. SPARROW, Esq., Accountant, Department of Finance:

Dear Sir—Referring to our conversation yesterday concerning the protection of the City's interest with regard to checks, warrants and other documents having a monetary value, I wish to state that my idea is as follows:

(1) That the City shall purchase by contract such paper as it requires for the printing of checks, warrants, licenses and other documents of value. That it have made what is called a "dandy," which is used by the paper manufacturers for giving paper a watermark. That all this paper shall be watermarked, at frequent intervals, "New York City."

(2) The City shall have a steel die made bearing the words, "New York City," or, "Finance Department, New York City," like the words, "Lincoln National Bank," appearing on the attached

check. This steel die, which need be but a small one, and therefore less expensive—say, approximately, two inches square—is to be used for making transfers to a lithographic stone.

(3) All the paper purchased by the City with a watermark shall have superimposed upon it a safety tint composed of continuous repetitions of the transfer from the die referred to, which will appear on a large surface of paper, as the safety tint appears on the check attached. Using paper thus prepared, it will be practically impossible for any forging of checks, warrants or license certificates.

(4) This paper must, of course, be carefully guarded, and while it is in process of printing there must be a person in the pressroom of the lithographer—a representative of the City Record or of the Finance Department. Every sheet must be accounted for, and when the run is completed the design upon the lithographic stone must be destroyed. A complete record of all the sheets coming into this office must, of course, be kept, as this paper has a value that requires special pains being taken in guarding and watching it.

(5) I also recommend that in the printing of the checks and warrants for the annual supplies there shall be a large quantity printed of the different colors, in blank as to the banks and as to the title of appropriation. We then would have no delay in supplying your needs promptly.

BOARD OF CITY RECORD.

MONDAY, September 29, 1902.

A meeting of the Board of City Record was held on Monday, September 29, at 2.30 p. m., in the old Council Chamber, City Hall.

Present—Hon. Seth Low, Mayor; Hon. George L. Rives, Corporation Counsel; Hon. Edward M. Grout, Comptroller.

The minutes of the meeting of September 15th were approved as submitted.

The Supervisor submitted a communication in reply to one from the President of the Board of Education concerning the failure of the City Record Office to advertise in the Corporation papers of Brooklyn a proposal forwarded July 10th, which was ordered on file.

The Supervisor reported that there were 2,300 bound volumes of the "City Record" that could be disposed of, either by deposit in public libraries or institutions, or by sale.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Supervisor be authorized to deposit in public libraries or institutions interested in public affairs such copies of the bound volumes of the "City Record" as he can spare; and that he be authorized to sell in the customary way at public auction, after advertising, any other copies of the "City Record" no longer of use, or any other waste paper in his possession.

Resolved, That the Supervisor keep a record of all libraries and institutions in which such copies of the "City Record" are deposited.

The Supervisor also submitted a report concerning the resolution adopted at the previous meeting with reference to the use of a watermarked and safety-tinted paper for the City's checks, warrants, etc. He submitted an offer from Messrs. George La Monte & Son to furnish a safety bond paper, 17x28, 36 pounds, at \$15 per ream, the City to bear the cost of \$75 for the dandy roll and \$200 for the surface mark. Also, a letter from the Kingsland Paper Mills, offering to supply the paper at twenty-five cents a pound, making nine dollars per ream, including all the preliminary expenses of the dandy roll and surface mark.

DEAR SIR—We have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your esteemed favor of the 23d instant, concerning the use of safety paper by the City for its checks, etc. We will comply with each and every specification you have stated, and will agree to furnish the paper at twenty-five cents a pound delivered on your sidewalk, 3 per cent. for cash. It would require six weeks to furnish the paper.

In accordance with the above proposal, we agree to furnish a paper to be of strong texture and in every way suitable for the work for which you require it; we further agree to watermark the sheet at frequent intervals, as you state, two to three inches apart, with such watermark as you may designate; we also agree to imprint on both sides of the sheet the coat of arms of the City and such reading matter as is practical, said paper to contain all the safety properties of our standard grade of Bankers' Safety Paper; we further agree to furnish it in six tints and in the quantities you state and in either of the two sizes that you state, and will furnish the paper in bundles of 250 sheets exact count. We will agree to furnish all dandies and special machinery necessary for the manufacture of this paper at our expense, and further agree that such machinery and dandies shall be for your exclusive use, and it is understood that we will deliver no paper to anybody except on your written order.

Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Commission be authorized to insert in special publications advertisements for positions of a technical character when they believe it to be in the interest of the service to do so, said advertising to be done under the direction of the Supervisor of the City Record.

Resolved, That the Board of City Record authorize the insertion in the Corporation papers of Brooklyn, on September 8, 9, 10 and 11, notices of a hearing by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in regard to the removal of overhead electric wires in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
