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## DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES.

### Report for the Quarter ending December 31, 1904.

May 24, 1905.

Honorable GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, City of New York:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to transmit herewith, pursuant to the provisions of section 1544, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, the report of the Department of Public Charities of The City of New York for the quarter ending December 31, 1904, together with reports of heads of institutions for the same period.

In addition thereto the following matters may be noted. On October 20 bids were opened for the following work:

No. 1. For furnishing labor and materials required for installing new boilers and making alterations to boiler-house at laundry, City Hospital, Blackwell's Island, for which there were eight bidders, the lowest being Evans, Almirall & Co., to whom the contract was awarded for \$8,147 on November 14, 1904.

No. 2. For furnishing labor and material required for installing two 50 horsepower boilers, one hot-water tank, one return tank and feed pumps, one fire service pump with all machinery and necessary connections; also remove present heating boilers and high pressure boiler and run a 2½-inch water main at Cumberland Street Hospital, Borough of Brooklyn. There were eleven bidders, the lowest being Motley, Green & Co., for \$5,625.

No. 3. For furnishing all the labor and material required to erect a passenger elevator in the north wing of Cumberland Street Hospital, Borough of Brooklyn, for which there were three bidders, the lowest being Sprague Elevator Company, for \$9,370.

On October 28 bids were opened for furnishing all the labor and material required to install the heating system in the School for the Feeble-Minded at Randall's Island, for which there were seven bidders, the lowest being Harry L. Philp, for \$1,857.

On the same day bids were opened for furnishing labor and material for the erection and completion of stable and morgue at Cumberland Street Hospital, Borough of Brooklyn, for which there were fifteen bidders, the lowest being William P. McGarry, for \$9,986, to whom the contract was awarded on the same day.

On November 23, 1904, the following order was issued:

"Ordered, That no fee shall be charged by any person connected with the Department of Public Charities for any service rendered to any person in any pavilion for the insane under the jurisdiction of this Department, and that no fee or gratuity in any form whatever, direct or indirect, shall be accepted by any person connected with the Department of Public Charities for any service rendered to any person in any pavilion for the insane under jurisdiction of this Department. The punishment for breaking this rule shall be dismissal from the service."

On November 30 bids were opened for furnishing labor and material necessary to make repairs to roofs, leaders, gutters, etc., at Cumberland Street Hospital, for which there were eleven bidders, the lowest being James Halpin, for \$575, to whom the award was made the same day.

On December 19 bids were opened for furnishing and delivering the supply of fresh meat, fresh fish, poultry, fluid and condensed milk for 1905.

For meat there were four bidders.

For fish there were four bidders.

For poultry there were three bidders.

For milk there were four bidders.

On December 21 bids were opened for furnishing fresh meats, fresh fish, fresh milk, coal, fertilizers and poultry for the Borough of Richmond, for which there were seven bidders.

On the same day bids were opened for furnishing and delivering anthracite, bituminous, blacksmith and gas coal in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx and the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens for the year 1905, for which there were nine bidders.

On December 23 bids were opened for furnishing labor and material required for the extermination of rats and mice and for the extermination of roaches and water bugs from the institutions of this Department in the Borough of Manhattan, for which there were three bidders, the lowest being The Brown Insecticide Company, for \$235, to whom the award was made the same day.

On December 27 bids were opened for the transportation and burial of pauper dead in the Borough of Queens, for which there were two bidders. All the bids for this were subsequently rejected and it was readvertised.

## REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENTAL DIETITIAN.

December 31, 1904.

Hon. JAMES H. TULLY, Commissioner, Department of Public Charities:

Dear Sir—Herewith is transmitted my report for the fourth quarter of the year 1904.

Practically no changes in the organization of the Dietary Department have been made. It has been agreed that it would be best to secure a woman manager for the dining-room hall at the Tuberculosis Infirmary, but one answering all requirements has not yet been found.

As the Civil Service eligible list of Dietitians is about exhausted, the Civil Service Commission has been asked to arrange for an examination at an early date; the request has been granted, and it is understood that the requirements of applicants have been made more stringent, which will insure a higher standard for the work.

Early in October new office accommodations for myself were arranged for on the pier foot of East Twenty-sixth street and have proved most helpful in my work. The food supply continues to be almost without exception satisfactory, the results being realized from the improved specifications for foods which went into operation at the beginning of this year.

No changes in existing dietaries have been made during this quarter, but heads of departments concerned are considering several changes contemplated to improve the dietary at the Tuberculosis Infirmary at a slightly increased expense.

Requests for copies of dietaries, opinions and advice upon dietaries are frequently received from outside sources.

The service of the special diet kitchens of the general hospitals is being extended, the number of orders filled from them being more than twice as many as at the time of the opening of the diet kitchens.

The equipment for the laboratories for cookery, chemistry and bacteriology at the Nurses' Home is nearly all received and installed, making it possible to do more thorough work in teaching than has been done in the past.

During the quarter I have conducted classes in the principles of cookery, elementary chemistry and bacteriology in the laboratories, and have given a short course of lectures on dietetics to the intermediate class of Nurses.

At commencement time, December 17, pupils in these classes prepared a special exhibit of their work.

## REPORT OF THE EMPLOYMENT AGENT.

Hon. JAMES H. TULLY, Commissioner, Department of Public Charities:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to submit herewith my fourth quarterly report for 1904, and in submitting the same I would state that in order to increase the efficiency of the Employment Department I have arranged, in addition to my regular duties, to devote as much time as I can conveniently spare to the out-door work of this Department, locating new employment offices recently established and investigating as to the quality of help which they may be able to refer to me for positions in the various hospitals, institutions and asylums under your supervision.

I have made several visits to Blackwell's Island during the past three months, which have given me an opportunity of observing the women helpers whom I have placed in the several hospitals and institutions as to their quality of work, ability, etc.



An increasing number of both personal and referred applications have been received at this office, all of which were disposed of to the best interest of the applicants.

More or less successful effort has been made to arrange whereby women who have been referred for positions will first manifest their willingness (in accepting a position) to remain for at least three months before requesting a pass to the city. In some instances this method has been helpful.

During the past quarter I found it necessary to make but few transfers. Four women have been reinstated, after giving satisfactory information as to remaining out over pass, their previous work and record having been reported satisfactory.

On December 23, 1904, by your direction, I visited City Hospital and arranged to have the laundry work of the City Hospital transferred to the laundries at the Metropolitan Hospital and the New York City Home for Aged and Infirm; meanwhile a night shift of laundresses from the City Hospital had been arranged, to work from 6 P. M. until 1 A. M., occupying the laundry of the Metropolitan Hospital temporarily until accommodations could be arranged at the City Hospital.

On December 30, 1904, by the direction of Deputy Commissioner Dougherty, a second visit was made to the City Hospital, Blackwell's Island, to secure the statements of fifty-nine women as to their losses sustained in the burning of the City Hospital laundry.

New laundry baskets have been provided for the Metropolitan Hospital, as per request made, and I would report that these baskets, which were made on Randall's Island by the inmates, are of an excellent quality and of much stronger construction than those which have been previously provided.

## REPORT OF THE BUREAU OF DEPENDENT ADULTS.

February 3, 1905.

Hon. JAMES H. TULLY, Commissioner, Department of Public Charities, Twenty-sixth street and East river, New York City:

Dear Sir—In forwarding the report of this Bureau for the quarter ending December 31, 1904, I beg to call your attention to the following facts:

There have been 2,769 applicants sent to hospitals for adults; 274 children sent to the institutions for children on Randall's Island; 919 persons sent to the New York City Home for the Aged and Infirm.

Transportation has been afforded to 164 sick and destitute persons to reach their homes, thereby preventing them from becoming charges upon the City and County of New York.

There have been 49 sick and destitute persons committed to the State Almshouse for care awaiting transportation.

There have been 118 persons sent to the Municipal Lodging-house, and 17 destitute aliens returned to the office of the United States Commissioner of Immigration.

There have also been sent from this Bureau 43 patients to the Craig Colony for Epileptics; 4 to the Syracuse State Institution for Feeble-Minded Children; 2 to the State Custodial Asylum for Feeble-Minded Women; 4 to the New York State Hospital for Incipient Tuberculosis; 23 deaf-mutes sent to institutions; 119 men and 122 women sent to Bellevue Hospital for examination as to sanity.

The above figures make a total of 4,627.

In addition this Bureau has examined 5,757 sick and destitute persons, to be cared for in hospitals and homes other than our own, at the expense of the City and County of New York, of which 965 were rejected as improper charges, thus showing that the Bureau of Dependent Adults of the Department of Public Charities of The City of New York has cared for, at the expense of said City, 4,792 persons in institutions other than our own, and 4,627 in our own institutions, making a total of 9,419 cases.

Total of above, 10,384 cases, of which 9,419 were approved.

This Bureau has also taken 204 complaints of abandonment; 76 of non-support; 68 of bastardy, sent to court; 36 of bastardy, not sent to court, having been settled in this office. The result from these cases has been a collection of \$30,597.09 (for the support of these persons) during said quarter, thus saving that much to the taxpayers of the City and County of New York.

As the above figures show, there were 10,768 cases handled by this Bureau during the quarter ending December 31, 1904.

This Bureau has also issued 10,000 passes to visit Blackwell's and Randall's Islands; given 616 meals to destitute persons awaiting disposition, and there have been 328 calls for the sick wagon.

This Bureau has also the charge of the City Morgue, where 2,145 bodies were received during the quarter ending December 31, 1904, of which but 1,002 were buried by friends.

In conclusion I would say that the work is energetically and expeditiously performed through the thorough organization of the force under my supervision.

I would again state, as in former reports, that there is a dire necessity of additional clerical help in this Bureau.

## REPORT OF THE BUREAU OF DEPENDENT CHILDREN FOR THE QUARTER ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1904.

New York, March 31, 1905.

Hon. JAMES H. TULLY, Commissioner, Department of Public Charities:

My Dear Sir—I have the honor to submit the report of the Bureau of Dependent Children for the quarter ending December 31, 1904.

Those familiar with the work of this Bureau understand and appreciate the problems with which we have to deal in connection with dependent children cases. Probably the most serious problem is that of desertion of parents (usually the father).

During the present quarter no less than 23 per cent. of the children sent to institutions as public charges were committed for that reason.

During the quarter we made an attempt to extradite a man who had deserted his family in this city and who was subsequently located in St. Louis, Mo. Communication with the Chief of Police of St. Louis resulted in the man's arrest and he was held on complaint of this Bureau until arrangements could be made for his extradition, but, unfortunately, our effort to have him extradited failed. The reason given by the officials having the matter of extradition in hand was that desertion of wife and children was only a misdemeanor, and was not an extraditable offense. There are hundreds of such cases, and the sooner the law is amended, to make desertion of family a felony and hence an extraditable offense, the better it will be for the taxpayers of this city.

In this connection it will be of interest to note that this Bureau took action in another case with better results. The case in question was a woman with eight (8) children who had been deserted by her husband. It was learned that the man, after leaving his family located in Jersey City, N. J., where he married another woman, and subsequently went to Washington, D. C. It was at this point that the Department learned of his whereabouts, and we at once communicated with the Chief of Police at Washington, D. C., and had the man arrested on a charge of "bigamy," but, as the offense had been committed in Jersey City, N. J., he could not be tried in Washington, D. C., on that charge. However, the Superintendent of Police of Washington, D. C., to his credit, be it said, had the man arraigned on the technical charge of "adultery," the result of which was that he was convicted and sentenced to prison for eleven (11) months and twenty-nine (29) days, without fine, which means that he must serve his full sentence and cannot be released on bail or otherwise. The deserted woman in this case has promised to co-operate with this Department just before the expiration of her husband's sentence to have him extradited to the State of New Jersey and prosecuted for bigamy, and the aforesaid Superintendent of Police has written that he will see to it that the man is held pending arrangements for his extradition.

The foregoing are typical of hundreds of such cases with which this Department has to deal, and seems to emphasize the necessity of the passage of a law making desertion of wife and children in necessitous circumstances a felony.

## Supplies.

During this quarter office furniture that was greatly needed was furnished on requisition.

## New Appointments.

On October 7, 1904, the Commissioner of Public Charities appointed an extra Pupil Examiner, and she was detailed to this Bureau for duty.

REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL LODGING-HOUSE FOR QUARTER ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1904.

New York, December 31, 1904.

Hon. J. H. TULLY, Commissioner, Department Public Charities:

Dear Sir—I beg to submit herewith the report of the Municipal Lodging-house for the quarter ending December 31, 1904.

In addition to the tabulated statistics, I beg to say that during the past quarter I have had this institution inspected by Inspector Johnson, of the Department of Health, with a view of ascertaining whether we could increase the sleeping capacity of our dormitories by adding an additional berth to our now two (2) berth beds (double deckers). After receiving the report of the above named Inspector, Dr. Bensil advises me that to do so would reduce the air space below the legal requirements.

Were this not the case it would have given us about 150 extra beds. Having these, it might not have been necessary to use the three rooms on Twenty-sixth street dock for sheltering purposes.

Bathing.

During the quarter we have made quite a change in our shower baths, the old showers have been removed, and an idea of our own, consisting of several transverse

pierced pipes, have taken their place. We think this quite an improvement; up to the present time they have proved a success.

Removal of Mangle, etc.

An old mangle, out of service for a long time, has been removed, and an iron railing, with top brass rail, has been built all around the machinery; this not only prevents inmates from coming in contact with the belting, etc., but adds considerably to the appearance of the basement.

In view of not being able to provide better quarters, the rooms on Twenty-sixth street dock, used in emergency cases to shelter our overflow, have been made as sanitary and comfortable as possible by putting doors on the toilet room (formerly exposed) and inclosing the upper part of same, also putting ventilators on windows and panes of glass where needed. The stoves have been removed and steam is now being used for heating purposes.

Precaution Against Fire.

Employees, as usual, are being continually schooled as to their duties in case of fire; all fire extinguishers, fire-hose and other fire appliances throughout the institution are inspected at regular intervals.

Supplies.

Supplies of all kinds received during the quarter from the storehouse, meat department and bakery were of excellent quality.

Requisitions.

Requisitions for supplies, repairs, etc., have been acted upon very promptly and in a very satisfactory manner by the officials having charge of such matters at the central office.

Disposition of Inmates.

Reports, etc., as to the disposition of such inmates referred to the Bureau of Dependent Children and the Bureau of Dependent Adults have been received as usual without delay.

Charitable Societies.

All communications, requests, etc., to and from all charitable organizations and interested individuals have been acted upon promptly and courteously.

Holiday Dinners.

As has always been the custom at this institution on Thanksgiving Day a holiday dinner, consisting of turkey, etc., was served to 950 persons. On Christmas Day a similar dinner was served to 620 persons.

## REPORT OF THE NEW YORK CITY TRAINING SCHOOL FOR NURSES, BLACKWELL'S ISLAND.

6 Trained Nurses, 2 Head Nurses, 55 Pupil Nurses, 12 Probationers and 3 Male Orderlies at City Hospital.

5 Pupil Nurses at Maternity Hospital.

1 Trained Nurse, 22 Pupil Nurses at Gouverneur Hospital.

1 Trained Nurse, 12 Pupil Nurses at Harlem Hospital.

1 Trained Nurse, 7 Pupil Nurses at Fordham Hospital.

12 Pupil Nurses were on vacation.

At the Home—5 men, 19 women and 1 male convalescent Helper.

One Pupil Nurse was dropped during the quarter for illness.

On October 1 the fourth class of probationers for the year was received. Ten took the examination, all passed and all were finally entered as Pupil Nurses.

In this month also the examination of the probationary class for August was held, fourteen coming up for the examination, and all passing, making a very creditable class record. Four of those who entered in August were dropped from the class for failure to keep up with the work.

The usual lectures and lessons were carried on during the quarter with very encouraging results. We were enabled to carry through the work on broader lines and more thoroughly, as we had our new laboratories in which to do this work. The half-yearly examinations were held in December, and very creditable records indeed were made.

In October the substitution of Trained Nurses at \$50 for Head Nurses at \$30 was completed, and it seems to be working very nicely, as it centralizes authority more and the work seems to be smoother.

In November notification was received that the erysipelas pavilion was ready for occupancy and a letter was sent requesting permission to install a Trained Nurse and twelve Pupil Nurses, with the other help necessary for the care of the patients in that building. It was approved, but, as the furniture had not been delivered for the building, it was thought wiser to occupy the building as an overflow of our surplus patients, until the medicine closets at least could be furnished.

In this month also a requisition for the new schedule of lectures, by which we were allowed twenty-two lectures extra for the third-year course, was passed through, so that the lecturers could be notified to be ready after the 1st of January.

In December the commencement was held on the 17th. In spite of the fact that it was our first winter commencement, and that it was a stormy day, about twelve hundred people were present during the afternoon and evening. The exercises were carried out upon the same lines as heretofore, and what made it specially enjoyable was the fact that it was our first commencement in our own assembly hall. Refreshments were served in the new dining pavilion, which was formally named Brennan Hall, and was thrown open for the inspection of guests, but owing to some difficulty, on account of the severe weather, the work on the building was not completed as far as we had hoped. Dr. Edward S. Peck, who has been Chairman of our Board of Examiners for a number of years, and a Visiting Surgeon at City Hospital for twenty-five years, has severed his connection with that institution, and in recognition of this fact, the Nurses of the graduating class presented him with a very handsome ink-stand, with the badge of the school imbedded in the cover. The members of the school, including officers and the recent graduates, also presented the Superintendent with a very beautiful Christmas gift, which consisted of her monogram set in diamonds.

There were twenty-nine pupils who received their diplomas at this time, and many very complimentary things were said about their standing. The head of the senior class, Miss Baker, received 96.3-5 per cent., and was presented with a badge of the school by Mrs. Cadwalader Jones. Miss Isabel McCuaig, at the head of the intermediate class, made 89.4-7 per cent., and was presented with a gold medal; also Miss Land, of the junior class, who made 93.30-45 per cent., and also received a gold medal. Both were presented by Mrs. Cadwalader Jones, Chairman of the Advisory Board. Mrs. Jones has announced her intention of presenting these badges for the future. When it is considered that these Nurses were not marked for their theoretical work alone, but on their general proficiency and their deportment, the record is a very creditable one indeed.

The Christmas was passed, as usual, in the hospital, the patients being cheered by the good things provided through a donation by Mrs. Gerry, who remembers the hospital every year. Other donations received during the quarter were contributions from the Island Mission, for patients' needs, and a green house for the Nurses' Home, which is to be put up as soon as the grounds are clear of the contractors' supplies.

The new reception pavilion is progressing very slowly and without any apparent reason, except for lack of labor.

There occurred on December 23 a most disastrous fire in our laundry, entirely destroying part of our equipment and injuring the balance to such an extent that it will have to be removed and repaired. Fifty-eight of the female help slept on the second and top floors; we were very fortunate in rescuing all of them. None of them had time to save their clothing or effects and were compelled to flee in their night clothing, as the fire occurred about 1 o'clock A. M. As these people receive very meagre wages and could ill afford and, in fact, could not buy new clothing, the Department supplied their wants in this respect, with the sanction of the Honorable Commissioner. The fire necessitated the using of the new erysipelas and epileptic pavilion for a dormitory until such time as other accommodations can be provided.

The average daily census for this quarter has been unprecedented and on several occasions the daily census has been larger than at any previous time in the history of this hospital, reaching as high as 822.

The usual repairs, such as painting, tinsmithing, plastering and carpentry, etc., have been carried on with vigor.

The X-ray static machine which was installed in this institution, has been used by hand power, but not electric motor, as the connection with the penitentiary has not yet been made. It seems to be satisfactory, as I received no complaint from the Physicians.

Deputy Superintendent Christopher Easton, feeling it necessary on account of feeble health, tendered his resignation in the month of October. The same month Mr. Edward J. Kelly received his appointment as Deputy Superintendent.

Dr. E. J. Miller, former Intern at the Metropolitan Hospital, was appointed December 1, 1904, Resident Pathologist, to serve for six months.

A request recommending that the age limit be placed not higher than twelve years for children sent to the Children's Ward was approved by the Commissioner.

It was found necessary to renovate another pavilion to make additional dormitory room for the female help. This renovating consisted in reflooring, plastering, painting and the installing of a system of new plumbing.

A sanitary drinking fountain was placed in a convenient locality south of the solarium.

The painting of the Catholic church was completed, adding much to its appearance.

The cottage of the Superintendent was repaired and painted during the quarter.

The eave troughs and leaders at the Nurses' Home were replaced by new ones, and roof was painted.

## Summary.

During the quarter 124 days were lost owing to illness; 2 Head Pupil Nurses and 7 permanent Nurses resigned; 6 Pupil Nurses and 4 Head Pupil Nurses finished their course; 1 permanent Nurse was dropped owing to illness; 2 Pupil Nurses were dropped for failing in examinations; 1 Head Pupil Nurse and 8 permanent Nurses were appointed; 14 vacations were granted.

On October 1 we received a class of fourteen (14) probationers, nine (9) of whom passed the examination.

Examinations were also held for the intermediate and senior classes in December. As an experiment a number of the pupils were permitted to take a course in massage at their own expense, but it is too early to form any opinion as to the advisability of continuing the lessons.

Lectures were delivered to members of the graduating class by Drs. C. C. Boyle, John Hutchinson and S. K. Royle.

The post-graduates received instruction in management and training school work. Fewer complaints have been received since Argand lamps were provided for the Nurses' rooms.

The roof and drainage of the Nurses' Home have been put in thorough repair, the piazza painted, storm doors constructed; also closets for the classroom supplies.

All classes were discontinued during the holidays, and the Nurses enjoyed the Christmas spirit which pervaded the hospital, due to the generous donations of societies and friends interested in the institution.

The children were made especially happy by a well-laden tree, the gift of a family closely connected with the hospital and school.

During the past quarter the following transfers and improvements have taken place at this institution:

In order to have the wards of the Children's Hospital, hereafter enumerated, painted and cleaned, the following transfers of patients became necessary: On October 3 the inmates of ward 27, surgical ward, were transferred to ward 26; November 21, the inmates of ward 6 were returned to ward 25, medical ward, and the inmates of ward 24 removed to ward 6.

During the quarter the following named wards were in quarantine for scarlet fever: Ward 28, boys' medical ward, from September 3 to October 3; ward 1, crippled girls, from October 17 to November 9; and ward 23 was quarantined for chicken pox from October 23 to November 12.

On October 24 at the suggestion of Dr. Stowell, President of the Medical Board, admission charts were substituted for admission cards.

In order to centralize and thus facilitate the workings of the telephone system on Randall's Island, the telephone switchboard has been removed from the Infants' Hospital to the main office. For all official purposes this change is found to be much more convenient.

At the School for Feeble-minded a new steam heating system is being installed. At present the new steam main is hung and connections are now being made to the coils and radiators. When finished this will be of very great benefit to the institution as the old steam radiators and apparatus had been in use since 1868. The entire system was completely worn out and had become totally inadequate to heat the building.

In order to provide extra, much needed, sleeping accommodations at the School for Feeble-minded, a covered arcade, 108 feet 4 inches long, has been erected from the School for Feeble-minded to ward 16. As soon as this is finished, the present dining room can be used as a play room for the girls, and the large dormitory now utilized for that purpose can be restored to its original use.

A new waiting room has been erected on dock at One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street. It is heated and is very comfortable. Visitors and employees are now protected from the inclemencies of the weather while waiting at this point for the arrival of the boat.

The contract for placing new roof on gas house has been completed. A steam and air blower has been made to remove carbon from the retorts at gas house. This is a valuable improvement, as the work, which heretofore took from three to four days, can now be accomplished in from four to six hours. The frame work for small gas tank, which was displaced during a storm, has been re-erected and the two brick chimneys on gas house have been repaired. The tar boxes and purifiers have also been thoroughly cleaned. The engine which runs the exhauster at gas house has been rebabbitted and a new wrist pin and boxes have been fitted.

At the operating room, reception building, two glass wash basins have been fitted up. A wall coil was built at the store house and return connections have been made to same. A steam line, 250 feet long, has been laid from the store house to the drug store and three radiators have been fitted up in that building with all the necessary connections. A new syphon has been supplied and connected in pump pit at the central power house.

All the plumbing fixtures have been removed from wards 31, 32 and 33. A bath tub has been erected at ward 15. The boilers at the Infants' Hospital boiler-house have been relined with fire-box blocks, composed of a steel mixture. A leak in boiler has been repaired. A steam pump not in use, has been removed. New globe valves have been fitted on washing machines at the Infants' Hospital laundry. A galvanized iron railing was put up on stairway at One Hundred and Twentieth street dock.

The entire interior sheathing of pavilion 36 was taken out on account of shrinkage. The side walls and ceiling were relined with tar paper and the sheathing put up in good order. The three small pavilions known as wards 31, 32 and 33, which were condemned as wards, are now being used as follows: Ward 31 has been fitted up as an Engineer's work shop, and the other two have been thrown into one by taking out a side wall of each and erecting an extension, 33 feet by 40 feet, between them, thereby making one large building, 40 feet by 75 feet, which is used as a Carpenter's shop and storehouse for fine lumber. Made three double section desk tables (white pine) for new Morgue. Erected a frame shed, 25 feet by 45 feet, for storage of old lumber and articles needing repairs. Erected an inclosed frame shed, 14 feet by 25 feet, for the storage of building wood. Reconstructed old frame building now used as paint shop.

At Children's Hospital the ceilings and side walls of wards 22, 24, 26, 27 and 28, also kitchens and Nurses' rooms attached were painted in two coats; all woodwork and furniture grained and varnished and radiators painted in one coat of aluminum. Painted in two coats, ceilings, side walls and stairways in hallways, three stories high, of the North Hospital; woodwork grained and varnished. Painted in two coats, ceiling and side walls of band room, Superintendent's office, kitchen of pavilion E, surgical dressing room of pavilion K, kitchen, laundry and pantry, Superintendent's cottage; all woodwork varnished. Painted three new double section desk tables for new Morgue in four coats. At Infants' Hospital painted ceilings and side walls of two diet kitchens and pantries attached, also sashes and blinds; painted ice-box and bread-box; grained and varnished tables and stained, shellacked and varnished refrigerator. Painted ninety (90) iron bedsteads. Put in 1,029 lights of glass in different buildings.

Twelve dead trees were cut down.

Hauled from boiler-houses 678 cart-loads of ashes, which were used in grading yard between school building and engine-house, grading walk between school building and ward 15, grading and leveling grounds around new storehouse, grading and leveling grounds around Painters', Carpenters' and Tinsmiths' shops, filling in and grading road from storehouse to office, grading grounds around wards 14 and 16 and filling in and leveling dumps.

Graded and sodded grounds in front of gymnasium, 3,956 square feet, using 20 cart-loads of loam. Made new tar walk to gymnasium, 138 square feet. Graded and tarred play yard north side of ward 15, 4,800 square feet. Repaired tar walk from Infants' Hospital to Industrial School, 200 square feet. Graded and sodded lawn south side of school building, 728 square feet.

Put in curb at Infants' Hospital kitchen, 50 square feet. Dug trench from storehouse to drug store for steam pipes.

An omnibus has been provided to be utilized in stormy weather to convey children who are being discharged from the institution to the boat, also in like weather to bring the Teachers from the boat to the school buildings.

An entertainment was given on December 29 in which the children of both the Day School and the School for the Feeble-Minded took part, and at which the Randall's Island band gave its initial performance. Commissioners Tully, Dougherty and McInerney, together with a large number of ladies and gentlemen, were present.

The exercises consisted of several selections by the band; calisthenics by a class of girls of the School for the Feeble-Minded, and songs, recitations, cantata, action song and costumed dances by the children of the Day School. The Commissioners expressed themselves as being very gratified with the children's efforts, particularly with the music contributed by the band.

The band is composed of feeble-minded boys, and the progress they have made during their six months of musical training compares favorably with that of boys having a much higher order of intelligence. The Commissioner provided uniforms for the boys of the band. They certainly add greatly to their appearance and they take much pride in them.

The following is the amount of work accomplished in the Industrial School for the quarter ending December 31, 1904:

## Sewing Department.

Made 4,508 pieces girls' clothing, 4,180 pieces boys' clothing, 44 pieces men's clothing, 8,625 pieces miscellaneous articles, 2,996 pieces bedding, 238 pieces infants' clothing.

## Tailoring Department.

Cut 4,224 pieces girls' clothing, 3,135 pieces boys' clothing, 27 pieces women's clothing, 269 pieces men's clothing, 1,187 pieces infants' clothing, 2,768 pieces bedding, 7,896 pieces miscellaneous articles.

## Shoemaking Department.

Repaired 647 pairs shoes.

Made 2 pairs shoes (high shoes).

## Basket-Making Department.

Made 25 clothes baskets, 15 waste-paper baskets, 14 half-bushel baskets, 7 hampers.

Repaired 28 clothes baskets, 1 market basket, 5 reed-chair seats, 5 reed-chair-backs, 8 cane-chair seats, 1 cane-chair back.

## Mat Making Department.

Twenty-four coir brush mats, No. 3; 1 coir brush mat, 36 inches by 22 inches; 22 rope chain mats, No. 3; 1 rope chain mat, oval; 1 rug, 10 feet by 10 feet.

## Gardening Department.

Cut and propagated 1,000 geraniums, 300 abutilons, 100 agerathums, 50 salvias, 1,000 althernauthera major, 1,000 althernauthera aurea, 800 althernauthera arneana, 300 colins golden bedder, 300 colins verschaffeltii, 200 acheranthus lindenii.

During the quarter the following products of our farm were distributed to kitchens and used by the employees and inmates:

Beets, 39 bushels; carrots, 15 barrels; celery, 2,070 bunches; lettuce, 516 heads; parsley, 15 bushels; parsnips, 40 barrels; peppers, 10 bushels; pumpkins, 430 heads; squash, 200 heads; string beans, 25 bushels; tomatoes, 56 bushels; turnips, 7 barrels.

## FOURTH QUARTERLY REPORT OF THE HOSPITALS AND OTHER INSTITUTIONS IN THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES, BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN AND QUEENS, NEW YORK, 1904.

Brooklyn, N. Y., February 1, 1905.

Hon. JAMES H. TULLY, Commissioner, Public Charities, New York:

Dear Sir—I herewith submit the fourth quarterly report, together with the annual summary for the year 1904, of the hospitals and other institutions in the Department of Public Charities in the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

## Kings County Hospital.

In this hospital, 539 patients remained October 1, 1904, from the previous quarter; 2,157 patients were admitted during the quarter, of whom 1,518 were males, 639 females, making the total number under treatment 1,877 males and 819 females, a total of 2,696. Of this number 657 were discharged recovered, 907 were discharged improved, 63 were discharged unimproved, 205 were transferred to State hospitals for insane, 213 died and 651 remained under treatment December 31, 1904.

The number of ambulance calls was 372.

The number of visits by the visiting staff during the quarter was 433.

The amount of labor accomplished by convalescent help consisted of 51,526.

## Kings County Hospital Dispensary.

In this dispensary 1,034 cases were treated during the quarter, of whom 736 were males and 298 were females; the number of new visits were 407, revisits 627.

The New York City Home for the Aged and Infirm, Brooklyn Division.

In this home 1,212 remained from the previous quarter. During the fourth quarter 554 males and 203 females were admitted, making a total of 757. The total number cared for was 1,245 males and 724 females, a total of 1,969. Of this number 528 were discharged during the fourth quarter, 55 died and 1,386 remained in the home December 31, 1904.

The amount of labor accomplished by inmates of the home for the quarter ending December 31, 1904, was 65,460 days, distributed as follows: 52,170 at the New York City Home for the Aged and Infirm, Brooklyn Division; 7,954 days at the Kings County Hospital; 5,336 days in the Department for Transportation, Gardens and Stables.

## Neurological Hospital.

In this hospital 141 patients remained under treatment October 1, 1904, from the previous quarter, 67 patients were admitted, making the total number under treatment for the quarter 208, of whom 121 were males and 87 were females. Of this number 39 were discharged improved, 17 died and 152 remained under treatment December 31, 1904.

## Cumberland Street Hospital.

One hundred and seventy-one patients remained under treatment October 1, 1904, from the previous quarter, of whom 82 were males and 89 females. Three hundred and thirty-three males and 198 females were admitted during the quarter, making the total number under treatment 702, of whom 415 were males and 287 females. Two hundred and eighty-five cases were discharged recovered, one case discharged unimproved, 55 died and 185 remained under treatment December 31, 1904. One hundred and seventy-six were discharged improved.

The number of visits made by the visiting staff during the quarter was 313; the number of ambulance calls was 625.

## Cumberland Street Hospital Dispensary.

In this dispensary during the quarter ending December 31, 1904, 3,789 were treated, of whom 2,640 were males and 1,149 were females, 931 being new cases and 2,858 were revisits.

## Bradford Street Hospital.

At this hospital 3 cases remained under treatment from the previous quarter, 21 cases were admitted during the quarter, making the total number under treatment 24, of which 11 were discharged recovered, 9 improved, 2 died and 2 remained under treatment, December 31, 1904. The number of visits made by the visiting staff was 16. The number of ambulance calls was 273.

## Bradford Street Hospital Dispensary.

In this dispensary 1,663 cases were treated during the quarter, of whom 1,084 were males and 579 females; the number of new cases was 545; number of revisits 1,118.

The contract has been awarded for construction of new balconies along nearly the entire west front of the building for women at the New York City Home for the Aged and Infirm, Brooklyn Division. These balconies are to be inclosed in iron and glass, and will afford ample sitting room for the inmates of this Division of the Home who hitherto have been very crowded in their dormitories. The balconies are to be three stories high, corresponding with the different stories of present Home. The work was commenced on this addition of the Home the latter part of December.

The usual amount of painting has been accomplished in the different institutions in these boroughs.

Contracts were awarded also for a new stable and morgue, for installation of new boilers and for remodeling heating apparatus of the laundry at the Cumberland Street Hospital; also for the installation of a new electric elevator and shaft, with fire-proof stairway. This elevator will be for service and for taking cases to and from the operating room on the fifth floor. It will supply a long needed want.

## REPORT OF THE BUREAU OF DEPENDENT ADULTS, BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

February 7, 1905.

Hon. JAMES H. TULLY, Commissioner of Public Charities:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to herewith submit my report for the three months ending December 31, 1904:

Of the number of children committed during the quarter it is gratifying to say that the number is less by eight (8) than the commitments last quarter, but the discharged were less by two, thus leaving the number remaining in institutions December 31 greater by three than for the quarter ending September 30, 1904.

Of the number of children remaining in private families, one (1) has been discharged. The children in private families have been furnished (as per your instructions) with good warm clothing for the winter, and those residing at a distance in the country and distant from the schools have been furnished with rubber shoes, and in some instances rubber boots; they have been clothed comfortably, but not extravagantly. Of the children in institutions and families, I have reinvestigated the circumstances of the parents or relatives whenever said parents or relatives could be located.

The part payments by parents or relatives of children in institutions and families, while not amounting to as much as last quarter, was caused by said parents or relatives not having employment.

In the abandonment and bastardy cases, while the disposition has not at all been satisfactory, I have done everything possible to prosecute these cases. The number of patients examined in lunacy was nineteen (19), of whom fourteen (14) were committed to Manhattan State hospitals, four (4) were discharged, the examiners not finding them insane, and one (1) died after being declared insane. The number of permits issued for admission to New York City Farm Colony was thirty-nine (39), and to the Insane Pavilion at New York City Farm Colony, by the Department, seven (7), and by City Magistrates twelve (12), making the total number of admissions fifty-eight (58). The number of burial permits issued for interment in Potter's Field (this borough) was nine (9).

I am pleased to say the number of patients (City charges) admitted to the two hospitals in this borough is one hundred and ten (110) less than the admissions during the last quarter.

A report was presented from Examiner Conway, dated April 15, on the appeal of Thomas Shields, candidate in the examination for Fireman held November 15, 1904, for a special examination, said examination in which he competed having been canceled by the Commission. It appeared that Mr. Shields left the city immediately after taking his examination for a business trip to Ireland, and therefore had no notice of the cancellation of the examination in which he competed, or of the calling of the new one.

On motion, the request was denied.

A report was presented from Examiner Story, dated April 17, stating that he had made an error in computing the percentage on the technical sheet of Mr. Frank J. Jones, candidate for the position of Inspector of Tenements, he having set forth the same as 73 per cent. when the candidate's marks really averaged 76 per cent. on that paper. The Secretary was directed to have the candidate's percentage amended accordingly.

A communication was presented from Examiner Story, recommending that the rating of Irving A. Stoney, candidate for promotion to the rank of Roundsman, Police Department, be raised on Laws and Ordinances from 79 to 84 per cent. The matter was laid over.

A communication was presented from the Pay-roll Clerk, dated April 12, asking the Commission to investigate the employment of Rev. Frank R. Jones as a Hospital Clerk in the Department of Health. The Pay-roll Clerk stated that Mr. Jones had first been appointed as a Chaplain, and that when the Department's attention was called to the fact that the classification allowed them but one Chaplain, Mr. Jones was immediately reappointed to the position of Hospital Clerk. The matter was referred to Examiner Byrne for investigation.

A communication was presented from the Labor Bureau, dated April 12, recommending that the following-named eligible lists in Part III. of the Labor Class, which expire by limitation on July 1, 1905, be continued for another year, in view of the small number of appointments that have been made from same:

Hudson, No. 171 West Tenth street, New York City, candidate for the position of Mechanical Engineer, which application was received before the closing date, but returned by the Application Clerk because the applicant was employed in Washington, D. C., at the time of filing same. The Secretary stated that, upon the statement of Mr. Hudson that he was a resident of New York City and that he was merely temporarily employed in Washington, he had been given a conditional notice for the examination, subject to the approval of the Board. On motion, the granting of the conditional notice to Mr. Hudson was approved, and his application was accepted.

The application of Alexander Abrahams, No. 70 West One Hundred and Thirteenth street, candidate for the position of Structural Steel Draughtsman, was rejected on the ground that the candidate was not a citizen of the United States.

The leave of absence, without pay, for six months from April 1, 1905, granted Henry O. Dyer, Clerk in the Department of Education, was approved, it appearing from the doctor's certificate furnished that such leave of absence was granted because of illness.

A letter was presented from the Fire Commissioner, dated April 12, requesting an extension of the leave of absence, without pay, for six months, granted Michael Kennedy, Wheelwright, for one month from April 1. It appearing from the doctor's certificate furnished that Mr. Kennedy is still unable to report for duty, on motion, the additional leave of absence asked for was granted.

On the recommendation of the Chief Examiner, the report of the Board of Examiners for positions in the non-competitive class, Department of Education, dated April 1, was approved.

A letter was presented from the Assistant Secretary to the Mayor, dated April 11, transmitting a communication from one "James O'Connor," protesting against the proposed changes in the rules governing the rating of candidates for admission to the Police and Fire Departments, for the attention of the Commission. The Secretary was instructed to acknowledge the letter, and to state that the same had been placed on file.

A letter was presented from the Police Commissioner, dated April 10, asking for a re-rating of the record of James Edward, candidate in the recent examination for promotion to the rank of Roundsman, on the ground that the candidate was charged with a fine imposed during his probationary period, and inclosing a communication of the Corporation Counsel stating that, in his opinion, no fine or penalty inflicted during the probationary period of a Patrolman should be considered in the rating of his record in an examination for promotion. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Police Commissioner and state that the opinion of the Corporation Counsel was not retroactive, and the Commission could not therefore grant his request to rerate Mr. Edward's record; but that in all future examinations for promotion the Chief Examiner

would be instructed to be governed by the advice of the Corporation Counsel in the premises.

A communication was presented from the Fire Commissioner, dated April 11, transmitting copy of the opinion of the Corporation Counsel with reference to the method of examination to be adopted for the Firemen to be appointed in the boroughs of Richmond and Queens upon installing the "paid system" in lieu of the "volunteer system." The matter was referred to Commissioner Talley for consideration.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, dated April 13, requesting the Commission to proceed with the open competitive examination for the position of Clerk, Department of Taxes and Assessments, which had been scheduled some time previously and then postponed. The Secretary was directed to proceed at once with the examination.

A letter was presented from the Assistant Secretary of the Park Board requesting, on behalf of the Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, an examination for promotion from the position of Gardener in his Department to that of Head Gardener. The Secretary was directed to arrange an examination in which all persons who have served in the position of Gardener in said Department for a period of six months may compete.

A letter was presented from the Board of Education, dated April 4, requesting an examination for the position of Inspector of Heating and Ventilating. There being no such title in the classification the Secretary was instructed to proceed with an examination under the title of "Inspector of Light and Ventilation," and to confer with the Secretary of the Board of Education as to the qualifications desired in said position in order that the examination might conform to same.

A letter was presented from the Department of Public Charities, dated April 14, in answer to the communication from the Commission requesting that the title of Dennis Gerrity be changed to Apothecary in order that the same may conform more strictly to the duties he is at present performing, stating that as soon as the Department would have a \$1,200 grade established by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment Mr. Gerrity's title would be changed to Apothecary; and that the required change could not be made sooner for the reason that the highest grade now fixed for the position of Apothecary in that Department is \$1,050 per annum, while Mr. Gerrity is receiving a salary of \$1,200 per annum.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Public Works, Brooklyn, dated April 13, asking whether, under the Civil Service Rules, he may release Luke J. McElvoy, who was appointed an Inspector of Regulating, Grading and Paving on April 5, 1905, in his office, it being the desire of Mr. McElvoy to serve in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, to which Department he was certified by this office at the same time that he was certified to the Borough of Brooklyn. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Commissioner of Public Works and state that a request from the President of the Borough of The Bronx for Mr. McElvoy's transfer to his Department would be approved by the Commission.

A letter was presented from the Mayor, dated April 14, asking approval of a leave of absence, without pay, for three months from April 15, granted Samuel Brock, Clerk, in the Bureau of Licenses, it appearing from the doctor's certificate furnished that the leave of absence was granted on account of illness. On motion, same was approved.

The request of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated April 17, for an examination for promotion from the position of Junior Clerk to that of second grade Clerk, in his Department, was granted.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Brooklyn, dated April 17, requesting that Mr. Peter J. Farley, Transitman, be permitted to enter the supplementary examination for promotion to Assistant Engineer in his Department, to be held on the 27th inst. It appearing that Mr. Farley was notified to enter the regular examination held on April 7, but was ill on that date, request was granted.

The President was requested to communicate with the Department of Education and state that it is the understanding of the Commission that that Department has determined to inaugurate the system of employing Cleaners from the Civil Service eligible list for that position; that they will start the system immediately in the new schools, and will install the same in the schools now in course of construction, thereby putting the system into operation gradually; and to ask them to kindly report to the Commission, from time to time, the number of the schools in which they have adopted this plan, thereby keeping the Commission advised as to the progress made under the new system.

A letter was presented from the Department of Docks and Ferries, dated April 15, acknowledging receipt of the letter of the Commission under date of the 12th inst., relative to the alleged assignment of a number of Laborers in that Department to perform the duties of Watchmen, stating that the matter would be investigated and reported upon. The Secretary stated, in connection with the said letter, that the Secretary of the Dock Department had called upon him and stated that, upon investigation, he had found that the persons whose employment was complained of were not in any manner violating the Civil Service Law; that while they were employed at certain posts, which were claimed to be those of watching, they performed work of a laboring nature, such as mopping floors, cleaning windows, cuspidors, etc.; that they were also assigned to duty on the various pieces of floating property of the Department, such as pile drivers and scows, and that they were obliged to make fires, remove ashes, and keep the ropes, pike piles, etc., in readiness for resumption of work the day following; that men regularly employed under the title of Watchman would not perform any work not pertaining to that title, and that they would not labor in any manner, and consequently could not fill the positions described; that, at the present time, the rate of wages for Watchmen is 25 cents per hour, while that for Laborers is 31¼ cents per hour, a difference of 50 cents per day, and that the Department has seen fit to pay these men but the 25-cent rate.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to communicate a copy of the statement of Secretary Collins to the Civil Service Reform Association.

A letter was presented from the Secretary to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated April 15, in answer to the letter of the Commission stating that it had been alleged that a Laborer in that Department, one Thomas Roach, was performing the duties of a Watchman. The letter stated that the matter would be immediately investigated, and the head of the Bureau in which Mr. Roach is employed, notified to assign him to appropriate duties, in accordance with the Civil Service Law and Rules. The letter was ordered filed.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Bridges, dated April 13, requesting that the Commission except from examination, under Rule XIII, paragraph 6, Mr. Henry P. Morrison, Surveyor, to perform expert work, his compensation not to exceed the sum of \$250 in any one year.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That Mr. Henry P. Morrison, Surveyor, employed in the Department of Bridges, be and he is hereby excepted from examination under the provisions of Civil Service Rule XII., paragraph 6, it appearing that Mr. Morrison is a person engaged in private business, and that the services to be rendered are professional, scientific, technical and expert, and of an occasional and exceptional character; provided, however, that the amount of his compensation in any one year shall not exceed two hundred and fifty dollars.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, dated April 13, requesting that the classification of positions in his Department in the exempt class, be amended by including therein the positions of Superintendent of Ferries and Assistant Superintendent of Ferries. The Secretary was instructed to call a public hearing on the proposed amendment, in accordance with Civil Service Rule III.

A letter was presented from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated April 12, asking that the Commission open the examination for promotion to Transitman in his Department to the Rodmen employed therein, and that the Mechanical Draughtsmen in his office be permitted to enter the examination for promotion to Topographical Draughtsman. The latter request was denied, it being the opinion of the Chief Examiner that it would not be proper to allow the same. The Secretary was instructed to proceed with a supplementary examination for promotion from the position of Rodman to that of Transitman in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, it appearing that the regular examination had been held before the request of President Haffen was acted upon.

A letter was presented from the Police Department, dated April 11, in answer to the inquiry of the Commission, made at the request of the State Civil Service Commission, as to the maximum compensation to be allowed Mr. W. A. Colcord for instructing



the employees of the Police Department in the working of the machinery on the new launches, stating that Mr. Colcord's services would not be required, and that no further consideration of the matter was necessary. The Secretary was instructed to communicate the foregoing to the State Civil Service Commission.

On the recommendation of the Chief Examiner, the report of the Board of Examiners for Positions in the Non-competitive Class, Department of Health, for the month of March was approved.

A letter was presented from the Deputy and Acting Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated April 13, asking that an open competitive examination be held for the position of Measurer, and that, pending the establishment of the eligible list, he be permitted to employ, under the provisions of Civil Service Rule XII., paragraph 3, Messrs. Michael F. Fitzpatrick and Edward Lennon. The request was granted, and the Secretary was instructed to summon the persons nominated by the Commissioner for non-competitive examination, and, in the event of their passing the same, to certify them for employment, under the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 3.

A letter was presented from the Comptroller, dated April 14, requesting that a special examination be held for the position of Clerk with a knowledge of real estate and real estate law, and that, pending the establishment of the list, he be permitted to appoint provisionally, under Rule XII., paragraph 3. The matter was laid over.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Correction, dated April 13, requesting that an open competitive examination be held for the position of Physician, the eligible list for that position having been exhausted, and he having been unable to make a selection for appointment to the position at Riker's Island from the list for Medical Inspector, certified by the Commission as the most appropriate list. The request was denied, and the Secretary was directed to make further certification from the list for Medical Inspector.

The request of Alfred S. Burgess, No. 1822 Anthony avenue, that he be restored to eligibility for certification for appointment to the position of Assistant Engineer, at the rate of \$1,800 per annum, was granted, it appearing from Mr. Burgess's statement that he declined appointment at that salary in the office of the President of the Borough of Queens on account of location.

The request of George H. Thomas, No. 248 South Third street, Brooklyn, that he be restored to the eligible list for Janitor, was denied, he having declined appointment in the Borough of Brooklyn on March 2, 1905, on the score of "location."

The request of Patrick T. McCooney, Fort Slocum, that he be permitted to waive appointment as Fireman for a year, was presented for consideration. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. McCooney and state that there is no provision in the rules allowing a candidate to waive certification, but that any time during the term of eligibility of the list the Fire Commissioner requests certification of his name the same will be certified.

The request of Mrs. Mary E. Skelly, No. 135 Sands street, Brooklyn, that she be given a special examination for the position of Cleaner, Board of Education, was granted, upon her affidavit that she notified the Commission of her change of address from No. 155 Withers street, Brooklyn, to No. 135 Sands street, Brooklyn, but that her notice of examination was sent to her old address, and the records of this office showing that it was returned marked "not found."

The request of Patrick McGuire, No. 174 Graham street, Brooklyn, that his name be placed upon the preferred list for Laborer, was granted, it appearing from the doctor's certificate furnished that he was unable to respond when certified because of illness.

A letter was presented from the People's Security Company, dated April 11, with further reference to the alleged illegality of the employment of Charles Jamar in the Department of Correction. The letter was ordered filed.

The request of Millard Hewes, Laborer, employed in the Department of Bridges, that his name be placed upon the preferred list, for the reason that he is ill and unable at the present time to perform his duties, was denied, for lack of power.

An affidavit was presented from Mason H. Sheffield, No. 500 Herkimer street, Brooklyn, candidate for the position of Mechanical Engineer, setting forth the fact that he filled out his application for the position and mailed the same in a sealed envelope, properly stamped and addressed, during the time advertised for the receipt of such applications. It appearing that the application was never received at the office of the Commission, the candidate had been granted a conditional notice to enter the examination. On motion, the action of the President in granting a conditional notice was approved, and Mr. Sheffield was instructed to fill out and file a duplicate application.

A communication was presented from John Elwood, candidate for the position of Patrolman, protesting against being debarred from taking the examination on account of being over thirty years of age. It appeared that the candidate reached his thirtieth year on March 25, 1905, and, therefore, was not notified for his physical examination. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. Elwood and state that the law provides that the name of no candidate shall be placed on the eligible list who is over thirty years of age.

A communication was presented from Michael Conyngham, No. 611 Mott avenue, The Bronx, dated April 12, protesting against the fact that the Commission refused to certify him for appointment in the City service. He having been dismissed from the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx for cause, on December 5, 1903, the Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. Conyngham and call his attention to the provisions of Civil Service Rule VII., paragraph 14.

The President was requested to communicate with the Reform Association and state that the Commission does not see the advisability of taking such action at the present time.

The action of the President in granting the request of William J. McCaffery, No. 738 St. Ann's avenue, Borough of The Bronx, that he be permitted to change the date of his birth on his application for Patrolman, upon presentation of a birth certificate, was approved, it appearing that when Mr. McCaffery was certified to the Police Department there was a discrepancy between the date given by him at that time and that set forth on his application.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
