Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:
From March 22 to April 4, inclusive, eighty-eight operations were performed at
Bellevue Hospital, twelve at Gouverneur Hospital, twenty-five at Harlem Hospital
and thirty-five at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the attending Surgeons or their Assistants were present.

The lowest estimate received for furnishing plants, shrubs and trees at Harlem and Fordham hospitals is that of Siebrecht & Son, which is \$658.07 for Harlem Hos-

and Fordham hospitals is that of Siebrecht & Son, which is \$058.07 for Hariem Hospital and \$939.24 for Fordham Hospital.

Messrs. William Horne & Co., who have the contract to provide dressing rooms at Harlem Hospital, at a cost of \$390, submit a claim for \$60 additional, having found on removing the closets that the walls were plastered in the rough. This makes necessary replastering instead of patching the plastering, which was called for in the specifications. specifications.

It is recommended that the Board of Health be notified that the swamp north of Fordham Hospital is a breeding spot for mosquitos and a serious nuisance to the

hospital.

On March 26 the Police Commissioner issued an order, No. 22, that nursing children are not to be separated from their mothers who are prisoners, but are all to be brought to Bellevue Hospital. As this is impracticable, and as prisoners who are not sick are not eligible for admission, it is recommended that the attention of the Police Commissioner be invited to this matter, as such children could be sent to the House of Detention.

Authority is requested to have an officer of the United States Marine Hospital

Service study mental diseases in the psychopathic wards, under the direction of our resident Alienist, who approves of the plan.

It is recommended that the Board of Aldermen be requested to authorize the purchase in the open market of three ambulances, at a cost not to exceed \$2,100.

The mangles of the American Laundry Machinery Company placed in Harlem and Fordham hospitals are very unsatisfactory because of faulty installation, and it is recommended that the contractors of each hospital take the matter up.

It is recommended that the salary of the Chief Cook at Bellevue Hospital be increased from \$65 to \$75 a month, the amount paid to chief cooks in all State hospitals. He has served here for eighteen years and has charge of the preparation of all food for patients and Orderlies. It is further recommended that the salary of the Helper in charge of the patients' clothes room be increased from \$25 to \$30 a month, and that a woman Helper be placed in charge of the women's clothing, at a salary of \$25 a month. The Registrar of the Out-Patient Department (a Nurse) asks for an increase in her salary from \$40 to \$50 a month.

In January, 1906, the Supervising Nurses of the hospitals were directed to have fire drills every fortnight. These drills were carried into effect at the time, but on moving into the new fireproof buildings the system went into abeyance. The Nurses have been directed to resume the drills, and an employee from Bellevue has been
