DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING FEBRUARY 14, 1914.

COMMON DRINKING CUPS, ROLLER TOWELS AND THE FREE LUNCH FORK.

Attention having been called to the fact that the Board of Health regulations with respect to common drinking cups and roller towels are not being observed as they should be, Commissioner Goldwater is taking steps to secure fuller compliance with the department regulations. Letters have been sent to those found violating the sections of the Sanitary Code with respect to drinking cups and roller towels, warning them that a continuance of the offense will render the offender liable to arrest and prosecution.

In this connection it may be stated that the Department is also contemplating action against the use of common forks at the saloon free lunch counters. Investigation has shown that forks, used by one person in eating, from a common dish, food such as hash, potato salad, sauerkraut, etc., are returned after using to a glass containing some cold water only, to be picked up and used in the same way by succeeding persons.

This very personal tool thus comes into more or less intimate contact with the saliva of the mouth and the mucous membrane of the tongue and lips.

In view of the fact that disease-producing bacteria, some of them a most virulent kind, may be present in secretions of the mouth and throat, it is deemed important to prohibit this common use of such eating utensils. In an examination of the common barroom fork, undertaken sometime ago in Louisville, disease germs were found in thirteen out of sixteen specimens examined. It is suggested that the food at such lunch counters be prepared beforehand in the form of sandwiches, etc., and handed out to the individual, or else each customer be given food on a plate with individual utensils, and that these utensils be thoroughly washed after using.

DISEASE AMONG BAKERS.

In accordance with the law requiring the examination of bakers, over 3,500 employees of the National Biscuit Company have recently been examined by the Medical Officer of the company, in co-operation with the Department of Health. The examination disclosed a remarkably small amount of disease, and while it was made with special reference to pulmonary tuberculosis, other conditions were noted. The result is shown in the following table:

This report is very encouraging to those interested in public health work, and is strong evidence of the growing appreciation by large employers of labor of the importance of systematic examination of their employees. The organization of such "welfare work" is not only of great value to both employer and employee, but also to the community in general.

INSPECTION FOR CONTAGION IN PUBLIC, PAROCHIAL AND OTHER FREE SCHOOLS, LAST QUARTER, 1913.

The Bureau of Child Hygiene, through its Division of School Medical Inspection, maintains a corps of Medical Inspectors and Nurses, one of whose duties is to safeguard the school children against the spread of infectious diseases.

Upon the daily visit to each school the Inspector or Nurse carefully inspects for evidence of infectious diseases all pupils who have been sent to the examining room by the teachers. Once a month a "routine inspection" is made, when the entire school is inspected, the pupils passing before the Examiner in an orderly procession. Pupils, apparently ill with contagious diseases such as scarlet fever, measles, etc., are recommended to the Principal for exclusion, their name and address being referred to the Bureau of Infectious Diseases, for further supervision in the homes.

Pupils with contagious eye and skin diseases are instructed by the Nurse, and also by pamphlets, as to proper treatment. Exclusions from school are recommended only when the pupil is a menace to other scholars, or no endeavor is made by parents or guardians to remedy the trouble. The pupil is permitted to return to school when the condition is improved.

The following tables summarize this work for the last quarter of 1913. The number of inspections of pupils is much greater than the total enrollment, due, as noted above, to the routine inspection made each month. Such summaries will hereafter be published regularly, each quarter, exactly the same form of table being used.



Seventh—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Eighth—All construction which shall be made under this grant shall be done in a manner solely upon the terms and conditions hereafter to be imposed by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, or their respective successors in authority. The said Company shall submit a working plan of construction to the said President and to the said Commissioner, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said pipes or conduits, connections, manholes and other appurtenances to the mode of protection of all subsurface construction under the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Ninth—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the pipes or conduits of the Company, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Tenth—It is agreed that the right hereby granted shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said pipes or conduits in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the pipes, conduits and appurtenances in the manner directed by the officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Eleventh—The Company shall bear the expense of keeping in repair for one year after it has been replaced, all pavement which may at any time be removed by said Company, either for the purpose of construction or for the repairing of the pipes or conduits and the appurtenances thereof.

Twelfth—The Company shall bear the expense of inspection which may be required by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and of all work of construction.

Thirteenth—The Company shall cause a test to be made of the pipes hereby authorized whether laid within conduits or separately whenever required by and under the supervision of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The conditions of such test shall be as follows:

(a) If the test be made in the foundry where the pipes are manufactured, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of three hundred (300) pounds per square inch.

(b) If the test be made in the field, of pipes in use or ready for use, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of two hundred (200) pounds per square inch.

A certificate showing that such a test has been made without injury to the pipes shall be executed by an officer of the Company, and indorsed by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and filed with the Board.

Fourteenth—The Company shall not charge consumers more than the following rates:

(a) Consumers making monthly contracts:

Four (4) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes not over 500 cubic feet.

Two (2) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of over 500 cubic feet, but less than 1,500 cubic feet.

One (1) cent per month per cubic foot for boxes of 1,500 cubic feet and over.

(b) Consumers making yearly contracts:

Fifteen (15) cents per year per cubic foot of box.

These rates shall not apply to boxes located above the first floor of any building, nor to boxes located within the Washington Market. Should District No. 1 be extended to include Washington Market, the Company shall furnish refrigeration to consumers located within the market at reasonable rates to be fixed by the Board.

During the term of this contract the Board shall have absolute power to regulate the maximum rates, provided that such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Fifteenth—The Company, upon the application for refrigeration of any person, firm or corporation whose premises are located within District No. 1, or if such district be extended, as hereinbefore provided, then within such extended district shall extend its pipes or conduits to such premises and furnish to such applicant refrigeration at the rates herein prescribed, or at such rates as may be hereafter fixed by the Board, as herein provided. The Company shall not be required, however, to furnish refrigeration to applicants whose premises are located above the first floor of any building.

17. Quantity furnished to outside consumers.

Nineteenth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from the privileges granted under this contract, and on or before February 1 in each year shall make a verified report to the Comptroller of The City of New York of the business done by the Company for the year ending December 31 next preceding, as may be prescribed. Such report shall contain the number of feet of pipe and conduit laid and the number of manholes constructed during the year, and also a statement of the gross receipts from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers, together with such other information and in such detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-first—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained or with any orders of the Board, acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten days, to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the pipes and conduits constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-first—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its pipes, conduits and appurtenances as herein provided, in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of fifty dollars (\$50), as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such pipes, conduits or appurtenances which may affect the surface of the streets, shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sum may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-second—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the pipes or conduits authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Twenty-third—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board, acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, the repairs of the street pavement and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions, or compliance with such orders, or either of any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after the default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any notice or direction of the Board, or other municipal officials, given or made, pursuant to the terms of the contract, or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force in such case and in any of these events, the Company shall pay to the City a penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100) for each violation, which sums may be deducted from said fund.
