Report of the Committee on Apportionment—

No. 578.

May 26th, 1916.

To the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Sirs—Your Committee on Apportionment of Assembly Districts, appointed by the Board to prepare and report to it a plan of division into Assembly Districts of the Counties comprised within The City of New York, hereby reports and recommends for adoption by the Board an appended description of the Assembly Districts of the several Counties.

The Committee has gone into this matter very thoroughly, and has made a careful calculation of the requirements as to population laid down by the Act. In order to strictly comply with the law, it has been necessary to make an arbitrary layout which, in a few instances, has been objected to by district representatives who appeared before the Committee, but the Committee feels that the general plan, which it here presents, is one which is most equitable under all the circumstances. It has been necessary to proceed with this work as rapidly as possible in order that the layout may be in the possession of the Board of Elections at the earliest moment, so that that Board may not be hampered, but rather aided, in its work of making the required changes in election districts which are demanded by the reapportionment, and getting ready the enormous mass of printing resulting from so many changes in district lines.

The Committee believes that its deliberations have worked out the best possible result, and it, therefore, recommends the adoption of the plan of division into Assembly Districts herewith submitted.

Whereas, Article three of the Constitution of the State of New York provides that in any city embracing an entire county and having no board of supervisors, the body exercising the powers of a common council shall assemble at such times as the Legislature making an apportionment of Assembly Districts in the State shall prescribe, and divide any such county into Assembly Districts as nearly equal in number of inhabitants, excluding aliens, as may be of convenient and contiguous territory, in as compact form as practicable, each of which shall be wholly within a Senate District formed under the same apportionment, and are to be equal in number to the members of Assembly to which such county shall be entitled, and

Whereas, by the provisions of chapter 373 of the Laws of 1916 it is made the duty of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York to meet on the 23d day of May, 1916, and proceed to divide the respective counties in such City into so many Assembly Districts as they are entitled respectively to Members of Assembly under said law, therefore be it

Resolved, pursuant to article 3, section 5 of the Constitution of the State of New York, and the provisions of chapter three hundred and seventy-three of the Laws of 1916, the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York do hereby divide the several counties respectively within such city into Assembly Districts, numbered, bounded and described as hereinafter specified.

Resolved, That certificates be prepared to be duly filed, signed by a majority of the Aldermen of said city, stating the number and descriptive boundary lines of each Assembly District, with the number of inhabitants therein, exclusive of aliens.

New York County.

First district. The first assembly district shall consist of that portion of the thirteenth senate district within and bounded by a line beginning at the junction of the Hudson River and Canal Street, and running thence along Canal Street to West Broadway, along West Broadway to Grand Street, along Grand Street to Broadway, along Broadway to Broome Street, along Broome Street to Forsyth Street, along Forsyth Street to Stanton Street, along Stanton Street to Chrystie Street, along Chrystie Street to Second Avenue, along Second Avenue to East Third Street, along

East Third Street to Great Jones Street, along Great Jones Street to West Third Street, along West Third Street to Sixth Avenue, along Sixth Avenue to West Washington Place, along West Washington Place to West Fourth Street, along West Fourth Street to Christopher Street, along Christopher Street to Bleecker Street, along Bleecker Street to Eighth Avenue, along Eighth Avenue to West Twelfth Street, along West Twelfth Street to Greenwich Avenue, along Greenwich Avenue to Eighth Avenue, along Eighth Avenue to West Nineteenth Street, along West Nineteenth Street to Hudson River, and thence along the Hudson River to Canal Street, the place of beginning.

81,363 inhabitants, excluding aliens.

Second district. The second assembly district shall consist of that portion of the thirteenth senate district within and bounded by a line beginning at the junction of the East River and Jackson Street, and running thence along Jackson Street to Madison Street, along Madison Street to Gouverneur Street, along Gouverneur Street to Grand Street, along Grand Street to Clinton Street, along Clinton Street to East Broadway, along East Broadway to Canal Street, along Canal Street to Chrystie Street, along Chrystie Street to Broome Street, along Broome Street to Broadway, along Broadway to Grand Street, along Grand Street to West Broadway, along West Broadway to Canal Street, along Canal Street to the Hudson River and along the Hudson River and around the southern end of Manhattan Island to the East River; thence along the East River to Jackson Street, the place of beginning, including Governor's, Bedloe's, Ellis and Oyster Islands.

81,363 inhabitants, excluding aliens.

Third district. The third assembly district shall consist of that portion of the twelfth senate district within and bounded by a line beginning at the corner of Canal and Chrystie Streets, along Canal Street to Ludlow Street; thence along Ludlow Street to East Houston Street, along East Houston Street to Avenue A, along Avenue A to East Ninth Street, along East Ninth Street to First Avenue, along First Avenue to East Thirteenth Street, along East Thirteenth Street to Second Avenue, along Second Avenue to East Fourteenth Street, along East Fourteenth Street to Fourth Avenue, along Fourth Avenue to Astor Place, along Astor Place to Lafayette Street, along Lafayette Street to Great Jones Street, along Great Jones Street to East Third Street, along East Third Street to Second Avenue, along Second Avenue to Chrystie Street, along Chrystie Street to Stanton Street, along Stanton Street to Forsyth Street, along Forsyth Street to Broome Street, along Broome Street to Chrystie Street, along Chrystie Street to Canal Street, the place of beginning.

55,258 inhabitants, excluding aliens.

Fourth district. The fourth assembly district shall consist of that portion of the twelfth senate district within and bounded by a line beginning at the junction of the East river and Jackson street and running thence along Jackson street to Madison street; along Madison street to Gouverneur street; along Gouverneur street to Grand street; along Grand street to Clinton street; along Clinton street to East Broadway; along East Broadway to Canal street; along Canal street to Ludlow street; along Ludlow street to East Houston street; along East Houston street to Attorney street; along Attorney street to Stanton street; thence along Stanton street to the East river and along the East river to the foot of Jackson street, the place of beginning.

54,091 inhabitants, excluding aliens.

Fifth district. The fifth assembly district shall consist of that portion of the seventeenth senate district within and bounded by a line beginning at the corner of Sixth avenue and West Third street; thence along West Third street and Great Jones street to Lafayette street; along Lafayette street to Astor place; along Astor place to Fourth avenue; along Fourth avenue to East Fourteenth street; along East Fourteenth street to Irving place; along Irving place to East Eighteenth street; along East Eighteenth street to Third avenue; along Third avenue to East Twenty-third street; along East Twenty-third street to Lexington avenue; along Lexington avenue to East Fifty-fifth street; along East Fifty-fifth street to Park avenue; along Park avenue to East Fifty-fourth street; along East Fifty-fourth street to Eighth avenue; along Eighth avenue to West Thirty-eighth street; along West Thirty-eighth street to Seventh avenue; along Seventh avenue to West Thirtieth street; along West Thirtieth street to Greenwich avenue; along Greenwich avenue to West Twelfth street; along West Twelfth street to Eighth avenue; along Eighth avenue to Bleecker street; along Bleecker street to Christopher street; along Christopher street to West Fourth street; along West Fourth street to West Washington place; along West Washington place to Sixth avenue, and along Sixth avenue to West Third street, the place of beginning.

Seventh district. 81,670 inhabitants, excluding aliens.

Tenth district. The tenth assembly district shall consist of that portion of the fourteenth senate district within and bounded by a line beginning at the junction of the East river and East Thirty-first street; thence along East Thirty-first street to Second avenue; along Second avenue to East Thirtieth street; along East Thirtieth street to Lexington avenue; along Lexington avenue to East Fifty-sixth street; along East Fifty-sixth street to Third avenue; along Third avenue to East Fifty-third street; along East Fifty-third street to First avenue; along First avenue to East Fifty-fourth street; thence along East Fifty-fourth street to the East river,

and along the East river to the foot of East Thirty-first street, the place of beginning, also Blackwell's island.

54,967 inhabitants, excluding aliens.

Eleventh district. The eleventh assembly district shall consist of that portion of the seventeenth senate district within and bounded by a line beginning at the junction of the Hudson river and West Seventy-first street; along West Seventy-first street to West End avenue; along West End avenue to West Seventieth street; along West Seventieth street to Amsterdam avenue; along Amsterdam avenue to West Sixty-fourth street; along West Sixty-fourth street to Columbus avenue; along Columbus avenue to West Seventieth street; along West Seventieth street to Central park west; along Central park west to West Eighty-third street; along West Eighty-third street to Columbus avenue; along Columbus avenue to West Ninety-third street; along West Ninety-third street to Central park west; along Central park west to West Ninety-eighth street; along West Ninety-eighth street to Broadway; along Broadway to West Ninety-first street; along West Ninety-first street to the Hudson river, thence along the Hudson river to the foot of West Seventy-first street and the Hudson river, the place of beginning.

54,288 inhabitants, excluding aliens.

Twelfth district. The twelfth assembly district shall consist of that portion of the fourteenth senate district within and bounded by a line beginning at the East river and Fifty-fourth street; thence along East Fifty-fourth street to First avenue; along First avenue to East Fifty-third street; along East Fifty-third street to Third avenue; along Third avenue to East Seventy-third street; along East Seventy-third street to Second avenue; along Second avenue to East Seventy-fourth street; along East Seventy-fourth street to First avenue; along First avenue to East Seventy-third street; thence along East Seventy-third street to the East river, and along the East river to the foot of East Fifty-fourth street, the point or place of beginning.

55,042 inhabitants, excluding aliens.

Thirteenth district. The thirteenth assembly district shall consist of that portion of the seventeenth senate district within and bounded by a line beginning at the junction of Eighth avenue and West Fifty-fourth street; thence along West and East Fifty-fourth street to Park avenue; along Park avenue to East Fifty-fifth street; along East Fifty-fifth street to Lexington avenue; along Lexington avenue to East Fifty-sixth street; along East Fifty-sixth street to Third avenue; along Third avenue to East Seventy-fourth street; along East Seventy-fourth street to Lexington avenue; along Lexington avenue to East Ninety-seventh street; along East Ninety-seventh street to Park avenue; along Park avenue to East One Hundred and Second street; along East One Hundred and Second street to Fifth avenue; along Fifth avenue to Ninety-seventh street; thence through the transverse road across Central park to Central park west; along Central park west to West Ninety-third street; along West Ninety-third street to Columbus avenue; along Columbus avenue to West Eighty-third street; along West Eighty-third street to Central park west; thence along Central park west and Eighth avenue to West Fifty-fourth street, the place of beginning.

Dear Sir—I request that a resolution be adopted by the Board, authorizing the acquirement, for Municipal purposes, in the care and under the jurisdiction of the Bureau of Street Cleaning of the President of the Borough of Richmond, either by purchase or by condemnation proceedings, a strip of land on the westerly side of Tompkins Avenue, Rosebank, adjoining the property now owned by The City of New York, and occupied by a Refuse Destructor.

This strip of land lies between another piece of property which was purchased by the City, for the use of this Department, on March 30, 1914, for the sum of \$5,500, and the street frontage on Tompkins Avenue. At that time a proceeding for the opening of Rosebank Avenue (Tompkins Avenue) was under way, which showed the taking of this strip of land into the avenue, so that the parcel of land purchased on March 30, 1914, had a frontage on Rosebank Avenue but none on Tompkins Avenue.

It is estimated that there will be required for the remainder of the year 287 pairs of boots, the cost of which at the rate of \$5.50 per pair will be \$1,578.50.

Sir—Under date of February 4, 1916, I wrote your honorable board as follows: "I have the honor to request that your Board authorize an issue of Revenue Bonds in the sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000) Dollars for the raising and alteration of quarters of Engine Co. 253, located in 86th Street near 24th Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn. This is made necessary by reason of the improvements in 86th Street which embrace the change of grade of approximately four feet.

"This department has been compelled to temporarily abandon these quarters and lease quarters for this company at the corner of 25th and Harway Avenues at an annual rental of \$1,800.00. Plans showing proposed work, together with itemized estimate of cost, have been submitted to the Bureau of Contract Supervision of the Board of Estimate, who have approved same but recommend that the charges be made by an issue of Revenue Bonds instead of Corporate Stock, and I accordingly make the present application.

"As this building will not be available for use until these changes and alterations are made, I respectfully urge your Board to take as prompt action as possible upon this request, so that it will not be necessary to maintain this company in these quarters any longer than is absolutely necessary."

On February 23, 1916, the Board of Aldermen adopted a resolution authorizing the issue of special revenue bonds in the amount requested.

Bids were opened for this work on May 24, 1916, and the total of the three lowest bids on the contracts amounted to \$15,406.00. As may be seen the amount requested was not sufficient to cover the work. This is accounted for by the great advance in the cost of labor and material.

A modification will be made in the plans, which will cut down the cost, it is estimated, to about \$14,000.00. It is, requested therefore that you authorize an issue of \$4,000.00 revenue bonds in addition to the amount already issued to cover the cost of this work, the importance of which you are familiar with. Board of Elections of the City of New York, General Office, Municipal Building, Manhattan, New York, May 26th, 1916.

Honorable Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, City Hall, Manhattan:

Gentlemen—The Board of Elections of the City of New York, requests permission to contract for the reproduction of signature copies of the registers of the various election districts within the City of New York, without the necessity of public letting, for a price not to exceed for the first copy forty cents per page, where a second copy is necessary fifteen cents per page, and where a third copy is required four cents per page, together with ninety cents per book for binding the same with fibre board.

This work has to be completed in time for use at the polls on Primary Day, September 19th, 1916, of the signature copies of the registers throughout the city where election districts have to (under the new amendments to the election law) be rearranged to contain as near as may be 400 voters.

As near as can be estimated now, there will be between 80,000 and 90,000 pages to be reproduced. The time is limited in which to complete this work, which cannot be commenced until action is taken by your Honorable Board in appropriating the assembly districts within the five counties of the Greater City, and there are only a very few firms in the reproducing line who could possibly handle the kind of work involved in the rearrangement.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:
Section 1, paragraph a of subdivision 6 of section 215 of article 16 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to signs and showbills, and particularly to illuminated signs, is hereby amended to read as follows:

6. Restrictions. a. No illuminated sign shall extend more than 8 feet from the building line, except that on authorized marquis awnings the illuminated signs may extend the entire length and width of the awning, but not more than two feet above nor one foot below said awning; nor shall any such sign be less than ten feet in the clear above the level of the sidewalk beneath the same.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 604 of article 29, and section 554 of Article 32 of chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances known as the Building Code, in relation to the registration of plumbers.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Sec. 1. Sec. 604 of article 29 of chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 604. Registration of plumbers. a. Once in each year every employing or master plumber carrying on his trade, business or calling in the city shall register his name and address at the office of the bureau of buildings in the borough of the said city in which he performs work, under such rules as the said bureau may prescribe. Such registration may be cancelled by the superintendent of buildings for a violation of the rules and regulations for plumbing or drainage of such city duly adopted, or in force pursuant to the provisions of this article, or whenever the person so registered ceases to hold a certificate from the examining board of plumbers or to be actually engaged in the business of master or employing plumber, after a hearing had before said superintendent, upon prior notice of not less than ten days.

b. No person, corporation or copartnership shall engage in or carry on the trade, business or calling of employing or master plumber in the city unless the name and address of such person and the president, secretary or treasurer of the corporation, or of each and every member of the copartnership shall have been registered as above provided.

c. It shall be unlawful for any person, corporation or copartnership in the city of New York, unless said person, corporation or copartnership shall have complied with the requirements of this section, to hold him or themselves out to the public as a master or employing plumber by the use of the word "plumber" or "plumbing," or words of similar import or meaning, on signs, cards, stationery or in any other manner whatsoever.

d. It shall be unlawful for any person, corporation or copartnership in the city of New York to engage in or carry on the trade, business or calling of employing or master plumber, unless such person, corporation or copartnership has conspicuously posted in the window of the place where such business is conducted, a metal plate or sign appropriately lettered or marked "licensed plumber," in accordance with rules adopted by the superintendent of buildings.

e. No person, corporation or copartnership registered as provided in this section, or who holds a certificate from the examining board of plumbers, shall, for the benefit of any person engaged in the plumbing business who is not so registered, apply for, receive or make use of, any permit granted to him by reason of being so registered, or holding such certificate from the examining board of plumbers.

Section 2. Section 654 of Article 32 of Chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by adding a subdivision to be known as subdivision 2a, to read as follows:

2a. Violations of the provisions for the registration of plumbers. Any person, corporation or copartnership violating any of the provisions of sec. 604 of this chapter relating to the registration of plumbers shall be fined for such offense in a sum not exceeding two hundred and fifty dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding three months, or by both, and in addition, shall forfeit any certificate of registration that may be held at the time of such conviction, provided, however, that when such violation is for the provision relating to the posting of a metal plate, no penalty for imprisonment shall be imposed, and the fine shall not exceed fifty dollars for the first offense, but not less than one hundred nor more than five hundred dollars for a subsequent offense.

Section 3. The provisions of this ordinance shall take effect immediately.

An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances by Adding Thereto a New Article Relating to Massage Establishments, Their Proprietors, Managers and Employees.

By Alderman Wendel—

AN ORDINANCE to amend chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances by adding thereto a new article relating to massage establishments, their proprietors, managers and employees.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, as follows:
Section 1. Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by adding thereto a new article, to be article 15 thereof, to read as follows:

Article 15.

Massage Establishments.

- Section 180. Definition.
181. Qualifications of applications for licenses.
182. License fee and term.
183. License Certificate.
184. Restriction.
185. Attendants.
186. Exemptions.
187. Violations.

§180. Definition.

All massage parlors, institutes, institutions, or other places where manual or mechanical massage or similar treatment is applied, except barber shops, ladies' hair-dressing establishments and Russian, Turkish or Roman bath-houses, which are known and established as such, shall be deemed to be massage establishments within the terms of this article. No one shall keep, conduct or maintain a massage establishment, after August 1st, 1916, who is not duly licensed thereto as hereinafter provided.

§181. Qualification of applicants for licenses.

Every person desiring to commence or to continue the practice of manual or mechanical massage, or similar treatment, or who shall open a massage parlor, institute or institution or other place, where manual or mechanical massage, or similar treatment is given, after August 1st, 1916, shall present to the commissioner of licenses a diploma issued to him or to her by an incorporated and regularly conducted college or school of manual or mechanical massage, or similar treatment, having a course lasting at least 10 months and a faculty of not less than 6 duly licensed doctors of medicine and surgery, or a like number of duly licensed doctors or practitioners of osteopathy, whose signatures must appear on such diploma, setting forth that the student has been instructed and is duly qualified in the following subjects: anatomy, physiology, hygiene, masso-therapy, mechano-therapy, electro-therapy, hydro-therapy, naturopathy, chiro-practice, neuropathy, dietetics, suggestive therapeutics and the theory and practice of manual and mechanical massage or similar treatments. The applicant shall also file with the commissioner a certificate that he or she is of good moral character, signed by not less than 3 duly licensed doctors of medicine and surgery or a like number of duly licensed doctors or practitioners of osteopathy.

§182. License fee and term.

The annual fee for each license granted and issued under the provisions of this article shall be \$5. All such licenses shall be issued as of August 1st of each year, and shall expire on the 31st day of July next succeeding the date of the issue thereof.

§183. License certificate.

Each person to whom a license shall be granted under the provisions of this article shall receive a certificate thereof, in such form and style as may be prescribed by the commissioner of licenses. Such certificates shall be re-issued on each renewal of the license and shall be constantly displayed in a conspicuous place upon the licensed premises.

§184. Restriction.

No person to whom a license shall have been issued under the provisions of this article shall apply manual or mechanical massage, or similar treatment, at any other place than that specified in such license nor shall the licensee continue such applications after his or her license thereto shall have expired, or shall have been suspended or revoked.

§185. Attendants.

The provisions of this article shall not apply to attendants over the age of 21 years, regularly employed in massage establishments, duly licensed under the provisions hereof; provided, however, that the employment in any establishment licensed hereunder of any attendant who is under the age of 21 years, or is of lewd or immoral character, shall be good cause for the revocation of the license of such establishment.

§186. Exemptions.

The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to doctors of medicine and surgery, nor to doctors or practitioners of osteopathy, duly licensed to practice as such under the laws of the State of New York.

§187. Violations.

Any person who shall violate any provision of this article shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not more than \$250, or by imprisonment for not exceeding 60 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment. Subject to the exceptions contained in §§ 180 and 185 of this article, the application or any offering or advertisement to apply manual or mechanical massage, or any similar treatment, or the public representation that he or she is qualified or lawfully authorized to apply massage, or any similar treatment, by a person not licensed to conduct or maintain a massage establishment, as provided in this article, shall be deemed to be a violation of the provisions hereof.

Section 2. Section 1 of article 1 of chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

§1. When required.
In addition to the business, places, trades, occupations and things required to be licensed by statute or by other chapters of this code, the following must be duly licensed, as herein provided, namely:

- Billiard and pool tables.
- Bowling alleys.
- Dealers in second-hand articles.
- Dirt carts.
- Drivers or chauffeurs of hacks, cabs, taxicabs and expresses.
- Expresses and expressmen.
- Exterior hoists.
- Hacks, cabs and taxicabs.
- Hand organs.
- Itinerant musicians.
- Junk dealers.
- Massage establishments.
- Peddlers, hawkers and venders.
- Public carts and cartmen.
- Public porters.
- Shooting galleries.
- Street musicians.
- Stands within stoop lines and under the stairs of elevated or subway stations.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The Committee on Buildings, to which was referred on May 23, 1916 (Minutes, page 696), the annexed ordinance to amend section 604 of article 29, chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances, known as the Building Code, relating particularly to registration of plumbers, respectfully

REPORTS:

That the committee has been advised to withhold action pending the introduction of a more definite amendment. It, therefore, recommends that this matter be placed on file.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 604 of article 29, chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances known as the Building Code, in relating particularly to registration of plumbers.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Sec. 1. Sec. 604 of article 29 of chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances, known as the Building Code, relating to registration of plumbers, is hereby repealed in its entirety, and in the place and stead thereof the following be inserted:

Sec. 2. Annual registration of plumbers in bureau of buildings. (a) Once in each year every employing or master plumber carrying on his trade, business or calling in The City of New York, shall register his name and address at the office of the bureau of buildings in the borough of the said city in which he performs work, under such rules and regulations as the said bureau prescribes, and thereupon he shall be entitled to receive a certificate of such registration from said bureau, if, at the time of applying for such registration he holds a certificate from the examining board of plumbers of said city, and is a citizen of the United States. Each person obtaining such certificate from the examining board of plumbers after the date fixed by the bureau of buildings for registration, may, however, register with the bureau of buildings within thirty days after the issuance of such certificate. Such registration may be cancelled by the superintendent of buildings for a violation of the rules and regulations for plumbing or drainage of such city duly adopted, or in force pursuant to the provisions of this section, or whenever the person so registered ceases to hold a certificate from the examining board of plumbers or to be actually engaged in the business of master or employing plumber, after a hearing had before said superintendent, upon prior notice of not less than ten days.

(b) The plumbing and drainage of all buildings, both public and private in The City of New York, shall conform to the rules and regulations lawfully adopted by the superintendents of buildings of the various boroughs. Said rules and regulations hereafter adopted, and any changes thereof, shall be published in the City Record on eight successive Mondays before they shall become operative. Suitable drawings and descriptions of plumbing and drainage shall in all cases be submitted and placed on file in the bureau of buildings of the borough in which the work is to be performed, and the same shall not be commenced or proceeded with until the said drawings and descriptions shall have been so filed and approved by the superintendent of buildings. Repairs and alterations of plumbing or drainage may be made without the filing and approval of drawings and descriptions in the bureau of buildings, where such repairs and alterations do not include the use of new vertical or horizontal lines of soil, waste, vent or leader pipes. Notice of such repairs or alterations, however, shall be given to the said bureau before they are commenced, in accordance with the rules and regulations of said bureau. The superintendents of buildings shall have power to require sworn statements from persons registering under the provisions of this act before granting any permit to proceed with the work.

(c) The bureau of buildings in each borough is hereby charged with the enforcement of the provisions of this section and the next succeeding section, and in addition to such officers or employees as are now provided by law, the superintendent of buildings may appoint inspectors of plumbing, when appropriation for the salaries of the same shall have been duly made. Inspectors of plumbing shall, under the direction of the superintendents of buildings, in addition to their other duties, ascertain whether persons performing plumbing work in the city of New York are registered, as in this section provided, and shall file written reports in the bureau as to their investigations.

Sec. 3. Carrying on business of plumber without registration punishable by fine or imprisonment. (a) It shall not be lawful for any person, co-partnership or corporation to engage in, perform, or carry on the trade, business or calling of employing or master plumber in the city of New York unless such person, or each member of such co-partnership or corporation shall have been registered as provided in the foregoing section.

(b) It shall be unlawful for any person, co-partnership or corporation in the city of New York, unless said person, co-partnership or corporation shall have complied with the requirements of the preceding paragraph, to hold him or themselves out to the public as a master or employing plumber by the use of the word "plumber" or "plumbing," or words of similar import or meaning on signs, cards, stationery or in any other manner whatsoever.

(c) No person, co-partnership or corporation registered as provided in the preceding section, or who holds a certificate from the examining board of plumbers, shall, for the benefit of any person engaged in the plumbing business who is not so registered, apply for, receive or make use of any permit granted to him by reason of being so registered, or holding such certificate from the examining board of plumbers.

(d) Any person, co-partnership or corporation violating any of the provisions of this section or the preceding section shall be fined for such offence in a sum not exceeding two hundred and fifty dollars, or by imprisonment for a term not exceeding three months, or by both, and in addition shall forfeit any certificate of the examining board of plumbers or any certificate of registration he may hold at the time of such conviction.

(e) Nothing in this section or the preceding section shall abrogate or impair any of the powers of the health department, the tenement house department, the board of aldermen and the board of estimate and apportionment of the city of New York, with respect to the regulation of plumbing and drainage in the said city.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Resolved, That in pursuance of the provisions of Subdivision 8 of Section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of thirty thousand two hundred and fifty dollars (\$30,250), the proceeds

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends that the Board of Aldermen request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to issue thirty thousand two hundred and fifty dollars (\$30,250), special revenue bonds, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the proceeds thereof to be used for making necessary repairs to the building known as the "Fulton Market," located on the block bounded by Fulton, South, Beekman and Front Streets, Borough of Manhattan, under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—The building occupied by the block bounded by Fulton, South, Beekman and Front Streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, formerly used for the purpose of and known as the "Fulton Market," has been abandoned for market purposes, and, by a resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted at a meeting held October 7, 1914, the Comptroller was authorized to derive such revenue as might be had until the ultimate disposition of the property might be decided upon by the Sub-Committee on Vacant Property.

The dilapidated condition of the building prohibits its rental either in part or in its entirety for any adequate sum or sums, and at present it represents a considerable loss of income, which might be retrieved by the expenditure of the amount necessary to place it in proper repair and rearrange it in such a manner that it may be used for business purposes.

It is proposed to rebuild the upper portion of the building, including the roof, and to replace the present floor, at an estimated expense of approximately \$30,250, as set forth in the attached report of Mr. Chandler Withington, Chief Engineer.

The assessed valuation of the property as at present is \$450,000, to which may be added the amount of the proposed expenditure, making a total of \$480,000, which sum may be considered as a fair valuation of the property for the purpose of determining what amount would represent an adequate return from it as an investment.

At present it shows a return of only \$9,099.60 per annum, but if placed in proper condition and rented, would produce about \$32,760 annually, and when fully occupied by responsible tenants on long term leases, might be advantageously disposed of by the City.

It is proposed to divide the floor space into 18 store spaces, five year leases of which at upset rentals, will be sold with the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. Such leases will contain a provision that the lessees shall erect and maintain the required partitions in accordance with certain specifications provided and approved by the City.

There will be nine store spaces fronting on South Street, one 27 feet by 80 feet at each corner of the block, with seven spaces 20 feet by 80 feet between them; four store spaces each fronting on Fulton Street and Beekman Street, the corner spaces being 25 feet by 85 feet, and the interior spaces 20 feet by 85 feet, with an interior store space 30 feet by 80 feet fronting on Front Street.

The estimated rental value of these spaces is as follows:

2 South Street corner spaces.....	\$6,000 per annum.
7 South street interior spaces.....	16,800 per annum.
2 Fulton and Beekman Street corner spaces.....	3,000 per annum.
6 Fulton and Beekman Street interior spaces.....	5,760 per annum.
1 Front Street interior space.....	1,200 per annum.
—making a total of \$32,760 per annum, or a return of 6.82 per cent. per annum upon investment valuation of \$480,000.	

Unsuccessful efforts have been made to find a purchaser for the building at a fair price, or a lessee who would pay a fair rental and make the necessary alterations and improvements. It therefore is apparent that the proper solution of the problem is for the City to repair and rent the building for a period of five years, at the end of which time it could probably be sold to advantage.

In order to provide the necessary funds for the above improvement, I recommend the adoption of the attached resolution. Yours respectfully,

Sir—It is proposed to repair this building, which is now in a dilapidated condition, so that it can be rented for market purposes.

There was considerable difference of opinion between the Comptroller and the Borough President of Manhattan as to the repairs which were considered necessary.

Tentative plans prepared by the Comptroller's office, which provided for repairs and alterations estimated to cost \$30,250, included the following items:

The removal of the towers, and also of the second story; the construction of a new roof on steel beams; a new concrete floor; the removal of masonry and doors from the archways on all four streets, and the relocation of some of the columns supporting the present roof.

They did not include provision for repairs to the exterior of the building or to the sidewalks.

The Borough President estimated that necessary work would cost \$70,000. This figure provided for all the work shown on the tentative plan of the Comptroller, and in addition, included plumbing, store fronts, partitions, painting, electric lighting and gas service.

The building was examined by an engineer of the Bureau of Contract Supervision, who by modifying the two plans mentioned above in certain unessential particulars estimated that the necessary work could be done within the amount of the request.

A conference was arranged between the representatives of the Comptroller and of the Borough President and the Engineer from the Bureau of Contract Supervision proposed modifications of plans, as follows:

The present flat roof framing to remain; the large skylights to be decked over; the walls of the towers and of the second story to be repaired instead of removed.

With these modifications of the Comptroller's plan, which were agreed to by the Borough President's representatives, it will be possible to make necessary repairs to the exterior, to the sidewalks and also to paint the interior, in addition to making complete repairs for the \$30,250, as requested.

The expenditure of this sum will place the building in serviceable condition, and will result in the return to the City of considerable revenue. Respectfully,

Dear Sir—This department, under date of January 3rd, made application to your Board for the issuance of \$2,325 revenue bonds for the purpose of purchasing equipment for the new quarters of this Court in the Bergen Building. The request for this amount was predicated on the necessity for providing proper equipment not only for the additional needs of Chambers, the furnishing of an office for visiting Judges, but also for furnishing part 2, which has been found necessary to be held every month since the increase in the volume of business.

On March 13th, the sum of \$1,000 was allowed, it having been determined that owing to the absence of a formal assignment of a part 2 court room by the Sinking Fund Commission, no funds could be appropriated for furnishing this part. Since then suitable quarters have been assigned upon the third floor for this part. A bench, jury box and railings have been installed by the owner of the Bergen Building, and this, coupled with a separation of the equipment of part 1, provides working quarters. It has been found necessary, owing to the noise caused by those walking through this court room, to have suitable linoleum laid at the earliest opportunity in order to deaden sound. The room will require 200 square yards and the best estimate submitted, \$1.30 per square yard, indicates that the sum of \$260 is necessary for this purpose. In addition, in order to provide sufficient seating arrangements, at least three dozen court room chairs similar to those in use are required. The purchase price of these at \$6.45 each totals \$232.20.

1. Bay Parkway, Ocean Parkway to 64th Street..... \$7,000 00

The roadway of this section of Bay Parkway, which is macadam, is in very bad condition. It is proposed to scarify and resurface this roadway under contract. The work was anticipated for the year 1916, the cost of same being included in the budget estimate, but was, of necessity, eliminated at final budget adjustment. If the condition of this section of Bay Parkway is not improved during the present year, it undoubtedly will result in the roadway having to be entirely reconstructed in the near future.

2. Park Circle at intersection of Ocean Parkway and Coney Island Avenue..... \$4,000 00

The pavement of this Circle, two hundred feet in radius, is macadam, with the exception of a thirty-foot wide circumferential sheet asphalt roadway for business vehicles, which was completed last year. The entire Circle is subject to a large amount of traffic, as it is one of the main entrances to Prospect Park and is crossed by all automobiles going to and coming from Coney Island via Ocean Parkway. The macadam portion of this Circle was greatly damaged by the business traffic prior to the completion of the sheet asphalt pavement, and it has not been properly repaired since, owing to lack of funds. It is now proposed to provide a roadway for pleasure vehicles alongside the present traffic roadway, and to reserve a circle of one hundred and fifteen feet radius in the center, which will be parked. This arrangement will result in a great saving in roadway area to be repaired and will permit of better traffic regulations and improve the appearance of this Plaza. The work will be done under contract and will consist of scarifying and resurfacing a portion of the macadam area and the setting of curb for parked space.

As the work for which the above funds are needed should be carried on to completion just as soon as possible, your favorable action is urgently requested.

Sir—The items of the above request have been examined into by the Bureau of Contract Supervision and facts have been developed as follows:

1. Bay Parkway, Ocean Parkway to 64th Street..... \$7,000 00

The condition of this roadway is such that if it is not resurfaced this year it will need reconstruction at a much greater cost next year.

At the time of preparation of the 1916 budget the necessity for this work was realized, but it was thought that it might be deferred until 1917, by filling the holes and treating with oil, for which an allowance was made. Owing to the extremely severe winter, the entire roadway has deteriorated much more rapidly than was anticipated and the treatment which was provided for in the budget would be poor economy for this section of the parkway at this time. The budget allowance, owing to the same reason, will be required on other sections of the parkway.

It is proposed to scarify the surface of this roadway, put on two inches of new stone and finish the surface as plain macadam. This surface will be allowed to season and then it will be treated with a coat of non-asphaltic oil. This class of work has proven very economical under traffic conditions similar to those obtaining on this parkway.

The estimated cost submitted of \$7,000 is reasonable.

2. Park Circle, at intersection of Ocean Parkway and Coney Island Avenue..... \$4,000 00

This Circle has an area of about four acres, all of which is paved with macadam, except a strip thirty feet in width around the outside, which is paved with sheet asphalt and is used as a heavy traffic roadway. The condition of the macadam is very bad and no funds are available to restore it to satisfactory condition.

There is no necessity for any such area of paving as exists at this point, and it is believed that it would be more economical, more satisfactory, and enable the better

control of traffic, to lay out a circle some 230 feet in diameter in the center of this area, to set a cement curb around this circular plot and to maintain it as a park rather than as paved area. This arrangement will leave a strip of macadam 30 feet in width between the circular park and the present asphalt traffic road. This strip of macadam is to be resurfaced in the same manner as described above for Bay Parkway and used as a roadway for pleasure vehicles.

Street car tracks cross the centre of this circle and at present the condition of the paving in this railway area is very bad. Arrangements have been made to have this railway area put in proper condition by the railroad company at the time the proposed work is being done.

The cost of doing the entire work outlined above will not exceed the cost of putting this area in satisfactory condition, if left as a paved area, as at present, the results will be much better, and the future maintenance cost considerably reduced. Sir—The items requested have been examined into by the Bureau of Contract Supervision and facts have been developed as follows:

1. Repairs to greenhouses and reconstruction of Pit No. 1; installation of new heating plant, \$3,250.

These greenhouses consist of seven separate buildings and an office. Six of the houses are of modern construction and are in good condition, except that the frame west wall of one house has rotted and has only held together during the present winter because of bracing and covering with tar paper.

This wall will have to be reconstructed before next winter. It is proposed to replace the present rotten wooden siding with a concrete wall similar to the present walls of some of the other houses.

The seventh section known as Pit No. 1 of the greenhouse is in such poor condition as to be practically useless. It is poorly designed, the timbers are rotting and it has no facilities for heating or ventilating. It is proposed to tear out the present rotten wood, to replace siding with a concrete wall, to reconstruct the roof, and to provide pipes for heating, for a ventilating apparatus, and for benches for plants.

The present heating system of the greenhouses consists of three old style hot water boilers, assisted by one modern boiler acting as an auxiliary heating plant in two of the houses. The old style boilers are thirteen years old and, if retained, will not only need considerable repairing but be in continuous danger of breaking down. The heating is not quite satisfactory at present and will surely be inadequate if the seventh section is reconstructed.

It is believed that the best solution of the heating problem is to junk two of the old boilers, keeping the third old boiler for use only in case of emergency; to purchase four new sections for the present auxiliary boiler and a new ten section boiler of the same type as this auxiliary; to connect these boilers together and to install a system of valves so as to connect the two boilers to the entire greenhouse system. This plan will provide more and better regulated heat than at present and will require the operation of two boilers instead of the four now used. These new boilers should be equipped with grates which will permit the use of pea coal as fuel. The saving in cost of coal necessary to operate the plant as planned above will be sufficient to pay for the installation of the new boilers during the first year.

The requested amount of \$3,250 for this work is reasonable.

2. Painting and repairs to Kings Mansion.

This building has not been painted since 1912. The repairs to be made are minor and are incidental to the painting. To make these repairs and to give the building two coats of the best white lead and zinc paint will probably cost the \$300 requested.

3. Installing automatic electric pump at Golf House.

The capacity of the present pumping plant is about 250,000 gallons. There is a maximum need for only 16,000 gallons, or only about six per cent. of capacity. The plant costs about \$2,500 per year to operate. The proposed pump will cost \$1,000 for original installation and about \$550 per year to operate. Its installation will effect an economy during the first year of operation of about \$1,000 more than its cost for both installation and operation.

No funds are available in the department for any of this work; the work is all necessary, and the requested amount for each item is reasonable.

Hon. FRANCIS P. KENNEY, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen: No. 496—Request of the Board of Trustees of the College of the City of New York for \$17,367.34 special revenue bonds, the proceeds to be used for altering the Stadium of the College of The City of New York and for its maintenance and operation for the balance of the year 1916.

Sir—The sum requested is based upon an investigation heretofore made by the Bureau of Contract Supervision in connection with a request made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for \$27,627 for the same purpose, as a result of which recommendations were made in detail, as follows:

For Permanent Alterations and Equipment.

1—Portable screen, \$750—

This screen is to be erected inside of the existing iron fence surrounding the field, from one end of the stadium building to the other. The screen is necessary on occasions when admission is to be charged to the events held on the field.

2—Excavation under end of Stadium, \$3,000—

There is no place available to store the field and game apparatus used on the field. It is proposed to excavate space under one end of the stadium and construct retaining walls on the two interior sides. To provide storage space by any other method will be more costly. An additional building if erected would have to conform to the architectural features of the stadium and would reduce the field area, which is none too large.

3—Office Equipment—Two offices at \$350 each, \$700—

This equipment is necessary to furnish and equip the office to be occupied by the additional instructors and clerical help, herein recommended.

4—Property room equipment, \$500.

This is necessary to provide shelving, racks and cases for the storage and care of the game apparatus for which there is now no provision.

5—Store room equipment, \$500—

This is necessary to provide shelving and cases for the storage of the field apparatus which is to be cared for in this store room.

6—Heating, \$500—

In the stadium there are several rooms for storage and offices, four of which contain plumbing fixtures, such as toilets and shower baths. No heat has been provided for these rooms. It is necessary that heat be provided in order to permit use of these rooms during the cold weather and to protect the plumbing fixtures from freezing. An installation of gasteam radiators is proposed. This is the cheapest installation that will give adequate service.

7—Field benches, \$300.

These benches are to be provided for the use of the large number of contestants on the field while awaiting their turn in the different events. No facilities have been provided for this purpose.

8—Stadium roof and lobby equipment, \$1,500.

In order to permit the use of the stadium for practice during times when the field cannot be used owing to weather conditions, it is necessary to provide cages in the covered lobby and on the roof of the stadium. The officials of the College deem it essential that the athletes should have daily practice throughout the year.

9—Entrance from Hygiene Buildings to Field, \$2,332—

On June 4, 1915, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution closing West 138th street, from Amsterdam to Convent avenues. This was approved by the Mayor on June 5, 1915. The chief argument advanced in favor of this closing was that it would provide a direct entrance to the stadium from the Hygiene Building, on college property. This entrance would then be under direct control of the college authorities.

It is proposed to construct an entrance doorway with steps leading from the corridor of this building to the street level, and fences on each side of the passageway across the street, thus providing a direct entrance to the stadium, with the control necessary, so that only contestants or those having business on the field would be permitted to enter this way. Owing to this construction no additional help will be required to care for this entrance. As at present, one additional man will be required when the field is in use. This work will also provide an additional exit from the Hygiene Building in case of fire. There is at present only one exit from the building.

10—Wire partitions in underground passageway, which connects all the college buildings, \$200—

This partition is required to form a locker room to contain the lockers which will be used by field contestants. There is at present no available room for these lockers. The partition to be erected is necessary to permit of proper control of those using the lockers.

11—New filter and pump, \$1,500—

The filters at present in use are of insufficient capacity to meet the increased demand for bathing facilities which will ensue when the new field is used. The present filters take 50 hours to filter the water required to fill the swimming pool. With the additional filter and circulating pump requested it will be possible to reduce this time to 20 hours. The water can in addition be kept circulating through the filter at other times in order to maintain its clarity. This is necessary as a safeguard for the lives of the bathers using the pool. One life has been lost here owing to the muddiness of the water preventing the instructor from seeing the unconscious bather at the bottom of the pool in time to save his life.

12—Alterations in Hygiene Building, \$1,060—

The use of the stadium and field will require that additional space be provided for the medical examination of the contestants and for the keeping of records of the individuals examined. It is proposed to provide the necessary additional space by enlarging the present medical examination room in the Hygiene Building by adding the adjoining space occupied by the laboratory, moving the laboratory to the present shower bath room. This will also provide space for the record file cases which are now in the hallway. The shower baths will be transferred to the room formerly used

as a shower bath room but which is now used as a storage room and office, the shower bath partitions having been left as originally installed. A large room on the first floor will be divided into three small offices for use of the gymnasium instructors. These rearrangements will provide the necessary facilities at a very reasonable cost.

Total for permanent alterations and equipment \$12,642.

4—Maintenance, \$800—

It is recommended that the sum of \$800 be allowed for maintenance for the remainder of the year 1916. This amount will be required for the purchase of the initial equipment necessary for the care of the field, such as wheelbarrows, shovels, rakes, lawn mower, hose and other implements, office equipment, stationery and supplies, and items of repairs to roofs, plumbing, concrete and other work.

AN ORDINANCE to amend § 30 of article 2 of chapter 17 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to the use of drives and bridle paths in parks.

Be It Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 30 of article 2 of chapter 17 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 30. Use of drives and bridle paths.

In all parks and parkways the drives shall be used only by persons in pleasure vehicles, on bicycles or on horseback; the bridle paths only by persons on horseback. Animals to be used on either shall be well broken, and constantly held in such control that they may be easily and quickly turned or stopped [; except as otherwise provided in this article, they shall not be allowed to move at a rate of speed on the drives or bridle paths of more than 8 miles an hour]. No person shall operate, drive or propel, and no owner thereof riding thereon or therein shall cause or permit to be operated, driven or propelled, on any park drive, parkway or park street, any bicycle, tricycle, velocipede, motor-cycle, motor-tricycle, motor delivery wagon, or motor vehicle, however propelled, or any vehicle drawn by horses or other animals, recklessly or negligently, or at a speed or in a manner so as to endanger, or to be likely to endanger, the life or limb or property of any person. A rate of speed exceeding 15 miles per hour shall constitute prima facie evidence of a prohibited rate of speed and manner of driving, and a violation of the provisions of this section; a rate of speed exceeding 20 miles per hour shall constitute a prohibited rate of speed and manner of driving, and a violation of the provisions of this section; and a rate of speed exceeding 25 miles per hour, on parkways in the outlying sections of the parks of the boroughs of The Bronx, Richmond, and Queens, shall constitute a prohibited rate of speed and manner of driving, and a violation of the provisions of this section. When an officer on duty shall direct, by gesture or otherwise, that the speed of an animal or vehicle shall be checked, or that it shall be stopped, or its course altered, such direction shall be immediately obeyed. No horse or other beast of burden, nor any automobile, shall be driven or suffered to stand anywhere except on the drive or bridle path. On all driveways and parkways where grass plots divide the way, all vehicles and horsemen must keep to the right-hand drive or bridle path.

3. Applications for Licenses. All applications to the police commissioner for licenses required by this section shall be in writing and signed by the applicant, and shall be in such form and detail as the said commissioner may prescribe.

4. License Fees; Disposition Thereof. The annual fee for each such license shall be one dollar, which shall be paid by the applicant upon the issuance of the license. All fees received for licenses issued in pursuance of this section shall be by the police commissioner paid into the police pension fund, and a detailed account of all such fees shall be rendered monthly by the said commissioner to the comptroller of the city.

5. Expiration of Licenses. All licenses issued under this section shall, unless sooner suspended or revoked, as hereinbefore provided, expire on the 30th day of June next succeeding the date of the issuance thereof.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of a Special Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Monday, April 24, 1916, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President; Alexander Keogh, Commissioner. The President presided.

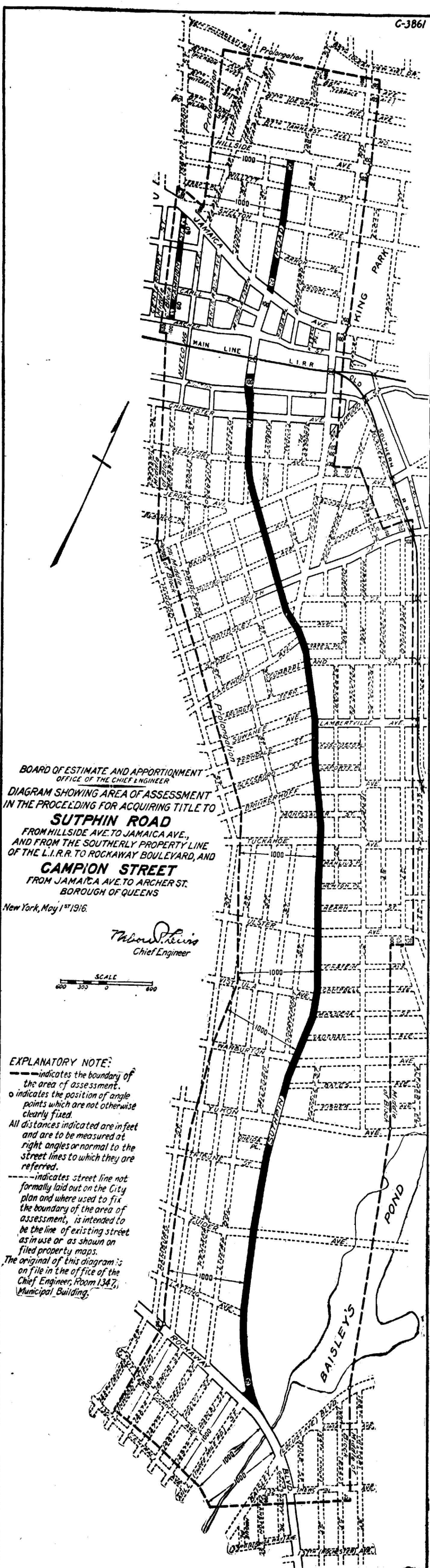

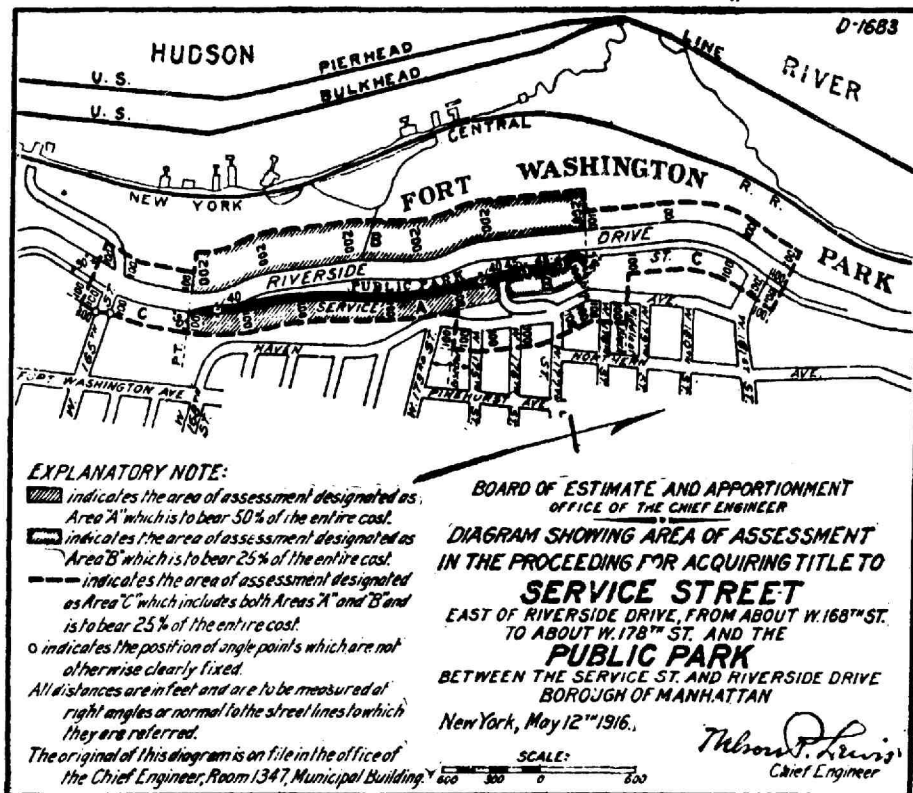

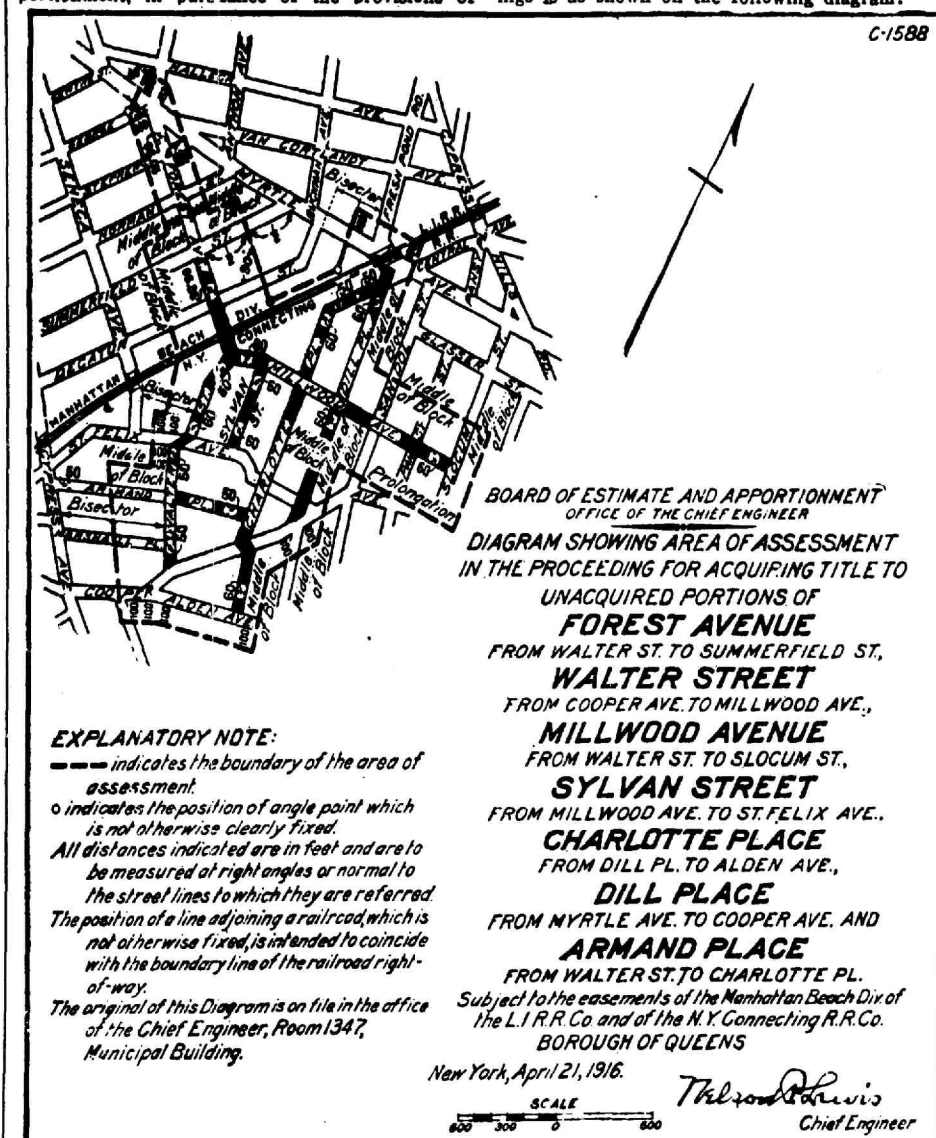

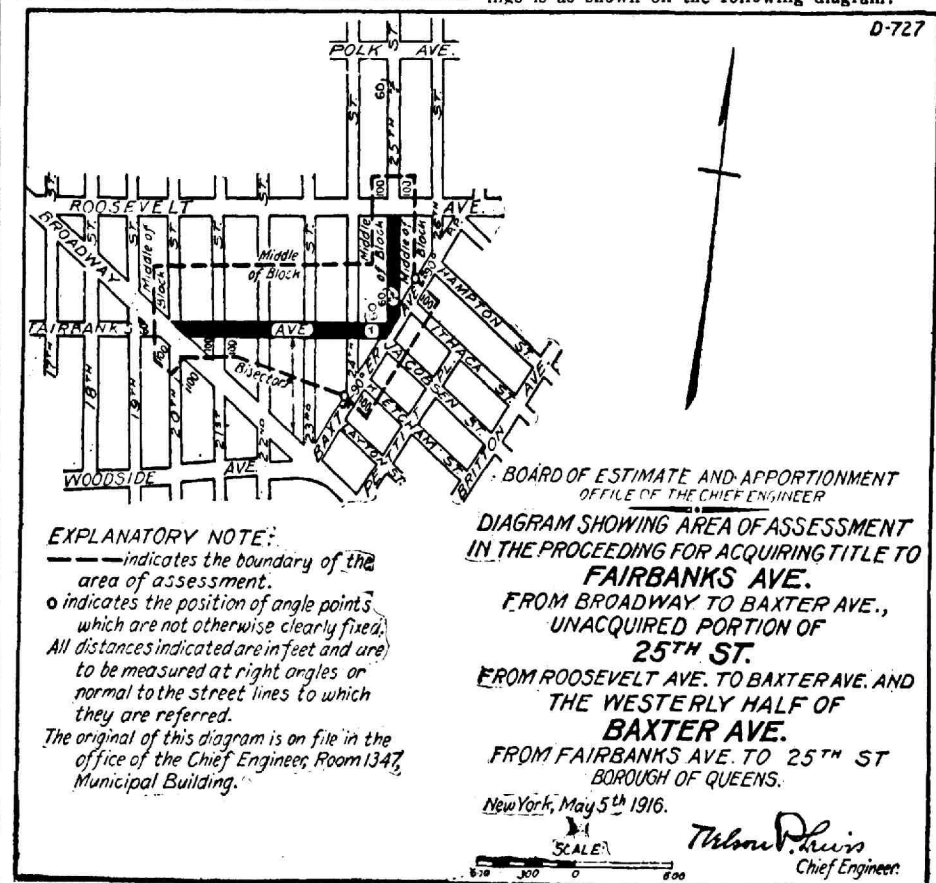

(a) Sixteen (16) tracks across Hamilton Street (Winstead Avenue), between Fulton Street (Jamaica Avenue) and South Street (Liberty Avenue), adjoining the two existing main line tracks of the Company;

Said last named portion shall be apportioned in the manner provided by the Railroad Law for the elimination of existing grade crossings, except that in no event shall the City's share of such portion exceed the sum of forty-eight thousand five hundred dollars (\$48,500), and the Company agrees to assume and repay to the City any sum in excess of the said forty-eight thousand five hundred dollars (\$48,500), which the City may be required to pay as its share of such portion. The Company shall at its own entire cost and expense, for the entire

term of this contract, whether original or renewal, maintain the said bridge and the piers and abutments thereof in good order and repair."

—and

WHEREAS, Section 2, Seventeenth, in the second paragraph thereof, provided as follows:

"It is provided that the period herein fixed for completing the reconstruction of the bridge across South Street and performing the work in connection therewith, and for completing the construction of the bridge across Farmers Avenue, removing the surface tracks from the said avenue and performing the work in connection therewith, may be extended by the Board, but the total extension of time in the case of either of said streets shall not exceed in the aggregate one (1) year, and provided further that when the commencement or completion of such construction or reconstruction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court, or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within the control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company; and provided further that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay and delivered to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless, upon the request of the Board, the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board, either in its own name as a party or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings."

—and

WHEREAS, Pursuant to section 2, Sixth, as above, the period for the completion of construction of the bridge across Hamilton Street and the work in connection therewith is about to expire—i. e., on May 4, 1916; and

WHEREAS, Pursuant to section 2, Tenth, as above, the time for the completion of construction of the bridge across Farmers Avenue and the work in connection therewith expired on May 4, 1915; and pursuant to Section 2, Seventeenth, as above, the Board, on the application of the Company and by resolution adopted April 30, 1915, and approved by the Mayor May 4, 1915, granted an extension of time up to and including May 4, 1916, within which to complete the construction of the bridge across Farmers Avenue and the work in connection therewith, which period is about to expire; and

WHEREAS, The Company, by a verified petition dated March 27, 1916, has applied to the Board for a further extension of time of three (3) months within which to complete the construction of the bridge across Hamilton Street and the Bridge across Farmers Avenue, and to complete the work in connection therewith, as required by said contract, as amended:

Now, THEREFORE, in consideration of the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50) to be paid by the Company to the City on or before June 30, 1916, and of the mutual covenants herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

SECTION 1, First: All the remaining portion of Section 2, Sixth, of said contract of May 4, 1914, beginning with and including paragraph "(c)" is hereby amended to read as follows:

"(c) The construction of said bridge or archway shall be completed in no event later than August 1, 1916. During the period prior to August 1, 1916, and pending the construction of said bridge or archway, the Company may construct, maintain and operate the tracks hereby authorized across Hamilton Street at the same grade as the surface of said street; provided, however, that the Board may, by resolution, direct the removal of such tracks from the surface of Hamilton Street and the construction of a bridge or archway across said street before August 1, 1916.

The Company shall complete the construction of the bridge or archway hereinabove provided for on or before August 1, 1916, or within the time fixed by the Board, should the Board direct the prior removal of the surface tracks and the Company shall, on or before such date, or within such time, as the case may be, remove from the surface of Hamilton Street the sixteen (16) tracks and the two (2) main line tracks and thereafter maintain and operate the same upon said bridge or archway, subject to the terms and conditions of this contract.

Should the Company fail or neglect to complete the construction of the said bridge or archway on or before August 1, 1916, or within the period fixed by the Board, should it direct the prior removal of the surface tracks, as the case may be, or should the Company within the same time fail to remove from the surface of Hamilton Street the sixteen (16) tracks hereby authorized and also the said two (2) main line tracks, the right and privilege hereby granted to construct, maintain and operate sixteen (16) tracks across Hamilton Street shall cease and determine on and after August 1, 1916, or on and after the date fixed for the prior removal of the surface tracks.

Should the Company not take advantage of the privilege to construct, maintain and operate the tracks hereby authorized upon the surface of Hamilton Street as hereinbefore provided, and fail to complete construction of the said bridge or archway on or before August 1, 1916, the right and privilege hereby granted to construct, maintain and operate sixteen (16) tracks across Hamilton Street shall cease and determine on and after August 1, 1916.

Second: Paragraph "(c)" of Section 2, Tenth, of said contract of May 4, 1914, is hereby amended to read as follows:

"(c) The Company shall commence and complete the work of constructing said bridge and of changing the street grades and drainage system, as above provided, on or before August 1, 1916, and shall within the same period remove from the surface of Farmers Avenue the three (3) unauthorized tracks and the two (2) main line tracks now constructed thereon; otherwise the right and privilege hereby granted to construct, maintain and operate three (3) tracks across Farmers Avenue shall cease and determine on and after said August 1, 1916.

Third: The second paragraph of Section 2, Seventeenth, of said contract of May 4, 1914, is hereby amended to read as follows:

"It is provided that the period herein fixed for completing the reconstruction of the bridge across South Street and performing the work in connection therewith may be extended by the Board, but the total extension of time shall not exceed in the aggregate one (1) year; and provided further that when the commencement or completion of such reconstruction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within the control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such reconstruction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company. And provided further that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay and delivered to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders

and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless, upon the request of the Board, the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board, either in its own name as a party or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

SECTION 2. It is mutually understood and agreed that, except as herein expressly provided, nothing in this contract contained shall be deemed to affect in any manner the provisions of the contract entered into between the City and the Company, dated May 4, 1914, as amended by said resolution adopted by the Board April 30, 1915, and approved by the Mayor May 4, 1915, and the Company hereby promises, covenants and agrees, on its part and behalf, to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in such contract of May 4, 1914, as modified by said resolution, and as further modified or altered by the provisions of this instrument.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by The Manhattan Refrigerating Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to The Manhattan Refrigerating Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of the City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract, made and executed in duplicate this 19th day of May, 1916, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and The Manhattan Refrigerating Company, a domestic corporation (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesses:

Whereas, By resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen April 1, 1890, and approved by the Mayor April 8, 1890, the Greenwich Refrigerating Company was granted permission to lay

two pipes not more than six inches in diameter, each, beneath the surface of the following streets:

West Street and Tenth Avenue from Horatio Street to 14th Street;
14th Street from Tenth Avenue to the North River;
Thirteenth Avenue from Horatio Street to 14th Street;
Horatio Street from Thirteenth Avenue to West Street;
Gansevoort Street from West Street to Thirteenth Avenue.

Bloomfield Street and the streets or parts of streets immediately adjoining the new market located in the Ninth Ward of The City of New York, bounded by Tenth Avenue and West Street, Thirteenth Avenue and by Gansevoort and Bloomfield Streets and the streets and passages intersecting said market.

for the purpose of conducting salt water for refrigerating purposes, subject to certain conditions named therein; and

Whereas, On or about March 18, 1898, the said permission was transferred by the grantee thereof to the Manhattan Refrigerating Company (the Company); and

Whereas, Under date of May 23, 1898, the Company entered into an agreement with the Comptroller of the City, authorizing the Company on certain terms and conditions to construct and maintain its system of refrigeration in the new West Washington Market and the buildings and stands thereon; and

Whereas, Pursuant to the said resolution and the said agreement, the Company and its predecessor did construct, maintain and operate conduits, pipes and appurtenances within the limits of West Washington Market and under and along several of the streets named in the aforesaid resolution of the Board of Aldermen outside the limits of the market; and

Whereas, Under date of December 8, 1915, the Company applied to this Board for a franchise to construct, maintain and operate conduits and pipes for refrigeration purposes in a certain specified district in the Borough of Manhattan, which to some extent includes the streets named in the said resolution of the Board of Aldermen outside the limits of the West Washington Market; and

Whereas, The Company has stated its willingness and intention to pursue any and all rights acquired by it pursuant to the aforesaid resolution of the Board of Aldermen, except so far as they may include permission to construct, maintain and operate conduits, pipes and appurtenances within the limits of the West Washington Market and in such portions only of the streets outside the limits of the market as may be necessary to connect the refrigeration system in the market with the Company's plant.

Now, therefore, in consideration of the premises and of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The permission granted to the Greenwich Refrigerating Company by resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen April 1, 1890, and approved by the Mayor April 8, 1890, and subsequently acquired by the Company, authorizing the construction, maintenance and operation of pipes for refrigeration purposes in the streets and passages intersecting the West Washington Market and certain streets, avenues and highways of the City outside the market, as set forth and specified in the aforesaid resolution is hereby surrendered by the Company to take effect on and after the first day of August, 1916, the Company reserving and retaining to itself, however, the right by said resolution granted, to construct, maintain and operate pipes for refrigeration purposes in the streets and passages intersecting the West Washington Market, bounded by Tenth Avenue and West Street, Thirteenth Avenue, Gansevoort and Bloomfield Streets, and in the streets or portions thereof immediately adjoining the said market, as follows:

Bloomfield Street between the westerly line of Thirteenth Avenue and the easterly line of Tenth Avenue, West Street and that portion of Tenth Avenue between the northerly line of Bloomfield Street and the northerly line of Horatio Street, which lies outside of the district described in Section 2 of this contract; Gansevoort Street between the easterly line of West Street and the westerly line of Thirteenth Avenue; Thirteenth Avenue between the southerly line of Gansevoort Street and the northerly line of Bloomfield Street; and the southerly line of Bloomfield Street, subject upon the Company and upon its use of said streets and passages, and to all the rights of the City contained in the said resolution of April 1, 1890, and with the reservation above noted, the aforesaid resolution of the Board of Aldermen and the permission contained therein, is hereby agreed and declared to be, and the same shall be null, void and of no effect on and after said first day of August, 1916, and with the said reservation the Company hereby releases and forever quit-claims to the City on and after said first day of August, 1916, any and all rights and privileges granted by or contained in the aforesaid resolution.

It is further agreed that nothing in this contract contained shall be construed as to effect, impair or lessen the right or obligation of the Company as contained in the aforesaid resolution of the Board of Aldermen and in the aforesaid agreement with the Comptroller to construct, maintain or operate its pipes in the streets or passages intersecting West Washington Market, bounded as aforesaid, or in the streets or portions thereof described in this section immediately adjoining said market.

Section 2. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate conduits and pipes with the necessary branches and extensions thereof leading directly into private property for the sole purpose of supplying refrigeration to consumers, provided that such conduits shall not be of greater outside dimensions, including insulation and other covering, than as follows:

Main line conduits, 25 inches by 20 inches.
Branch and service line conduits, 30 inches by 18 inches.

The conduits and pipes hereby authorized shall be constructed only beneath the surface of the streets and only in, through, along or across such streets, avenues and highways as are included within the following described district in the Borough of Manhattan

DISTRICT.

Beginning at a point on the easterly line of Eleventh Avenue 110 feet 8 inches north of the northerly line of West 14th Street measured along the easterly line of Eleventh Avenue; thence easterly through private property and across Tenth Avenue and Ninth Avenue on a line parallel with the northerly line of West 14th street to a point formed by the intersection of said block line with the easterly line of Lot 13 in Block 627; thence southerly along the easterly line of Lot 13 to the northerly line of West 14th Street; thence southerly from the last named point across West 14th Street to the southerly line thereof at its intersection with the easterly line of Lot 17 in Block 629; thence southerly along the easterly line of Lots 17 and 4 to the northerly line of West 13th Street; thence southwesterly on a straight line across

and along West 13th Street and Gansevoort Street to a point formed by the intersection of the southerly line of Gansevoort Street and the westerly line of West 4th Street; thence southerly along the westerly line of West 4th Street to the northerly line of Horatio Street; thence westerly to a point 99 feet west of the westerly line of West 4th Street; thence northerly along the westerly line of Lot 43 of Block 627 to the northerly line of Lot 54 of Block 627; thence westerly along the northerly line of Lots 54, 55, 56, and 59 of Block 627 to the westerly line of Lot 37 of Block 627; thence northerly along the westerly line of Lot 37 to the northerly line of Lot 59; thence westerly along the northerly line of Lot 59 to the westerly line of Lot 59; thence southerly along the westerly line of Lot 59 to the northerly line of Lot 28 of Block 627; thence westerly along the northerly line of Lot 28 to the easterly line of Hudson Street; thence westerly across Hudson Street to the westerly line thereof at its intersection with the southerly line of Lot 12 of Block 627; thence southerly along the southerly line of Lots 12, 8 and 7 to the easterly line of Lot 2 of Block 627; thence southerly along the easterly line of Lot 2 to the southerly line of Lot 2; thence westerly along the southerly line of Lot 2 to the easterly line of Greenwich Street; thence westerly across Greenwich Street to the westerly line thereof at its intersection with the southerly line of Lot 57 of Block 643; thence westerly along the southerly line of Lot 57 to the easterly line of Lot 63 of Block 643; thence northerly along the easterly line of Lot 63 to the northerly line of Lot 63; thence westerly along the northerly line of Lots 63, 64, 65, 66, 67, 68, 70 and 71 of Block 643 to the westerly line of Lot 71; thence southerly along the westerly line of Lot 71 to the southerly line of Lot 40 of Block 643; thence westerly along the southerly line of Lot 40 to the easterly line of Washington Street; thence westerly across Washington Street on a prolongation of the southerly line of Lot 40 to the westerly line of Washington Street; thence southerly along the westerly line of Washington Street to the center line of Horatio Street; thence westerly along the center line of Horatio Street to the easterly line of West Street; thence northerly along the easterly line of West Street and the easterly line of the southerly line of Little West 12th Street; thence westerly at right angles to the easterly line of Tenth Avenue to the center line of Tenth Avenue; thence northerly along the center line of Tenth Avenue to its intersection with a prolongation of the northerly line of West 13th Street; thence westerly on a prolongation of the northerly line of West 13th Street to a prolongation of the easterly line of Eleventh Avenue; thence northerly along the easterly line of Eleventh Avenue to the point or place of beginning.

signed by T. A. Adams, President, a copy of which is hereto annexed and made a part of this contract.

Section 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said conduits shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of fifteen (15) years from August 1, 1916, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of ten (10) years upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested persons selected in the following manner:

One disinterested person shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested person shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested person, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of the original term of this contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen.

They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall in any event be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) in cash within one (1) month after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five years, an annual sum which shall be equal to two (2) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250).

During the second term of five years, an annual sum which shall be equal to four (4) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than four hundred dollars (\$400).

During the third term of five years, an annual sum which shall be equal to four (4) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than six hundred dollars (\$600).

The gross receipts mentioned above shall be the total receipts of the Company or any subsidiary of the Company, or of any purchaser of refrigeration from the Company for purpose of resale from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers except those located in West Washington Market.

(c) An annual payment for each linear foot of conduit constructed within the limits of the streets under the franchise hereby granted (excepting, however, such conduits as are constructed within the vault space or vault spaces of any building or buildings used or occupied exclusively by the Company for the purpose of its business) as follows:

For conduits of outside dimensions, not exceeding insulation and other covering, not exceeding 30 inches by 18 inches—twenty-five cents (25c).

For conduits of outside dimensions, including insulation and other covering, exceeding 30 inches by 18 inches—but not exceeding 35 inches by 20 inches—thirty cents (30c).

An annual payment of two dollars (\$2) for each manhole constructed within the limits of the streets under the franchise hereby granted. The annual charges shall commence on August 1, 1916.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on February 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to December 31, next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between August 1, 1916, and December 31, 1916, shall bear to the whole of one year.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal) notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payments for refrigerating rights or franchises at a different rate, or no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof of any of the streets, avenues or highways included within the district herein described or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual, firm or other corporation a similar right, privilege or other property of the same or other terms and conditions in the same streets, avenues, highways and other property of the City included within the district hereinbefore described.

Fifth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth—Upon the termination of the original term of this contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination or forfeiture of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the conduits, pipes and appurtenances of the company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets, avenues, highways and other property of the City shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its conduits and appurtenances constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets, avenues, highways and other property of the City shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Seventh—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets, avenues, highways and other property of the City in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Eighth—All construction which shall be made under this grant shall be done in a manner solely upon the terms and conditions hereafter to be imposed by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, or their respective successors in authority. The said Company shall submit a working plan of construction to the said President and to the said Commissioner, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said conduit lines, connections, manholes and other appurtenances, and the mode of protection of all subsurface construction under the street in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Ninth—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, avenues, highways and other property of the City, required on account of the construction or operation of the conduits of the Company, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Tenth—It is agreed that the right hereby granted shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said conduits in any way interfere with the construction or maintenance of public works in the streets, avenues, highways and other property of the City, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the conduits and appurtenances in the

manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Eleventh—The Company shall bear the expense of keeping in repair for one year after it has been replaced, all pavement which may at any time be removed by said Company, either for the purpose of construction or for repairing of the conduit line and its appurtenances.

Twelfth—The Company shall bear the expense of inspection which may be required by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and of all work of construction.

Thirteenth—The Company shall, at its own expense, remove from beneath the surface of Tenth Avenue the unused conduits, pipes and appurtenances now existing therein from a point at or near the southerly line of Bloomsfield Street to a point at or near the southerly line of 14th Street, as shown by the hatched broken black line on the map hereto attached. The work of removal shall be done whenever the street is being repaved and within such reasonable time as may be fixed by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and under his supervision. In case of the Company's failure to comply with the above provision, the Borough President shall remove the conduits, pipes and appurtenances at the Company's expense.

Fourteenth—The Company shall cause a test to be made of the pipes to be contained within the conduits hereby authorized whenever required by and under the supervision of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The conditions of such test shall be as follows:

(a) If the test be made in the foundry where the pipes are manufactured, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of three hundred (300) pounds per square inch.

(b) If the test be made in the field, of pipes in use or ready for use, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of two hundred (200) pounds per square inch.

A certificate showing that such a test has been made without injury to the pipes shall be executed by an officer of the Company, and indorsed by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and filed with the Board.

Fifteenth—The Company shall not charge consumers more than the following rates for refrigeration to be furnished to boxes properly insulated at a temperature of not lower than 32 degrees Fahrenheit:

Four (4) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of not over 500 cubic feet.

Two (2) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of over 500 cubic feet, but less than 1,500 cubic feet.

One (1) cent per month per cubic foot for boxes of 1,500 cubic feet and over.

These rates to apply to boxes located not above the first floor of any building.

During the term of this contract the Board shall have absolute power to regulate the maximum and minimum rates for all refrigeration, and the Company agrees to abide by such rates provided that such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Sixteenth—The Company, upon the application for refrigeration of any person, firm or corporation whose premises are located within the district within which the Company is hereby authorized to operate, shall extend its conduits to such premises and furnish to said applicant refrigeration at rates not exceeding those herein prescribed or hereafter fixed by the Board as herein provided, on condition that before any such extension shall be made, such person, firm or corporation shall agree, in writing, to accept and pay for such service for a reasonable time not exceeding one (1) year. The Company shall not be required, however, to furnish refrigeration to applicants before October 1, 1916, nor to applicants whose premises are located above the first floor of any building.

Seventeenth—A correct map shall be furnished to the Board by the Company on the first day of February, 1917, showing the exact location of all conduit lines and manholes constructed, with reference to the street lines, the curb lines and the street surface, together with a statement of the total length of such conduit. On the same date of each succeeding year, during the term of this contract, a supplementary map shall be furnished the Board showing all conduits laid during the preceding year.

Eighteenth—The conduit lines hereby authorized shall be used only by The Manhattan Refrigerating Company, and for no other purpose than supplying refrigeration.

Nineteenth—The Company shall submit a verified report to the Board not later than February 1, in each year, for the year ending December 31, next preceding, and at any other time, upon the request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued; for cash; for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt as by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. Number of feet of each kind of conduit now laid.
12. The total amount expended for same.
13. Amount, kind and capacity of machinery now in use and required for operation.
14. The total amount expended for same.
15. Quantity of refrigeration produced during the year and the average price received for same.
16. Quantity used in Company's own warehouses.
17. Quantity furnished to consumers (a) in West Washington Market; (b) outside West Washington Market.
18. Number and location of warehouses occupied by the Company, exclusively or in part, and the extent of such occupation by the Company.
19. Number of and gross receipts from consumers supplied (a) in West Washington Market; (b) outside West Washington Market.
20. Amounts paid by Company for damages to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
21. Total expenses of operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twentieth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross receipts from the privileges granted under this contract, and on or before February 1 in each year shall make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of New York of the business done by the Company for the year ending December 31 next preceding, as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain the total number of feet of each kind of conduit laid and of manholes constructed, the number of feet of each kind of conduit laid and the number of manholes constructed during the year, and also a statement of the gross receipts from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers, together with such other information and in such detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the

correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-first—In case of any violation or breach of failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the conduits constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-second—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at rates not exceeding those herein or hereafter fixed, or fail to maintain its conduits and appurtenances as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such conduits or appurtenances which may affect the surface of the street shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-third—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the conduits authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company.

Twenty-fourth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of Two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500), either in money or securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board, acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at rates not exceeding those herein or hereafter fixed, the removal of unused conduits and pipes, the restoration and repairs of the street pavement and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions, or compliance with such orders, or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any notice or direction of the Board, or other municipal officials, given or made pursuant to the terms of the contract, or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force, in such case and in any of these events, the Company shall (except where other sums are fixed by this contract) pay to the City the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) for each violation as liquidated damages for such failure, which sums may be deducted from said fund.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the liquidated damages provided for in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be required to pay such liquidated damages in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or after a hearing appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith require the payment of said sums herein provided for, or where the damages are not liquidated by the terms of this contract such amount as appears to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw such amount from the security fund deposited with him. The finding of the Board as to the amount to be paid by the Company shall be final and can only be attacked on the ground of fraud or mistake. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund, the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City the sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500), and in default thereof, this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

These provisions for the recovery of such damages are in addition to the right to forfeit the franchise, conferred by section 3, subdivision Twenty-first, of this contract.

Twenty-fifth—The grant of this franchise, so far as it shall include or affect the so-called Gansevoort Market Lands in the block bounded by Little West 12th Street, Washington Street, Gansevoort Street, West Street and Tenth Avenue, is and shall be subject to such other or further conditions, restrictions, agreement or consent as the Comptroller of the City may see fit to impose or require, pursuant to the authority and control over such lands vested in him by the Charter of the City.

Twenty-sixth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when

above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Twenty-seventh—The words "streets or avenues" and "streets and avenues" wherever used in this contract shall be deemed to mean streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, concourses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement included in the district hereinabove described, and under the surface of or in which authority is hereby given to the Company to construct or maintain its conduits.

Twenty-eighth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other Board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other Board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Section 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In WITNESS WHEREOF, the party of the first part by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed, and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

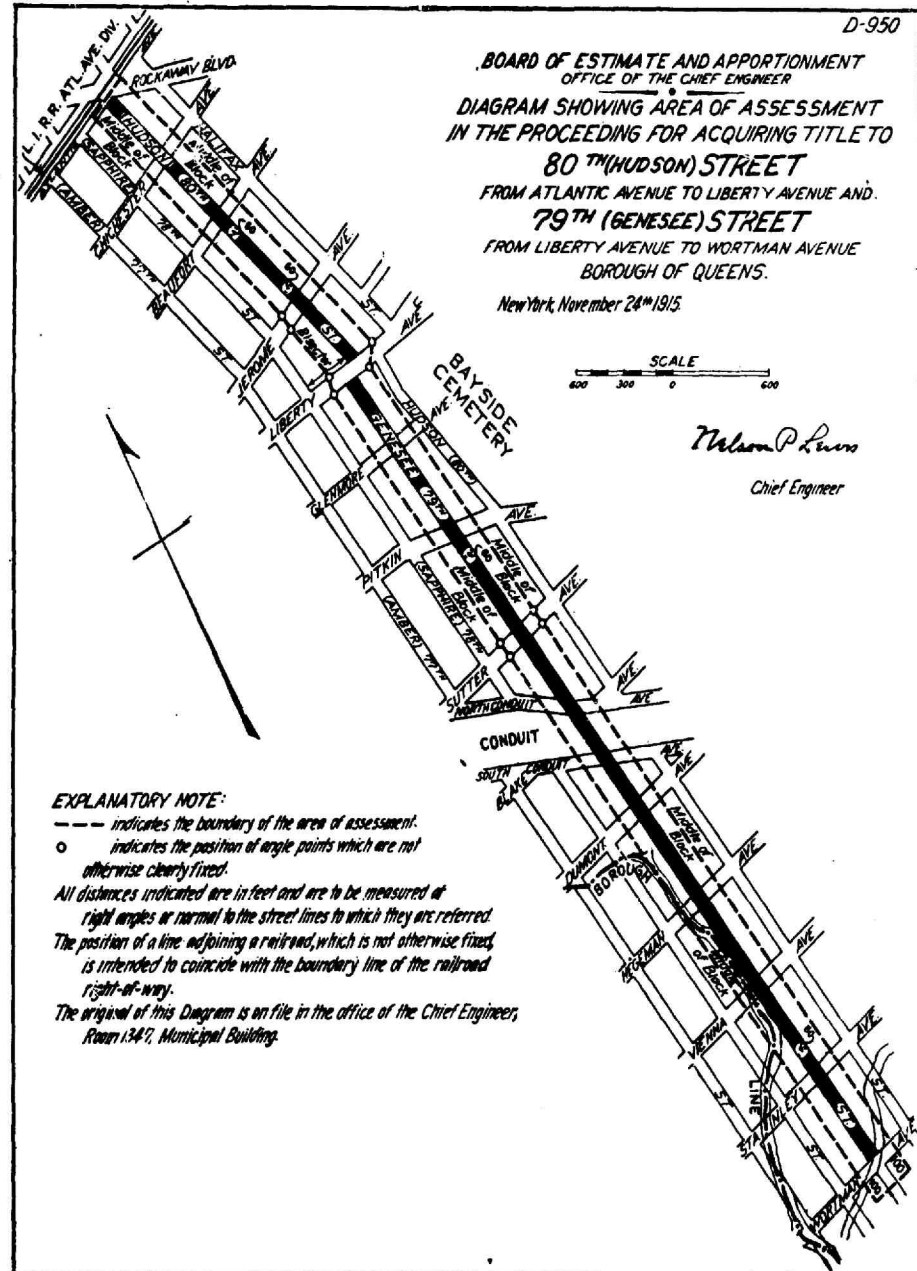

The permit for all openings in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and cost to which it may be liable, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting bricks, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions shall in any case be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and he it further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureau or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
