Sanitary Bureau

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending April 16, 1887:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 6,653.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 1,208.

During the past week 228 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 40 permits.

There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 7 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 10 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 119 permits

At premises where contagious diseases were reported, 407 visits were made, and 340 disinfections and 73 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 11.

number of vaccinations performed was 1,699, of which 580 were primary, and 1,119 revaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 15,870 pounds of meat, 26,200 pounds of fish, 12 boxes of candy, 500 barrels of fruit and vegetables, 1 barrel of apples, one-half barrel of beets, and 150 oranges

The number of specimens of milk examined was 64, the number of analyses of same made was 1; the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 6, and the number of arrests made was 2.

The certificates of 553 births, 60 still-births, 272 marriages and 825 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, April 16, 1887. This shows a decrease of 36 births and 3 still-births, and an increase of 112 marriages and 54 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was a decrease of 5 births and 11 stillbirths, and an increase of 50 marriages and 127 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from croup decreased 5; typhoid fever, 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; puerperal diseases, 1; rheumatism and gout, 5; cancer, 2; heart diseases, 12; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 5; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; apoplexy, 5; Bright's disease and nephritis, 7; premature and preternatural births, 2; surgical operations, 1, and drowning, 1; while the deaths from small-pox increased 4; measles, 8; scarlatina, 6; diphtheria, 5; whooping cough, 1; erysipelas, 2; malarial fevers, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 2; inanition, 5; alcoholism, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 19; bronchitis, 4; pneumonia, 28; meningitis and encephalitis, 3; convulsions, 3; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 9; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 6; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3, and suicide, 3. The number of deaths from aneurism was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 188 were in institutions, 467 in tenementhouses, 146 in houses containing three families or less, 14 in hotels and boarding-houses, 10 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 12 were on the basement floor, 137 on the first, 174 on the second, 172 on the third, 101 on the fourth, 30 on the fifth, I on the sixth; 811 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 14 non-residents; 101 were stated to be single, 245 married, 103 widowed, and the condition of 376 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 825; still-births, 60; hodies in transitu, 13; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 96 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 553 births; 272 marriages; 60 still-births; 825 deaths; 13 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 161 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 11 transcripts of the birth record, 8 of marriage, and 99 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending April 16, 1887, was 50.5 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.982, the mean humidity was 57, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,032, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.09 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 790 deaths and still-births, or 89.06 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 35; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 310; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 125; Greenwood (undenominational), 37; Lutheran, (undenominational), 114; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 17; Evergreen (undenominational), 60; Woodlawn (undenominational), 25; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 16; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 10; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 3; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 11; Washington (undenominational), 24.

The actual mortality for the week ending April 9, 1887, was 822; this is 139 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1886, and 110 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 29.04 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,472,152.

SIR—There were 760 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, April 23, 1887, which is a decrease of 65, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 64 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1886. The actual mortality for the week ending April 16, 1887, was 748, which is 35.0 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.41 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,472,974.
